### Mrs. Roosevelt Discusses War

Three aspects of the war crisis in this country-how far politics should be adjourned, how to keep America out of the conflagration, and what to do to prevent war profiteering—are discussed by Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt on her question and answer page in the October issue of The Democratic Digest, publication of the Women's Divi-sion, Democratic National Committee.

As to what extent politics should be adjourned at the present time, the President's wife says "completely, where foreign policies are concerned" but not in local and domestic affairs which remain "fundamental to the solution of our own problems." Differences of opinion cut across party lines, she declares, and should be argued out in the open "until a decision has been reached which will represent the majority opinion in the country."

Citizens who wish to help keep the country out of the

European war can best do so by refusing to accept any information until they are sure it is "authoritative", Mrs. Roosevelt thinks. She also feels that each individual should fill responsibilities at home "as the need arises" and aid in alleviating the suffering of civilian populations in the war areas aroad.

In response to a question as to what housewives can do to prevent war profiteering. Mrs. Roosevelt goes into more detail. She suggests an educational program through newspapers and over the radio be conducted by consumer co-operatives and other organizations which reach women buyers. 

As to what extent politics should be adjourned at the oresent time, the President's wife says "completely, where foreign policies are concerned" but not in local and domestic affairs which remain "fundamental to the solution of our own problems." Differences of opinion cut across party lines, she declares, and should be argued out in the open "until a decision has been reached which will repre-

Citizens who wish to help keep the country out of the European war can best do so by refusing to accept any information until they are sure it is "authoritative". Mrs. Roosevelt thinks. She also feels that each individual should fill responsibilities at home "as the need arises" and aid in alleviating the suffering of civilian populations in the war areas aroad.


