## Engineers Consider Flood Menace Less

MEMPHIS, Tenn., May 26.—(INS)—After days of tall engineers believed today they had succeeded in saving the levee at Mouth's Landing, Miss., which for more than a week has threatened to crumble and inundate thousands of acres of lowland.

Today a hot loop was completed around the structure which two years ago gave way and inundated the city of Grenville and the engineers believe that if the entire dyke in front of it gave way, it probably would hold back the tons of flood water.


