## Some Cuts In Diem Aid Urged

SAMGON, Viet Nam (UPI)—High-ranking American civilian officials here are pressing for selective cuts in U. S. aid to South Viet Nam despite opposition from U. S. military and intelligence chiefs, diplomatic sources said today.

Washington officials have rejected the idea of massive cuts in the \$500 million annual U. S. aid to the government of President Ngo Dinh Diem in its fight against Communist Viet Cong guerrillas.

The sources here said carefully calculated small cuts could help America's image in Viet Nam and other parts of Southeast Asia by showing that the U. S. government is not committed irreversibly to the Diem regime, which has been accused of suppressing democracy and persecuting the nation's Buddhist majority.

## Citrus Aplenty, But Costly, Says Mutual

LAKELAND (UPI) — Ample supplies of fresh citrus and citrus products will be available in the nation's markets this fall but Mrs. Housewife will have to pay premium prices.

Florida citrus industry leaders have predicted that despite higher prices caused by a world shortage of citrus, the nation's housewives will have the money and the demand and will buy.

The disastrous December freeze which hit the Florida citrus belt last year left the industry in a crippled condition with only half a normal orange crop forecast this year. Most other citrus-growing areas of the world also were affected by bad weather last year.

Florida Citrus Mutual, a giant growers cooperative, has predicted an orange crop in the state of 60 million boxes, compared to an estimated 120.5 million boxes before the freeze last year.

Mutual also predicts a drop in grapefruit production from 28 million to 23 to 25 million boxes and a decline in tangerine production from 4.3 million to 2.5 million boxes.

Another telling effect of the bitter freeze has been the depletion of the reserve inventory of citrus products, including frozen orange concentrate.

"There will be ample supplies of good quality fruit, in all varieties for the holiday trade, both Thanksgiving and Christmas," said Mutual Executive Vice President Robert W. Rutledge.

Rutledge said the Florida citrus leaders believe the business economy of the nation is sound and said the consumer disposable income is greater now than ever before. He said that because of this, and the fact that demand for citrus has increased, the housewives will pay prices which he said may be the highest in the past 20 years.

M. F. Chapman, American mining engineer, trapped 11 chinchillas in Chile, took them to California in 1923, and started chinchilla farming in the nation.

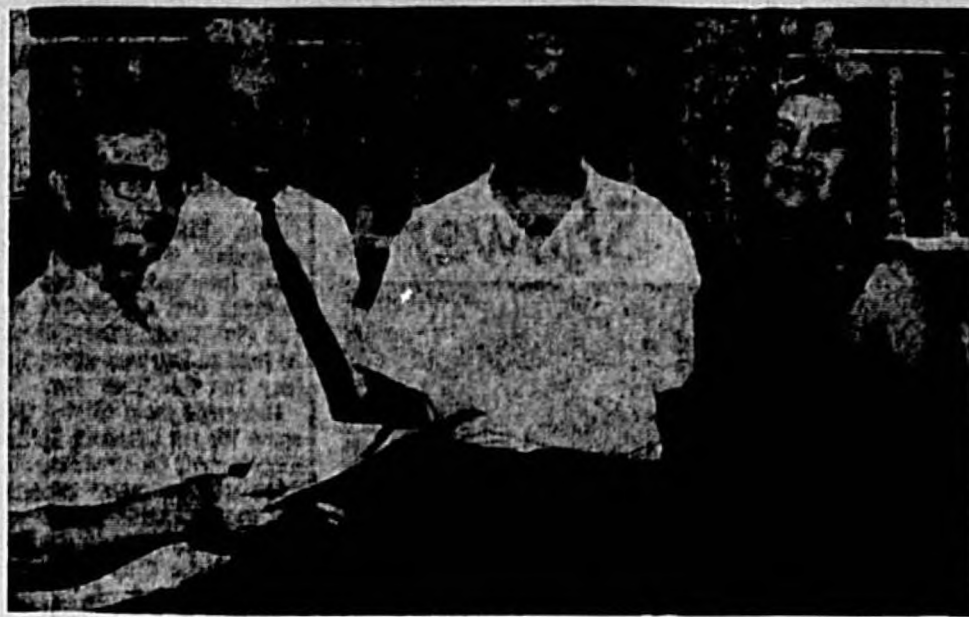
Albert was graduated from high school in Mankato, Minn., where he was a letterman in football and wrestling.

