Sheriff's office places no wake signs on river

SANFORD — The Seminole County Sheriff's Office has installed "NO WAKE" signs along the St. Johns River in order to protect structures and property in areas where the water has risen significantly.

These no wake areas are identified as areas within eyesight of a structure, from Lake Harney to Lake Jessup, and from I-4 west to the power line crossing.

The Sheriff's Office is asking boaters to take extra precautions in these areas in order to avoid damage to property.

Boaters are personally responsible for any damage caused by the wake they leave behind. Marine units will be patrolling these areas throughout the weekend.

CRA endorses 20-story project

SANFORD — Developers of a 20-story residential project on the shores of Lake Monroe have at least one city board on their side.

Members of the Downtown Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) voted unanimously to support to the River's Edge, a proposed 24-story condominium project, that has now been scaled back to 20 stories. The

CRA also approved the developers' request that the board recommend the project receive stormwater credits from the city.

The vote to support is only a recommendation and does not carry legislative authority. Both the Sanford City Commission and the city's Planning and Zoning Commission must approve the project before it can be built.

The River's Edge project is proposed to be built on 9.36 acres at 750 Fulton Street behind The Sanford Herald

building and would span out like a fan to Seminole Boulevard and U.S. 17/92/French Avenue.

Developer Mehbub Manji, of Quality Real Estate Developers LLC in Longwood, was present at the meeting. "We'll have much more open space

than we had before," local architect Jerry Mills said.

The project will have more than 1,000 parking spaces above and below so that they meet city parking regulations. They have also scaled the project back to 47 units per acre, to make the project more palatable, Mills said of all the changes.

Originally, they were planning on having 42,000 square feet of retail space

County's silence deafening to stadium neighbors

SANFORD — Seminole County commissioners admitted residential neighborhoods will face impacts from a proposed football stadium at the University of Central Florida, but the problems will be limited and the county will mediate traffic snarls.

"There is no reason for us to try to get involved with it," said Seminole County Chairman Carlton Henley. "The problem is we have no jurisdiction." The proposed 45,000-seat stadium would be located just across the border in Orange County.

Henley also said there are people in favor of the stadium. Those against the location, he said, should bring their concerns to Orange County.

Carillon homeowner and citizen group leader Michael Proctor has tried to meet with anyone in Seminole County government who would listen him. He has more than 600 residents opposed not to the stadium, but to its location on the northern end of the UCF campus.

UCF will hold a public hearing on the proposed stadium Nov. 9. Proctor objects to what he called Seminole County's silence on the impact the stadium will have on the surrounding neighborhoods with noise, traffic, crime and other issues.

He wanted the county to retract its previous submission

Grand jury to get case involving guards

SANFORD — State Attorney Norm Wolfinger's office said more review is warranted in the case of two white security guards who shot and killed a black youth in July, so attorneys will present the facts of the investigation before a Seminole County grand jury this week.

A new grand jury will convene Monday in Sanford, and Assistant State Attorney Wayne Holmes said he should be able to present the case Tuesday afternoon.

"This is the type of case to present to a grand jury," Holmes said Thursday. Confusion about what actually happened in the early morning hours of July 16 makes this a good example of what a grand jury is all about, he said.

About 3 a.m. on July 16, McGill was driving a car without a license and dropping off a friend at Country Lake Apartments near Seminole High School. Two armed security guards, Bryan P. Ansley and his employee William Swofford, approached the vehicle.

According to police reports, the guards fired into the car when they thought McGill was driving toward them. Two bullets hit the driver, one fatally through his heart.

Dialysis center gives doctors more control

SANFORD — Earlier this week a new dialysis center opened up on 1st Street across from Central Florida Regional Hospital.

Dialysis Services of Central Florida was opened up by a physicians group, so that the doctor's had direct oversight into their patients' care.

Dialysis is the long-term treatment for renal failure, more commonly known as kidney failure. Mary Rowley, a registers nurse for DSCF, explained that patients who have in-stage renal disease are left with kidneys that can no longer clean the toxins, or regulate sodium and potassium levels that enter the body.

When patients come in for dialysis treatment, they are hooked up to machines that

Health Dept. issues flu drug scam warning

SANFORD — The epidemiology program at Seminole County Health Department urges residents to be aware of several recent scams involving the prescription drug Tamiflu, used in the treatment of influenza.

In the interest of capitalizing from the public's concerns regarding pandemic influenza, some individuals are illegally stockpiling and advertising the drug Tamiflu for resale. Spam emails are beginning to circulate regarding the availability of the drug through questionable retail agents.

