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# Miami Area Water Usage May Be Cut

MIAMI (AP) — Unless there is abnormally high winter rainfall, water use in south Florida will have to be restricted by February, according to William V. Storch, chief engineer of the Central and Southern Florida Flood Control District.

"The picture is relatively better than it was the first part of this month, but so far we have only gained some time," said Storch of November's near-normal rainfall.

He said coastal rainfall has improved ground water levels, but "we are still far from being in good shape in our surface reservoirs."

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# Waste Water Experiment Conducted

GAINEVILLE, Fla. (AP) — University of Florida researchers are trying to prove with a \$96,400 federal grant that waste water can be successfully used to irrigate and fertilize farm and forest lands.

The university is trying to find an alternative to dumping wastes into the sea and the pollution of ground water supplies. It will discharge millions of gallons of effluent from the City of Tallahassee's southwest waste water treatment plant onto its land and summer forage crops in nearby farmlands.

# Kissinger Resumes Peace Negotiations

PARIS (AP) — Henry Kissinger resumed negotiations with Le Duc Tho today amid reports that the United States may be preparing to sign a cease-fire agreement with the Saigon government's concurrence.

They met at a villa near the North Vietnamese headquarters in suburban Clotay in Hoi.

As his car pulled up to the villa, Kissinger said with a grin for the reporters and photographers gathered there: "I thought this was supposed to be a secret rendezvous."

The Viet Cong accused the Thieu government of drawing up a list of several thousand political prisoners to assassinate before a cease-fire agreement was signed.

In Bangkok, Field Marshal Thanom Kittikachorn, the chairman of Thailand's ruling military junta, said the United States will keep troops and warplanes in Thailand after a cease-fire in Vietnam in case the North Vietnamese violate the truce agreement.

Chou En-lai (premier) has been telling American visitors we should not cut our defense budget nor withdraw from Asia," said the official, who declined to be identified.

The administration official also said Communist China was concerned that Japan was so quick to break relations with the Republic of China (Taiwan) even though this will allow closer ties with Peking.

latter has begun a rapprochement with the United States in the wake of its serious split with the Soviet Union. In a recent seminar at Freedoms Foundation, Valley Forge, Pa. European relations vis-a-vis Communist objectives in Europe, several recent visitors to mainland China said there was a widespread feeling there that war with the Soviet Union was a genuine possibility.

They reported deep tunneling going on within many cities, apparently to provide bomb shelters for key personnel and such vital functions as communications, command and control.

Maps showing parts of Soviet Siberia painted in the color of China and strident anti-Soviet propaganda left little doubt as to who the "No. 1 enemy" is, they said.

These "new China hands" were among the 100 or so delegates, nearly half of them from

Western Europe, who participated in the seminar which was co-sponsored by the American Bar Association's Committee on Education about Communism and the International Documentation and Information Center.

The feeling at the seminar was not that the Chinese would attack the Soviet Union in an attempt to regain "lost territories" which Peking claims. Rather it was that the Chinese fear of the Russians — and vice versa — could lead to an incident that might set off a conflict between the two Communist giants.

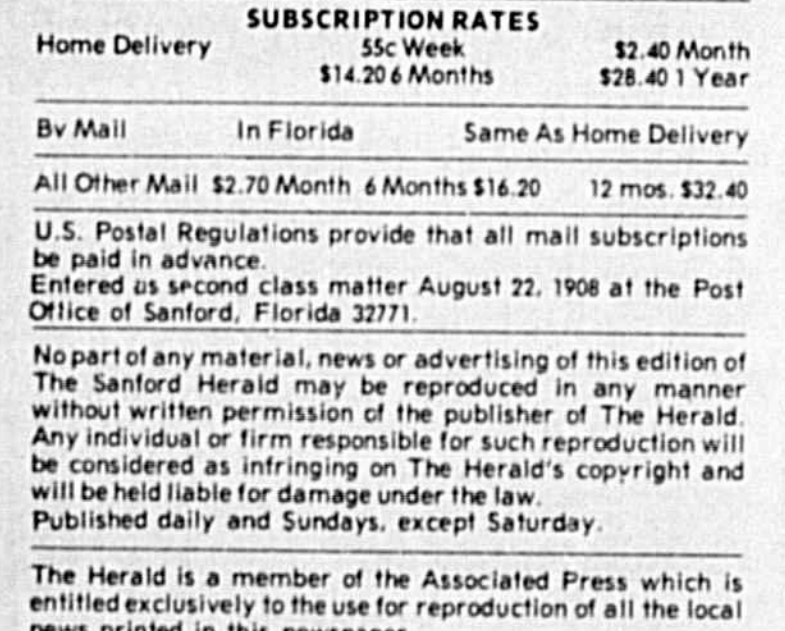
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Dear Abby

Using basically the same tools which saw them finish unbeaten in their five final games the Hounds of Dick Copeland were able to post their seventh victory of the season. Perhaps the main ingredient in the victory was the defensive prowess of quarterback Bob Constantine and the super defensive play of linebacker Greg Wallack.

