

## Children Teach Themselves At Montessori Preschool

STAMFORD, Conn.—  
—Before designing the Early Learning Center here, architects Edgington and Scott spent three days sitting on a floor to get a three-year-old's eye view.

So all the shelves are low, knee-high to the proverbial grasshopper and the windows afford a limitless view. The classrooms in this orthodox school bear none of the trappings commonly found around little children in school. None of the standard holiday silhouette cut-outs made by the teacher and colored by the child, the cutesy bunny rabbit word books or the huge bins containing haphazardly the "playthings" children could sentimentally spend their days with.

Play refrigerators, play stoves, play dishes, play world.

Instead, the core area resembles a chaotic art gallery colored warmly. To the side, a large black-and-white abstract painting on one wall. Museum overhead lights send muted daylight playing over the room. Carrying ensembles for 2 to 6-year-olds, large plants (watered by children) stand or hang near

company creativity," said Mrs. Skutch.

Mrs. Skutch and her teachers order the environment and stock it with learning materials that invite independent use and mastery. Montessori materials, English learning equipment, electronic typewriters, tools, adding machines—all, with minimal explanation, can be used even by two-year-olds. Many materials, such as the Montessori sandpaper letters, are multisensory. A child can feel as well as see the shape. Or the cutout letters. Tangible learning.

Teachers often invent their own materials. Children write their own stories. They bake real cakes, real cookies, even—quite loathe. These choices, made within the rule-framework of not harming oneself, the environment, or another child, produce what Margaret Skutch calls "quiet confidence."

Mrs. Skutch received this training, combined her own and the spirit of Montessori to begin the Early Learning Center. A church basement housed the school for the first two years. But a \$4,000 grant from Educational Facilities Laboratories, an offshoot of the Ford Foundation, provided the then Stamford Montessori School with its present inexpensive, flexible building.

Fees for children attending the center range from \$900 per year for pre-primary (2 1/2 to 5 years) to \$975 for primary (5 to 6 years). The summer session is \$125 for both groups.

The orderly, uncluttered environment reflects what Margaret Skutch is like. "Chaos doesn't have to ac-

From reading to climbing to cooking.

—They decide whether to explore inside or out.

Mrs. Skutch feels that Early Learning Center children leave the school with great self-confidence. "They are," she said, "comfortable with themselves."

## Charge Reduced In J. Spry Trial

Circuit Judge Richard Muldrew this morning directed a verdict of acquittal of second degree murder charges in the trial of Jack Spry, charged in the beating death of the woman with whom he had been living. Judge Muldrew declared he did not agree with the state that statutes detailing manslaughter did not fit the case and that the depravity of mind, an element in the second degree murder offense, was only touched upon by the defendant. The court read the defendant's statement that the deceased "jumped up and started hitting and cutting me all over. I thumped off and hit her, and then hit her a couple more times."

Judge Muldrew contended that although Spry "hauled off and hit her, and then did her in," the only depravity shown was in bruises upon the deceased, Victoria Wesolowski, and it had not been ascertained as to the age of the bruises. Further, the court stressed, the defendant made up a case of self defense, did not run away, and attempted to aid the victim and summoned an ambulance.

Assistant State Attorney Newman Brock told the court that five people had testified the wounds were fresh, and that to say the wounds were old is a "bunch of bunk."

Following the directed verdict by the court, the state presented closing arguments in the case in which the jury will decide upon lesser offenses. Brock said a conviction of manslaughter is the minimum which should be considered.

Giving a thumbnail sketch of the case, Brock mentioned testimony of various physicians who treated the woman and noted testimony of a severe blood clot on the frontal brain area and the victim's teeth knocked out. Attending physicians, Brock said, disclosed the victim as traumatized "everywhere" and that death was caused from a blunt instrument, which Brock submitted was the defendant's fist.

Assistant Public Defender Gerald Ruberg detailed the question of a "prostitute of a murder" noting Spry did not fit the state's description in that he administered aid to the victim with cold compresses, walked a mile to a phone to summon aid, and then directed and met the ambulance.

"He didn't intend to kill her," the defense attorney said, "but she attacked him. He did not alter the crime scene, he loved the woman, he didn't want to beat her, but he didn't want to be cut up."

