

County Mulls Laser Use

"Lasers won't cause physical damage except to the eyes and only if they are closer than 1 1/2 miles from origin."

Seminole County Board of Commissioners were approached by Richard Manning and Don Woods of International Laser Systems, Inc. on Tuesday, about the possibility of using some space at the Osceola Airfield.

Manning said that his company is engaged in several contracts with the Air Force to build Laser experiments and that several thousand feet are needed to run the experiments. Osceola was considered by the company to be the best of any areas because of the sparsity of houses in the vicinity of the field and because it is a rural area.

Further, the fact that the airfield is not used except for the county landfill operation was an added attraction for the use. Laser Company wishes to employ Manning said that the tests would continue for one or two months, but there is a possibility that a long term lease would be sought for a

continuous testing program if contracts are received by the company. Commissioners were concerned about the possibility of damage to persons who might wander into the laser beam and there was some question about the planes which fly to and from the Sanford Airport over the Osceola area.

Woods explained that the lasers won't cause physical damage to people except to the eyes, and only if they are closer than one and one-half miles from the origin of the beam. The beam, according to Woods, is narrow, only ten feet wide, and that it would only be on for a short period of from under one minute to two or three minutes at most.

As 93rd Session Opens 'Nam Is Congress' Prime Topic

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite a White House suggestion that congressional intervention might prolong the war, Senate Democrats are in general agreement that Congress should try to end U.S. involvement in Vietnam if President Nixon does not.

The efforts of the President to end the tragic conflict in Indochina now through a negotiated settlement. With the war the prime topic of conversation at the opening of the 93rd Congress, White House press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler told newsmen: "Members of Congress should ask themselves if they want to be responsible for causing doubts in the enemy's mind and the United States position and therefore possibly prolonging the negotiations."

Rep. Bella Abzug, D-N.Y., introduced a bill calling for a prompt peace agreement and, if not, a cutoff of all money for the war. Rep. Michael J. Herrington, D-Mass., offered a resolution of inquiry calling for the President and defense secretary to report on the number of bombs dropped, shells fired, planes lost, and men killed, wounded, captured and missing since the bombing of North Vietnam was intensified Dec. 18.

The Senate Democratic Conference endorsed a statement by Majority Leader Mike Mansfield assigning top national priority to "termination, forthwith, of our involvement in the war in Vietnam." Mansfield noted Nixon could withdraw all U.S. forces from Indochina "by a stroke of the pen" but Congress cannot. "I do not know whether there is a legislative route to the end of this bloody travesty," the senator said, adding that Congress has no choice but to try.

PARIS (AP) — South Vietnam today renewed its demand that Hanoi recognize the existence of two sovereign states in Vietnam and accused the Communists of seeking "a disguised victory with the October draft peace agreement."



U.S. War Casualties Highest In Two Years

SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. Command today announced the loss of another B52 heavy bomber and another F111 fighter-bomber in the air war against North Vietnam.

It also reported that the recent air blitz on Hanoi and Haiphong pushed the total number of Americans killed, missing or captured during the last two weeks of 1972 to 109, the greatest number of American war casualties in two years. The South Vietnamese Command reported 116 enemy attacks across the country during the past 24 hours, including 82 rocket and mortar attacks. It was the highest 24-hour total in two months; but most, apparently, were small. First reports from the Saigon command said four civilians were killed and 43 wounded; no American casualties were reported.

by the American raids on Hanoi and Haiphong, apparently because of political repercussions. It was learned that the Nixon administration ordered the report withheld. However, North Vietnam broadcast a report that a preliminary survey showed 1,313 persons were killed and 2,801 wounded by the U.S. raids on Hanoi. It charged that the B52s had now turned to "carpet-bombing" population centers in the southern panhandle of North Vietnam since the bombing halt above the 20th parallel.

