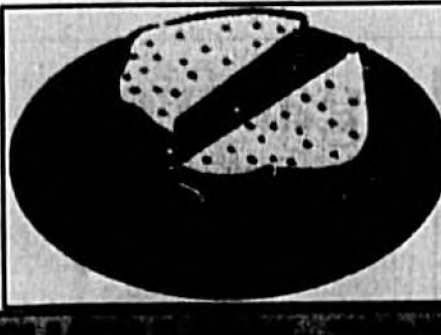

Rally 'round the conference center

Citizens for Progress rally tops expectations

SANFORD - "The turnout was far beyond our expectation," said Lon Howell, one of the organizers of Tuesday evening's Citizens for Progress rally at Fort Mellon Park. The rally, supported through efforts of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce, was to gather support for the proposed development of the conference center and hotel on the park site.

The gathering, held in conjunction with the chamber's "Business After Hours" event, began at 5:30 and ended at approximately 7 p.m. Regarding the number of people who attended, Howell commented, "The cook told me he prepared 1,000 hamburgers and 200 hot dogs. We had 40 cases of drinks. When we were cleaning up at the end of the meeting, we found we only had half of a hot dog and one hamburger left."

Among speakers at the rally were Sanford Mayor Larry Dale and Joseph Pacitti, president of PRA Development and Management Corporation, which would be the developer of the project. Larry Strickler acted as master of ceremonies. Seminole High School cheerleaders provided some of the

entertainment with a special cheer in favor of the proposed development.

In addition to words of support, Howell said Citizens for Progress also gave out over 150 signs. Comparing his signs with those of Fort Mellon Park development opponents, members of Save Our Park, Howell

commented, "At least ours are legal. Theirs don't say, 'paid political advertisement' and with the matter to come up with the general election ballot, it's a political matter and has to be advertised as such."

If the development is approved by Sanford voters on November 3, it is proposed to

occupy some but not all of the present Fort Mellon Park area. It has been projected that between 1,000 and 1,200 new jobs will be created.

In addition to the hotel, the conference center would be in response to the Seminole County. Please See Rally, Page 3A

Judge orders GOP out of judicial races

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Judge Vernon C. Mize, a senior retired judge, pinch hit a home run Tuesday in Circuit Court for a team trying to keep politics, paybacks and cronyism out of elections for judicial candidates.

Mize upheld the constitutionality of Florida Statute 105.071 that prohibits political parties from endorsing judicial candidates and forbids these candidates to campaign as a member of a party or accept contributions from one.

The Seminole County Executive Committee challenged the law early this year but was blocked with a temporary injunction from Judge Gene Stephenson until a ruling was made on the constitutionality of the law. That being done Tuesday, Stephenson's injunction became permanent. Stay out of the process, the local GOP was told.

"We're disappointed and we will take this immediately to the Fifth District Court of Appeals," GOP Executive Committee Chairman Jim Stelling said today. "At least six other circuit courts have ruled the law was unconstitutional. Judge Mize, whom I respect very much, had a different opinion."

It was correct, Stelling said, for Chief Judge John Dean Moxley to assign the case to a retired senior judge who would not be involved in any future judicial races. "I can appreciate the intent but I am very disappointed with the result," Stelling said.

Attorney Michael Jones, who represented six GOP Executive Committee members who were opposed to the party's involvement, was pleased with the decision. "The law prohibits its parties and politics to be involved and it's a good law," Jones said.

Jones argued that it has long been recognized that First Amendment freedom of speech - such as the GOP claimed it had to endorse judicial candidates - in some cases must be subordinated to the necessity of the government and its preservation.

"It is under this umbrella that this Court must look at the evil and the clear and present danger to the judiciary and the general public if Florida Statute 105.08 is deemed unconstitutional," Jones wrote in his memorandum.

In other words, Jones told the court that it was necessary for judges to be free from direct political pressure and that they can render decisions inde-

It's a bird, it's a plane, it's a Flying Inflatable Boat!

SANFORD - It's a boat, it's a plane. Just what was that odd craft hovering over Lake Monroe on Tuesday?

Marketed as the Flying Inflatable Boat, the recreational craft made its debut in Lake Monroe during a special promotional tour. Inventor Dol Malingri offered demonstrations of the FIB's capabilities.