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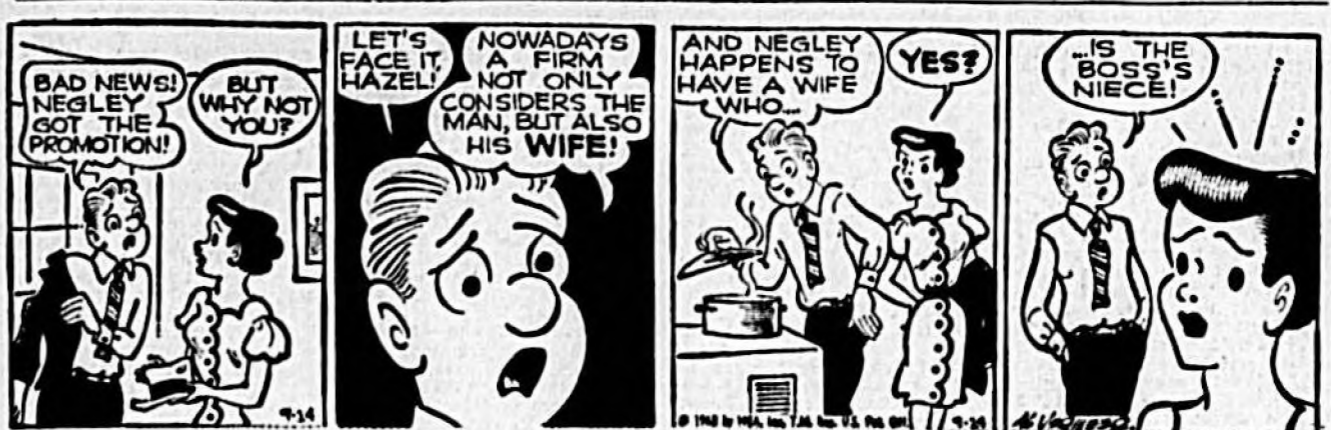
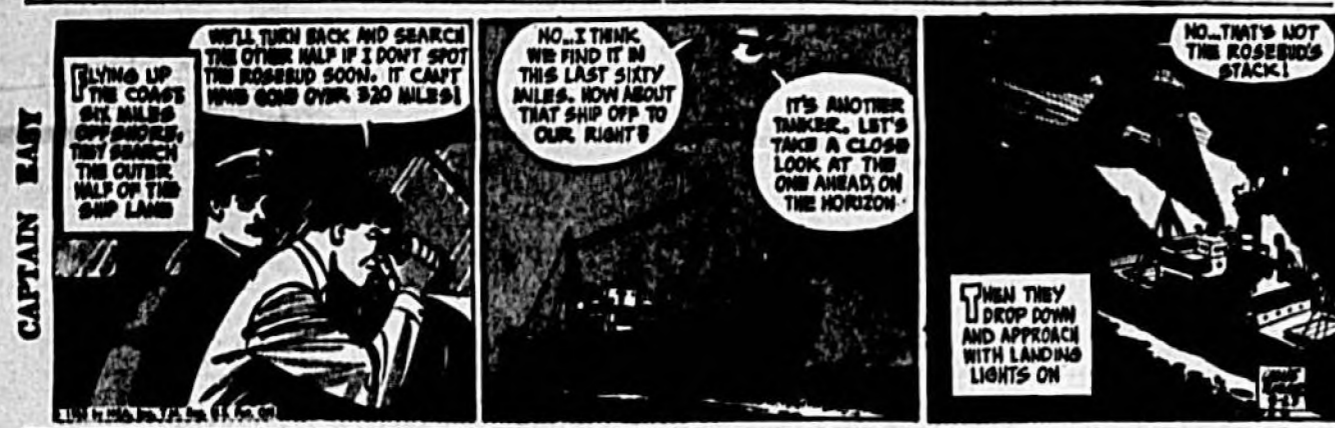