To avoid being a victim of fraud, residents should be aware of following information:

Individuals should not rely on websites that will provide their clients with a prescription for a medicine without a true doctor-patient relationship.

The U.S. Food and Drug

Coward Commission: Disney's new animated movie "Chicken Little" opened nationwide yesterday. Unfortunately for south Seminole County residents our elected representatives have been playing Chicken Little for several months now regarding a proposed football stadium for the University of Central Florida.

The stadium is currently proposed for the north end of UCF's campus, which sits on the Orange County side of the Seminole/Orange county line. Seminole residents in that area have repeatedly asked county commissioners to address potential impacts on their neighborhoods the stadium could generate like traffic, noise and lighting. The commissioners have

taken an uncharacteristic stance. "We have no jurisdiction," said Chairman Carlton Henley.

Ha, when has that stopped the county from sticking its nose in other people's business. Ask any official from one of Seminole County's seven cities if the county hasn't tried to strong arm the municipalities on issues of planning and zoning.

To be fair, the issue does rest with Orange County, but our elected officials — most of whom have stressed the importance of addressing major issues with an eye toward regional solutions — are curiously timid on expressing an official position.

The university was built before the subdivisions, and I think that should be given merit as school officials plan UCF's future. But the residents have some valid concerns and aren't just falsely proclaiming that "the sky is falling." Unfortunately for them, their commissioner have become a little chicken.

Barely scraping by: Exxon Mobil reported last week that it made a profit of \$10 billion during its most recent 3-month financial period. That brings Exxon's year-to-date profit to \$25 billion with one quarter remaining. Royal Dutch Shell announced \$9 billion in profits for the quarter, double what it made in the comparable quarter in 2004. Marathon Oil posted a mere \$770 million quarterly profit, but that was more than triple the profit the company made for the same period last year.

So tell me again why we can't charge the oil companies with price gouging for jacking up the prices after the hurricanes?

Wekiva Parkway public hearings set

SANFORD — The Wekiva Parkway, one of the key elements in the Western Connector Program, is moving forward through a Project Development and Environment Study.

The study, which the Expressway Authority and the Florida Department of Transportation — District 5 officially kicked off in January 2005, has yielded numerous alignment alternatives for the proposed 25-mile roadway.

The purpose of the study is to determine the best alignment for the Wekiva Parkway, interchange

locations, and roadway characteristics that minimize community and environmental impacts, while still meeting critical transportation needs.

Local governments and state agencies reviewed preliminary routes. Based on government input and data analysis, the initial alignment alternatives are to be refined and ready for review and comment at Public Involvement Workshops in November.

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Longwood issues boil water notice Thursday

The City of Longwood issued a boil water notice Thursday. Public Works Director Richard Kornbluh said he didn't know how long the notice would remain in effect.

"We'll be taking water samples Thursday," he explained, "and they were expected to be back some time Friday. Then we'll take another sample Friday, and if they both come back positive, we could lift the notice as early as Saturday."

He didn't however, speculate on whether he thought the samples would come back showing the water was clear again. "We need two consecutive days of positive tests," he said, "and we

don't know how long it will take. The notice could be lifted this Saturday (Nov. 5) or it may have to stay in effect for several more days."

The area affected is east of South Grant Street, and south of SR-434, west of Highway 17-92, and includes the Wildmere Subdivision and connections east of Highway 17-92 and north of Lake Irene Drive, south of SR-434 for persons served by the City of Longwood water system.

He suggests, "Do not drink the water without boiling it first." Bring all water to a boil, let it boil for one minute, and let it cool before using, or use bottled water. Boiled or Bottled water should be used for drinking, making ice, brushing teeth, washing dishes

and food preparation. Boiling kills bacteria and other organisms in the water.

Fecal coliforms and E coli are bacteria whose presence indicates that the water may be contaminated with human or animal wastes. Microbes in these wastes can cause diarrhea, cramps, nausea, headaches, or other symptoms. They may pose a special health risk for infants, young children, and people with severely compromised immune systems.

As of Thursday, the city began flushing the water distribution system, increasing disinfection levels, taking additional coliform bacteria samples for laboratory analysis and surveying area properties for possible cross connections.

Administration (FDA) advises that when buying medicines over the Internet, consumers should look for the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy VIPPS seal, which certifies legitimate pharmacies.

Individuals buying alleged Tamiflu from an unauthorized vendor may receive a product of uncertain quality.

Seminole County Health Department also strongly recommends not stockpiling the drug for personal use.