Malingri, who lives in Treasure Island, came up with the idea of combining an inflatable boat and a wing to get the ultimate recreational experience. An adventurer himself, Malingri is a pilot and also has sailed around the world three times and written three books.

"This is a safe and simple way to fulfill dreams of flying," Malingri said.

Since Malingri introduced the FIB in 1989 in his native Italy, more than 1,000 have sold worldwide and there have been no accidents or fatalities, he said. Though no license is required

to operate the craft, Malingri said his company includes training as part of the purchase.

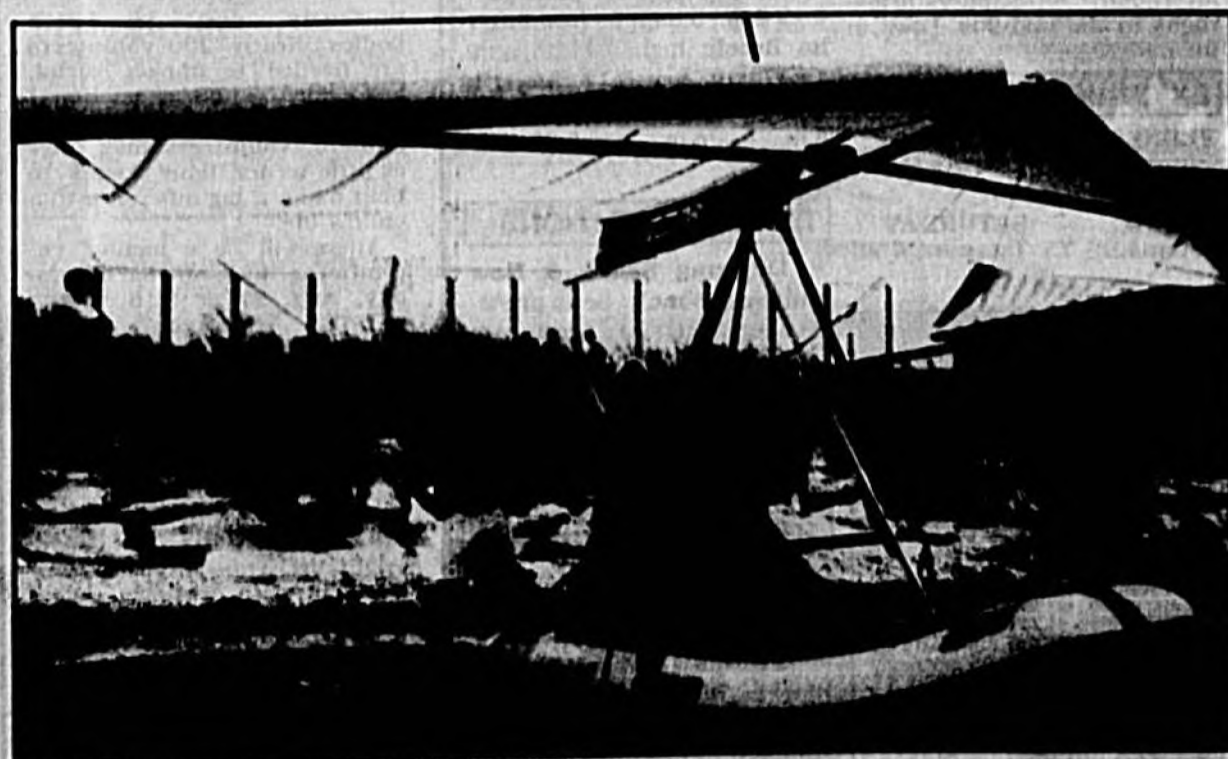
Phil Lomness of Sanford found the craft to be mechanically sound and safe. The 19-year-old commercial pilot has been flying since age 8.

"It's very stable and combines the ease of flight and safety," Lomness said.

Lomness said he is interested in becoming a local distributor for the product.

David Melillo, vice president of marketing for Polar Star Group Inc., which distributes the FIB, said the craft could become the next evolution of the personal watercraft.

