

## Jail's Sex Harassment Probe Involves Female Inmates

Why was a Seminole County Jail guard fired Monday amid charges of misconduct involving alleged sexual harassment? That's what the guard's lawyer would like to know, and he's asked Sheriff John Polk to list the reasons his client was "officially terminated."

But so far Sheriff Polk has declined to be specific, saying the matter is headed for review by a civil service board and public disclosure of the charges could damage the guard's reputation unnecessarily if they are unfounded, as well as constitute unfair pre-review publicity.

But the problem may be that the issue goes far deeper than involving only one guard — Polk readily admits other guards at the jail are being investigated in connection with similar sexual harassment charges, although reportedly unrelated to Monday's firing of the one guard.

And, the internal investigation into the charges apparently involves female inmates who have complained of sexual harassment by "some guards" at the correctional facility.

The guard who was officially fired Monday is Cpl. Elisha Smith, 42, a sheriff's department employee for about five years.

Smith was suspended with pay about 30 days ago after "one or more inmates" complained of sexual harassment. Polk said Smith was formally fired after an internal investigation "produced what I personally consider to be sufficient information to terminate him."

That was confirmed today by the sheriff's office spokesman in the Smith case as well as in the case involving the other guards.

It was never specified if the allegations were made by male or female inmates, but those involved in the issue said last

night it is their understanding female inmates issued the complaints.

Smith, however, swears he's innocent and threatens to "blow the lid off (the county jail)" when he goes before the civil service board. How much impact that will have, however, is up in the air since two of the three board members are sheriff's department personnel.

The three-man board consists of Duane Harrell, the department's chief deputy who was appointed by the sheriff; Detective Lt. George Hagood, elected by sheriff's department personnel and William Colbert, a Sanford lawyer selected by Harrell and Hagood and who serves as board chairman.

Smith said he intends to fight the charges and will seek full reinstatement as well as any back pay lost from the day of his official firing.

"I'm not guilty, that's why I'm fighting it. I want my job

back. When I get through telling my story, there are going to be a lot of people in trouble down there (the jail). I'm going to blow the lid off," said Smith who added he hasn't decided whether to allow the civil service hearing to be open to the public and press. He has that choice, according to Polk.

Smith's lawyer, Harvey Alper of Altamonte Springs, agrees with his client.

"Our defense is that Smith did nothing wrong. All I know at this point is that the sheriff's office gave my client a letter telling him he was terminated, but it didn't give specific reasons. It used vague terms implying official misconduct by an officer, but I wrote the sheriff requesting specific charges against Smith be written up and submitted to me prior to the hearing."

## Sheriff Frustrated Over Budget Appeal

"An exercise in futility" — that's what Seminole County Sheriff John Polk called the presentation of his proposed \$6,197,096 budget for 1981-82 to the County Board of Commissioners at the Agri-Center auditorium Monday night.

Polk, who is requesting a 6.63 percent increase over this year's budget, explained the need for 39 additional personnel including those mandated by new state and federal guidelines for correctional facilities. The 1980-81 sheriff's budget is \$5,221,805.

The proposed 1981-82 base budget is \$5,633,483 and the sheriff is asking \$543,613 for new personnel and programs.

Additional personnel he is seeking include five clerk typists, five communications employees, 12 uniformed deputies, one deputy in crime prevention, 14 corrections officers, one booking clerk and one cook at the jail.

After three hours of presentation and discussion the commissioners left the frustrated sheriff dangling, saying they would let him know if they came to any decision by the July 14 public hearing on the budget.

Polk said he had been told there would be a separate public hearing on his budget, but was informed Monday night that the entire county budget would also be included. He said the hour he had been allotted would be nowhere near the time needed to explain to the public his entire budget.

Commission Chairman Bob Sturm proposed \$6,004,579 be approved as the

entire budget for the sheriff's department by adding the rent for building 310 and the utility bills to the sheriff's proposed \$5.63 million base budget.

"The Board of County Commissioners pays the electric bill for the rest of the constitutional officers. I think they should pay it for mine," Polk said.


"They are ignoring their own staff recommendations," he said. "Their staff recommended a \$50,000 to \$75,000 cut in my proposed budget and I offered \$100,000 cut in expenses other than salaries."

Not included in the budget figure was an "Officer-in-the-schools" pilot program proposed by Polk to the commission. Polk said by assigning an officer to work in the school and neighborhoods served by the school the juvenile crime rate as well as drug use could be cut.

The total cost for the first year would be \$55,903 Polk said, but this could be cut to \$34,000 the second year. The proposal calls for placing one officer in a middle school and one in a high school for the first year of the program. The schools would probably be Lake Brantley High School and Milwee Middle School, he said.

"I feel it is a very good program," said Polk, "but there's nothing in my budget I could knock out. I could look into providing secondhand cars for the officers instead of new ones and fixing up some of our old ones to use."

Mrs. Patti Brantley, wife of State Rep. Bobby Brantley R-Longwood, spoke for a group of members from the United Parents of West Seminole and the Seminole County Drug

Awareness Task Force, who were at the workshop to support the Officer-in-the-Schools program.

"We are convinced this is where to start," she said. We have spoken to the Seminole County League of Civic Associations, the Young Republicans, the Greater Seminole Chamber of Commerce, the League of Cities, and the RSVP and they are all concerned about the drug problem. They are convinced that this program is the thing to do."

"We feel it would be very beneficial for all facets of the community. The commission working with the Sheriff and the School Board could negotiate the cost down."

"The trouble with pilot programs," commented Commissioner Bill

Kirchhoff, "is that they either crash or become a whole fleet."

Polk said that in Orange County, the county takes care of funding of schools in the county and the cities fund schools in their limits.

"If the pilot program shows us we can reduce juvenile crime rate, it will save 10 times the cost and if we can get one youngster off drugs it would be worth the cost," said Polk.

Sturm proposed a compromise to the suggested funding of one-third each for the school board, sheriff and county. "I'm in favor of the concept," he said, "but think it should cost \$34,000 the first year with the school board paying \$20,000 the sheriff paying \$14,000 and the county providing the cars, gas and oil."

## Iranian Exiles Take Credit For Bombing

Hundreds of thousands of Iranians, chanting and beating their chests in a sign of mourning, marched through the streets of Tehran today for the mass funeral of 72 prominent officials of the Islamic regime killed in a terror bombing.