## JFK Commences 'Non-Political' 5-Day Journey

MILFORD, Pa. (UPI) — President Kennedy keynoted an 11-state tour of conservation areas today with a call for space-age Americans to discover "whole new universes" of opportunity in their own land, water and idle youth.

The Chief Executive's avowedly "non-political" five-day journey across the continent started with a salute in Pennsylvania to the Republican father of the conservation movement, Cliford Pinchot.

Kennedy's tour also will take him to nine north-central and western states where Democratic senators running for re-election in 1964 have invited him to share in the reflected glories of local natural wonders.

In his initial speech the President gave his administration credit for increasing "the pace of resource development and conservation in a variety of ways" since taking office in 1961.

"I begin today a journey to save America's natural heritage — a journey to preserve the past and protect the future," Kennedy said at the outset of remarks prepared for delivery here at his first speechmaking way-station.

The President scheduled the stop to dedicate the 82-year-old "Gray Towers," the ancestral Pinchot home, as the Pinchot Institute for Conservation Studies. Pinchot, twice governor of Pennsylvania, served under President Theodore Roosevelt as the first chief of the U. S. Forest Service and was one of America's most renowned conservationists.

Kennedy said Pinchot's career "marked the beginning of a professional approach to the management of our nation's resources."

"He was a practical idealist," Kennedy said, "believing that the riches of the American continent should produce for all its people an abundant life — believing that waste of our resources, or their monopolistic control, was an offense which threatened the very existence of democratic society . . ."

"Above all, he was a gifted, driving administrator, transforming a minor federal bureau into a dynamic, purposeful agent of national policy."

## Extra Police Posted To Guard De Gaulle

PARIS (UPI) — Extra police and security agents today were assigned to guard President Charles de Gaulle on a provincial tour because of threats to kill him received in several of the cities he will visit.

De Gaulle will tour the Rhine Valley and visit two atomic energy stations on his 20th trip to the provinces since returning to power in 1958.

Police sources said several of the municipal councils in area have received threats from terrorists of the Secret Army Organization (OAS), which has sworn to kill de Gaulle for granting Algeria independence. The last OAS attempt on his life was made little more than a year ago, when machine gun bullets missed him by inches.

De Gaulle was expected to concentrate on his anti-inflation program in the series of speeches he will make. But European attention was focused on his offer to share France's nuclear knowledge with its neighbors.

# Highway Patrol Sets Crackdown On Traffic

"Operation Trackdown" — stepped-up enforcement program by the State Highway Patrol aimed at reducing highway deaths—will be launched locally Thursday by Sgts. Z. V. Smallwood and J. S. McKinnon, of the DeLand post. The troopers will brief city police, sheriff's deputies and other troopers at 3 p.m. Thursday at Sheriff J. L. Hobby's office.

"Operation Trackdown" will be an intensified enforcement program designed to cut down Florida's soaring death rate, said Sergeant Smallwood. "We started with a very comfortable MINUS margin in our state highway death column but as of this date we are 55 deaths PLUS for this year and unless drastic steps are taken we will wind up the year with a deplorable death rate."

"Operation Trackdown" will involve stepped-up use of aircraft, radar, electric timers and unmarked patrol cars in addition to the regular troopers in this area," Smallwood stated.