\$9 Million In Grants

ALTIMONTE SPRINGS—Announcement last Friday that this city is to receive federal money for a portion of its utility system is no new thing. With the most recent grant approved by the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency for expansion of the municipality's regional sewage treatment plant of \$3,402,000, the city over the past nine years has received a total in federal

funds amounting to \$8,458,100, most of which has been in outright grants. Grants are sums which do not require repayment. Total of grants has been \$4,223,100 according to Mayor Lawrence Swofford. This does not include the recent Legacy of Park grant at \$125,000 for improving the grounds of the Civic Center and other parks in the community.

Pursuit of federal money began in 1964 with acquisition and improvement of the city's water system. Shortly thereafter expansion of the water system was necessary and another federal loan of \$275,000 was approved.

In 1969, federal loan of \$995,000 was approved to begin the city's sewer system. This was followed by grants of \$401,100, \$247,500, and \$182,600, all for improvement of the sewer system, Swofford said.

Swofford said additional applications are being prepared to pursue more federal money for the city, as well.

In Brevard Road Closure Controversy

Closure of 13.2 miles of the Dunes Road between New Smyrna Beach and Playalinda Beach took on national proportions Wednesday night as more than 150 sportsmen and environmentalists, met with representatives from the offices of United States Senators and Congressmen in the

Brevard County commission chambers in Titusville. Newly elected Florida State Senator Lori Wilson and John Vogt also attended the meeting to familiarize themselves with the controversial issue. The dispute over this section of road (which can hardly be called a road, merely a sand trail) began June 7, 1972 when the Department of the Interior,

through its agent, Robert Yoder, Manager of the Merritt Island Wildlife Refuge, erected signs barring vehicular traffic. This area has been used for recreational purposes by bathers, surfers, conservationists, fishermen and hunters from the East Central Florida region. The closing of this road resulted in the vocal disapproval by a number of

citizens representing these special interest groups and has now become a concern of the general public. The rationale for the road closing as presented by Manager Yoder, was based on Executive Order 11844, the purpose of which was to establish policies and provide procedures that will insure that (Cont'd. 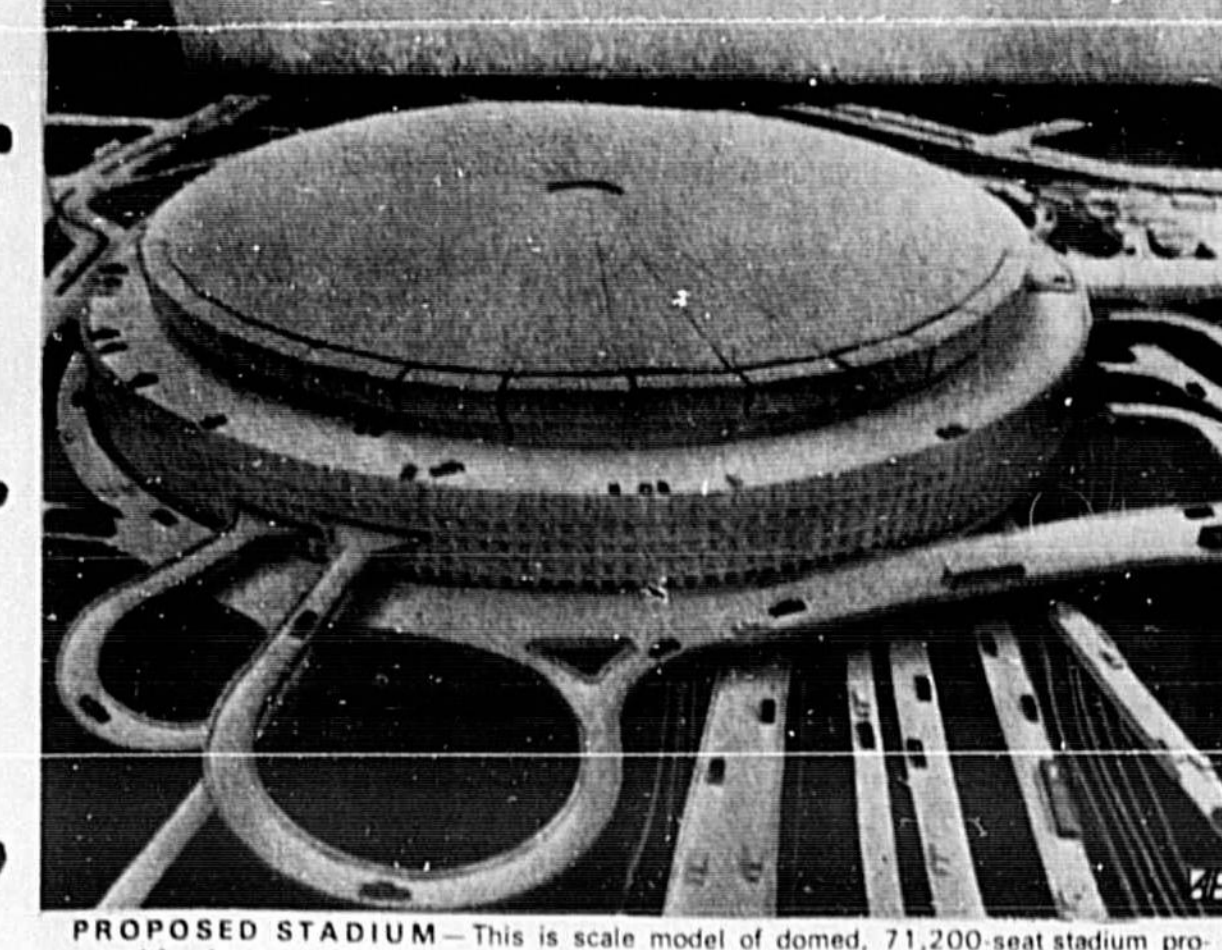