In another indication of the worsening turmoil gripping Iran, officials said Mohammad Kachouei, governor of Tehran's notorious Evin jail, was fatally shot in the prison compound and the revolutionary prosecutor's office charged the warden was "assassinated by U.S. agents."

A prison spokesman told UPI Kachouei was buried along with the 72 officials killed in the massive bomb blast Sunday at the Islamic Republican Party headquarters, including Ayatollah Mohammed Beheshti — second in power to Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini and mastermind of the American hostage crisis.

The spokesman said seven people were arrested late Monday in the shooting attack at the Evin jail, which once held some of the American hostages and was the site of executions by both the Islamic militants and the former regime of the shah. He did not elaborate further.

The official Pars news agency reported that "two other Majlis deputies have been added to Sunday's terrorist bomb explosion." But it was not immediately clear whether they died in a hospital from injuries in the attack, raising the toll to 74, or whether they were identified among the 72 known dead.

Pars said survivors of the bombing and other government officials joined "millions of inhabitants of Tehran dressed in black" in the funeral procession for the "martyrs."

Many people carried pictures of Beheshti, 52, IRP chief and supreme court justice who led the successful fundamentalist campaign to unseat Abolhassan Bani-Sadr from the presidency.

Executive Affairs Minister Behzad Nabavi, who escaped injury in the blast and was seen in the crowd beating his chest in a sign of mourning, issued a statement rejecting claims by the Turkey-based Iranian Equality Party that its agents had carried out the attack, Tehran radio said.

The party, said to be led by the late Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi's last chief of staff, Gen. Mokhtar Qarabaghi, Monday claimed responsibility for the attack, Turkish radio and television said.

The bombing was a severe blow to Iran's Islamic regime and besides Beheshti claimed the lives of at least four cabinet ministers, six deputy ministers and 23 Majlis deputies.

Pars said the mourners "surged" for hours on the Beheshti-Zahra cemetery in southern Tehran for the burial of the officials.

Khomeini issued a statement to mark the mass funeral, saying Iranians "will not be afraid of being martyred by a bunch of professional criminals hired by the superpowers," Pars reported.

The revolutionary leader's statement appeared to blame the leftist Mujahedin Khasi (peoples warriors) for the bombing saying, "this ignorant gang, which claims to be fighting for the people, has taken the lives of 73 individuals who were serving the people."

Pars reported earlier that Beheshti, who was a member of the presidential triumvirate and headed the supreme court and the IRP, would be replaced as IRP general secretary by Hojatoleslam Mohammad Javad Bahonar, a former minister of education.

The growing unrest in Iran has prompted the U.S. government to warn the Soviet Union not to interfere.

Seven days of mourning were declared in Tehran and all businesses closed to honor those who died when the bomb blew apart the headquarters of the IRP. The bomb, reported to weigh 66 pounds, twisted steel beams and caused the collapse of the roof.

Thousands of angry mourners marched on streets draped with black banners, calling for Khomeini "to let them crush the counter-revolutionary forces" responsible for decimating the nation's leadership, Pars said.

Parliament Speaker Hashemi Rafsanjani, who along with Prime Minister Mohammed Ali Rajai was "slightly injured," blamed the blast on Israel and "agents of the U.S.A., the sworn colleagues of (Iraqi President) Saddam Hussein."

## Breathalyzer Refusal Ruled Admissible

### 'We'll Be Able To Get More Drunks Off The Road'

Persons accused of drunk driving in Seminole County may have a tougher time beating the charges in court from now on as the result of a ruling Monday by county Judge Wallace Hall who, breaking with local tradition, said a jury should be made aware that a defendant refused to take a breathalyzer test.

Assistant Seminole State Attorney Steve Brady, who argued the matter before Hall, applauded the decision as "the greatest thing to come along since radar," and added that the conviction rate for drunk drivers should increase dramatically.

"With this, we will be able to get a lot more drunks off the road," Brady predicted.

Hall's ruling will have no effect on cases heard before county judges James Dickey and Harold Johnson, "but we hope to argue our case to them and see if we can't convince them to go along."

Historically, Seminole judges have not

allowed law enforcement officers to testify that a defendant charged with driving under the influence (DUI) refused to take a breathalyzer test at the time of his arrest. Their drivers license is suspended for three months.

The temporary loss of driving privileges, however, has not been a sufficient threat to coerce many motorists into taking the test, Brady said. "A lot of these people are repeat offenders who face mandatory jail time, so they refuse the test in the hope of weaseling out of the case in court."

"A guy will get up on the witness stand and try to explain away his weaving all over the road and staggering by claiming he was on medication for some illness, or he is a diabetic or epileptic," Brady said.

Faced with that, "a jury wants to see the results of that breathalyzer test. It's hard, scientific evidence which shows whether the amount of alcohol in a suspect's blood exceeded the lawful limit."

"Without it, some juries find it hard to convict," he said. "If we don't present it,

they wonder why. Before, I couldn't tell them we didn't have it because the defendant refused to take the test. Now I can tell them."

Brady said at least 50 percent of the DUI cases he prosecutes involve people who have refused to submit to the breathalyzer. "Face it, your chances for acquittal are better if you don't. And that's exactly what defense attorneys tell their clients — 'Don't take the test.'"

"They won't be able to do that any more," Brady said. "Faced with Judge Hall's ruling, most defendants will most likely just roll over and plead guilty."

"The next case we get in which a person who refused to take the breathalyzer test is convicted of DUI will undoubtedly be appealed on the grounds that the prosecution should not have been allowed to introduce his refusal at trial," Brady said.

If that happens, the issue will "go to the circuit court which will take at least 3-4 months, then maybe on to the Fifth District Court of Appeals."

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## Premature Baby Battling For Life After Beating Red Tape

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI) — A 3-pound baby girl born three months prematurely was alive and battling for life today thanks to a determined hospital staff that reached all the way to the White House when it found itself stymied by indifference and red tape.

Talmadge Memorial spokesman Alex Vaughn said the infant had shown "a little bit of progress" during the night and early today, but that the child was expected to remain on the critical list for several days.

"It's amazing the baby even made it. It's beyond belief," said Becky Burke, who led the battle to get Stephanie Marie McElrath the treatment she had to have.