The FIB can be towed on a small trailer and uses conventional gasoline fuel. Assembly time is about 15 minutes. Without the wing, the inflatable can be used as a boat seating four passengers. The craft can take off from the water and soar up to 10,000 feet or skirt the waves. The craft seats one passenger and a pilot and has the ability to land in one foot depths. Retail cost is about \$22,000, fully assembled with training included.

Supporters seek Ritz Theatre grant from state

Historic landmark could reopen for show business by January, 2000

SANFORD - It's onward to Tallahassee next month, to seek a financial grant for the continued revitalization of the Ritz Theatre.

Historic preservation grants for Special Categories will be considered on Sept. 15, and Ritz supporters plan to be on hand.

Helen Stairs, president of the Ritz Community Theatre Restoration Project, reported on the latest progress to the Sanford City Commission during a Monday afternoon work session. She said if the grant can be obtained from Tallahassee and there are no delays in the work, the restored facility could be officially opened by

January 1, 2000.

People planning to make the trip to Tallahassee to promote the Sanford project include Stairs, Sanford Mayor Larry Dale, Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce Director Ron Rose, Sanford Main Street Manager Linda Kuhn, Ritz Architect Jerry Gross, and possibly others who have still to commit to making the trip.

The amount being sought is \$411,511. This will be in addition to the CDBG block grant given recently by Seminole County, in the amount of \$437,000.

"Even if we get the grant approved," Stairs observed, "that doesn't mean we get the money right away, and we can't get involved with some of the actual

work until the money is here and in the bank. That's why it seems to be taking so long."

She continued, "But even so, we have a great deal of the work already completed, and with the city working on Second Street, we'll have our water and utility lines handled."

Stairs said the facility is being designed to handle all needs of the community, with much of the focus on the youth of the community. David Scott, principal at Idylwild Elementary School in Sanford, was also on hand at the meeting. He said nine Sanford schools have come out in full support of the restoration project, with others in the surrounding area, including Lake Mary High School, indicating additional

support.

When finished, the theater is to seat 500 people. When operational, Stairs said expectations are that 71,500 people could attend various functions during the first year of operation, with hopefully more in coming years.

She predicted plays, musical programs, dance recitals for local dance schools, readings, and other uses which would involve local talent.

Scott told of the youth from various schools which have toured the building recently, still under construction. "You should see their expressions when they set foot on that stage," he said. "They can immediately imagine what it's like to perform in front of an audi-

ence."

Stairs said obtaining the grant in Tallahassee will not be easy. "We understand there are over 150 applicants for historic preservation grants, and the state can only give grants to 40 of the applicants." She added however, that there is a feeling that Sanford will be among the top for consideration.

During Monday afternoon's Sanford City Commission work session, Commissioner Whitely Eckstein asked where the operational funds would come from in the future years.

Stairs responded that the theater should be self-sufficient. "We expect to handle the first year's operational costs

Deadline to apply for fire aid

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Less than one week remains for residents in the 40 Florida eligible counties to make application for damages suffered during the recent wildfires.

Tuesday, Sept. 1 is the final day to apply for most federal/state disaster assistance available according to disaster recovery officials. To register for aid individuals must call the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) toll-free number. The FEMA number is 1-800-462-8029 or 1-800-462-7585 for those with hearing or speech impairments.

Applicants may qualify for assistance under several federal and state programs including disaster housing assistance, individual and family grants for disaster related needs, or U.S. Small Business Administration low interest disaster loans for home or businesses.

Included in the disaster-declared counties are Seminole, Orange, Volusia, Lake and Osceola.

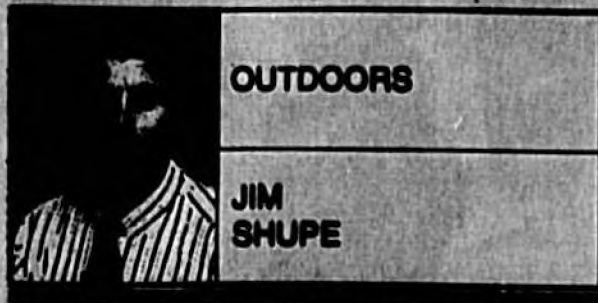

Florida's "TEAM" approach

SANFORD - A current and intense management plan is underway aimed at enhancing five of the state's more popular lake systems to make them more attractive and productive for freshwater anglers.

