Soviets Forge New Pincer Threat To City Of Kharkov

U.S. Heavy Bombers Begin Punishing Attack On Burma Rail Junction

On the Russian front, Red army troops, now driving 60 miles into the Ukraine, were reported forging a new pincer threat to the big steel city of Kharkov after a 17-mile advance to the southeast. Other columns were reported sweeping through the south-eastern Ukraine toward the Sea of Azov in a move to close the arc around Rostov.

From New Delhi in the Indian theater, communications reported United States heavy bombers made a punishing attack Tuesday on a central Burma rail junction.

Back to the European theater, the German air force stabbed at London four times during the night but indications early today were that the Nazis had done no damage after a furious daylight raid yesterday which smashed a school house and killed at least 30 gaily chattering children in the building.

The showing last night and early today by the Nazi air force was regarded by observers as insignificant as a military operation, for the Germans only reached the outskirts of London once. Otherwise, the four alarms in the London area, one of them in each one section, produced almost no incidents.

Secondary bombs were dropped in the southeast section during one alarm.

The German daylight raiders hurled 20 to 30 children and three tons of debris but rescuers were digging for them. It was the worst blow suffered by London schools since the blitz attack began.

Only six raiders eluded London's defenses and the school, in the heart of a residential section, was smashed into rubble.

There wasn't a chance that the children and the school, which had been chattering gaily at luncheon on the first floor; but 200 rescue workers kept digging for them.

In southern England, where the raiders also delivered destruction, one elderly man died of shock in a southeast coastal town where 40 to 60 planes appeared in two waves, but dropped no bombs.

German night raiders kept hitting at the coast, dropping incendiaries on the residential area of the southeast coast town and starting a small number of fires which were quickly put out. No casualties were reported in the night attack but there was considerable property damage.

Some half-dozen got through the E. A. F. and Royal Canadian Air Force fighters, who heavily engaged the force and damaged many others in addition to shooting down the 11.

End Is Near For Cut In Civilian Economy

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21. (AP)—WPA Chairman Donald Hanes today indicated the Government is near the end of trimming down civilian economy and civilian production will be increased to the maximum possible materials and equipment.

He said the WPA shortly will announce a large-scale program of simplification of consumer goods and services, and that the Government will be able to produce more goods and services than it has in the past.

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Canned Baby Foods Will Be Rationed By OPA

Eleven Items Added To List Of Products By Wickard

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21. (AP)—The OPA today announced many canned baby foods will be rationed under the same point system as baby formula. The list of items to be rationed includes strained or chopped foods made of fruits, vegetables or meats and put up in sealed cans or jars. Baby foods rationed will include strained or chopped foods made of fruits, vegetables or meats and put up in sealed cans or jars.

At the same time, Rep. Edwin A. Huff introduced a bill designed to prevent the OPA from taking ration cards as a means of punishing any violators of OPA regulations. His action followed reports that OPA officials in New York would withdraw food ration cards of persons violating the pleasure driving ban.

Wickard's order authorizes the OPA to ration "as necessary" condensed and evaporated milk, jellies, jams, preserves, fruit, butters, pickles, relishes, food products, fish and shell fish. The order is designed to "facilitate administration" of food rationing, retaining the authority to allow OPA when rationing of goods added items becomes necessary.

The order was not announced publicly. First intimation was in the Federal Register, a government organ for promulgating orders and regulations.

Transport Plane Crashes And All Aboard Killed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21. (AP)—A crash of a transport plane under contract to the Army with 11 passengers and nine crew members killed Jan. 19 near the coast of Dutch Guiana in South America, was announced today by Major General Harold George, commanding the air transport command.

Complete identification of the passengers was not established. There were no survivors except the pilot in the remote section. The next of kin of all military personnel have been notified. An announcement of the crash was delayed because of the time required to reach the scene and determine the extent of the casualties.

The plane was flying south and all aboard were on their way to Africa. The plane was operated by an unidentified airline which had regular schedules for the transport command throughout the world.

The number of casualties in a single plane was due to the great size of the plane. General George explained. He said the percentage of losses on the contract lines was exceedingly low.