Stephanie was born Saturday night in Southeastern Medical Center, a small Miami hospital, to Carleen and Gary McElrath, who hasn't had his medical insurance long enough to be eligible for a maternity benefit.

Ms. Burke, public relations director at Southeastern, said the hospital did not have the facilities to care for the critically ill infant, who she said had to have "level three" care.

A spokesman for Talmadge Memorial explained level three care means "highly intensified care both from the standpoint of monitoring and what is being done for the patient," plus providing the physicians necessary in every specialty and the equipment in level trauma patients 24 hours a day.

Nine hospitals in Florida with such facilities rejected Stephanie. One in Miami turned her down when they learned her parents had no insurance, Ms. Burke said. Others said they had no room. Still others, she said, gave no coherent reason.

The staff began calling out-of-state hospitals with level three neonatal care. It was Sunday afternoon when they put in

a call to Talmadge Memorial Hospital in Augusta.

"They were super. They didn't ask any questions, none of the financial questions we had been hearing. They said they had a bed and would hold it for us, and they would send an ambulance out to Bush Field at Fort Gordon to meet us."

"At that point," Ms. Burke said, "all we had to do is find a way to transport the infant. That's when the problems really started."

A commercial air ambulance wanted \$3,000 to transport the child, she said, and the McElraths didn't have that much money.

For the next several hours the hospital itself put "about 60 calls" through to Homestead Air Force Base in south Florida, Scott Air Force Base in Illinois — the Air Force emergency center — the Pentagon, the White House, the homes of all Florida congressmen and senators,

and the governor's mansion.

### Court Eases 'Miranda'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court is giving police greater leeway in how they inform suspects of the famous "Miranda warning" about self-incrimination.

Over the protests of three justices, the high court Monday struck down a ruling that had thrown out a California man's murder conviction on grounds he was not properly advised of his right to have an attorney present during police questioning.

But the high court said Monday the California court "essentially laid down a flat rule requiring that the content of Miranda warnings be a virtual incantation of the precise language laid down in the Miranda opinion" handed down in 1966.

"Such a rigid rule was not mandated by Miranda or any other decision of this court, and is not required to serve the purposes of Miranda," the court declared, in an unsigned opinion.

## Bush Pledges U.S. Support To Marcos Government

MANILA, Philippines (UPI) — Vice President George Bush pledged America's total support to the newly installed government of President Ferdinand Marcos today in a strong inauguration toast, saying "we love your adherence to democratic principles."

Marcos took the oath of office for a new six-year term following elections that opposition leaders have dubbed "a farcical sham." The elections came after Marcos ended eight years of martial law, saying at his inaugural Monday, "today we proclaim here the birth of a new republic."

One Western political analyst, who refused to be identified, called Bush's statement "extremely unfortunate considering the suspicious many young Filipinos already harbor concerning U.S. policy here."

"The Bush toast is sure to raise more than a few eyebrows," the analyst said.

In the champagne toast, Bush told Marcos the United States and the Philippines have always been close because "we stand with the Philippines, we stand with you, sir."

"We love your adherence to democratic principles and to the democratic processes," Bush said. "We will not leave you in isolation. . . it would be turning our backs on history if we did."

## U.S. Asks Australian Forces

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States hopes to convince Australian Prime Minister Malcolm Fraser his country can serve the cause of Middle East peace by contributing soldiers to a multinational truce force in the Sinai Desert.

U.S. officials were not expecting a firm answer from Fraser during his meeting today with President Reagan at the White House because the decision will have to be made by the Australian Cabinet.

The United States hopes Australian participation will help persuade other countries, including New Zealand, to join the effort. The United States, according to Secretary of State Alexander Haig, will contribute a battalion of men — 800 to 900 troops — to the 2,500-man force that will supervise Israel's pullback from its final strip of occupied territory.

The Soviet Union has indicated it will veto any United Nations force in the Security Council.

## 3 Die For Chastity

SEOUL, South Korea (UPI) — Three daughters in their 20s allowed their mother to kill them to protect their chastity, police said.

Chae Jin-sook, 55, was obsessed with a zeal for virtue and imposed tight discipline on her daughter, 28, 26 and 22, police said Monday.

Late Saturday, the woman talked her daughters into agreeing to a suicide pact to protect their virtue with death. She tied their hands and legs and then one by one covered their heads with nylon bags until each suffocated, police said.

Mrs. Chae failed to kill herself, however, and was found sitting near the bodies.

Her son reported the killings to police. Police said the woman forced the suicide pact on her daughters after the youngest stayed out two nights.

## Siege Of Zahle Ends

ZAHLE, Lebanon (UPI) — Lebanese security forces took control of the Bekaa Valley town of Zahle today and evacuated the city's rightist militiamen, ending a three-month-old Syrian army siege of the war-torn Christian enclave.

The end of the siege, worked out by an Arab League peace committee, increased hopes of a comprehensive settlement to the Lebanese conflict.

# Appeals Court Upholds Mills' Burglary Conviction

The Fifth District Court of Appeals in Daytona Beach has upheld a lower court ruling in a case which signaled the beginning of the end for 34-year-old Gregory Mills who was sentenced to die in the electric chair for the murder two years ago of retired Sanford businessman James Wright.

Mills, now on Death Row, appealed his 1979 conviction for burglarizing a Sanford home in which he stole a .410-gauge shotgun that was later used to gun down the elderly Wright in his home at 458 S. Elliott St.

Mills was found guilty of armed burglary, an offense which carries a maximum penalty of 30 years in the state penitentiary. During the May 9, 1979 robbery of the home of John Fox, 1920 Magnolia Ave., Mills and co-defendant Vincent Ashley stole a shotgun and box of shells. Mills claimed the charge should have been simple burglary — a 15-year felony — because he did not enter the home with a weapon and did not load the shotgun while in the house.

In writing the court's majority opinion, Judge J. Orfinger said that it was "clear that under the facts of this case . . . appellant (Mills) had the ability at any time during the burglary and after he had possession of the shotgun and the shells to insert the shells and make use of the weapon."

" . . . if he had loaded the weapon, he would be considered armed. Is he any less armed merely because he carries the shells separate from the weapon?" Orfinger asked. "Once the shotgun and shells were united in Mills' possession, he had the capacity to use the weapon by the mere expediency of inserting one or more shells, and thereby commit the violent act the statute seeks to proscribe."