Children's Home A Hope Beacon

The lighted cross on the shady campus of the Florida United Methodist Children's Home on the shore of Lake Monroe in Enterprise is like a beacon of hope calling children who cannot find love, laughter or shelter in their own surroundings to come and be wanted.

For here indeed is a home that gives true comfort and solace, hope and promise, love and laughter to God's children in need of love and care.

Originated and inspired by two evangelist sisters, Misses Emma and Tina Tucker, in 1866, the home had grown from one small frame building that housed 12 orphans, to 10 brick buildings, called Cottages, with 66 children from broken homes.

At least 200 children are sheltered each year at the home. The home was chartered as an orphanage and was called "The Orphanage." The Tucker sisters leased six acres and the little white frame building on it (which had been the Carriage House to the Brock Home, when this territory was known as Mosquito County) to the Florida Methodist Conference.

They donated another six acres to the Methodist College. In 1869 the college in conjunction with the conference began operation of the orphanage, and as the need arose, built new buildings. In 1923 there were three frame buildings, but the conference felt that frame buildings were not practical, so they tore them down, one at a time and replaced them with brick structures, still standing on the grounds.

In 1929 the name of the home was changed to "The Florida Methodist Children's Home," and the policy of admittance to the home was changed to admitting children from broken homes, or from homes where the situation was such that one

