

Once regarded as almost invariably fatal, this aliment can now be controlled or entirely averted by proper treatment, according to a report submitted at a meeting of the Medical Society of New York held recently at the New York Acad-

Coronary thrombosis is not primarily a disease of the aged," the report stated, "but takes its greatest toll from the ranks of prominent business, administrative and pro-fessional men during the most productive depute in their lives. In our experience, prolonged nervous tension directly related to professional or business responsibility appears to be the most important single contributing factor.

Further observations led to these general conclusions:

Patients can survive coronary thrombosis for many years

Association of Colleges and Unit in good or fair condition. The disease is more prevalent among men than among women, yet men seeth to come through the acute attack better, and to live longer thereafter. In the main the younger a patient is at the time of onset, the longer he will live.

The treatment recommended is based primarily on com plete rest, of several weeks' duration. 


