

Strike Threat Over Apollo 17 On Schedule

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) Free of a strike threat, preparations for the last Apollo flight to the moon went on a clockwork schedule today for Wednesday's night launching.

"I'm very happy to report that there will be no strike," said Bernard Mamet, attorney for 60 aerospace workers whose proposed walkout in the final days threatened to wash out the

Astronauts Eugene A. Cernan.

Ronald E. Evans and Harrison N. Schmitt, sleeping later each day to adjust for an afternoon wakeup for the 9:53 p.m. EST launch, were to run through procedures for an emergency abort on

the launch pad today. Later in the day, Cernan and Schmitt were to rehearse in a mock lunar lander, while Evans worked in a commandmodule simulator and on orbital geology.

Cernan and Schmitt will land the craft named Challenger on the moon next Monday. Evans will remain aboard the command craft, America,





Peking Wants U.S. To Remain In Asia

A high-ranking Nixon administration official says Communist Chinese leaders, fearing aggressive moves by the Soviet Union, are urging the United States to maintain strong military forces.

"Chou En-lai (premier) has been telling American visitors we should not cut our defense budget nor withdraw from Asia," said the of-

ficial, who declined to be identified. "Chou thinks that Mel Laird is about the only top U.S. official who really understands the

As defense secretary, Melvin R. Laird has the responsibility of speaking out for a national defense adequate to meet the challenge of a massive Soviet nuclear and naval buildup.

During the recent presidential election, Sen. George McGovern, the Democratic candidate, called for huge cuts in the Pentagon budget and a virtual withdrawal of American power from the Western Pacific. Even though President Nixon denounced the McGovern proposal, he is likely to face heavy congressional pressure to cut defense

spending in the coming year. The administration official also said Communist China was concerned that Japan was so quick to break relations with the Republic of China (Taiwan) even though this will allow closer ties with Peking. The reason cited; a vacuum may be created into which the Russians might move.

The United States still maintains between 8,000 and 9,000 military personnel on Taiwan, but plans to reduce this number gradually and perhaps withdraw them all eventually.

Apparently, Peking believes that Tapei might try to seek closer relations with Moscow because of a fear of mainland China - just as the

Salute To Freedom's Backbone

The midnight knock on the door by secret police is something no U.S. citizen has to fear. It is a blessing not shared by all humans. The American may wish to pray for them, while giving thanks for his own

blessings. He does not have to be a Christian. He may be a Jew, a Mohammedan, a Buddhist or a member of any other sect under the sun. Or he may be an atheist. The choice is entirely his. In any event he is free from coercion or prosecution.

He may criticize his government, petition it, publicly protest its laws and acts. He is secure against unreasonable search or unwarranted seizure, against self-incrimi nation or cruel and unusual punishment. He may not be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law.

These are basic liberties commonly taken for granted today. But Americans have fought and died for them - in the war against Hitler, in the struggle against Communists, in all the battles this nation has fought since its own birth. One hundred and eighty years ago there were barely four million Americans striving to create a nation after the long

The new Constitution, so bitterly debated and so carefully writtten by their leaders in Philadelphia, was concerned essentially with establishing a governmental mechanism that would assure a balance among the various interests of society.

Magnificent though the document was, it was far from complete. In concentrating on spelling out what the new federal government was obliged to do and how it would be organized, the Founding Fathers omitted to specify what the government was forbidden to do.

They had not intentionally neglected to consider the individual's rights. Far from it. Freedom from repression had been the basic issue of the war just fought. The Colonists at large, however, after their experience

with the tyrannical and unresponsive British crown, regarded with a critical eye the potential power being vested in the new American government. They wanted the rights and restrictions made clear, so that all future generations would have firm guidelines, so courts could have a written document to support and uphold those rights and restrictions.

The ten Amendments, ratified by three-fourths of the states on Dec. 15, 1791, became known as the Bill of Rights and the very backbone of American freedom.

Party's Only Job

All the struggling over Mrs. Jean Westwood's job as Democratic national chairman tends to blot out some conflicts and contradictions which party politicians and theorists alike really haven't figured out how to cope with. One of the big complaints of the "old" or regular Democrats is against what they term the "quota system"

established under the McGovern-Fraser commission party reforms. The commission's goal, of course, was to set rules which would not merely promise but virtually assure wider participation in party processes by previously un-der-represented women, blacks, poor, etc. From the outset of discussion, tough-minded commission members recognized the dilemma: Free, open voting in primaries, caucuses or whatever will not automatically produce the kind of wider, balanced participation deemed

desirable. It can and often does produce very one-sided results in the make-up of convention delegations and the One respected professor on the commission once blurted

"If we want the kind of participation we're talking about, we're just going to have to dictate it." The commission nervously shrank from that. It pro-

claimed flatly it was against dictated quotas. For its shaky middle ground, it chose to ask state party organizations to establish rules which would assure participation of theretofore under-represented groups in "reasonable proportion" to their percentage of a state's party vote. Trouble followed, however, because the militants among the under-represented women, blacks, and young chose

to interpret "reasonable proportion" largely as "quota, meaning exact rather than approximate representation Many of the delegation challenges brought to the convention Credentials Committee reflected this outlook. And it produced bitterness which endured through the July Miami Beach convention and lingers still. It was a principal factor in turning off many ethnics, Catholics and Jews who voted for President Nixon this


A former newspaper reporter herself, Mrs. Bentley told a meeting of women journalists at the University of Minnesota that the role of women in the federal government has expanded greatly in recent years. For example, no less than 119 women have been ap-

pointed to top-management positions. These include: A member of the Council of Economic Advisers; a member of the Atomic Energy Commission; the chairman of the Tariff Commission; the chairman of the National Endowment for the Arts; a staff assistant to the President; five generals and one admiral; a judge on the U.S. Tax Court; the Treasurer of the United States; the director of the U.S. Mint, and, of course, Mrs. Bentley as head of the Maritime Commission

In addition, she says, in the past 15 months 1,200 women have been appointed to middle-management government jobs in Washington.

These, however, are appointments. The goal of some 250 elected women representatives and senators in the 99th Congress in 1985 remains an extremely ambitious one. But if the goal is not achieved, it may be due in part to something else Mrs. Bentley touched upon. In her experience, she has found that men, especially young men, have more faith in the abilities of women

than do the women themselves.

Polk said the lab is slated to go full service in about a year and a half, but he hopes to see the new addition within six months. Plans are to add a document examiner