Tamiflu should only be used when prescribed by a physician. Stockpiling generates a shortage of the drug by the manufacturers, delaying distribution of the drug to those who may really benefit from it, such as the elderly and those with serious chronic diseases. Improper use of Tamiflu may lead to the development of resistant influenza viruses, eventually making it useless to everyone.

The best protection against influenza or the 'flu' is to get

the flu vaccine. Antiviral drugs such as Tamiflu are not an acceptable substitute for a flu vaccine. Individuals who have been victimized by this scam can contact their local police department and the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services at 1-800-HELP-FLA (435-7352).

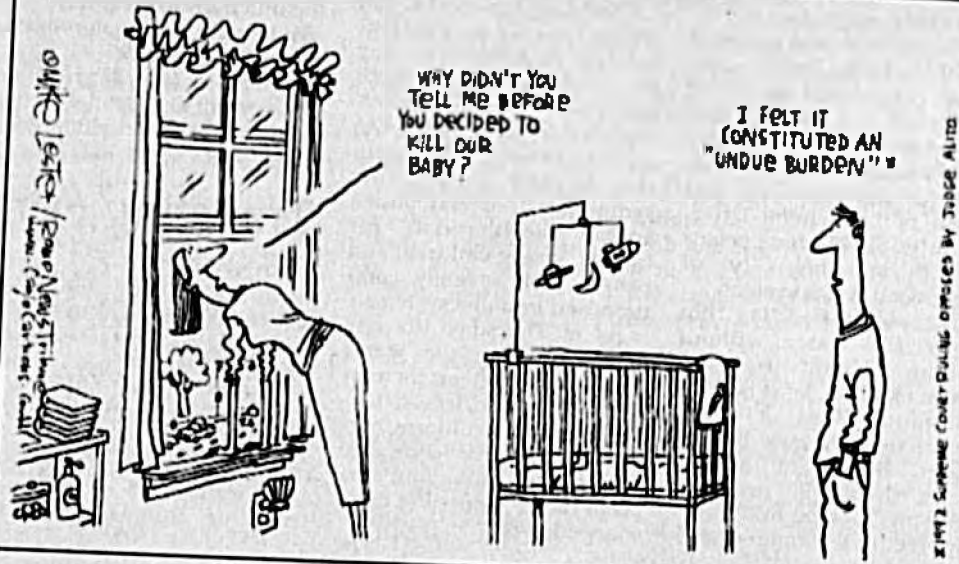

The Way We Were:

Memories of Miller family

The following information on members of the Miller family was edited from Memories of Seminole County Families, 1850-1945, a publication of the Seminole County Historical Society. Copies may be purchased at the Museum of Seminole County History.

THEO J. MILLER

Theo J. Miller (T.J.) was born March 22, 1851 in Antwerp, Belgium and came to America in 1872. He arrived in Sanford in 1879 where he began a furniture and undertaking business on the southeast corner of Park Avenue and First Street. He also established Lakeview Cemetery on West 25th Street. Miller's horse, Bob, who faithfully pulled the hearse for many years, was buried in the cemetery with a headstone honoring his faithful service. (This headstone is now a featured exhibit in the Sanford Museum).

T.J. had many other business interests. Among other things, he invested in the South Florida Railroad and was one of the founders of the Sanford Building and Loan Association.

T.J.'s first wife was Mary Frances Robinson who gave birth to a son, Frank Leonard Miller on Aug. 15, 187. Mary died soon afterwards. T.J. hired Isadora Young to care for his son, and as time went by, he fell in love with her. They had to wait though, until she was old enough to get married, which they did in 1881.

When the Millers set off for a tour of the west in the spring of 1882, Dora was several months pregnant. In Kansas, she gave birth, prematurely, to Oliver Joseph Miller. He was so tiny they kept him in a cigar type box lined with warm bricks, and fed him with a medicine dropper.

In 1900, T.J. had a magnificent Queen Anne style home built at 801 Park Avenue for his family; wife Dora, and sons Frank (age 12) and Oliver (age 8).

After Dora died in 1920, T.J. married Maude M. Miller. He then had a beautiful prairie style home built at 419 Magnolia Avenue.

T.J. was a devout member of Holy Cross Episcopal Church, where he served as a member of the vestry for over 20 years. His death on Oct. 15, 1929 at the age of 78 removed one of Sanford's most prominent citizens of the day.

FRANK L. MILLER

Frank L. Miller was born Aug. 15, 1878 to T.J. and Mary Frances Miller. He married Maude Doyle and they had two children, Frank L. Miller, Jr. and Mary Esther Miller.