Price Of Bread Increase Asked

WASHINGTON (AP)—American bakers are asking the cost of living council to approve price increases for bread and other products to offset rising costs resulting from the U.S.-Soviet trade deal.

At the same time, a bill has been introduced in Congress to promote demand for bread and other wheat products in the United States. Opponents say this could also result in higher prices.

The American Bakers Association, which represents about 1,000 bakeries, said Thursday that a "extraordinary price movement for flour" since the Soviet wheat agreement has increased their cost by approximately two-thirds of a cent per pound of bread.

In a letter to Cost of Living Council Director Donald Humphrey, it asked for "immediate compensatory price relief," adding that "the failure of even one bakery will, indeed, be a tremendous price to pay in furtherance of our expanded trade with Russia."

A pound loaf of bread currently costs about 25 cents. There was no mention of how much of an increase is anticipated, but industry spokesmen said earlier this week it could be from two to three cents per loaf.

The bakers requested a meeting with the cost of living council representatives next week. Joseph M. Creed, general counsel for the bakers group, said pre-tax profits for bakeries on a one pound loaf of bread averaged 1.13 cents in 1971. Costs now have increased by an additional 67 cents per loaf, he said, and it will place most bakeries in a deficit position.

He said the increase resulted from price fluctuations which followed the "tremendous and unexpected sales" of some 40 million bushels of wheat to Russia.

Bakers say wheat has gone up from \$1.37 a bushel in mid-July to \$1.86 per bushel last weekend, at Kansas City, and flour from \$5.40 to \$6.70 per hundredweight in the past year. Classified sources in the industry claim that federal export subsidies are another factor.

Congress, meanwhile, is considering a bill to establish a wheat industry council to promote demand for wheat products through a research and advertising campaign.

It would be financed by a levy on processed wheat that would rise from one cent per hundredweight the first year to 2.5 cents after that. Opponents argue that the cost of up to 86 million a year ultimately would be passed onto the consumer.

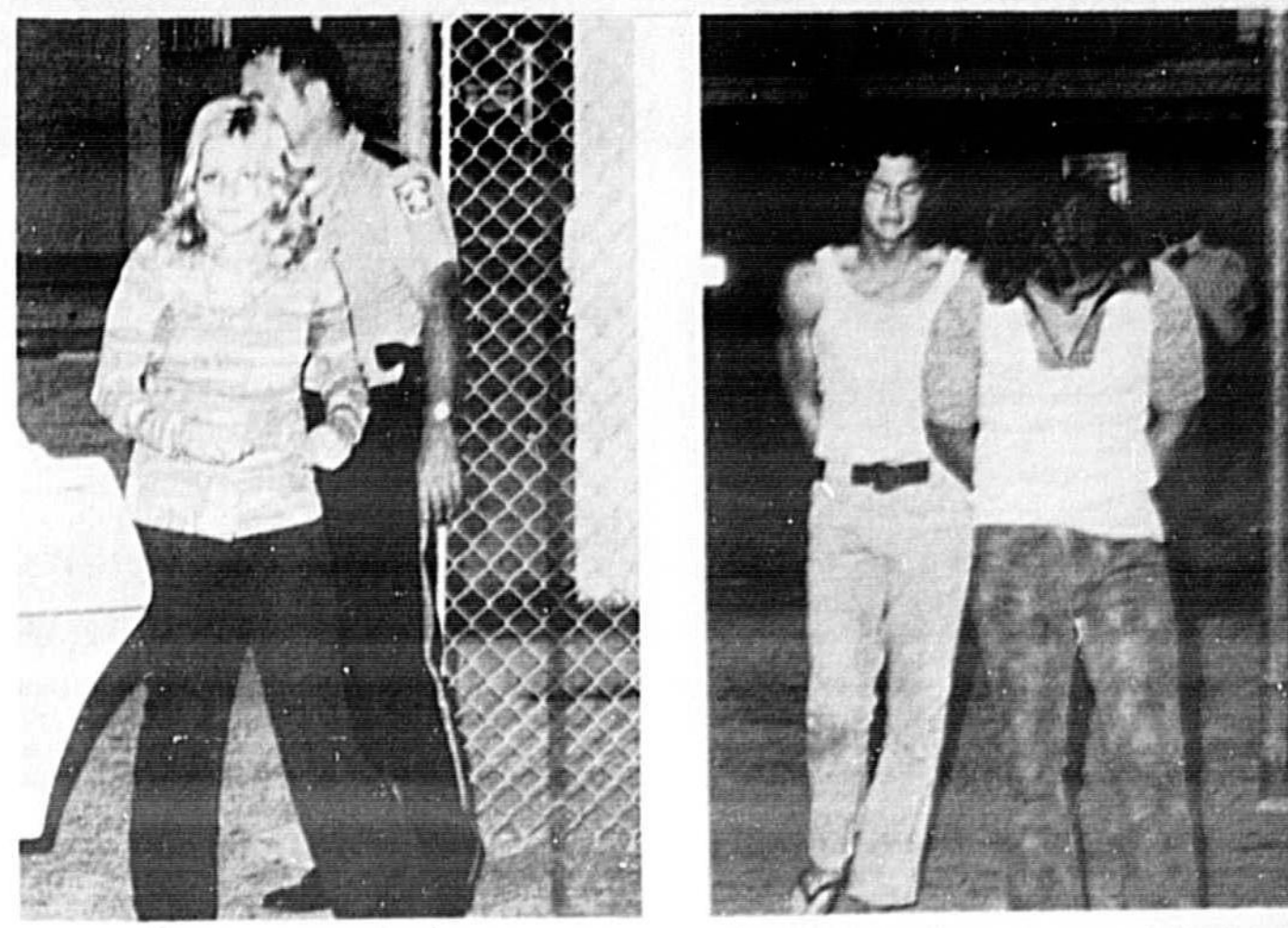
Agents seized approximately 2 1/2 pounds of marijuana along with various narcotic paraphernalia. Two late model cars were confiscated, after agents found samples of marijuana in them.