Aussie Mosquitoes Are Plenty Tough

BENBENA, Mont., Jan. 21. (AP)—People who live in the U. S. A. should go to Australia if they want to make the acquaintance of a super race of mosquitoes, says Pvt. Frank Jones in a letter to his mother.

He drew a picture that showed a man-size mosquito equipped with goggles, gas mask, hobnobbing with a pack of wire and mosquito, bar cutters and spines to prevent sliding while biting.

P. R. Bach, Jr. Grew Melon From Volunteer Vine

P. R. Bach, Jr., son of a West Nile farmer, who discovered a volunteer watermelon vine in a plot next to his home, raised for the first time a melon in the state. The melon was harvested here in the summer, and it was a green melon.

Young Bach, in describing how he grew the product, which usually is harvested here in the summer, said: "I first noticed the watermelon about the third or fourth day of November. I thought at first it was a cucumber, then I thought it was a green squash. About Thanksgiving time I found it was a watermelon. Every night when I thought it was going to freeze I covered it with crocus sacks. Tuesday night the vine was dead and we brought it in the house and put the melon in the refrigerator. We had it for supper last night."

War Costs Britain 50 Million Daily

LONDON, Jan. 21. (AP)—The war is costing Britain \$51,000,000 daily. Two years ago the cost was \$20,000,000.

The total expenditure of the present financial year which ends March 31 will exceed \$21,000,000,000. To foot the bill, Chancellor of the Exchequer Sir Kingsley Wood will ask Parliament to vote another \$2,400,000,000 to carry him over until the end of March.

In considering these figures, it is worth remembering that Britain's war costs are only according to the estimated actual expenditure during the forthcoming financial year—unlike the United States where estimated total expenditures are voted at the beginning of the year, regardless of the fact that the money may not be spent until the following or the next following year.

Most Enlistments Made By Texans

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21. (AP)—Texas leads the States in Army enlistments since Pearl Harbor, according to a report today by the War Department.

From a population of 6,414,824, as shown in the 1940 census, the State had 5,015 enlistments up to November 1, 1942, or a percentage of 8.26.

Statistics published in the Congressional Record today showed that from Dec. 8, 1941, to Nov. 1, 1942, Army enlistments from the 18 States totaled 691,724.

The statistics were given in a speech by Representative Patman (D-Texas) who said he obtained the figures from the War Department and had been authorized by it to release the information.

Job Security Denied To Newspaper Union

NEW YORK, Jan. 21. (AP)—New York job security for 600 members of the newspaper and mail delivery union was denied in an award announced Wednesday by an arbitration committee named to settle a dispute between the union and the Publishers' Association of New York.

The security denied by the union was the principal issue of a strike which deprived New Yorkers of their daily newspapers for several days last month.

The award was disclosed by Dr. Arthur B. Meyer, chairman of the state mediation board, and Fred C. Croton of the U. S. conciliation service who were named as arbitrators by the War Labor Board.

Earlier, the WLB granted union members a raise of \$5 a week in an interim order.

Under terms of the award, which will expire June 30, 1945, the WLB will name an impartial chairman and an adjustment board to settle any disputes arising out of wartime conditions.

Axis Forces Advance Slightly Against French Positions On Tunisian Front

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21. (AP)—The Axis forces in Tunisia advanced slightly against French positions on the Tunisian front today, according to a report from the United States Army.

The report said that the Axis forces had advanced about 100 yards in some places, but that the French forces had held their positions in other places.

Anthracite Mine Strike Appears To Be Terminated

WILKES-BARRE, Pa., Jan. 21. (AP)—The anthracite mine strike in Pennsylvania appears to be terminated today, according to a report from the United States Army.

The report said that the mine workers had returned to work and that the strike had ended.

Groceries Indicted On Anti-trust Charge

KANSAS CITY, Kan., Jan. 21. (AP)—Two of the largest chain grocery store companies in the country were indicted today on an anti-trust charge by the Federal Grand Jury.

The indictment named Safeway Stores, Inc., and Kroger Co. as defendants.

The indictment charged that the two companies had conspired to fix prices and to discriminate against smaller grocery stores.

The two indictments were filed in the Federal Court in Kansas City.