Frank became a business partner with his father and later, along with Ed Lane, built and operated the Milane Theatre. The \$80,000 theater opened Aug. 2, 1923 with a grand gala and featured the film "Enemies of Women" starring Lionel Barrymore and Alma Rubens. The theatre, located at 201 S. Magnolia Avenue, later became the Ritz and is now the Helen Stairs Theatre. During its restoration in the late 1990's, a marble cornerstone was uncovered which commemorates the 1923 Milane, giving the names of its owners, officers and directors. It is now placed on the building on the Second Street side.

Frank had a sincere interest in community service. He and the Miller family donated a marble shaft memorial to the Seminole County men who had served in World War I. It was placed in the Fourth Street Park and over 1,600 people attended the unveiling ceremony on Feb. 16, 1919. Today, this memorial is located in front of the American Legion Building on Sanford Avenue.

During the early 1900's, Frank served on the "Divide the County Committee" whose work helped in the break from Orange County as Seminole County in 1913. Frank became a Small Claims Court Judge and later City Judge. He served on the Sanford City Commission and was the first president of the Sanford Shrine Club in 1922.

He added a third Miller home to what is now Sanford's Historic District when he built a Colonial Revival home at 601 Magnolia Avenue. After the death of his wife, Maude, he married Katherine S. Collier. He died in 1972 and was buried in the Miller section of Lakeview Cemetery.

DR. OLIVER JOSEPH MILLER

Oliver Miller was born prematurely in Kansas, May 14, 1882. He spent his boyhood in Sanford and attended public schools. For a time he attended Florida Military Academy in Gainesville where he met Jessie McDonald, from Williston, on a bus. He thought she was the most beautiful girl he had ever seen, and decided that one day he would marry her.

He graduated from the Massachusetts Conservatory of Music and later attended Rollins College. His interests soon turned to medicine so he entered Jefferson Medical School in Philadelphia. He continued his medical education at the U.S. Naval College in Washington, D.C. from which he graduated with the rank of lieutenant.

On Dec. 6, 1906, Oliver and Jessie were married. Their first child, Theodora, was born in 1908 and at the age of 6, she developed a bone disease. Against all medical advice, Oliver decided not to amputate her arm. Instead, he performed "bloodless surgery" on their dining room table, the first operation of this kind. It was written up in medical journals. Theodora's arm was saved.

Dr. Miller became assistant to the surgeon general under President Taft. As such he and Jessie were invited to the White House on numerous occasions.

They returned to Sanford where Oliver was retained by the ACL Railroad while he built up his medical practice. In February 1915, Jessie gave birth to twins, Oliver Joseph Jr. and Mary Elizabeth. During World War I, Oliver served as a lieutenant colonel in the medical corps. He remained in government service until he had a stroke in 1926.

He returned to Sanford and opened the Seminole Pharmaceutical Company wholesale drugs, in Lake Mary. The grand opening was held May 5, 1927, with 2,000 people dancing in the street to a 14-piece orchestra. On Aug. 2, 1938, Oliver was found dead in his car on the Oviedo Road. He had committed suicide. A letter explained that he had an incurable disease and didn't want to become a hardship on his family.

Stetson's Corner Riverwatch

"How high's the water, Mama?" This may be a question from an old movie, but even in our high tech world it couldn't be more relevant. Whether you live on the river, near the river, or know someone who lives on a lake feeding the river, you have an

interest in the water level of the St. Johns River. Last fall we wanted a better predictor than a news reporter standing in knee boots and slicker at the end of Lake Harney Road. That's when we discovered a website that measures the river level every 30 minutes. If you have a computer and you're interested in knowing what the river is doing and what it is predicted to do, please read on. I put this in the category of taking charge of your situation, rather than waiting for someone in a government vehicle to ring your doorbell with all the answers. (I almost stepped up on my soapbox, but will save that for later).

This website, <http://ahps.srh.noaa.gov/in dex.php?wfo=mlb>, is not easy to memorize, so I put it in my "favorites" file where it is easy to find.

The letters stand for: Advanced Hydrologic Prediction Service, Southern Region Headquarters, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association, and the last three letters stand for Melbourne, the district that monitors the St. Johns.

A map pops up showing three boxes for Lake Harney,

Sanford, and Deland-three separately measured parts of the St. John's River. Click on the little square of Sanford and you'll find a chart showing in graph format what the observed and forecasted levels are in relationship to the different stages of flooding. This is called a hydrograph. If you prefer number tables, click on TABULAR DATA and it shows you by 30 minute intervals the observed and forecasted levels.