Agents also found a small sample of LSD. The half a tablet was taken to Pete Hagsdale, Crime Lab chemist, who confirmed that it is LSD.

Two of the suspects arrested listed their addresses as the residence which was raided. Vaughan H. Medcalf, 27, and his wife, Ann Marie Medcalf, 26, were charged with possession of marijuana and possession of narcotic paraphernalia. Bond was set at \$2,500 each for the possession of marijuana charge and \$2,500 each for the second charge.

James Stewart Farwig, 20, of 126 Hattaway Drive, Altamonte Springs and Nancy Carol Scott, 18, of 100 North Cortez, Winter Springs, also were charged with possession of marijuana and possession of narcotic paraphernalia. Bond was set at \$2,500 each.

With the added manpower provided by the Sanford and Longwood police departments, the county vice squad has been able to crack down on users recently. Vice arrests have been recorded at a record pace.

## Budget Totals \$9.9 Million County Tax Hiked .8 Mill

County real estate owners will be assessed \$2.2 million to finance the county budget for the fiscal year starting Oct. 1. This is an increase of 8 mill over the current tax levy.

The overall county budget is \$9.9 million. It includes \$3.9 million for a decrease in general spending for the next fiscal year, in that the budget figure of \$9.9 million for 1972-73 compares with \$10.3 million for the current fiscal year, really is not a decrease. County officials

indicate that the cost of the government operations actually will spiral upward approximately \$2 million dollars.

A portion of the \$10.3 million included funds from the previous year in the amount of \$4.4 million earmarked for the county government business. It is expected that approximately \$600,000 will derive from tax and other funds

collected from gasoline, and cigarette taxes, vehicle inspection fees, and other office departments, landfill charges, utility receipts as well as building and zoning fees.

There is also an increase in the tax levied anticipated as well as in the non-exempt property that is a marine engineer and juvenile detention home, parklands, and a mental health center, leaving an actual figure of only about \$6.1 million for actual government business.

In a breakdown of the seven funds which account for \$33 million contained within the budget with some comparative figures from last year's budget appears thusly:

The new courthouse building fund represented \$3.3 million dollars with 1.22 mill compared with \$2.05 million and 1.25 mill last year. Bond retirement for the courthouse and the new jail accounted for \$26.448 with a \$ mill figure compared with \$210.82 and 88 mill last year.

