seeking "a disguised victory with the October draft peace agreement." Saigon Ambassador Pham Dang Lam told the 172nd session of the semipublic Paris peace talks: "Unless they admit that their design is to achieve the reunification of Vietnam their way and to place the whole of Vietnam under their domination, the Hanoi authorities cannot fail to acknowledge that there are two distinct states of Vietnam."

He said both are "internationally recognized, each having its own political regime and exercising its sovereignty on its own territory, as in the cases of the two Germanys and the two Koreas." The four-party talks resumed today after a two-

week suspension. Their renewal was a preliminary

to the resumption Monday of peace negotiations between U.S. presidential adviser Henry A. Kissinger and Le Duc Tho of the North Vietnamese Politburo. U.S. Ambassador William J. Porter told the meeting the new year should mark "the concluding

phase of this protracted conflict" in Vietnam but added he did not "underestimate the problems which exist and which will face us still for some

Porter said the past four years of negotiations had been "largely sterile exchanges which only developed last October into a phase which can today be described as a serious negotiating process."

DESPITE A WHITE HOUSE SUG-GESTION that congressional intervention might prolong the war, Senate Democrats are in general agreement that Congress should try to end U. S. Involvement in Vietnam if President Nixon does not.



New to the courts is provision for the sentencing court to insure that a record is made of the entire sentencing proceeding. Another sentencing innovation is that the sentencing court shall state in each case affirmatively whether the sentence is concurrent or to such designation shall render the sentence concurrent. The new rule is a reverse of the former rule that sentences were consecutive unless otherwise specified by the court.





Social Security Is Inequity To Poor

WASHINGTON — The tax used to finance Social Security benefits is increasingly unfair to low and middle-income groups and is in urgent need of reform.

That conclusion is part of an analysis of the federal payroll tax published recently by the Brookings Institution.

John A. Brittain, author of the study - "The Payroll Tax for Social Security" — recommends that federal policy makers reappraise the tax and adopt a finance system based on the taxpayers' ability to pay rather than benefits in the

Brittain points out that the Social Security tax has grown faster than any other federal tax since the Second World War.

In 1971, tax collections to finance the federal old-age, survivors, disability, and health insurance (OASDH) programs reached \$44 billion, or 27 times the level of 1949. This increase, representing a compound annual growth rate of 16 per cent, raised the share of this tax in total federal revenue from 4 per cent to 23 per cent.

When other contributions to the over-all social insurance system are added, the total of 1971 becomes \$56 billion — far more than was collected under the corporate income tax and more than half the yield of the federal individual income tax.

The latest increase continues the upward crend. The maximum individual tax for OASDH rose to \$811 in 1971 and is due to reach \$1,320 in 1974, when a two-earner family may be paying as much as \$2,640 a year, or \$2,880 if the September, 1972, proposals of the Senate Finance Committee are enacted.

Explaining why this is so, Brittain said first that the rates seem low compared to the income tax, and that tax-payers assume that their payments are vested in their own names. Second, the case for Social Security has been skillfully presented. Because its benefits have done much to prevent and alleviate poverty, the

political institution. "But the main factors are popular ac-

ceptance of the payroll tax as a contribution to a trust fund analogous to a private insurance program, and ignorance of the burden imposed on low and middle-income groups," he said.

According to Brittain, Social Security experts have fostered the analogy between Social Security and private insurance since the program began in 1937.

In Brittain's view, persistence of the "insurance principle" has discouraged evaluation of the tax independently of the subsequent benefits and contributed to the headlong growth of payroll taxation.

Public understanding that individual taxes and benefits are not tied together, either legally or in practice, could open the door to consideration of more equitable means of financing



Cuba Conscious

Castro Makes Trip To Moscow

Why has Premier Fidel Castro suddenly rushed off to Moscow? What is troubling Cuba's bearded dictator? Ostensibly he flew to Moscow to attend the ceremonies marking the 50th anniversary of the Soviet Union. Cuba watchers suspect, however, that there is considerably more

During over a decade of alliance with the Soviet Union Castro had until now only paid three visits to that country. The first was in April of 1963, the second in January of 1964. and the third ended last July 5. This last visit closely followed President Nixon's trip to Moscow, and it is believed Castro was anxious to find out what, if anything, Mr. Nixon and the Soviet rulers discussed in regard to Cuba. Thus, Castro suddenly finds it necessary to take two trips

The suddenness of the decision to go was indicated by the fact that there was no advance word. Havana Radio simply reported he had left. His earlier pilgrimage in 1972 was an-

nounced weeks in advance. Observers believe it significant that Castro left for Moscow just four days after having been host to Chilean President Salvador Allende, himself en route home after a" trip to the Soviet Union. Did Allende tell Castro something that made him hurriedly fly off to Moscow? This appears to be a distinct possibility.

