## Ban Placed On Abattoirs In City Limits

### Orlando Man Given Contract To Build Information Booth Near Municipal Zoo

The City Commission instructed City Attorney Fred Wilson last night to prepare an ordinance amendment prohibiting any slaughter house or abattoir within the city limits. This amendment is expected to be adopted at the next meeting of the Commission, City Manager H. N. Sayer said this morning.

This action followed a heated discussion in a crowded room between opponents and proponents of the proposed abattoir in connection with the Central Florida Quick Freeze plant at Thirteenth and Elm Avenue. Edam Shindler, attorney at law, represented the opponents, and he reiterated a previous demand that the ordinance allowing abattoirs in the city be repealed. Alex H. Johnson, owner of the new plant, submitted results of a local poll, which he said was taken in the area affected and showed 60 per cent in favor of the abattoir.

Discussion became so heated, said Mr. Sayer, that the Commission retired for 30 minutes to deliberate before reconvening.

Section 10 of the City Ordinance adopted in 1911, prohibited slaughter houses in the city limits. On Sept. 9, 1946, following requests of Mr. Johnson and Forrest Gatchel to be allowed to operate a modern, sanitary abattoir in connection with the proposed quick freeze plant, the Commission amended the 1911 ordinance so as to permit within the city limits construction and operation of abattoirs, approved by the State Board of Health.

James E. Hudson, Orlando contractor, was awarded the contract to build a tourist information booth on the corner near the Zoo. His bid was \$4,162. Local bidders were Haveland Construction Company and T. S. Crawley.

The Commission adopted an ordinance making it a misdemeanor with penalty up to \$200 to destroy written notices served by police. This includes traffic violation tickets.

City Attorney Fred Wilson was instructed to prepare a resolution condemning the St. Johns River Line Washburn dock as unsafe and in hazardous condition. The owners were notified three months ago to repair the structure, said Manager Sayer.

Approval was given to a plat extending Evergreen Cemetery west to the railroad tracks. Fire Chief Mack Cleveland was authorized to attend the conference of fire marshals in Tampa next week.

A letter from N. L. Bryan of the State Road Department was read. This was an answer to the city's request that French Avenue be repaved and widened by the State as a farm-to-market road. The reply was that the Road Department is not permitted to spend money on projects of this nature, and stated that the responsibility for the improvement is up to the City.

A letter from radio station operator James Rivers to the effect that he expects to secure favorable response to his application for FCC to operate a radio station in Sanford, was read. It was stated that he was ready to sign a 99 year lease and to locate his studio at the Mayfair Inn.

## Poland Sets Date For General Election

WARSAW, Nov. 13, (AP)—The Polish government today announced a date for the long-planned general election. The date is Jan. 19, 1947. The Presidium of Poland's National Council set the date under an election law passed in September despite opposition of the peasant party.

The peasant party charged the election statute will deprive thousands of Polish citizens of the ballot. Earlier, in August, both the United States and Britain had asked Poland to establish safeguards for a free election.

## Reds Continue Fight Despite Chiang's Order

NANKING, Nov. 13, (AP)—The Chinese press claimed today that Communist troops are continuing their attack on government forces despite Chiang Kai Shek's order that they stop. The order, which took effect Monday at noon, was issued after the Nationalist government carried a strong warning to the Communists attributed to an unidentified high government official. The spokesman is quoted as saying that Nationalist forces are continuing to fight Communist positions with redoubled strength if the Red force refuse to come to terms through political channels.

Government sources are described as reluctant to discuss Communist charges that Nationalist forces are closing in around Yenan Communist strongholds and party capital. Neutral observers believe the Communist claim is well founded, and that the Communist capital of Yenan is the main objective of Chiang Kai Shek's troops.

## Six Palestine Police Officers Killed In Electric Car Blast

PALESTINE, Nov. 13, (AP)—Six police officers were killed today when an electric car was blown up. The dynamite charge, apparently under the track and discharged electrically. The blast was badly torn up, and traffic in the area was halted. A few minutes after this incident, two persons were hurt when a train hit a land mine. Both blasts occurred near Jerusalem.

## South African Proposal is defended By Britain As Trusteeship Fight Opens

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Nov. 13—(AP)—A slender, gray-haired South African, Field Marshal Jan Christiaan Smuts, talked cold turkey today to the UN General Assembly's Trusteeship Committee.