No millage was charged for the capital outlay fund for the juvenile home, mental health unit and parks, which total \$3.3 million dollars this year last year's figure, \$2.2 million. Bond indebtedness for these three units, however, is \$179,620 with 25 mill assessed compared with \$100,250 and 21 mill last year.

As stated above, with \$33 million attributed to these seven funds, the remainder of the millage will derive from the port authority, 1 mill; a decrease from last year's .18 mill; 1 mill from the hospital, down from 12 mill and the county health department remaining the same at .60 mill.

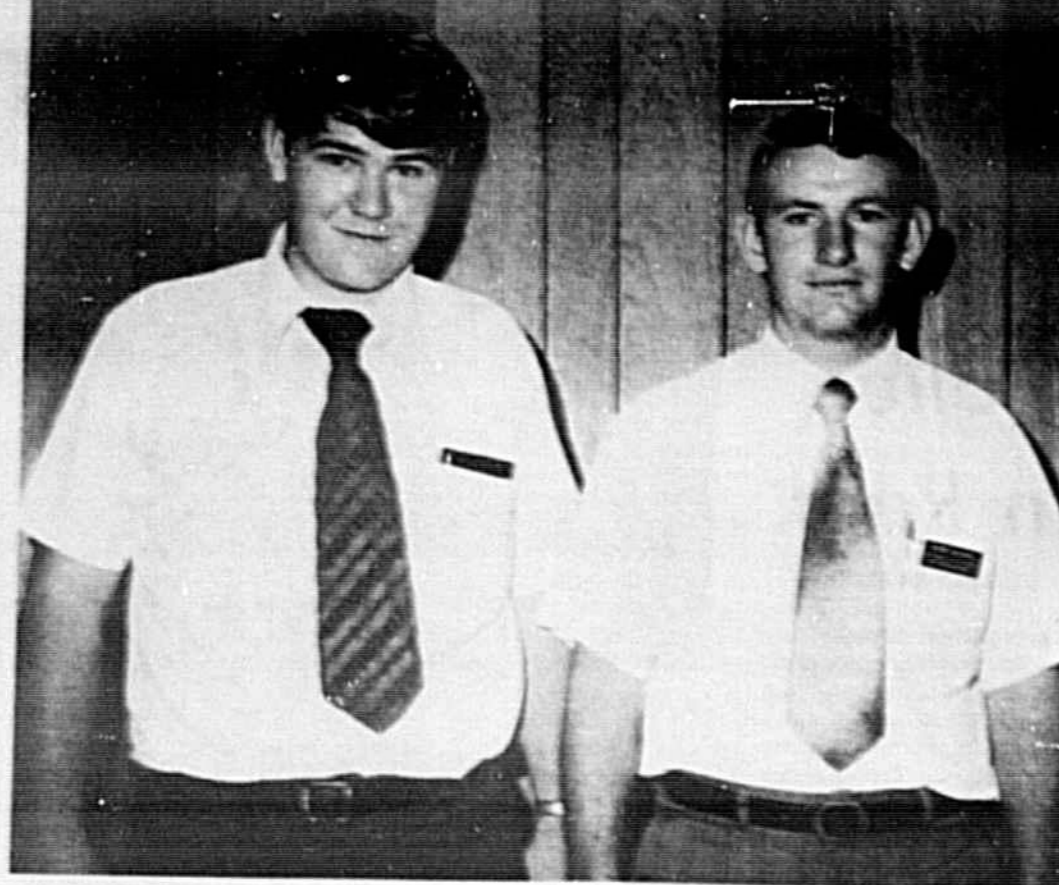
Are we not "making a big mistake" when we sacrifice time with our families, service to humanity, service to God, in the name of having more things or in order to be financially "secure"?