Despite his alliance with the Russians, Castro has never

fully trusted them. On at least two occasions they have made political moves inside Cuba aimed at diminishing Castro's power. On both occasions Castro managed to block the Soviet thrusts-but such maneuverings are hardly likely to have engendered trust or sincere friendship on either side. In the field of foreign relations, Castro and the Russians

In regard to the United States, the Soviet Union appears bent on closer ties and greater trade, while Castro rants and raves against "imperialism." In regard to Latin America, Castro has not abandoned his subversive efforts, whereas the Soviet Union has pursued its own policy of establishing diplomatic relations with the Latin American countries and expanding commerce with them.

In the early 1950s the communization of Cuba represented a major coup for the Soviet Union. The Iron Curtain was extended right into the United States' backyard. and Russia had a significant beachhead in the Western Hemisphere. But today Russian diplomats and traders move freely

about much of the hemisphere, and Cuba is less important to the Kremlin. Furthermore, Chile has moved in the direction of Marxism, and the Chilean Communist Party is a more stable and reliable ally to Russia than is the volatile Castro. An additional important factor is the financial cost of Cuba to Russia. No hard figures are available but experts believe that Cuba is costing the Soviet Union at least \$1.5

million a day. For a nation with its own economic problems,

this is a considerable drain. The question is, is Cuba worth it



Even as they are beset by difficulties they did not expect to accompany material well-being, Americans plainly turn away from the idea that their "system" should be drastically altered. Old laws of life mingle with new. So those who see "revolution" in the discontent, the distrust, and the flailing of our institutions just don't

In this time of swift change, quick answers are appealing, not only to simplistic radicals but to the millions in the middle courted for years by the purveyors of easy

But those same millions in the middle, like their counterparts in all ages, fear change even as they desire it. They dislike gross disruption. In this country, people are terribly rootless anyway. They need anchors, reference points, havens,

In their frustration they may fulminate against their institutions, and thereby mislead hopeful revolutionaries, But they sense that they need these institutions-changed somewhat but not to unrecognizable shape. They want

Their responses to oppressive bigness have produced some healthy "new freedoms," like wider participation in politics. But they have also led to excesses which sometimes make them seem determined to be ungovernable. The misguided haters of all order glorify these excesses. But the evidence mounts that more and more Americans are in fact sickened by them, and would welcome a new feeling of wholeness and order and direction in their

They have not been blessed with leaders who can articilate their new problems, let alone propose solutions. Yet all blame cannot fall upon the politicians, or the managers of industry. The playwrights and other writers find nothing new or revealing to say. Music has thinned down to a few faint strains, lost in the thunderous, repetitive "rock" beat which surely is only a contrivance to fill a vacuum, a distraction of the ear from the fact

Our very gains, then, have in critical ways been selfdefeating. As the deeply perceptive historian, Daniel J. Boorstin, observes, the "democratizing" of life has flattened out experience. Television, travel, and abundance level the landscape. Excitement fades quickly. The romance and drama of living vanish just as they are grasped. On just its sixth happening, man's remarkable run to the moon is taken by many like a tired rerun of a favored television serial.

There is an enormous failure in all this. Is it the in-

evitable failure of affluence? Is there nothing to satisfy us, to challenge us, after we have attained it? Some bright Americans do not think so. They are not the ones who say "return to nature," with its cruelties of disease and discomfort. Or who talk of halting tech-

nology and freeing men from all restraint. They are men who suggest we must find wholeness and purpose in developing better our inner riches of mind and heart, searching not for uncontrolled freedom but for rea individuality in special appreciation of the lasting wealth of art, music, literature, and thought. All these realms have indeed endured, and do offer immense reward.

Thus enlivened in spirit, men may take new heart tackling the "unchallenging" challenges of today's many complex and perversely multiplying problems-which now engulf and dishearten them. They may accept an old law of life: The pace of today notwithstanding, human problems always take time-and demand both brightness and endurance of spirit.







Minor electrical repairs can be handled by most homeowners. More caution than skill is required in such jobs. This is the chief difference between repairs on an electrical system and other repairs. Touching a live wire is the constant danger, a danger that can be elimi-

nated easily. Just make certain there are no live wires. Either pull the main switch, or pull the fuse for the circuit you are working on. The important thing here is that you remove the right fuse. With the power off you can