Two weeks after the shotgun was stolen, the 72-year-old Wright was killed by a single blast from the weapon when he surprised Mills and Ashley in the process of burglarizing his home.

In a separate trial, Mills was convicted for his role in the theft of the murder weapon, then stood trial Aug. 15 and 16, 1979 for the subsequent break-in and homicide.

Ashley, who was given immunity for the Fox and Wright

burglaries, identified Mills in court as the triggerman in the Wright slaying.

Another key state witness — Sylvester Davis — testified that Mills admitted to both the break-ins and the shooting.

A 7-woman, 5-man jury deliberated more than four hours before finding Mills guilty of first degree murder and burglary.

Both Ashley and Davis are now in jail, Ashley for assaulting a police officer outside a local bar, and Davis for armed robbery.

"We had to let the little fish go to catch the big one," said Assistant Seminole State Attorney Don Marblestone. "But it all came out in the wash. All the bad guys are in prison."

# City Help Will Cost Attorneys

Chances are that attorneys in Seminole County will think twice before calling on Altamonte Springs city employees to provide them with information related to court cases.

The city commission has voted to charge attorneys \$50-per-hour for services of each employee involved in researching official records or giving testimony in court.

Commissioners, in a special work session June 18, discussed at length the need for establishing policy concerning

the use of city employees by attorneys working on cases.

Officials said city employees asked to provide information are being taken away from city business.

Too much time has been spent on accommodating legal representatives, they said. While records are being looked up and questions are being answered for these attorneys, service to the tax-paying public is interrupted, they said.

The new policy is effective immediately for all departments and provides that City Manager Jeff Etch-

berger be notified when city employees are called upon for legal information assistance.

All legal cases which do not somehow involve city business or the city of Altamonte Springs will be subject to the policy, officials said.

Specific areas of assistance named were answering questions, giving opinions, giving expert testimony, looking up records, and giving depositions. — SYBIL MITCHELL GANDY

sheriff's office will comply with that request. Smith, according to department policy regulating civil service board procedure, must be given his hearing no later than 30 days after he officially requests one. That request, according to Polk, was received last Friday.

Spolaki also said today Alper is scheduled to meet with Polk at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday when the sheriff will give him a "complete case file docket for his (Alper's) review."

Although Smith is the only guard to date who has been suspended or fired in connection with the sexual harassment charges, a jailer who resigned in early June may also have been implicated in similar conduct, according to Smith.

Polk said the jailer resigned for "personal reason," but Smith insisted it was because of his alleged involvement with the sexual harassment charges "and he wanted to avoid being fired and public embarrassment."

So far it's been unclear as to whether the allegations of sexual harassment against female inmates involves lewd or lascivious conduct or advances, or whether it stems from some female inmates complaining they are treated differently than their male counterparts.

"There's always the possibility that the complaining inmate or inmates are doing this just to cause problems for the guards," Alper speculated, pointing out it is not uncommon in detention facilities for inmates to allege misconduct on the part of their guards to get vindictive or give the guards a rough time.

"It appears this could also be a matter of problems Polk might be having at the jail in terms of security," he said.

At present the new jail at Five-Points can accommodate 212 prisoners. There is one section of 18 separate cells for female prisoners and another section containing four other individual cells for four other female inmates called holding cells.

Present policy is to have the cell blocks, male and female, patrolled every 15 minutes. It also calls for monitoring areas where inmates congregate outside their cells with an internal TV system. And, according to policy, male guards are not supposed to enter female inmate sections unless they're accompanied by a female guard except under extraordinary conditions, such as rioting, etc.

"Which raises the question of how sexual harassment can occur under those conditions," Alper noted.

Spolaki said it is his understanding that the policy governing security at the county jail does include those rules, but pointed out the TV cameras cannot monitor what's going on in the individual cells.

As of this morning, Spolaki said, there were 177 prisoners lodged at the county jail, 103 white males, 2 white females, 49 black males, 10 black females, 11 male federal prisoners, 7 white, 4 black, 1 temporary inmate from Orange County and 1 temporary federal inmate.

## Nuclear Build-Up: A Terrifying Reality

Because the United States can't be in favor of pre-emptive air raids and doesn't like to be surprised, as it was when its client-ally, Israel, destroyed Iraq's nuclear reactor, the Reagan administration suspended four F-16 deliveries and went along with the U.N. Security Council's condemnation.

Besides, the State Department isn't really sure Iraq would have made atomic bombs to carry out its threat to destroy Israel, and perhaps also Iran, which it invaded last year. According to Undersecretary of State Walter J. Stoessel Jr., "We had not made any definitive conclusions that they were aiming for a nuclear weapons capability." Also, Iraq was one of the signers of the non-nuclear Proliferation Treaty.

Washington's ambiguously reassuring pronouncement is anything but the end of this affair. And rightly so. The larger issue urgently raised anew by Israel's surgical strike on the Osirak reactor is how the proliferation of nuclear weapons can be controlled. Specifically, the question at hand is whether Iraq was going for nuclear weapons as Israel asserts, or whether Israel was carelessly yielding to trigger-happy paranoia?

The current scramble for answers is turning up some truly disturbing information. Roger Richter, a nuclear expert and the only American assigned to the International Atomic Energy Agency's Middle East and South Asia sections, told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee recently that he had not inspected the Iraqi reactor because only Soviet and Eastern European members of IAEA were permitted to do so.

No wonder the State Department is vague as to definitive conclusions about Iraq's nuclear weapons capability. Moreover, according to Richter, Iraq's "hot cell" laboratory obtained from Italy for separating plutonium, the bomb material, from uranium is not subject to any inspection whatsoever by the IAEA. And, even more astonishing, Richter told the senators the 100 tons of uranium, which Iraq has purchased for processing through the reactor into bomb-producing plutonium was not under any sort of inventory control by the atomic agency.

Other alarming facts are coming to light: The reactor Iraq purchased from France was not large enough to produce electric power, which the oil-rich Iraqis don't need in the desert anyway, and it was much too big for peaceful nuclear research. Further, Iraq vetoes French efforts to change the reactor's design so it would not require enriched, weapons-grade uranium. And then Iraq rejected France's offer of low-enriched uranium used for research and, instead, insisted on deliveries of the weapons-grade stuff. After uranium is converted into plutonium, scientists advise, a bomb can be assembled in about a week.