Look at the Lake Harney and Deland levels by clicking on their square boxes on the map and get the same information.

The site updates the levels at 2,6,10 a.m. and p.m.-but it takes about 30-45 minutes to update-I usually check at 40 minutes past the hour. The levels are measured in tenths and hundredths so 8.50 is 8 ft 6 inches.

The hydrologists are sensitive to adjusting the forecasts knowing that we depend on that information.

If you are new to Geneva, you may not know that the St. Johns River is one of the few rivers in the world to run northbound. It runs through Lake Harney, north through Lake Monroe and up toward Jacksonville to the ocean. In months when Melbourne and Vero Beach get a lot of rain, it will take a few days for the lake and river levels to rise in central Florida as that water makes its way northbound.

If you have family in other parts of Florida or around the country, you can look on this site and see their river conditions as well. If you tool around on the sites, you'll find tons of weather related information, not just hydrology. The National Weather Service is a kind of umbrella website and you can see

weather hazards, conditions, and predictions for almost any area, and for air, water, fire etc. These sites can be fun to follow with your children as well. There are all kinds of math and science applications- www.weather.gov for example is an easy site to remember.

There's a lot of talk now about personal responsibility and blame after many of the hurricanes this year. I confess some surprise at the folks in South Florida who were not prepared "because we thought it was going to be Cat 1 vs a Cat 2 or 3." Where were they last year when Charlie, Frances, and Jeanne blew through Florida?

I realize they missed most of the damage but surely they saw the effects of 75-110 mph winds and rain. When tropical or hurricane storm winds blow through, you're probably going to lose your power. Which means you'll need gas for your generator. Which means your car should already be full just in case. Which means you should have a generator and gas cans on hand. And a few gallons of water-one gallon per person per day is the rule, I believe.

No one in Central Florida was that smart last year until Charley, and then we knew what to do. I think the lesson is- pay attention to what happens elsewhere, so when it happens to us, we're prepared.

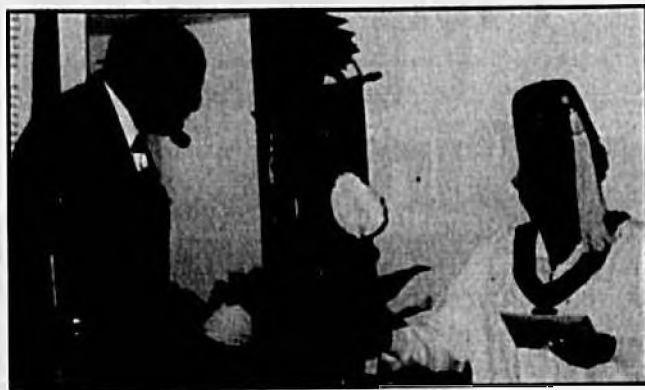

"The county's response sounds fishy to me," Proctor said. "On one hand they tell me, 'You will definitely be impacted by this.' It's become moot, however, since Nov. 3 was the last day the county could submit comments. I did everything I could do as a citizen."

Henley said UCF President John Hilt contacted him before the whole process started. They wanted to make sure the county was kept apprised of the stadium plans, Henley said.

The county chairman also said the impact would be limited to six or seven home games per year and only a handful of concerts and other activities.

They will probably have less traffic problems than they do during the week when 45,000 students attend school, Henley said. Football games do not attract a majority of students, Henley said, adding that he went to a game earlier this year with less than 20,000 students in attendance.

"I did tell Mr. Proctor that we would monitor the issues and be more involved on the game days to minimize the impact," Henley said Friday. "I appreciate citizens' concerns, but we have no jurisdiction there."

Because there are people who favor the stadium site, a public hearing was out of the question, he said. "We on the commission are in a no-win situation," Henley added.

Two county commissioners, Randy Morris and Bob Dallari, sit on the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council. Acting Executive Director Jeffrey Jones said in an Oct. 28 letter that council staff had reviewed the Campus Master Plan amendment, which addresses the stadium. The letter was sent to James K. Davis of the UCF Office of Facilities Planning.

"The matrix notes that the northern site is not compatible with the surrounding land uses," Jones wrote. "These land uses consist primarily of single-family subdivisions to the east and north of the proposed location."

He suggested that single-family subdivisions are the most sensitive type of land use to activities taking place nearby.

"Any land use that is substantially different, particularly one of greater intensity, is often perceived as lessening the desirability of a neighborhood and consequently its property values," Jones said.

