



Text: Luke 12:19-20 - "Lucky Man! You have all the good things you need for many years. Take life easy, eat, drink and enjoy yourself! But God said to him, 'You fool'!" All of us have enjoyed the recent TV commercials produced which contain the phrases, "the whole thing" and "try it you'll like it." They are catchy little pieces which hit "close to home" in our over-indulging society. The latest of these phrases "you're making a hig mistake" sort of capsules the message which all the others seek to convey. Too much of even a good thing is bound to eventually do you harm "you're making a big mistake" to go overboard on anything no matter how good it may seem

The truth contained in these captivating little commercials has a profound message for us all when applied not only to culinary delights but to all blessings of life in which our society in general has become accustomed to overindulging unfortunately, there is no patent remedy to bring "fast relief." Only a change in attitudes and habits can relieve the symptoms.

God's warning to our society "you're making a big mistake" is well characterized by the parable of the "rich" fool. For herein a man turns God's good blessings into a curse upon his soul by wrong perspectives and over-indulgence. His "mistake" is not in being rich but in foolishly considering and using the abundance God has provided. How many of us quite often fall in this tragic category.

Are we not "making a big mistake" when we "put off" until tomorrow the commitment of our lives to a living relationship to God and his church and a way of life which serves our fellow man?

And are we not "making a big mistake" when we provide our families with every "filling blessing" of life except a personal relationship to God

Yes, we live in a society full of the good things in life. For this we should be grateful, but is it not a "mistake" to hang our happiness of those temporal blessings alone? God says

God wants us to have a full life. He wants us to enjoy "the whole thing," not make an idol of only part. 

Conventions Over, Campaigns Here!

Now that the two presidential nominating conventions of the Democrats and the Republicans have ended, the campaign for the White House and all that means can begin in

Not that it hasn't been on. For the political action which breaks out into the open about every two years is never in neutral. But there are sort of formal boundaries that even the most unusual circumstances must respect.

This year the conventions were significant for their contrast. The Republicans engaged in a sort of love feast such as they have been denied since the days of the Dewey-Truman contest.

It was, however, much more than that. For President Nixon has a record of achievement that demands recognition and has won general public endorsement.

Underneath the planned and controlled polish, the professionally operated extravaganza which ended with a Nixon-Agnew ticket floating on a sea of cheers for "four years more", there was, for those who wanted to see, the iron-fisted strength of the conservative wing.

Last month the Democrats risked the perils which the McGovern-Shriver ticket has already encountered with a bold and needed effort to make the nominating convention responsive to the broad-base of all the American people.

With such a president as Richard M. Nixon in the White House bidding for a second term-a request that has been denied only two times in the 20th century-the Democrats risked much in terms of '72, but achieved much in terms of '76.

What needs to be watched during the next months of hard-nosed campaigning is the success which either McGovern or Nixon has in appealing to the great middle-class, where the true strength of the republic rests.

That there is a malaise infecting this solid group of citizens with the diagnosis usually made of "lack of confidence in those in governmental leadership posts at all levels" is a premise which the strategists of both parties not only accept but are busy planning the tactics with which to capture the "independents."

Thus only the highest praise can be given the insight which the beaming, tanned and confident Nixon showed in making a strong and determined bid for a "new American majority bound together by our common ideals" which would include members of all political parties.

Using a common political gimmick the Republicans are capitalizing on their present "in-office" status to attract Democrats who find the current policies of the '72 ticket at odds with

Bumper Stickers Needle Candidates

community is happier to see an election year roll around than the nation's commercial printers. For, as wedding announcements are bread and butter, the economic cake is the bumper sticker.

This year, with President Nixon and Sen. George McGovern, the printers have never had it so good.

Bumper strips have long since evolved from the pedestrian days of simple sloganeering when a contract could be tied up for printing the legend: "Glotz in 1972." The staple bumper stickers still have some of this name identification quality. Mr. Nixon's campaign forces expect to distribute a large number of stickers which state simply:

"Reelect the President." McGovern's forces have followed suit with their most widely distributed item. It is a single word strip which reads (if you haven't guessed): "McGovern."

There are other catchier ones which, according to some of my ad agency friends, are designed to be "singularly subjective." In other words, you read the bumper strip and must have a second thought to understand its full meaning. 

The AAFP is the only national medical organization that requires its members to take 150 hours of approved continuing education every three years. A number of state medical organizations also have similar require-"Education has continued to be a big thing with us,

and not just continuing education," says Dr. Jerome Wildgen, AAFP president There is now a specialty of family medicine that certifies doctors in this discipline by examination, thereby urnishing proof to the public and profession that these men are skilled and competent. So you see, the academy's consistent focus on education has brought family

medicine a long way from the horse and buggy," Dr. Wildgen says. Twenty-five years ago there were plenty of family doctors, 74.5 per cent of all doctors were general practitioners, but they were not organized, and "fast going down the drain" in the face of increasing specialization. Indeed, by 1970 only 16 per cent of all doctors were GP: It was the rapid rise in medical specialization that almost sounded the death knell for the family doctor. Fewer and fewer medical students became interested in going into family practice medicine, and there grew a certain ring of nonprestige in the phrase that a doctor was "just

a general practitioner. All of this occurred not only to the chagrin of dedicated, well-educated family doctors, but to the dismay of the people who were being treated by "good old Dr. Jones whom I have known all my life.



The seven-year-old daughter f a Sanford fireman was killed in a Saturday night accident on SR 431 near Paola. It was the second car-train fatality of the year and brings the 1972 traffic death toll to 11 in Seminole

Toni Helman, of Rt. 1, was dead at the scene, according to Troopers Robert Lovering and L. (Tommy) Tomlinson. lustice of the Peace Robert Carroll served as coroner at the scene. The accident happened at 8:05 p.m.

The girl was a passenger in a 1969 Ford pickup truck driven by her father, Larry Elwood Helman, a fireman for the City of Sanford. Her mother, Linda Helman, 24, was also a passenger in the truck.

According to Lovering , the truck was southbound over the tracks when it was struck broadside by the eastbound Seaboard Coast Line freight train. The impact knocked the truck nearly 100 feet down the track and all passengers were ejected. The train engineer was William H. Cagle.