"The FHP has a selective enforcement unit composed of seven troopers, four in marked patrol cars and three in unmarked or 'phantom' patrol cars. These have been dubbed 'The Wolf Pack' by the public and the men of the FHP are on the trail of all traffic violators, tracking down each one in a desperate attempt to stop the needless deaths, injuries and property damage on Florida's highways. They will concentrate their efforts in high accident areas."

"The law enforcement agencies will publicize the enforcement schedules of the radar, plans, cruisers, etc., in advance as fair warning to all motorists who may be traffic offenders."

Sergeant Smallwood said "the Wolf Pack" will move into Seminole County Oct. 4-5. The troopers will especially concentrate on hit and run, improper or no lights, public drunkenness (pedestrian), improper passing, driving too slowly and failure to signal.

## Demos Confident As Tax Cut Vote Nears

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Confident of victory, administration forces pressed for House passage today of an \$11 billion tax cut, biggest in history.

As the showdown vote approached, the tide was running against Republican leaders in their attempt to attach an anti-spending amendment to the tax-cutting bill or defeat it on final passage.

## Kelly Back In Judicial Robes

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Dade City Circuit Court Judge Richard Kelly re-donned his judicial robes today, following Senate dismissal of charges he ran his court like a tyrant and overstepped his authority.

The Senate voted 22-20 to throw out impeachment charges, leveled by the House last summer, ruling, in effect, that the state failed to show Kelly did anything illegal or improper.

Kelly, who never took the stand, said he was very grateful and would get back on the job immediately.

He made no reference to the 35 attorneys from his two-county circuit of Pasco and Pinellas who testified against him during the 12-day trial.

Nor did he say anything about the testimony of some of his fellow circuit judges that his reputation back home was bad.

The Senate made sure these attorneys will never have to try another case before Kelly, who is resident circuit judge in Pasco County but also sits in nearby Pinellas.

The Senate asked Chief Justice E. Harris Drew of the Supreme Court and presiding Judge C. Richard Leavengood of the Pasco-Pinellas circuit to set up a system of rotating judges so Kelly won't hear cases involving attorneys who spoke out against him.

## Living Costs Hold Steady

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The cost of living held steady in August and there are no signs of any strong inflationary trend before the end of the year, the Labor Department reported today.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics said lower food prices offset increases in transportation and recreation costs last month.

## 91-Mile Blast Aimed Toward Puerto Rico

SAN JUAN, P. R. (UPI) — Hurricane Edith swept across St. Lucia in the Caribbean today with 91 miles per hour winds and headed toward Puerto Rico.

A hurricane watch was ordered for Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, where the San Juan Weather Bureau said hurricane winds may be felt in the next 24 hours.

"On its present course, Hurricane Edith should pass about 125 miles south of Ponce, Puerto Rico, Thursday morning," the Weather Bureau said.

Reports of wind and flood damage on St. Lucia and Martinique began pouring into the San Juan Weather Bureau about midnight EDT.

Gusts of 91 m.p.h. were reported just before the eye of the storm passed over the north part of St. Lucia at 4 a. m. EDT.

Hurricane warnings were discontinued for the Windwards and Leeward Islands from Guadeloupe to St. Vincent when the storm passed, but gale warnings remained in effect for St. Lucia, Martinique and Dominica.

Gale warnings were discontinued for the area north of Guadeloupe and south of St. Vincent including Barbados.

In the latest advisory, weatherman said the center of the storm was near latitude 16.4 north, longitude 62.1 west or about 75 miles west of Martinique and 280 miles northeast of San Juan. Highest sustained winds were 80 m.p.h.

There were torrential rains and winds up to 78 m.p.h. at Martinique this morning, the weather bureau said.

Well to the north of the hurricane, a storm was lashing the Gulf of Mexico. The Coast Guard in St. Petersburg, Fla., reported two small boats missing in the Gulf. Three persons were aboard one of the boats, a 10-foot outboard from Dunedin, Fla., and four were aboard the 33-foot Gladys M.