He recommended establishing a permanent residential advisory board from adjacent areas in Orange and Seminole counties. The board would identify concerns and work with the university to resolve them.

Potential impacts include traffic, permanent buffering between the stadium and residential areas, tailgating activities, noise levels and lighting.

He also said additional traffic studies are needed to assess future traffic volumes and patterns to and from the stadium.

Commissioner Morris of Seminole County said the university will continue to expand and the neighborhoods need to understand that reality.

"The university has been there longer than most of the neighborhoods, and the impact will continue to grow," Morris

said.

The Seminole Board of County Commissioners has endorsed UCF's growth plan, Morris pointed out. He said the impact would be minor on these neighborhoods and will be addressed by the university.

"UCF is a very big activity and employment center," Morris said. "Much of the growth that has occurred in

Oviedo is because of the university. There is a symbiotic relationship there."

Proctor said they are concerned with the comments made by Seminole County to UCF.

"Your comments are supposed to help determine if a change in the UCF Master Plan is compatible and does not create a conflict," Proctor wrote in

an email to commissioners.

Regulations say the campus master plan must not be in conflict with comprehensive plans of any affected local governments, Proctor points out.

"Right now Seminole County's comment is 'No Comment,'" Proctor said. "The university is reading this remark as there is no compatibility and no conflict issues."

