It's a bird, it's a plane, it's a Flying Inflatable Boat!

SANFORD - It's a boat, it's a plane. Just what was that odd craft hovering over Lake Monroe on Tuesday?

Marketed as the Flying Inflatable Boat, the recreational craft made its debut in Lake Monroe during a special promotional tour. Inventor Dol Malingri offered demonstrations of the FIB's capabilities.

Malingri, who lives in Treasure Island, came

up with the idea of combining an inflatable boat and a wing to get the ultimate recreational experience. An adventurer himself, Malingri is a pilot and also has salled around the world three times and written three books.

"This is a safe and simple way to fulfill dreams of flying." Malingri said.

Since Malingri introduced the FIB in 1989 in his native Italy, more than 1,000 have sold worldwide and there have been no accidents or fatalities, he said. Though no license is required

to operate the craft. Malingri said his company includes training as part of the purchase. Phil Lomness of Sanford found the craft to be


mechanically sound and safe. The 19-year-old

commercial pilot has been flying since age 8. "It's very stable and combines the case of flight and safety," Lomness said. Lomness said he is interested in becoming a

local distributor for the product.

David Melillo, vice president of marketing for Polar Star Group Inc., which distributes the FIB, said the craft could become the next evolution of the personal watercraft.

The FIB can be towed on a small trailer and uses conventional gasoline fuel. Assembly time is about 15 minutes. Without the wing, the inflatable can be used as a boat seating four pas-sengers. The craft can take off from the water and soar up to 10,000 feet or skirt the waves. The craft seats one passenger and a pilot and has the ability to land in one foot depths. Retail cost is about \$22,000, fully assembled with training included.

Historic landmark could reopen for show business by January, 2000 By Niek Pisitauf HERALD STAFF WRITER

SANFORD - It's onward to Tallahassee next month, to seek a financial grant for the continued revitalization of the Ritz Theater.

Historic preservation grants for Special Categories will be considered on Sept. 15, and Ritz supporters plan to be on hand.

Helen Stairs, president of the Rits Community Theatre Resto-ration Project, reported on the latest progress to the Sanford City Commission during a Monday afternoon work ses-sion. She said if the grant can be obtained from Tallahasses and there are no delays in the work, the restored facility could be officially opened by

January 1, 2000. People planning to make the trip to Tallahassee to promote the Sanford project include Stairs, Sanford Mayor Larry Dale, Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce Director Ron Rose, Sanford Main Street Manager Linda Kuhn, Rits Ar-

Manager Linda Kuhn, Rits Ar-chitect Jerry Gross, and possi-bly others who have still to commit to making the trip. The amount being sought is \$411.511. This will be in addi-tion to the CDBO block grant given recently by Berninele County, in the amount of \$457,000.

"Even if we get the grant ap-proved." Stairs observed. "that desen't mean we get the meany right away, and we can't get in-volved with some of the actual

work until the money is here and in the bank. That's why it neems to be taking so long."