So outstanding were these two in their play Saturday night they were easily the choices as the best offensive and defensive players by the Space Bowl MVP selection committee.

Wallack actually opened the game's scoring with his talented toe as he booted a field goal of 36 yards early in the second stanza.

Constantine and freshman fullback Mike Massey propelled the Greynobuds downfield toward their first six-point of the night the next time the Lyman offense got control of the game.

Massey, one of the top runners in the Central part of the state blasted through the Eau Gallie defense for the final 25 yards and Wallack added the extra point for a 16-0 halftime score for the Hounds.

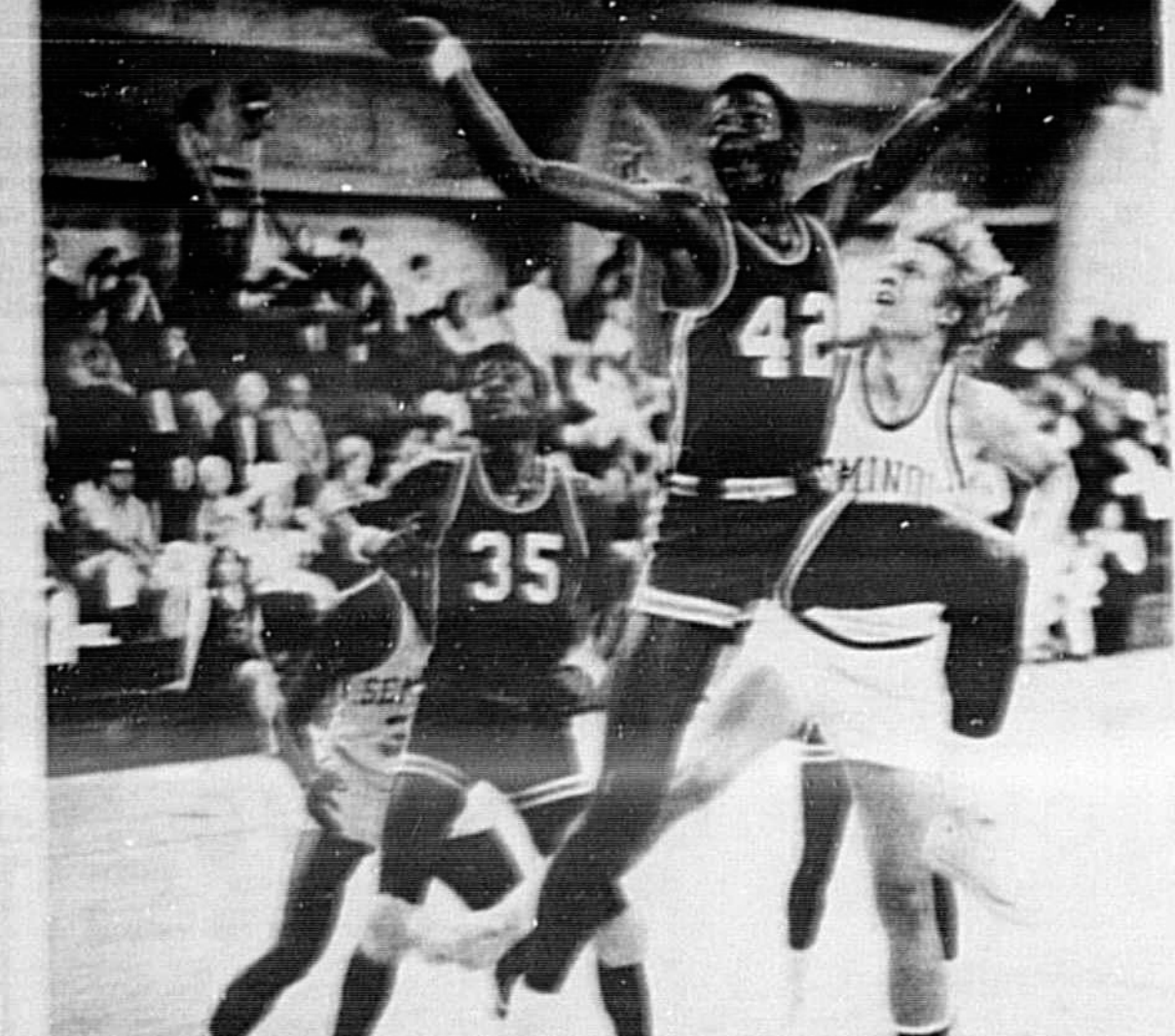

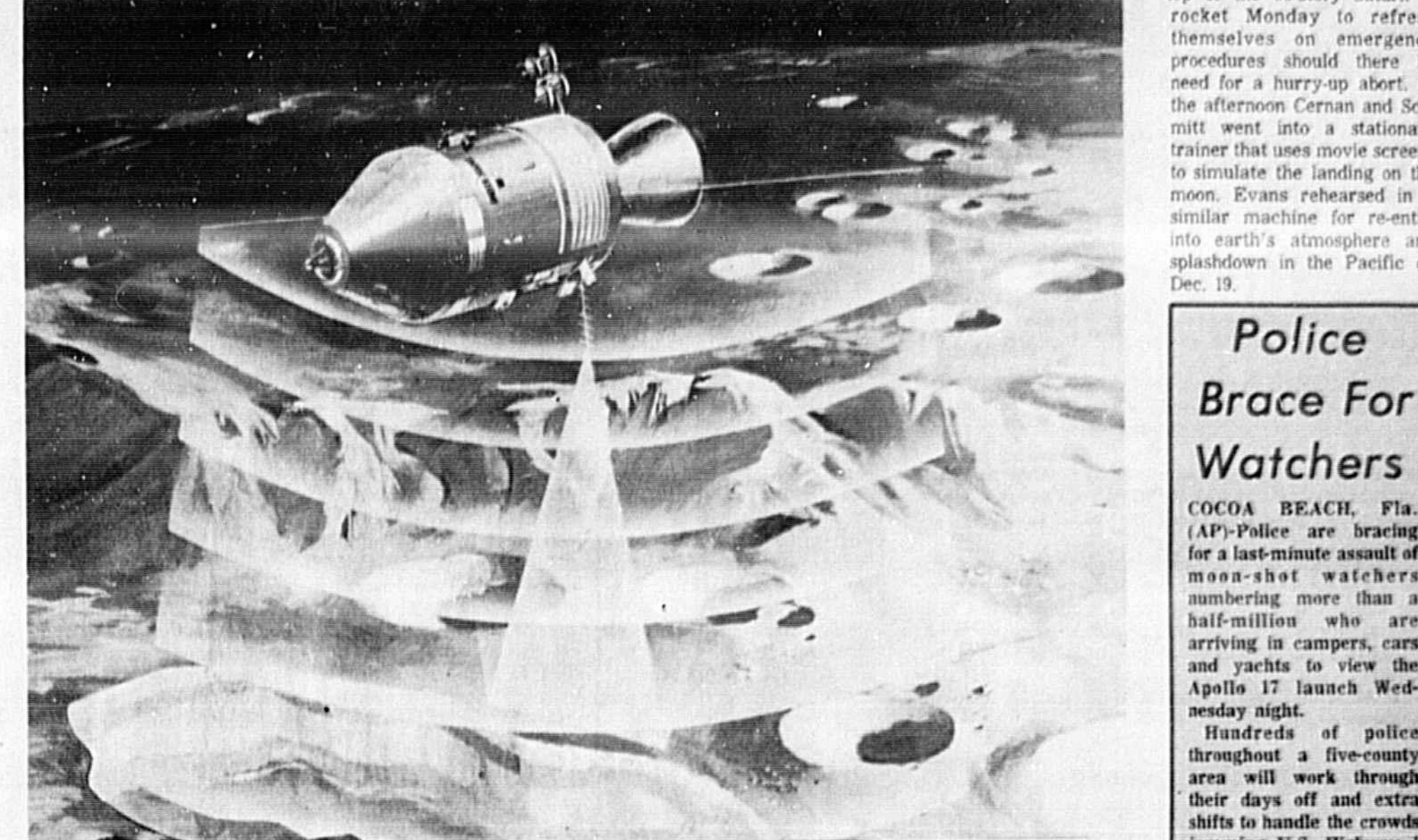

Apollo 17 Astronauts Training Ends

(AP)—Apollo 17's astronauts climb into their training spacecraft for the last time today, cramming for Wednesday's nighttime launch and a farewell visit to the moon. All systems — human, hardware, weather and rocket — were ready for the 9:33 p.m. EST liftoff, America's first night launching of humans into space. Astronauts Eugene A. Cernan, Ronald E. Evans and Harrison M. Schmitt had the luxury of sleeping late to adjust their biological time clocks for an afternoon wakeup on the day they've trained for the last 16 months. The launch crew ran into the usual number of minor and easily fixable problems — hose connections that sprung leaks, an air filter that didn't fit, a piece of scientific equipment that wasn't working right. None of it was important enough to disrupt the minute-by-minute schedule as electronic clocks tick downward for the liftoff. The weather outlook continues to be favorable; the space agency said. The forecast calls for partly cloudy skies with winds from 8-12 m.p.h. out of the south. The temperature in the vicinity of the launch pad should be in the 60s. That should be good news for the 500,000 space buffs expected in the Cape Kennedy area and central Florida and millions of others in a 500-mile radius who will see the Saturn 5's 2,000-foot-long tail of fire if skies are clear. And the rosters — five tiny mice who'll give their lives for science — come aboard today in aluminum tubes inside a sealed aluminum canister. They'll ride in the command ship America with Evans round-and-round the moon while Cernan and Schmitt explore the combination highland-lowland area of Taurus-Littrow on the surface. Experimenters implanted the astronauts went to the top of the 35-story Saturn 5 rocket Monday to refresh themselves on emergency procedures should there be need for a hurry-up abort. In the afternoon Cernan and Schmitt went into a stationary trainer that uses movie screens to simulate the landing on the moon. Evans rehearsed in a similar machine for re-entry into earth's atmosphere and splashdown in the Pacific on Dec. 19.