Targeted systems include Lake Talquin, the Orange Lake complex, Lake Griffin, the Lake Kissimmee complex, and Lake Istokpoga.

This agenda utilizes the "TEAM" (Team Effort Accomplishing Management) approach and has enlisted support from state agencies, local and state lawmakers, the media, university representatives and, most importantly, private citizens.

Launched in 1987 by the Commission's Division of Fisheries, TEAM has already received active and enthusiastic support from the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), the Department of Transportation (DOT), the Florida Forestry Service, state universities, water management districts (WMDs), numerous elected officials on both state and local levels, plus affected citizen and sportsmen groups which have a vested interest in improving our natural resources.

Today, the ability to manage and enhance Florida's freshwater lakes is far more complex than in years past because of a massive population explosion, which has taken place during the past two decades throughout the state.

Fortunately, due to successful environmental education and outreach programs, public interest and involvement devoted to renewing our natural resources has been heightened.

Major goals for this TEAM approach include:

- 1. Improve public fishing opportunities through extensive management while, at the same time, protecting our natural resources;
- 2. Educate residents, anglers and tourists of Florida's ecosystem functions;
- 3. Encourage tourist utilization of our lakes and rivers through national, regional, state and local media outlets;
- 4. Establish a framework for community involvement and participation in the management of their local lakes;
- 5. Involve the media and local/state lawmakers in the TEAM process;
- 6. Use TEAM to assist water management districts in identifying watershed problems and involve interested groups in solving problems.

Key components to a successful TEAM effort center on lake enhancement projects, special fishing events, a LAKEWATCH program, public bank fishing availability and a regularly published newsletter to keep people informed.

Depending upon the lake system and problems involved, enhancement might include a wide range of initiatives including a lake drawdown, weed control, removal of organic material and phasing out pollution sources.

Special fishing events might include non-competitive outings for kids, seniors and handicapped persons; clinics to teach women and novice anglers basic fishing techniques; and open, draw or team fishing tournaments for amateurs and pros.

LAKEWATCH programs will recruit and train volunteers in basic plant and fisheries monitoring methods in order to alert OFC, DEP and WMDs to potential problems. These volunteers also can help determine the age and size of various fish species to determine if harvest restrictions are warranted, and appraise angler attitudes concerning proposed regulation options.

At all lakes, biologists will investigate the possibility of providing public bank fishing opportunities. They will also consult with local government officials in building or improving fishing piers and boat launching facilities, plus maintaining fish feeders.

An inexpensive quarterly newsletter will be published keeping citizens abreast of TEAM activities. Other initiatives will include marketing plans for fish camp owners at each

Gridiron Classic to benefit Buoniconti's paralysis cure fund

LAKE MARY - What has been called the premier college football all-star game in the country will be held in Orlando, in January, and proceeds will benefit the Buoniconti Fund to Cure Paralysis.

The Inaugural All-Star Gridiron Classic will pit Team Florida, current college players at Florida colleges and universities and players who prepped at Florida high schools but play for out-of-state colleges, against Team USA, current college players from elsewhere in the country.

While line-ups will not be confirmed until the end of the college football season, players such as University of Central Florida quarterback Dante Culpepper and University of Florida offensive tackle Zach Piller are among the top-rated prospects for next year's NFL draft and are projected to play for Team Florida.

The All-Star Gridiron Classic, sponsored by Florida Citrus Sports and Florida Rotary Clubs, is slated for Saturday, Jan. 16, 1989, at the Florida Citrus Bowl. Former Dolphin Coach Don Shula is the honorary game chairman.

Chuck Noll, former Pittsburgh Steeler Super Bowl head coach,

will lead Team USA and Lindy Infante, former Florida Gator star and head coach of two NFL teams will command Team Florida.

Also expected to play for Team Florida are Martin Gramatica, kicker for Kansas State; Tony Bryant, defensive end for Florida State; Gana Joseph, free safety for University of Oklahoma; Oscar Davenport, quarterback for University of North Carolina; Keith Newman, linebacker for University of North Carolina; and Johnny Rutledge, linebacker for the University of Florida.