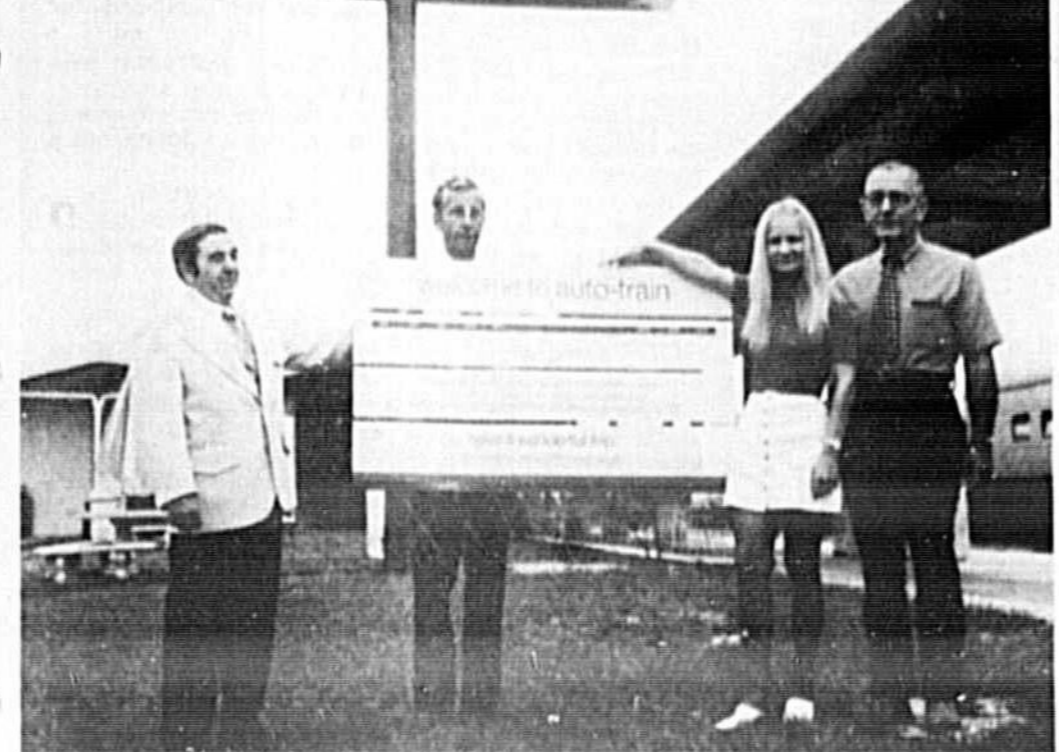

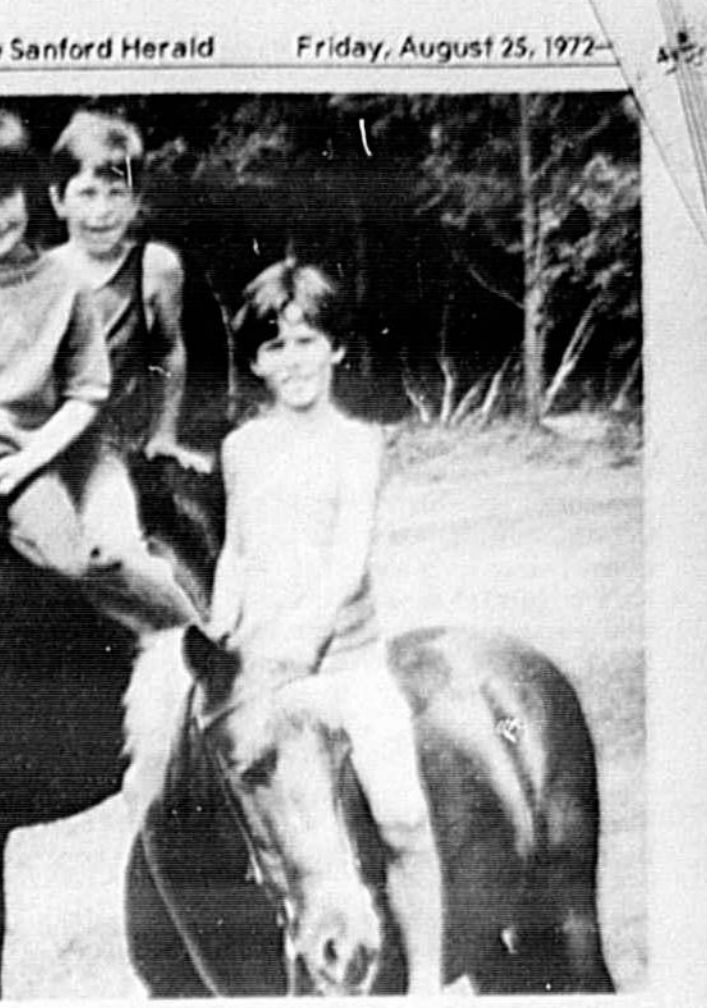

Conventions Over, Campaigns Here!