Federals Threaten Welfare Checks 'Hold-Up'

By JOHN STOWELL Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) — Claiming there's a mistake on one of every four welfare checks, the government is threatening to withhold up to \$689 million in federal relief funds next year unless states weed out ineligible and overpaid recipients. The Department of Health, Education and Welfare announced Monday it will begin cutting welfare matching grants in January. Each state's loss will be equal to welfare-spending errors spotted by mandatory, state-run spot checks. The immediate goal HEW officials said, is to eliminate an estimated 700,000 persons illegally receiving Aid to Families With Dependent Children (AFDC) and another 150,000 ineligible persons receiving aid for the aged, blind and disabled. The nationwide welfare-mis-spending rate is 8.3 per cent, HEW said, with Nebraska high at 9.8 per cent and North Dakota low at 1.2 per cent. California and New York each stand to lose more than \$90 million in federal matching funds next year, the last half of fiscal 1973 and the first half of fiscal 1974. The first complete sub-sample, covering 1.3 per cent of the welfare rolls last March, disclosed errors in about 25 per cent of payments, he said. Twain said 8.8 per cent of the 10.3 million persons receiving Aid to Families with Dependent Children and 4.3 per cent of the three million aged, blind and disabled adults were not eligible. Overpayments were being made, he added, to 13.8 per cent of those on AFDC and 9.7 per cent in adult categories. Underpayments were 7.6 per cent and 3.8 per cent, respectively.

'No Donnybrook' Mayor Promises

WINTER SPRINGS — Today's municipal elections in which Mayor Granville Brown predicts a 150-200 voter turnout, will not turn into a donnybrook tonight following the close of the polls. Mayor Brown told council in previous years there were people "hanging on the doors" and telling the clerks to "hurry up in there" in tabulating the results of the election. Since the city is the only one in the area with paper ballots as opposed to voting machines, the task is cumbersome. Mayor Brown stressed that the candidates should have the signs stationed at the doors of City Hall and there will be "no commotion." Mayor Brown continued there will be no hanging on the doors "until the girls are ready to give a report." As has been the case in recent months in many area cities, Mayor Brown cited that SR 434, "for the first time in history" looks like "Times Square on New Year's eve" with signs, etc. The mayor mentioned that the candidates should have the signs removed Wednesday on Thursday, but that if not removed by Friday, he will send the city maintenance man to do so. The city, Mayor Brown noted, has no law governing signs at present, and suggested that following the election, council "look closely toward an ordinance prohibiting signs."

Engineering Firm Probe Is Sought

By LIZ MATHEUX OVIDEO — Investigation, amid charges of "discrimination" and a "definite conflict of interest" against the city's consulting engineering firm of Driver and Spoor, has been requested by Richard Norton, a local surveyor-engineer. The Miami-based firm, which has served the city on a consultant basis for many years, recently, at the city's request, opened a branch office in Casselberry. Norton in remarks to the City Council last night accused the board of using a "double standard." The surveyor-engineer, with offices in Oviedo, hinted at impropriety in the fact that the firm on occasion has represented builders doing business with the city at the same time it was supposed to be representing the city. When contacted this morning at Driver and Spoor's Casselberry office, Gary Duffie said he had advised the Miami office of last night's developments and any statement would have to come from there. Norton asked for the investigation by the Florida Board of Engineer Examiners. Although the contract with the Driver and Spoor is up for renewal, the Council decided last night to hold execution of a new contract in abeyance until communication on the matter is received from the firm's main office. In a related matter, Albert Clark of the Calbert Construction Company complained to the board of the length of time it takes to get building plan approval from the Miami firm.

Hundreds of police throughout a five-county area will work through their days off and extra shifts to handle the crowds jamming U.S. Highway 1 and other major roadways. "It's going to be a helluva picnic," said Lt. Len Brady of the Florida Highway Patrol. "This is our first nighttime experience and we expect trouble primarily with pedestrians who wander onto the highways."
