

Florida State Loop Is Practically Set As 8-Club Circuit

Six Clubs Already In; Seventh Awaiting Word From Orlando

With six clubs, practically ready to go and the seventh awaiting word from Orlando, the possibilities of the Florida State League become an eight-club set-up located in near-actuality today.

The six clubs, all of whom were prepared to deposit their \$500 franchise bonds yesterday were Sanford, St. Augustine, DeLand, Daytona Beach, Palatka and Ocala.

Through Lee Meadows, former Pittsburgh Pirate hurler, the Leesburg club announced that it had accepted a working agreement with the St. Louis Browns through Bill Shinnick, vice-president of the Missouri city's farm clubs and former head of the Florida State League. The Leesburg forfeit deposit would be made as soon as the Orlando magnate had signed their intention of entering competition in the circuit this season, then ascending the loop to eight clubs.

A favorable decision is expected from the Orange County seat before the week terminates as three groups, one from Ocala, consider the franchise there.

While major league clubs were handling the state for their training seasons, the local ball park became the scene of the Charnagoos baseball school with 400 youngsters showing their wares in an endeavor to win a contract with one of the Lookouts' farm clubs.

In all likelihood, some of the youngsters attending the sessions will become a part of the Sanford team for this season.

Home Building

When President Roosevelt signed the two year extension act for the Federal Housing Administration, he gave the "go-ahead" signal for prospective home owners.

According to a report recently received from the headquarters of the F.H.A., a majority of those who have thus far taken advantage of these home construction facilities have been persons with incomes of \$2,500 a year or less.

Approximately 80 percent of these borrowers purchased homes costing not more than two and one-half times their reported annual income.

Other facts brought out by the report were that buyers whose incomes range from \$2,001 to \$2,500 annually represent 21.7 percent of the total number of borrowers.

Properties valued at less than twice their annual income were bought by 56 percent of the borrowers.

Reading And Writing

By JOHN SELLEY

If you can read Courtney Ryley Cooper's "Here's To Crime" without a few cases of cold chivers, you have stronger nerves than I. The book is among the most frightening of recent years and among the hardest hitting.
We hear that crime does not pay, and learn from Mr. Cooper that even that supposedly axiomatic remark is often used in the service of gangsters. Crime does pay, Mr. Cooper believes, offering figures to prove his contention. More than 3 1/2 million persons are engaged in it, he says, and an absolute minimum of 10 billion dollars a year is spent on crime "in all its phases of profit, expense and loss."
Fewer persons die from criminal activity, than from industrial accidents. Compared with motor car death and accident totals, fatality for criminals is, Mr. Cooper points out, insignificant. Last year 37,500 persons died in traffic accidents, and 10,000 were injured. But law enforcement killed only 4,100 persons, and of these something over 200 were executed.
As an example, Mr. Cooper says that Alvin Karpis, who boasts that he has killed a large share of his takings, could be returned to freedom at the age

of 41, and that his savings probably would represent more than the wages he could have earned honestly. Figures from the Federal Bureau of Investigation show that only one out of four persons will live a life of 60 years without becoming the victim of serious crime—robbery, assault, rape, arson, manslaughter or murder.
It is to help this condition that Mr. Cooper spreads 451 pages of his gleanings from the crime world upon the record. The operation of gangs, the division of their profits, the incredible gang molla and "mothers," the hostess and the scandals of parole are only a few of the matters discussed. There is material for a hundred crusades in "Here's To Crime," and one of the reasons why crime pays is that at least 99 of the crusades will be shrugged off by you and by me—
"Here's To Crime," by Courtney Ryley Cooper (Little, Brown).