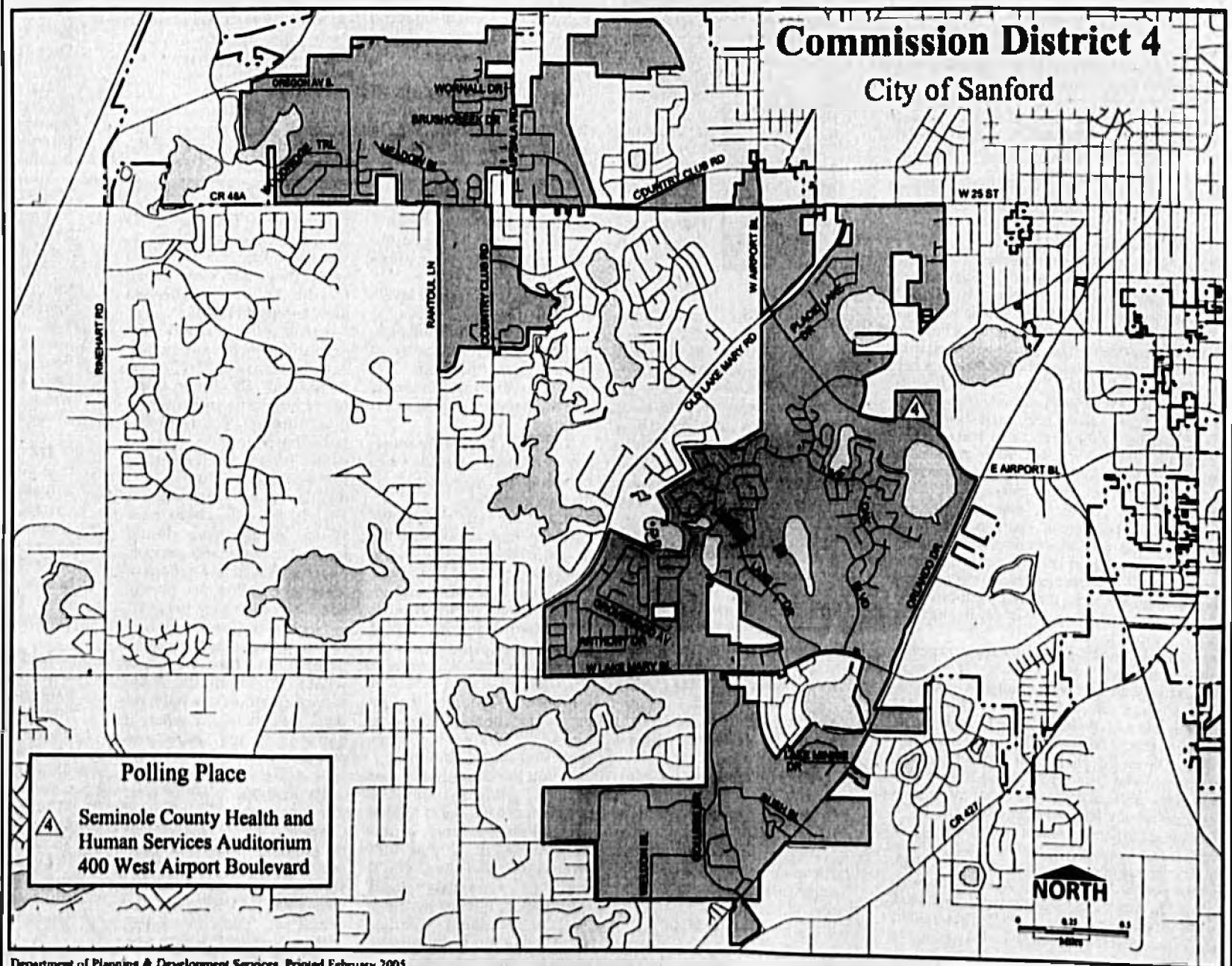

Thornton Park genius eyes city

SANFORD — Another developer is showing interest in Sanford.

At Thursday night's Sanford Historic Trust, Inc. meeting, Thornton Park developer Phil Rampy talked about how he started Thornton Park and what he sees going on in Sanford.

Rampy explained that he was able to market his \$129,000 renovated house on Thornton Avenue and Jefferson Street in Orlando, just by naming the area the house was in as Thornton Park when he advertised an open house. He sold the house for full price, he said.

"We thought we had really hit the jackpot," Rampy said.

Rampy said he took Thornton Park from an infantile state, to not quite adulthood yet.

"It's like a child going to really good school," Rampy joked.

He said in Thornton Park there are such a diverse group of people. From residents in their 90s, to people walking baby strollers.

Rampy told the Historic Trust members and guests that he has been taking notice of Historic Sanford, and has recently purchased some property in the area.

"I don't know exactly what it will be yet," Rampy said.

But, he continued to say that he always gives people the opportunity to give their opinion.

When asked what made him take notice of Sanford, he said two things: infrastructure

and the RiverWalk.

"Your highways are good, you've got an airport. You've got water. And, [you're] close to the beach," Rampy said. "You've got a lot of plusses."

Rampy said downtown Orlando is about to become a large downtown. He said he saw downtown Sanford as a little quieter, and a little simpler life. He said it would have to start with quality businesses and services.

He suggested that the city need some kind of anchor to start to draw people in. Whether it be an upscale restaurant or store with name recognition, like Dexter's did for Thornton Park.

"We have to really look at what we want as a community. But, yes, food is a great portion of what will bring people there," Rampy said.

An audience member asked Rampy what they do about people who were opposed to change. He said that is common in every community.

"You keep massaging all the people," he said.

He said it was beneficial for people who own land to do what's best financially. Then laughing, he looked at Linda Kuhn and said: "It's the mayor's job."

Rampy told the audience that one of the major challenges a community had that was experiencing growth, such as this, was urban planning and creating a master plan. He said the city should have a plan that wasn't stringent, and that could be changed.

"Think hard about your politicians," Rampy said. "You can be heard."

clean their blood to regulate toxins. This is called hemodialysis.

The facility also has peritoneal dialysis, where a catheter does a fluid exchange to remove toxins.

Rowley said that once patients with kidney problems get in-stage, they are either put on a transplant list, or they can come in for dialysis. Some patients have to come in for dialysis twice a week.

"I've dialyzed patients for 16

years," Rowley said. "Some [patients] are not candidates for transplants."

Bob Morrison, regional manager DCI, said doctors own DSCF, so that their patients are under the physician's control.

"The physician's wanted more direct control over how care is handled, so they can have care delivered the way they want it delivered," Morrison said. Another aspect of the new facility is the doctor's focus on technology. Morrison

said they are far more advanced than a lot of other dialysis centers, so their nurses are not bogged down by paperwork.

"It's the concept of having nurses do what they need to do," Morrison said.

Dialysis Services of Central Florida also has their own water distillation purification system on sight. Morrison said most people only drink one liter of water a day, but dialysis patients have to consume multiple gallons of water.

"If there were any impurities it would cross over to their blood," Morrison said.

The group held an open house Nov. 1 and 2, 2005, for current patients and future patients to come by and check out the facility. They have about 24 dialysis machines, so they could potentially serve a number of patients at one time.

on the bottom, but they cut back significantly, only having retail space on the left front side of the property.

"We do not want to compete with downtown," Mills, who's a lifelong Sanford resident, told CRA members.

The group of people presenting the new ideas to the CRA included former Mayor Brady Lessard. Mills stole a quote from Lessard explaining that "we're creating customers, not competition."