Among the "elite" group of 27 draft prospects, these players are expected to be selected in the first and second rounds.

Local Rotary clubs are involved in the effort to promote the event, and to sell tickets.

The service clubs are the exclusive ticket vendors, until Aug. 31, with part of the ticket proceeds, sold by that date, going into the coffers of the selling club, and to benefit Rotary's Camp Florida, a project of Florida Rotary Districts.

The one "side dish" that is served with almost every meal is bread. It comes in many shapes, tastes and textures. The variety of recipes could easily fill quite a few shelves at the library.

The development of automatic bread machines has brought about the rediscovery of fresh bread to the family menu. The machines make homemade bread simple and convenient to make but they can also be quite expensive.

There are also pre-mixed packages of dry ingredients for many types of bread available. Once again, they are convenient and sometimes costly compared to buying the ingredients separately. You can also buy frozen bread dough that only requires thawing and baking. However, as with all the above options you are paying for the convenience.

Making bread from scratch at home, without any special equipment, is not very difficult or time consuming and extremely inexpensive. The following recipes represent the two main types of bread. They are the "quick" no rising breads such as muffins, biscuits, flat breads and the rising yeast style breads.

Cranberry Nut "Quick" Bread
2 cups sifted all purpose flour
1 cup sugar
3/4 cup orange juice
1/2 cup chopped walnuts
1 cup chopped fresh cranberries
1-1/2 tsp. baking powder



Walnut Sour Cream "Quick" Biscuits
1/2 cup fine chopped walnuts
1/2 cup butter
1-1/2 cups sugar
2 cups all purpose flour
1 cup sour cream
2 eggs
1 tsp. each double acting baking powder, baking soda, vanilla extract and ground cinnamon

In a large mixing bowl combine soft butter and 1 cup sugar. Mix at medium speed until fluffy. Add remaining ingredients, except nuts and cinnamon and mix for 3 to 4 minutes. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Thoroughly grease a 9" tube style baking pan. Pour 1/2 of batter evenly around bottom of pan. Combine nuts and cinnamon and spread 1/2 of nut mixture over batter. Pour remaining batter into pan and cover top with remaining nut mixture. Bake for 60 minutes. Allow to cook before removing from pan. Sprinkle top with confectioner's sugar.

Italian Style Yeast Bread
5 cups all purpose flour
2 packages active dry yeast
1 lbs. butter
1 lbs. sugar
8 tsp. salt
1-3/4 cups water
1 egg white
olive oil
corn meal

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Mix 2 cups flour and all dry ingredients together in a large bowl. Heat butter and 1-3/4 cups of water until very warm but not boiling. With a mixer on low speed slowly mix in warm liquid. When evenly mixed place dough on floured board and knead dough while slowly adding remaining flour for 8 to 10 minutes. Cut dough in half and cover with towel and allow to rest for 30 minutes. Roll out each half of dough into 15" x 15" rectangles and roll

tightly. From long side "jelly roll" style. Cut 4 diagonal slashes across top with sharp knife about 1/2" deep. Brush top lightly with olive oil. On cookie sheet with corn meal sprinkled evenly place loaves, cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate for 2 to 24 hours. Uncover and bake for 20 minutes. Remove from oven paint beaten egg white over tops and bake for 5 more minutes. Remove and cool.

Tip of the Week
I always use double acting baking powder in bread recipes. It releases gases first when it contacts liquid and again during heating. The trick to light fluffy "quick" breads is to work fast. Mix completely and cook batter at once. When "quick" bread doughs and batters are allowed to sit, gas escapes which will cause the bread to not rise as well. When making yeast style breads do not over knead them or over roll the dough. This causes the bread to become thick, chewy or not rise evenly. Follow the direction for all bread style recipes and you will enjoy some great tastes and smells from your kitchen. May all your meals be a festive occasion.