Now that the two presidential nominating conventions of the Democrats and the Republicans have ended, the campaign for the White House and all that means can begin in earnest.

Not that it hasn't been on. For the political action which breaks out in the open about every two years is never in neutral. But there are sort of formal boundaries that even the most unusual circumstances must respect.

This year the conventions were significant for their contrast. The Republicans engaged in a sort of love feast such as they have been denied the days of the Dewey-Truman contest.

Last month the Democrats risked the perils which the McGovern-Shriver ticket has already encountered with a bold and needed effort to make the nominating convention responsive to the broad-base of all the American people.

Underneath the planned and controlled polish, the professionally operated extravaganza which ended with a Nixon-Agnew ticket floating on a sea of cheers for "four years more", there was, for those who wanted to see, the iron-fisted strength of the conservative wing.

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sustained, not by those who are swayed only by personal ambition or gain, but by those who believe in the basic policies of their party and work to support them.

There is another significant development which makes these conventions of more than usual political significance. In both, the office of the vice-president has caught the spotlight.

With the Democrats it was the ill-advised selection of Senator Tom Eagleton of Missouri by McGovern and the consequent replacement of him by former Peace Corps chief and Ambassador to France Sargent Shriver that made vice-presidency so controversial.

With the Republicans it was the nomination of Vice President Spiro T. Agnew that brought the office again into the limelight. Agnew's acceptance speech did much to clarify his understanding of the office and did, wily-nilly, show that he is, indeed, the man the GOP has in mind for the '76 presidential nomination.

The conventions, in short, have had their day and performed their function. Now it is up to the candidates. President Nixon must pay attention to the domestic challenges and deal with them in fact and not in theory to deserve popular approval.

Senator McGovern has the much harder task of clearly defining his policies and bringing together the usually (and normally) split Democrats.

Nov. 7th is the pay-off. The ballot is the pay envelope. The voter is the boss!

Under normal circumstances, such a political renegade would have faded from public view almost overnight.

Global View New Tokyo Regime Better for the U.S.

By RAY CROWLEY WASHINGTON (NEA) The new Tanaka administration in Japan is coordinating with the United States in its approach to Peking.

The coordination is unofficial and not published-but effective all the same.

The strategy aims at putting Japan in a stronger position to expand its markets in China without sacrificing the profits of its own companies.

The cooperation indicates the degree to which American and Japanese relations have recovered from the low period last year after President Nixon floated the dollar and visited Peking without giving Japan advance notice.

For a time it was predicted that Nixon's failure to take Tokyo into his confidence would cause Japan to move away from its tight association with the United States.

It was pointed out that Eisaku Sato, Kakuei Tanaka's predecessor and incumbent prime minister at the time of the Nixon shock, had staked his prestige on firm ties with this country and that any successor, even Sato's own choice, would inevitably somewhat harden Japan's position toward Washington.

But this has not thus far proved to be the case. Tanaka was not Sato's announced, but high Nixon administration officials are confident that he will do even more than Sato in cementing U.S.-Japanese relations.