Still, Eivgard Eklund, head of the International Atomic Energy Agency, insists the Iraqis are not in the business of nuclear bombs. And still all of this remains beyond any "definitive conclusions" by the State Department.

We have, in short, come to the point where the proliferation of nuclear weapons is no longer an alarming potential danger but a terrifying reality that further neglect can only magnify. An atomic bomb, concealable in nearly any automobile trunk, could devastate any city in the world and, therefore, could make entire nations hostage to unthinkable terrorist demands.

Thus, whatever ramifications there may be from the Israeli-Iraqi confrontation, one of its side effects is the overdue realization that world statesmen have no more urgent business than overhauling the International Atomic Energy Agency and making it into a strong anti-nuclear shield for humanity. The Reagan administration should not lose another day in leading this mission among the nations.

## France Trying New Step

In their long history as a nation, the French have experienced just about everything under the political sun with one notable exception. A government of France such as has emerged from the 1981 elections.

For the first time in many experiments with representative government, the French have opted for both a powerful leader with a firm popular mandate and a National Assembly under the firm control of a majority party — the president's.

The first situation is no novelty. France has had powerful presidents ever since Charles de Gaulle created the present office to the measure of his own out-sized capabilities and ambitions. But not even de Gaulle enjoyed an outright parliamentary majority. He and his center-right successors relied upon coalitions in the National Assembly.

This suggests that Francois Mitterrand's power and potential impact upon France may exceed that of even de Gaulle, who designed the Fifth Republic's constitution so that the president could govern without the National Assembly should that body prove difficult. But parliamentary agreement is still necessary for a fundamental restructuring of the French society and economy.

And that, of course, is precisely what Mitterrand intends if his campaign declarations are to be taken at face value.

What he has declared he plans for France is a program of extensive nationalization in the financial and industrial sectors of the economy and broad social reforms. If carried through approximately as envisaged, it could amount to a reordering of society through legislation of a significance second only to the revolution that began in 1789. It could, in fact, be the long-delayed completion of that unfinished upheaval.

To hear the French themselves, there now appear to be no serious obstacles to that end. The opposition parties on Mitterrand's right are in disarray and he has his sometime Communist allies precisely where he wants them — in a position of having to accept whatever tokens of power he may choose to share in the new French order or to go without. In the words of a few of the current headlines, "Mitterrand Holds All the Cards" and "Socialism's Hour Has Finally Arrived."

Mitterrand, who has been playing it cautiously initially, may think otherwise himself, however. And with some reason.

The Socialist victory may be if anything too overwhelming. The party, in the political doldrums only a few years ago with some 5 percent of the popular vote, could find its present swollen size a source of weakness rather than strength. Many if not most of the votes that have put president and party into power are borrowed — from Communists, who see their longtime rivals as the best bet at the moment of effecting meaningful reform, and elsewhere. Defections are to be expected if promises are not made good as rapidly as expected or in the form desired.

The party is also divided internally between hard-core leftists who want to proceed full steam toward nationalization and moderated who want to move with caution to avoid alarming less radical elements and uniting the opposition. The possibilities are there for a doctrinal struggle such as may be in the process of destroying the British Labor Party and is seriously weakening the West German Socialists.

Those are problems for the future, however. For the present, the headlines have it right. — Mitterrand and his Socialists have it all their way.

# Soviet Forgers Try To Undermine NATO

WASHINGTON — The KGB's expert forgers are up to their old tricks — turning out counterfeit Pentagon documents — and once again, the CIA has caught them at it.

The aim of the Kremlin forger squad this time was to sow fear and suspicion among our NATO allies, who are already uneasy about U.S. plans to upgrade our nuclear arsenal in Europe. The spurious documents have been published in a booklet, and its title says it all: "Top Secret Documents on U.S. Forces Headquarters in Europe: Holocaust Again for Europe."

The collection of fake documents purports to have been "Printed in England," and the publisher's introduction claims the booklet was "published as a public service." More may be on the way: The publisher's note says they "hope to extend this service in the future," and the booklet is subtitled "Information Book No. 1."

CIA sources told my associate Dale Van Atta that the latest KGB hoax has turned up recently in Oslo, Copenhagen, The Hague and Brussels. The booklets were mailed from the United Kingdom, but with no return address.

The attempt to weaken the NATO alliance with forged documents was similar to the appearance last year of supposed U.S. secret operations plans shortly after the decision was announced to base cruise missiles in Britain. The documents were mailed to several members of the British Parliament.

Of the latest batch of forgeries, at least two are complete fabrications. Some are authentic but have cleverly altered here and there to give them a totally different meaning.

A number of the documents were purportedly the 1962 battle plans of the U.S. commander-in-chief for Europe. They suggested that in certain circumstances the

United States might make a pre-emptive strike with nuclear, chemical and biological weapons — and might even use these weapons against neutral and allied targets.

Intelligence sources say some of the documents on which the Kremlin counterfeiting based its forgeries were sold to the Russians in 1963-64 by Army Sgt. Robert Lee Johnson, who worked in the secret military courier center near Orly Airport outside Paris. Johnson was caught, sentenced to 25 years on espionage charges, and in 1972 was stabbed to death by his son, who was visiting him at the penitentiary.

The sources acknowledge that some of Johnson's documents lend an air of authenticity to the KGB's forgeries. But they point out that the stolen documents are nearly 20 years old and bear little resemblance to U.S. and allied contingency planning today.


And, of course, the subtle and not-so-subtle

changes give the game away — at least to Americans who know the truth. The question, of course, is how persuasive the KGB's forgeries may be to European officials, who already have misgivings about their nation's vulnerability in case of a U.S.-Soviet showdown.

The Kremlin obviously considers the effort worthwhile. One CIA source estimates that as many as 50 KGB technicians are detailed to the forgery squad, and the budget for 1979 was estimated at \$200 million or more.

Earlier efforts by the Soviet counterfeiter include a spurious U.S. Army field manual, a fabricated speech by President Carter with insulting references to the Greeks, and a fictitious interview with Vice President Mondale.

Footnote: In case you were wondering, the CIA also forges documents intended to embarrass the Kremlin. It's all part of the game.

# The Cancer Connection

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI) — The three words that Richard Bloch never imagined he would hear came during a visit to his doctor three years ago. Cancer. Malignant. Inoperable.

