

First Anniversary Of Tex Rickard's Passing Finds Boxing Game At Low Ebb

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—It was just one year ago today that Tex Rickard passed quietly on to another life in a hospital down at Miami, Fla., whence he had gone to the corner stone for one of those monuments to his genius as a promoter of prize fights.

Such has happened in the year intervening but I doubt whether any of it has been really important, for when Rickard died, the secret of the multi-million dollar spectacle apparently died with him.

An artless man, something of a fool in his unlettered simplicity, he made millions for others and left boxing forever in his debt. I think it is typical of the breathless age that his anniversary seems to be passing New York by almost unheeded and that Madison Square Garden, whose every brick and stone is a lasting tribute to the promoter, hardly hears an echo of his name today.

But men still seek the secret of his genius, even though they look for it without a thought for the man to whom it came by nature's endowment. They could see some of it in their own difficulties with the heavy weight fighters of the day. They could see it in the fact that he himself not only is forgotten but never of his biographers is disenchanted. It is the latter who are not forgetting.

One of them, the Doran, is even now writing his inner-office account of the Rickard regime, a biography from the pen of one who can make the real Rickard live again in colors that harmonize with that most vivid of personalities. Much that was ardent fiction has been printed about Rickard, whereas the real story of the man defies fiction and makes it seem dull and wholly uninspired.

I have no way of knowing whether Doran holds the key to Rickard's secret of successful promotion. If any man does, Doran is he, for there was one of those instinctive understandings that require no words to express their thoroughness. They were together from the moment Rickard opened the door of the old garden until Tommy fought his last fight as heavyweight champion, sharing worries and triumphs, foreboding and elation, in that silent way of theirs.

Rickard wore the mask in life. His conversation was forceful and bland but you sensed that often he was repressing his real thoughts—thoughts hidden deep under that guileless gambler's mask of his.

Perhaps his biographer now will tear the mask aside and show what went on behind the eyes that squinted out at the world from the depths of their varied experiences.

If he does, the world will know the real Rickard for the first time, not the Rickard who showed you the mask he learned to wear as a farm dealer in Nemo. It ought to be a fitting tribute to his memory.

Shires Is Expected To Iron Out Kinks In Athletic Affairs

CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—(INS)—C. Arthur (The Great) Shires, whose vaudeville tour turned to a boom era of grief, was expected to arrive here by airplane today from Detroit, to iron out some of his difficulties.

First of all Shires says he will seek a contract with the White Sox, circling his old job at first base.

Tomorrow "What-a-man" together with his manager and mysterious Dan Dely and his manager are scheduled to join in a party given by the Illinois Boxing Commission designed to get at the bottom of "Mysterious Dan's" sensational charge that he was offered a choice between a kangaroo "ride" and a dive to the canvas when he met Shires here in the latter's professional debut.

Shires at first was to give his version of the issue tonight at promoter Jim Miller's boxing show here at White City in the same ring in which Dan took his famous 10 count. The objections of Gen. John V. Clinkin, chairman of the Illinois Boxing Commission, over ruled the speech Shires was to give.

SHARKEY LANDS IN MIAMI TO TAKE QUIET VACATION

Boston Gob Declares He Will Battle If Offered Opponent

MIAMI, Jan. 6.—(INS)—The tanned residents of this city, usually very attentive to what the wild waves are saying, have no ear for such trifles today.

Jack Sharkey has arrived. Accompanied by Mrs. Sharkey and their two children, America's heavyweight champion rolled into Miami last night, the old vocal chords hitting on their accustomed six. With the red caps still hanging around for their tips, Jack launched into his first oration.

"Give me an opponent and I'll fight," he declared. "But I don't want Madison Square Garden to feed me anyone like Griffiths. There's a fight, my boy, that wouldn't draw its breath. People would get the idea that I was touring the country in search of set-ups."

He came up for air and continued.

"I don't want another like last year. Stibbling is a good fighter, but his style made me fight a bad appearing fight. I don't want another like that anymore than the fans do."