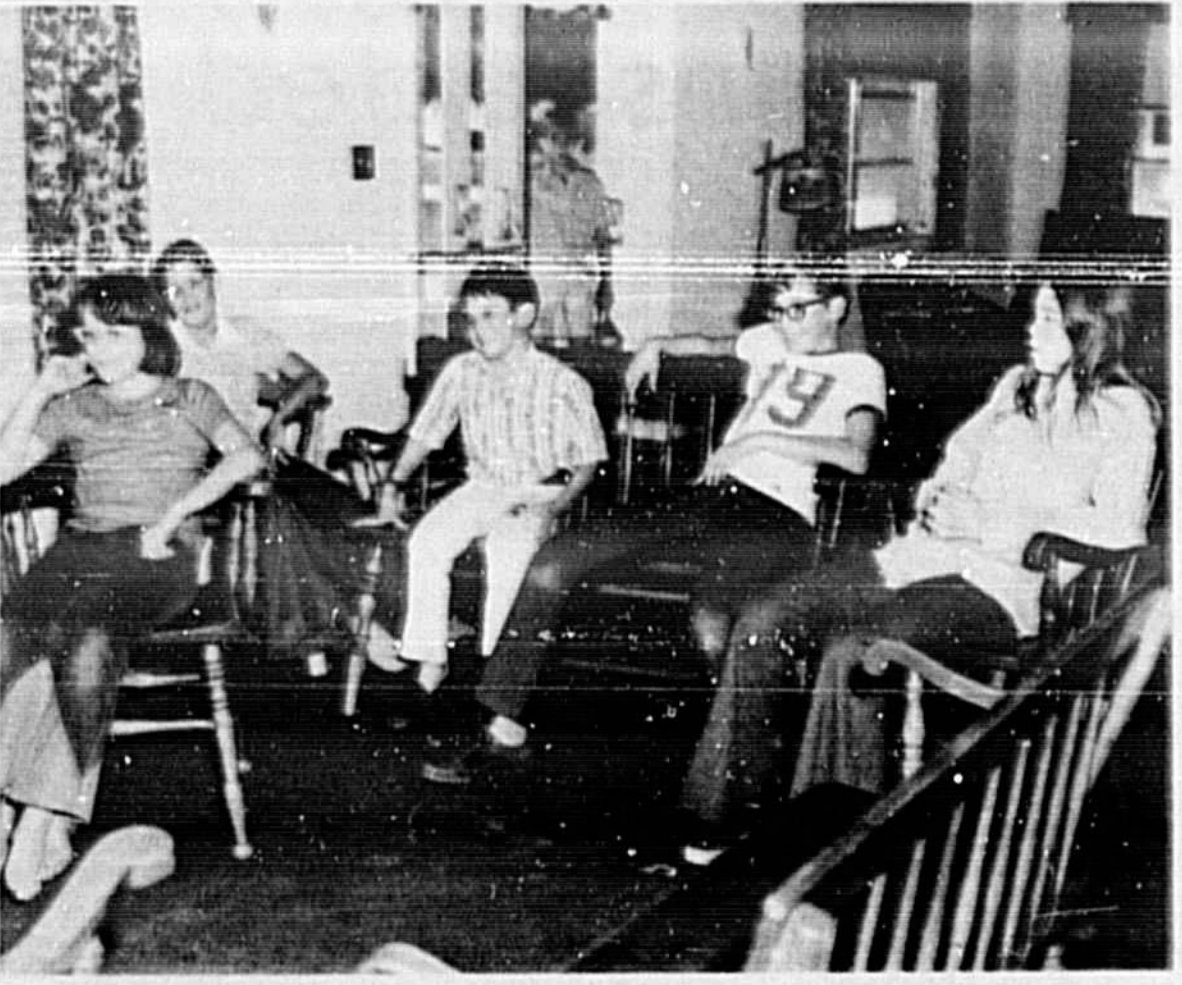
parent was too ill to care for the child or conditions were such that the child was kept from receiving proper care and understanding. They knew that the proper environment for children in their early lives is imperative. And so they took them in.

They received children from six years of age and see that they are taken care of properly, sent to school and receive the proper education. In their program of adjustment and group care, the child stays at the home until they are three years of age. Then they are placed or reach the age of 7.

While living in the home, the children attend the Enterprise Grade School or the Deltona Junior High School or Deland High School if they are older. The home has three buses, which have been purchased with funds received from donors, to take them back and forth to school, or church. The buses are also used for outings. The home has been the recipient of several ponies which the children ride in their leisure hours and on week-ends. The ponies are housed in a barn and have a corral to trot around

in all day. These bring much pleasure to the children. Rev. Bascom W. Carlton, who has held the position of superintendent of the home for 20 years, stated that the United Methodist Churches of the Florida Conference support the home together with donations from other interested persons. The annual budget is approximately \$5 million.

He happily related that he had just received definite confirmation of a \$75,000 donation by an anonymous donor in memory of her late husband. The money will be used for building a cottage to house children mentally or physically handicapped, shy or afraid, who will receive special attention by specially trained staff members. Dr. Carlton said he had been praying for such a cottage for a long time and that now the Lord had answered his prayer.