County Board Action Pools On Increase

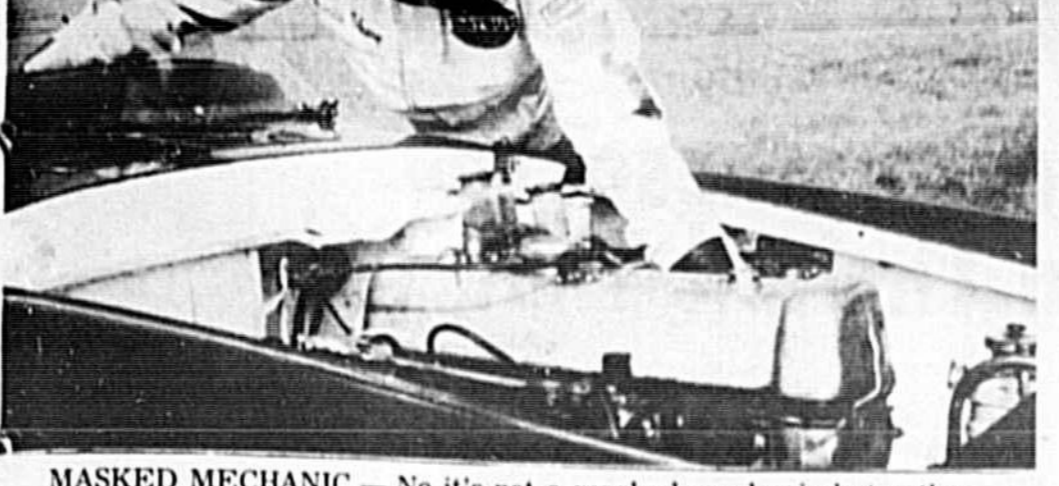

# White House Also Hurt Jesse Owens

MUNICH (AP) — It wasn't only Hitler who snubbed Jesse Owens in 1936 but also the White House, and that's the one that hurt the most, the black Olympic hero said Friday.

"When he returned home on a boat from the Berlin games there was no invitation from President Roosevelt waiting for us," Owens reminisced in one of his tight-cuff-hole offices at Olympic Village.

"It wasn't at all as it is today with athletes being treated like kings. It was just as if he were a nobody. Sure, it hurt. It was disappointing," he said.

The man who 36 years ago won four gold medals and gave an individual performance that has become a pinnacle of the Games has returned to Germany as special guest of the German Organizing Committee.

The 58-year-old former Ohio State thunderbolt said the question most asked of him is how it feels to come back to a country where he was snubbed by the Führer and regarded as an inferior breed.

"Hitler was there every day," Owens said. "But I can't say I was ever really conscious of him. For an Olympic competitor, every race is a final if he takes his mind off it, even if it's a qualifying heat, he is likely to blow the whole thing."

"I never got close to him and I don't think you ever met. The broad jump was staged right here with Goering and Goebbels, all of them very cold but I had my mind on my work."

In the broad jump, Owens recalled, he beat out the German ace, a tall Aryan blond named Latz Long, an idol of his countrymen.

"As we left the field after the medal ceremony, I raced up and put my arm around his shoulders and he put his arm around mine. As we walked past each section of the stands, the people stood up and cheered wildly."

"I understand the IOC told him I brought up one athlete he had to bring them all," Owens said. "I'm not angry. I give the man credit. He was out there every day cheering for his athletes."

# Top Marlin Fishing Found In Panama

PNAS BAY, Panama — One of the best places in the world for marlin fishing is Pinas Bay on the Pacific Ocean side of Panama, about 150 miles southeast of the Panama Canal.

The Pan American Highway is of no value in reaching Pinas Bay and may never be, due to the rugged mountains, rivers, and dense jungle between Panama City and the bay.

For those guests of the luxurious Tropic Star Lodge at the head of the bay, air travel is available from Panama City to the Jaque landing strip just south of Pinas Bay. Flight time is about 50 minutes, followed by a short ride from Jaque aboard one of the lodge's cruisers. For sports cruisers berthed in Panama or the Canal Zone the trip south from the canal to the fishing area takes about a day, cruising leisurely.

### Jail Escapee, Wife Captured By FBI

**DEVIL'S JUMP, Ky. (AP)**—A jail escapee and his wife, accused of kidnaping six persons during a flight from Florida to Tennessee, have been captured in a wooded area near the Great Smoky Mountains.

William Elisha Davidson, 27, and his wife, Ella, 28, were taken into custody Sunday about 12 hours after they released the hostages.

They were held in the Madison County jail in Richmond, Ky., Sunday night, and were to be arraigned today, the FBI reported.

Agents said they would be charged with kidnaping and interstate transportation of six persons.