"In that brief moment, I didn't know what cancer was other than knowing it was synonymous with death," recalls Bloch, sitting in the office of H&R Block, Inc., the income tax company he founded with his brother Henry in 1955.

"Thank God I had the presence of mind to ask two questions: Is there anything that can be done for me and is there anywhere I can go for more help?"

Around those two desperate queries, Bloch has built The Cancer Connection, a unique operation that tells newly diagnosed cancer victims where they can go for help, what they can expect and — in many cases — whether their doctor has told them all they need to know about treatment.

"I wanted a system of volunteers, all who at one time or another had cancer or knew someone who had cancer," Bloch explained. "I didn't want them to make a prognosis, just to answer the hundreds of questions that are in your mind but that you don't know how to ask."

Bloch attributes his triumph over lung cancer to his wife, Annette, and to Buddy Greenbaum, a close friend whose wife had died of cancer and who since that time also has died from the disease. It was Bloch's wife who vowed the couple would beat the cancer and his friend who urged him to seek treatment at the well known M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute in Houston.

On May 1, 1980, after chemotherapy, radiation treatment, immunotherapy, surgery and psychotherapy, Houston doctors told Bloch he apparently was cured.

The idea for a nonprofit, support agency for cancer victims was born that day in May. Since then, Bloch has gathered 73 volunteers who man a 24-hour-a-day hotline to listen to, advise and comfort those stricken with

cancer.

"We work on the premise that time is of the essence," Bloch says. "Next month, next week, tomorrow could be too late."

"When people call us now and say, 'My doctor says I'm not going to live,' we say, 'Why don't you get a second opinion? Why don't you go find a doctor who says I think I can cure you? I think you have a chance.'"

Keith King says he is living proof the hotline works. Although he just began his volunteer stint with the agency, he already is working side by side with a 16-year-old victim of Hodgkins disease.

"Here's this little girl not even through high school and she can look at me and see that I'm OK, so maybe she'll be OK, too," says King, a Hodgkins victim now in remission.

The hotline, however, is not the most unique feature of the Cancer Connection. A more unusual — and sometimes controversial — aspect is the Cancer Treatment Panel, a rotating group of at least five doctors who once a week assemble without charge to visit with Cancer Connection participants.

Their task? To examine the diagnosis, prognosis and treatment prescribed by the patient's doctor and, if warranted, recommend additional treatment — or even different treatment.

After reviewing the case of Teri Mantony, a 28-year-old newlywed with malignant melanomas, the treatment panel agreed with her personal physician that surgery was the best route to recovery.

"I just wanted to make sure that before my doctor sliced into me, he was doing the right thing," Mrs. Mantony said. "When I told him I was going to the treatment panel, there was a hurt in his voice, like 'Don't you believe what I've been telling you?'"

"When I left the panel, I felt relieved. I believed in my doctor, that he was right. I had that much more confidence in him."

Because the set-up is working, Bloch wants other cities across the country to build their own Cancer Connections.

So far, no one's volunteering.

# On 'The Iron Triangle'

WASHINGTON (NEA) — More than 20 years after President Eisenhower warned of the danger posed by the "military-industrial complex," that unofficial yet powerful alliance continues its unrestrained growth.

That chilling conclusion is unavoidable after reviewing a meticulously documented book-length study of the problem recently published by the Council on Economic Priorities, a New York-based independent research organization.

When Eisenhower, in his farewell address in January 1961, spoke of the potential threat from "this conjunction of an immense military establishment and a large arms industry," he included only those two elements in the coalition.

But the new CEP study, "The Iron Triangle: The Politics of Defense Contracting," adds a third component — the members of Congress who are overly enthusiastic about both the financial support the defense contractors can provide to their campaigns and the economic value of military production facilities in their states and congressional districts.

Dr. Gordon Adams, author of the CEP report, identifies a variety of mechanisms — none of which allow any measure of citizen participation — under which the politicians, contractors and government procurement officers protect and promote their own interests, often at the expense of the public.

"Over the years, the defense industry has become an active participant in (government) policy-making," says the report. "People, power and money move freely among three centers — congressional, executive (Defense Department) and private industry — creating a community of shared interests and assumptions which defends itself against outsiders."

Among the bonds that unite that triumvirate:

Political action committees: The PACs maintained by eight defense contractors — Boeing, General Dynamics, Grumman, Lockheed, McDonnell Douglas, Northrop, Rockwell International and United Technologies — contributed more than \$1.25 million to candidates for federal office between 1976 and 1980.

At least 40 percent of those funds went into the campaign treasuries of members of the House and Senate who sit on appropriations and authorization committees that have jurisdiction over defense and space programs.

The revolving door: CEP identified more than 1,900 individuals who moved between the government (the Defense Department or the National Aeronautics and Space Administration) and the eight defense contractors during the 1970s.

Some of those people "changed jobs several times, switching, for example, from a senior engineering position at a contracting firm to a procurement job in the same field at the Pentagon and back to their company again."

One former Defense Department official describes the danger inherent in that practice: "Position (in private industry) are offered to (government) procurement officers who have demonstrated their appreciation for industry's particular problems and commitments."

Washington operations: Industry lobbyists operate from expensively furnished, professionally staffed Washington offices whose principal mission is to generate more taxpayer-financed contracts for their companies.

## Mexico Hikes Oil Prices In Dramatic Turnabout

NEW YORK—Mexico, America's fourth largest foreign oil supplier, is raising its crude by \$2 a barrel in a dramatic turnaround that partially offsets the non-Opec nation's recent price reduction of \$4 a barrel, industry sources said Monday.

The Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries' crude oil production has sunk to its lowest level in more than a decade, Petroleum Intelligence Weekly reported Monday.

Meanwhile in Venezuela crude oil production for the week ending June 24 averaged 1.86 million barrels a day from the 1.91 million barrels a day, a decrease of 42,000 barrels a day from the 1.91 million barrel-a-day output for the previous week, the Energy and Mines Ministry reported in its latest newsletter.

## 'Miss Lillian' Recovering

AMERICUS, Ga. (UPI)—"Miss Lillian" Carter, the 82-year-old mother of former President Jimmy Carter, was recovering normally today from a mastectomy to remove a cancerous lump.