The Field Marshal, who is Premier of South Africa, said bluntly that his country would take over mandated South West Africa by itself if the General Assembly refused to approve his proposal for the trusteeship.

The 66-year-old Smuts spoke for the trusteeship committee.

Another member of the committee, India's Jawahar Lal Nehru, expressed his vigorous opposition to the trusteeship plan.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13, (AP)—A Western Airlines plane was reported missing today after a 15-minute flight from Burbank, California, to Los Angeles.

The plane was carrying 11 passengers and a pilot. It was reported to have been seen by a pilot flying from Los Angeles to Burbank. It had departed at 7:21 this morning.

## Anti-Scalping Law

JACKSONVILLE, Nov. 13, (AP)—The Jacksonville City Council rushed through an anti-scalping ordinance last night after hearing charges that ticket scalpers had grabbed the lion's share of reserved tickets for a high school football game to be played Thanksgiving Day.

The new ordinance provides that no ticket to an athletic contest may be sold for more than 25 cents above its established price by any person procuring tickets for resale. The action was taken after football fans protested the quick sale of some 5000 tickets for the annual game between Leo and Jackson High schools. The tickets were in a few hours Monday at \$1.50 each and were reportedly being offered at resale yesterday for \$7.50.

## Krug Confers With Soft Coal Industry Spokesman Today

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13, (AP)—Interior Secretary J. A. Krug conferred today with the coal ranking spokesman for the industry.

Krug and the coal spokesman discussed the proposed 40-cent contract with John I. Lewis, which would ward off a strike and permit the government to return the mines to private ownership.

The President's Dilemma

The two-year stalemate between Congress and the Administration has begun with solemn pledges on the part of President Truman that he expects to co-operate wholeheartedly with the Republicans in every move for the welfare of the country, and with loud hoasannas from newly elected congressmen and senators in wild acclaim of the President's attitude and tempered expressions of good will on their part.

And so the change in government begins in an atmosphere of peace and harmony. It remains to be seen how long the honeymoon will last. If President Truman were an exceptional man—something he does not claim to be—or if the Republicans were not politicians, it might reasonably be assumed that there is now some prospect for an early settlement of most of the problems with which this country is vexed.

However, history indicates the contrary. The low ebb of the depression from 1930 to 1933, when thousands of businesses all over the country were failing and millions of people found themselves without jobs, did not prevent the Democratic Congress from scuttling the program of a Republican President to bring some semblance of order out of chaos. And twelve years earlier, a Republican Congress had taken its vengeance upon President Wilson in the field of foreign affairs.

No, it would be nothing short of a miracle if present expressions of goodwill prove to be more than polite gestures.

What can happen when a President is confronted with a hostile Congress can be learned from a study of President Andrew Johnson's administration. He, though Abraham Lincoln immediately following the Civil War, at a time when Republicans controlled the Congress. Born in North Carolina, a former senator from that state, though he had opposed secession, he could not command the confidence of many people in the north.

He vetoed virtually every important bill which Congress passed; and Congress, in turn, passed them over his veto. The situation became so tense that Congress denied the President the right even to appoint his own Secretary of War, and when he insisted, the House Representatives voted to impeach him and he was tried in the Senate which voted 35 to 19 in favor of impeachment, not quite the necessary two-thirds.

Since history has a strange way of repeating itself, it is encouraging to note that in the present instance the two opposing branches of government are at least getting off to a better start.

Everybody's Business

The present excessive cost of government—federal, state and local—unless pared toward a pay-as-you-go basis, will threaten democracy and invite communism, in the opinion of T. Coleman Andrews, director of a division of the federal General Accounting Office. As an example of tremendous public debt he cites the Indiana situation, where, he says the yearly federal, state and local tax foresees tax reduction as a political issue for many years.

Public debt has grown to such astronomical proportions that only experts now understand the figures. The time has come when the public needs to pry this specialized knowledge loose and begin to study it.

rising prices on the other. But the most important element in the Republican victory, I believe, is the failure of sufficient voters to come to the polls on Nov. 6. While there is no official and official tabulation of the votes in all the states, the newspapers estimate that the total vote fell below 35 million. Thus, despite the much higher registration which so much impressed us, whenever I went during the campaign, millions of registered voters failed to cast a ballot.

It is worth emphasizing the fact, for what appears as a Republican landslide because of the number of House and Senate members elected by party, does not actually represent such a great difference in the total votes of the two parties.