The Davidsons offered no resistance when they were arrested.

"They just gave up," said McCreary County Sheriff Herman Hamlin.

The sheriff said authorities set up roadblocks "on every dirt road in that country" Saturday night after members of a Miami Beach, Fla., family who had been held hostage pointed out the area of woods into which the couple fled on foot.

Hamlin said a search party of about 75 FBI, state and county officers began combing the area early Sunday morning. The Davidsons were captured shortly before noon.

Authorities said Davidson, armed with a shotgun, escaped from jail in Bartow, Fla. Friday morning, taking Deputy Sheriff Bruce Browning with him, and then took five members of the Mel Prine family captive Friday night.

The hostages were released Saturday in a wooded area of Tennessee.

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## 'Revealing Results' Seen Demo Fund Probe Asked

WASHINGTON (AP) — Saying the results could be "very revealing," President Nixon's finance committee has asked congressional investigators to audit Sen. George McGovern's fund-raising records as closely as they did the Republicans.

"There must be no reluctance on the part of the General Accounting Office to pursue as vigorously with Sen. McGovern's staff the kind of investigation it has with the Finance Committee," committee chairman Maurice Stans said Sunday.

"We will anticipate a report equally extensive," he said, adding that the GOP has "reason to believe (the Democratic accounts) will be very revealing."

The former Commerce secretary's four-page statement, distributed by Nixon's official Committee for the Re-election of the President, charged that the GAO report was a sloppy, politically motivated job.

It is apparent that the strong and persistent pressures placed on the GAO by Democratic members of the Congress are responsible to a high degree for the inaccuracies in the report," Stans said.

John Connally, former Treasury secretary who's heading up the Democrats for Nixon drive, said on ABC's Issues and Answers program that the GAO report is a "nettleome thing."

"I don't think it is going to be a major issue, anything of that kind," the former Texas governor and Lyndon B. Johnson protege said, "but I think it obviously doesn't help."

Elsewhere, President Nixon entertained 400 movie stars and directors at a poolside party at San Clemente, Calif.

Today he was scheduled to get a progress report from Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird on plans for an all-volunteer Army by mid-1973, and counsel on the next announcement on Vietnam troop withdrawals.

### In Car-Train Collision Fireman's Daughter Killed

The seven-year-old daughter of a Sanford fireman was killed in a Saturday night accident on SR 431 near Paola. It was the second car-train fatality of the year and brings the 1972 traffic death toll to 11 in Seminole County.

Toni Helman, of Rt. 1, was dead at the scene, according to Troopers Robert Lovering and C. L. (Tommy) Tomlinson, Justice of the Peace Robert Carroll served as coroner at the scene. The accident happened at 8:05 p.m.

The girl was a passenger in a 1969 Ford pickup truck driven by her father, Larry Elwood Helman, a fireman for the City of Sanford. Her mother, Linda Helman, 24, was also a passenger in the truck.

According to Lovering, the truck was southbound over the tracks when it was struck head-on by the eastbound Seaboard Coast Line freight train. The impact knocked the truck nearly 100 feet down the track and all passengers were ejected. The train engineer was William H. Cagle.

Mrs. Helman was flown to Florida Hospital by Herndon Helicopter ambulance. "Lifesaver One." She is reported in critical condition. Helman was treated and released at Seminole Memorial Hospital.

Flying debris from Helman's truck struck a 1971 Ford pickup which had stopped for the train. The driver was Melvin D. Motes, 39, of Rt. 1, The Mates vehicle suffered body damage and a broken windshield.

Lovering has charged Helman with careless driving in the accident. According to Lovering, it was raining at the time of the collision.

Saturday's accident was the second car-train tangle at that crossing in recent weeks. The other car-train accident involving a fatality this year was at the crossing near Old Lake Mary Road and Airport Boulevard.

In another Saturday accident, an Orlando man was injured when he was pinned between two parked cars on SR 438 between Oviedo and Slavia.

George Jakubcin, 85, of Oviedo, driving a 1968 Plymouth, collided with a Ford Galaxie 500, occupied by Merrill Rhea Greenfield, 21, of 300 Vicki Dear Abby, forcing into a 1965 Buick owned by Andrew