"I don't know how the fight stands now. Before I left Boston it was off and on three times in three hours. When I left it was off, but when I got to Richmond it was on again, according to a Richmond paper."

In his full vocal stride now the terrible Sharkey man seemed to need no air.

"This is a vacation trip for me and the family."

"I'm going to do the things I didn't do when I was training last year, play some golf at Bayshore and swim and loaf in the sunshine."

Jack said on a percentage basis with the garden as his contract called for a Tuffy Griffiths fight would be more expensive for him than a winter vacation trip here.

"But the money isn't the most important thing," he concluded. "The garden is trying to start another heavyweight elimination contest and that's not necessary as far as I'm concerned. Give me an opponent for a real fight and I'll do the eliminating."

Layton, Reisel Tie For First Place In Billiard Tourney

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—(INS)—Johnny Layton, defending champion, and Otto Reisel were tied for first place with three victories each in the world's three-cushion billiard championship now in progress here.

Taking the lead soon after the opening of play, Layton last night decisively defeated Charles Jordan of Los Angeles, 50 to 22 in 23 innings. The defending champion bettered two of his own world records whipping Jordan, having an unfinished run of eight to eclipse his former best game work while his average of a 2.22 per inning was another new standard.

Reisel vanquished Harry Skuler 50 to 36 in 49 innings, Allen Hall conquered Tim Denton 50 to 24 in 38 innings and Angie Kieckhefer defeated Gus Copulos 50 to 16 in 33 innings, in other matches.

Real Purpose Of Poultry Show Is Told By Johnson

"Any person under suspension or who has been disqualified for membership by the American Poultry Association, shall not be eligible to enter or to compete in any show or to act as judge or in any other capacity in any show or exhibition held under the rules of the American Poultry Association."

"Any exhibitor disqualified for fraudulent practices shall have the right of appeal to the Executive Board of the American Poultry Association within thirty days from the date of his disqualification."

"Notice of a disqualification with a detailed statement shall be mailed by the Show Association, within ten days by registered mail, to the Secretary of the American Poultry Association and by registered mail to the local association (or repre-

disqualified party. "Protests are to be entertained by local associations only in cases of apparent dishonesty, ignorance, or carelessness on the part of the judge in scoring the specimens in dispute, the judge, together with the President and Secretary of representatives appointed by the man-

agement of the local association), shall constitute a committee of three, and the majority decision of this committee shall be final. Score cards made out by the judge in deciding protested awards are to be retained by the local association. "All Poultry Associations that

are members of the American Poultry Association shall be permitted to designate their exhibition as official American Poultry Association Poultry Shows, and to use the official entry books, entry blanks, judges' cards, ribbons and other supplies furnished by the American Poultry Association.

These Show Rules are official, are copyrighted, and can be used only by Poultry Associations or Societies that are associate members of the American Poultry Association. "Special for best display, any one variety, shall be made on

points, first to count 6, second 4, third 3, fourth 2, fifth 1, pens to count double. The points won in each class to be multiplied by the number of entries in that particular class of the variety. Then add total points won by each exhibitor in all the classes of the variety.

"The number of entries to constitute a display shall be left to the discretion of the Local Show Management, but the American Poultry Association recommends that the number of entries constituting a display be not less than 1 cock, 1 hen, 1 cockerel, 1 pullet, and 1 pen."

Buenos Aires Envoy Says United States Ignores Argentina

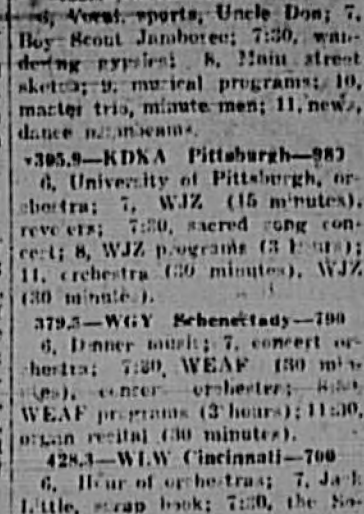