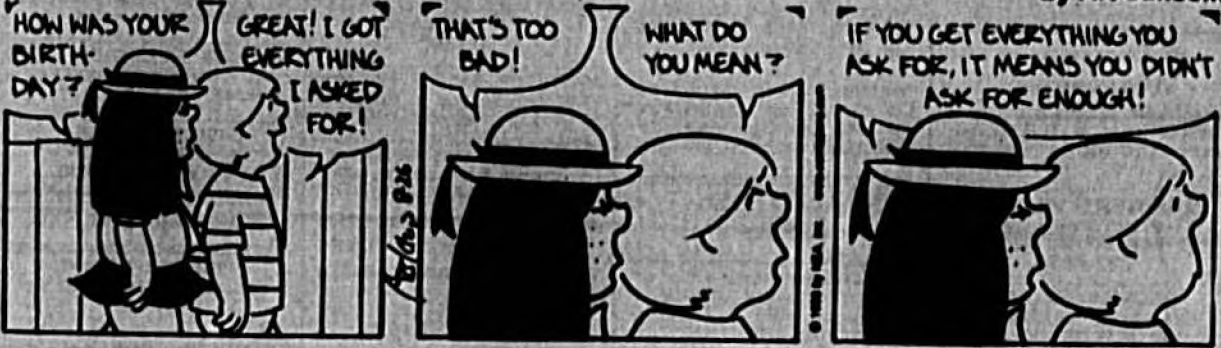

Did herb cause heart attack?

DEAR DR. GOTT: I had a heart attack this past February. I'm 75 with the physique of someone who's 55. I've never smoked, nor do I drink alcohol. I exercise and take appropriate vitamins to supplement what I don't get in my diet. My cholesterol counts have been within the prescribed limits, and prior to the attack, I'd never been sick a day in my life. In all my 75 years, I only did one thing differently for 10 days - I took an herb called guggulipids, an East Indian herb to lower cholesterol. During angioplasty, I was found to have my descending artery 90 percent blocked. Could this herb have caused my attack by breaking loose arterial plaque and thus causing a blockage? The question weighs pretty heavily upon me.

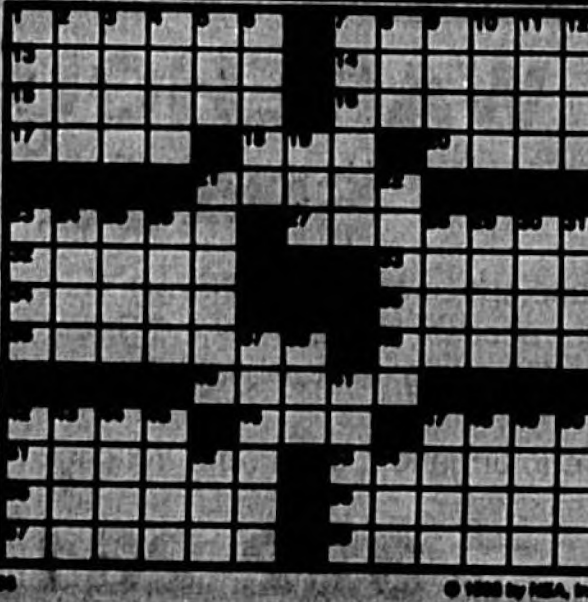

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Are you colorblind?

Albert Schweitzer, who was better known for his humanitarianism than for his sense of humor, once said, "An optimist is a person who sees a green light everywhere, while the pessimist sees only the red stoplight... The truly wise person is colorblind." Well, on today's deal you are in three no-trump. West leads the spade queen. Looking straight out the windshield at the North-South hands only, not peeking at the sidewalks to see the East-West cards, do you see a red light, a green light, or lights with no color? East's jump to three spades was a fair evaluation. Many would have bid four spades, but the vulnerability was unfavorable. Note that four spades doubled should cost 500, the defenders collecting two spades, two red-suit

aces and one heart ruff by North. Also, it would have been a phantom sacrifice because South saw only green lights.

After winning the first trick, declarer led a low club and finessed dummy's jack. Good news - the Spades won. Bad news - East discarded a spade. Suddenly South had only seven tricks, and with no good red-suit split, he finished two down.

Both the pessimist and the truly wise person would make this contract. With four tricks on the side, declarer needs only five club tricks, not six or seven. As dummy is entryless, the only danger is a 4-4 club split. So, the right play is to duck the first club trick, playing a low card from the dummy.

Here, declarer finesses the club jack on the second round to win 10 tricks: two spades, one heart, one diamond and six clubs.