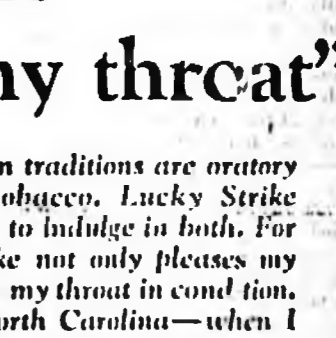
High Court Rules On Money Problem

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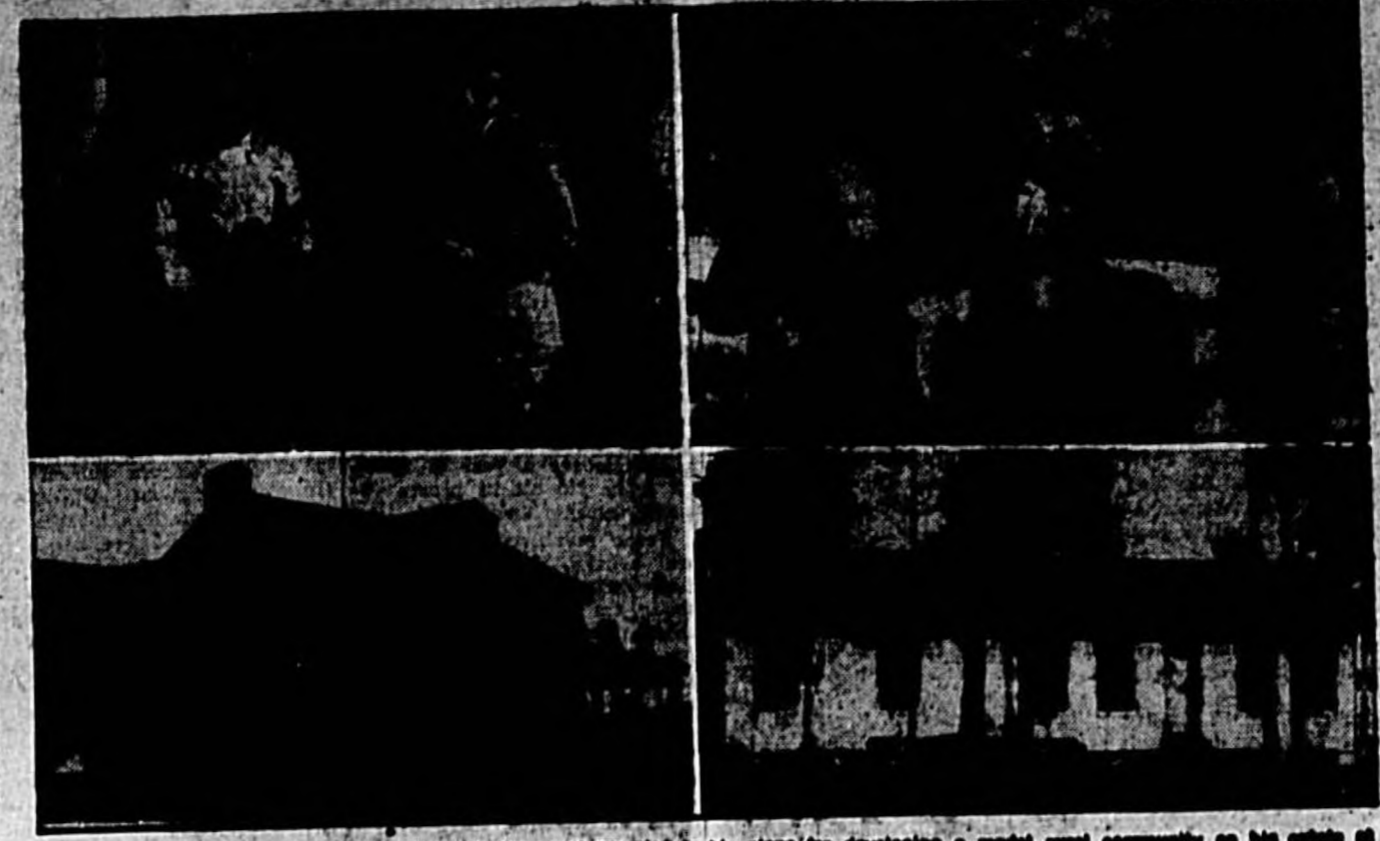

President Seeks Unfairness Is Tax On Sugar To Charge Hurdled Regulate Prices In Court Fight

Believes Plan Would Not Increase Cost To Average User Both Sides Accuse Opponents Of Using Untruthful Tales

WASHINGTON, Mar. 2.—(AP)—President Roosevelt proposed to Congress yesterday the enactment of a sugar quota system financed by a tax on raw sugar. The tax, the President said in a special message, should be set less than three fourths of one cent a pound on sugar, raw value. Income from the tax, estimated at \$100,000,000 annually, would make possible the assumption of direct payments to sugar producers, which the President proposed. "I am definitely advised," Mr. Roosevelt said, "that such a tax would not increase the average cost of sugar to consumers."

Mr. Roosevelt recommended that in evolving a new control system provision should be made for preventing child labor and establishing a minimum wage standard. The Jones-Costigan Act, which expired last December, but was extended in principle through this year, authorizes the secretary of agriculture to allot the estimated annual sugar consumption of the country among beet and cane domestic producers and such "off-shore" producers as those in Hawaii, the Philippines, and similar foreign possessions.

The act originally became law by amendment to the Agricultural Adjustment Act. Certain provisions, principally that imposing a processing tax, became inoperative when the AAA was ruled unconstitutional and benefit payments to producers ceased.

The President said the excise tax would amount to "approximately one hundred million dollars per annum to the Treasury of the United States, which would make the total revenue from sugar more nearly commensurate with that obtained during the period 1922-1929."

"Quota," the President said, "influences the price of sugar through the control of supply; consequently, under a quota regulation of the supply of sugar, a tax may be levied without causing any adverse effect, over a period of time, on the price paid to consumers."

The President asked special safeguards, in any legislation, for the rights of small producers to have them "an equitable share of the benefits offered by the program."