Surgeons, who removed her left breast in a 90 minute operation Monday at Americus-Sumter County Hospital, said she "withstood the procedure very well" and probably would remain hospitalized about a week.

"She showed a normal recovery from anesthesia and was talking when she left the operation room," hospital administrator James R. Griffith said after the operation. She was reported in stable condition.

## Baby Thrown Into Street

NEWPORT BEACH, Calif. (UPI)—A young mother tossed her 2-year-old girl into the path of oncoming traffic, but motorists were able to avoid striking the baby and she escaped with minor cuts and bruises, police said.

Rowena Kehaulani Harlan, 25, threw the baby into the street late Sunday, police said. Witnesses said the woman was holding the baby and shouting incoherently moments before the incident.

Mrs. Harlan was booked on suspicion of assault with attempt to commit murder, and was being held in Orange County on \$250,000 bail.

## Bonus System Scored

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A key congressman who opposed a move last year to let high-ranking officials of government agencies choose employees deserving awards for excellence, says his worst fears have been confirmed.

Rep. Edward Roybal, D-Calif., said the General Accounting Office has found these senior bureaucrats have been giving the bonuses in the form of pay raises to themselves and their high-level colleagues.

"This has been my primary concern with the bonus system and this report has confirmed my worst fears," Roybal said in a statement. He added his House Appropriations subcommittee will investigate and "wipe the dirty slate clean."

## NBC President Resigns

NBC BURBANK, Calif. (UPI) Fred Silverman is resigning as president of NBC, ending his unsuccessful three-year pabble to lead the network from the bottom of the ratings war, a network source say.

The NBC source, who asked not to be identified, said Grant Tinker, ex-husband of actress Mary Tyler Moore and head of MTM Productions, would replace Silverman as NBC's chief programmer.

RCA, parent company of NBC, planned to announce Silverman's resignation today in New York, the source said. A spokesman for RCA in New York issued a "no comment."

# 'Get Me Out Of Here, Ma'

TORRINGTON, Conn. (UPI)—Mugged and robbed of everything but the dungarees he was wearing, Gerard Coury telephoned his mother from Grand Central station in New York City.

"He was really, really upset," Mary Coury recalled Monday. "He said, 'Get me out of here, ma.'"

It was the last time she ever talked to her 26-year-old son, a former Fairfield University honor student and athlete.

About eight hours later — just before dawn Saturday — a teenage mob stripped Coury naked and chased him through Times Square to a subway station, where he leaped in desperation onto the tracks, and grabbed the electrified third rail. The crowd howled with laughter.

"I was stunned," said transit officer Edwin Cassar. "They (the mob) thought it was a big joke."

Mrs. Coury, who couldn't wire money Friday night as her son asked, picked up a local newspaper Sunday morning and read about an unidentified young man — described by police as a vagrant — who had been electrocuted in a New York subway.

"I felt certain it was our Gerry," said Mrs. Coury. "I don't know why. I hoped it wouldn't be but I was afraid it would be."

That night she and her husband, Narnir, identified their son's body in New York City's borough of Brooklyn. He was the youngest of their seven children.

Mrs. Coury said her son, who did

not live at home, was "a good clean kid" who "had never been arrested for anything."

"He was an excellent student," she said. "He was in many of the clubs in Torrington. He was president of one or two of them. He was very active in sports and played football."

He attended Fairfield University, a Catholic liberal arts college, for three years, where he made the dean's list in his first two years. But Mrs. Coury said his junior year "wasn't so good. He came through, but he decided not to go back for awhile."

Currently out of work, Gerard had called Thursday to say he was heading "to points south," possibly to visit a close friend in New Jersey

or to Washington, D.C., to get a job. She said she didn't know why he stopped in New York.

He called her about 8 p.m. Friday from a transit police telephone in Grand Central.

Police in Grand Central confirmed Monday they helped Coury, who they described as "cooperative, coherent and polite," phone his mother.

A Conrail spokeswoman said Coury told the officers he had been mugged in the city a week previously but was vague about the details. They said he asked his mother to wire him money.

Mrs. Coury doesn't drive and her husband has no vision in one eye so she said she didn't want him to drive to New York City at night. The local

Western Union office was closed and she tried to reach her son's friend in New Jersey.

When she called Grand Central back, police said Gerard had gone.

Her son's ordeal in Times Square began about 5:20 a.m. Saturday, when the area is given up to drifters, drug addicts, pimps, prostitutes, gangs of youths and petty criminals.

Cassar and his partner, Fred Ehlers, were breaking up a fight when they saw Coury running naked down the street with about 15 youths in pursuit. People joined the chase until a mob of 40 youths were chasing Coury. Cassar said they tossed bottles and cans at the fleeing man.

## Drifter Convicted Of Kidnapping Boy

HAYWARD, Calif. (UPI)—A soft-spoken drifter faces up to nine years in prison for kidnapping a 5-year-old boy and taking him to a mountain cabin to join a "son" allegedly abducted seven years earlier. Timmy White's parents said they were "very relieved" by the verdict.

Jurors deliberated less than two hours Monday before agreeing that Kenneth Parnell, 49, snatched Timmy, now 7, from the streets of Ukiah, Calif., as the boy was returning home from a 1980 Valentine's Day party.

"It (the verdict) was very important to us," said Angela White, Timmy's mother. "I didn't want the man to get off scot free so he could do it again to someone else ... It was awful."

The Whites moved to San Jose from Ukiah, Calif., seven months ago and now plan to move to an undisclosed and "less crowded" area of California, but James White, Timmy's stepfather, said he thinks the youth is fine despite the ordeal.

The defendant showed no emotion as the verdict was read. Defense attorney Scott

LeStrange said Parnell, who he painted as a lonely and despaired man, would decide within the week whether to appeal.

Alameda Superior Court Judge M.O. Sabraw, who set sentencing for Aug. 4, could give Parnell a maximum of either seven or nine years in prison depending on whether he takes the defendant's prior record into account.

Parnell was convicted and sentenced to a state hospital and San Quentin Prison when he was 19, for committing sex acts with an 8-year-old boy in a remote canyon. He also served a six-year state prison term in Utah on robbery and grand larceny convictions.

The balking defendant, last employed as a hotel night clerk, is to stand trial later on the charge of kidnapping Steven Slayner from a street in Merced, Calif., and holding him for seven years.

Slayner, then 14, and Timmy escaped last year from Parnell's cabin in the coastal mountains of Mendocino County and went to a Ukiah police station three weeks after Timmy was seized.

## Reagan Aide Irked By NAACP Remark

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Reagan appeared unperturbed by his cool reception from the NAACP, but one of his top aides was burned up by some sharp introductory remarks.

"I was very pleased," the president said as he left Denver for Washington Monday after addressing the NAACP's annual convention.

Reagan delivered a tough speech, making no concessions to his own economic philosophy, and saying black Americans should place their trust in free enterprise and his policies rather than government handouts.

The audience was equally tough, reacting with only scattered applause.

NAACP Chairman Margaret Bush Wilson introduced Reagan with several jabs, recalling he had failed to appear at the group's convention last summer during the presidential campaign.

She also brought the delegates to their feet cheering when she issued this disclaimer:

"The NAACP does not necessarily subscribe to the views that are about to be expressed."

Afterward, White House deputy chief of staff Michael Deaver told reporters, "I think the remark was unfortunate if you're trying to build bridges. To say it before the president even spoke."

Reagan smiled, but wife Nancy did not appear amused as she sat on the stage.

NAACP Executive Director Benjamin Hooks told reporters after Reagan's departure the president won no converts and said his organization "will continue to resist the president's economic policies."

Reagan insisted his economic recovery program is "the surest and most equitable way" to reduce inflation and to bring economic freedom to minorities.

"The well-being of blacks ... like the well-being of every American ... is linked to the health of the economy," he said.

Reagan said he believes many social programs over the years "have been more dedicated in making needy people government-dependent, rather than independent."

He said the government can provide subsistence, "but it seldom moves people up the economic ladder." And he added "an honest program would be dedicated to making people independent."

## Reputed Mob Figure Killed By Bomb Blast

OAKLAND PARK, Fla. (UPI)—Reputed Chicago underworld figure Joseph Testa is dead of massive injuries from a bomb planted under his luxury car at a country club. He died just hours after police said only he could help them find who did it.

Testa never regained consciousness after talking with police as he lay in the parking lot of the Tamarac Country Club after a "high-technology" bomb blew him 100 feet out of his limousine after a round of golf Saturday afternoon.

"Is there anyone you know who would have done this?" the 53-year-old millionaire businessman and reputed associate of Chicago mob figures was asked as he lay in his burning car.

"Yeah," Testa said. "A lot of people."

He died Monday at North Ridge General Hospital — where surgeons had removed one and one-half ounces of shrapnel from his body.

## Florida Escapee Nabbed

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—A man who escaped from Florida police custody more than a year ago following a grand theft conviction has been arrested.

Terry Lee Frazier, 25, and two other men were arrested Monday night at a North Hollywood area hotel by detectives acting on information obtained during their lengthy investigation.

Frazier escaped from a hospital in Hillsborough, Fla., June 21, 1980, with the aid of an accomplice. Police were questioning the other two men about their connection with Frazier.

Efforts to reach a settlement have been stalled by the players' refusal to sit down at the bargaining table unless the owners have something to offer.



## Anemia Not Just A Lack Of Iron

DEAR DR. LAMB — Recently I had my regular checkup and the doctor said I was a little anemic. He scheduled me to come back in six weeks for another test. He said that if I was still low that he would have to do special tests to see what was causing it. I was wondering if I couldn't just take some iron tablets and correct this on my own without having the tests.

DEAR READER — You might just confuse the issue. Your doctor wants to know what kind of anemia you have before he starts treating you. And he may find you don't really have a significant anemia at all worth the repeat tests.

There are several different kinds of anemia and that makes a difference in the choice of treatment for best results. You can have an anemia because you don't have enough iron. That is particularly likely to happen to young women in the childbearing age. Or you can have an anemia because you have chronic bleeding. That is important. A cancer of the large bowel may be the underlying cause of an anemia. The bone marrow may not be producing enough red blood cells. This can be from many different causes, too. Sometimes this is a response to any of a number of medicines. Sometimes it is from exposure to some toxic agent you are unaware of. Then, too, the bone marrow may fail with increasing age for no evident reason.

Still another cause of anemia is an inadequate amount of vitamin B-12. This may be from the inability to absorb B-12 because a vital chemical is absent from your stomach.

In order not to confuse the issue, I must urge you to follow your doctor's orders. The different causes of anemias are discussed in The Health Letter number 43, Understanding the Anemias, which I am sending you. DEAR DR. LAMB — I realize the importance of proper nutrition during pregnancy, but would there be any connection between proper nutrition and getting pregnant? I have been trying to become pregnant for some time. I am typical of today's youth, rushing day in and day out, often with skimpy meals to maintain my weight. I'm 26 years old, 5 feet 3 and 114 pounds. Although my gynecologist found my husband and me medically capable, I was embarrassed to ask about this.

DEAR READER — That is a good question. Many young women and even mature women have absent menstrual periods because they are on fat diets. A woman apparently needs to have a certain amount of body fat for normal hormone function. When you get too lean the brain stops releasing a hormone that stimulates the pituitary gland which in turn stimulates the ovaries. That is thought to be one reason why women athletes may develop menstrual disorders.

While it is not foolproof, a good guide for you is your menstrual periods. If you are having a normal cycle, you are probably able to get pregnant. Nevertheless, since you sound like you may be a little on the thin side, a few pounds might help. Otherwise check again with your gynecologist if you have not become pregnant within a year's time.

column. South won the club lead and proceeded to cash three diamonds, three spades, two hearts and a club for plus 600. Those pairs who played at four hearts scored 650 and gained two IMP's each at the expense of this particular pair.

However, the field of at least 14 of the 20 North-South pairs reached the good contract of six hearts only to wind up minus 100 when hearts failed to break.

Thus, this pair gained 12 IMP's against each of the unfortunate slam bidders for plus 180 IMP's and lost a total of 10 IMP's to those who played in five hearts to gain a net of plus 158 IMP's for their bad bidding.

If the hearts had dropped, this pair would have made seven for plus 720. They would lose 12 IMP's to each of the 14 slam bidders and while they would get a few back from those who played the heart game they would have lost over 150 IMP's instead of gaining the same amount.

Then, the East-West pair who played against them would have gained 150 IMP's through good luck and would have finished eighth in the field instead of 16th.