The CRA was told that a rough, and "very conservative" estimate of tax base revenue from the project at completion and capacity, could add \$1.8 to 2 million to their annual budget. This year's CRA budget was a little more than \$750,000.

"We want your blessing," Mills said. They also asked the CRA to recommend to the Sanford City Commission that the project receive stormwater credits.

Stormwater Credits were given to the city by the St. John's Water Management District in a new method of using excess stormwater systems from a nearby pond, to allow developers to develop infill projects, and instead of building a stormwater pond or storage unit on already too small lots, they could have the extra space for construction.

CRA Chairman Bob Parsell said that he didn't have a problem with this project receiving credits, and pointed out that the CRA sold the first credits to the Gateway project on the RiverWalk. He said he still wanted to see some infill projects downtown, though.

"They need to step up to the plate," Parsell said of smaller developers that could take advantage of the .5 to 1-acre infill lots that were the spark of the stormwater credits.

Stormwater credits would cost the developer's of River's Edge \$117,000 per acre, which would put more than \$1 mil-

lion into the city's pocket.

Infill projects can purchase stormwater credits with a 75 percent discount. And, at this time, CRA members said the credits are first come, first serve.

Mills, of Burke, Hogue, and Mills, said that if the project is approved they hope to fast track it so that it is completed within two years.

Board member Charles Rowe, who made a motion to support the project, first pointed out that since the stormwater credits originated out of the burrow pit in Goldsboro, he felt that some of the money from the credits should go back into that community.

"I don't think that is fair," Rowe said. "None of the benefit [from the credits] trickles down to that area."

Parsell suggested they mention that to Goldsboro area District 2 Commissioner Velma Williams.

Member Jeff Triplett said, "this is exactly why we spent \$50,000" finding out the value of the credits.

"To bring this type of development to the city of Sanford," Triplett continued.

Bruce McKibben, another board member, made a motion to encourage the City Commission, in writing, to approve stormwater credits for the project, if the high-rise is approved. The vote was unanimous in support.

"I have a feeling this is going to look good, too," Parsell said.

Rowe said if the River's Edge project is going to be approved and built, it was in the CRA's best interest that it be completed as soon as possible.

He made another motion for support of the project, that will be included in the same letter to City Commissioners that they support selling 9.36 stormwater credits for the project, if approved.

"There are issues that go both ways," Holmes said of the case. "It's like pieces of a puzzle. We will present all the facts and circumstances. There are facts favorable to the issue of self-defense, and others that aren't."

He said the grand jury process allows for a review of the evidence. Holmes also suggested that grand juries are made up of the same sort of people, from all walks of life, who comprise trial juries. If they make a decision to indict someone, that helps the case in the trial stage, he said.

"I look forward to presenting it to them, and I look forward to the grand jury's

insight," he said.

The Seminole County branch of the NAACP and people close to McGill have objected to the way the case has been handled from the outset. Turner Clayton Jr., local NAACP president, said he is not satisfied with the handling of the case.

"This is not the orderly process that normally takes place," Clayton said Friday. "Most people would have been arrested on the spot." He said they could have accepted the outcome if that had happened.

"How is (Holmes) going to present the case?" is the question that Clayton is ask-

ing now. He said he spoke with Holmes before the information about the grand jury was released.

"They don't want to do it themselves. They want to put it off on somebody else, that's why they will present the case to the grand jury," Clayton said. "They can present it real weakly if they want to."

He added that the organization will wait and see what happens this week, but without an indictment, further actions may be taken. Clayton did not want to elaborate on what those actions might be.

Holmes said regardless of

the emotional aspect of the case, everyone agrees that this was a tragedy. He said eventually the case will become public record. He added that it is difficult to be patient when the family has suffered such a tragic loss.

If a decision is not made to indict, most of the case will become public record right away, Holmes explained. If the grand jury returns what is known as a true bill, that becomes an indictment and the case is sealed until an arrest is made.

Holmes said he has not subpoenaed Ansley or Swofford. He does not know

where Ansley is right now. Both men were advised about the grand jury, but if they appeared it would be on a voluntary basis. He has not heard from either of the two guards.

"My intent is to present to the grand jury all the facts and circumstances so there can be a full review of this death," Holmes said.

Once the grand jury has heard everything, it will be the voice of the community as to whether the case goes forward. The standard the grand jury uses is probable cause, Holmes explained, the same standard a law enforce-

ment officer uses to make an arrest.

He also said in cases where self defense is claimed, very rarely will the person be arrested initially. In this case, for instance, news reports have disclosed that both guards discharged their firearms.

"Who hit what?" Holmes asked.

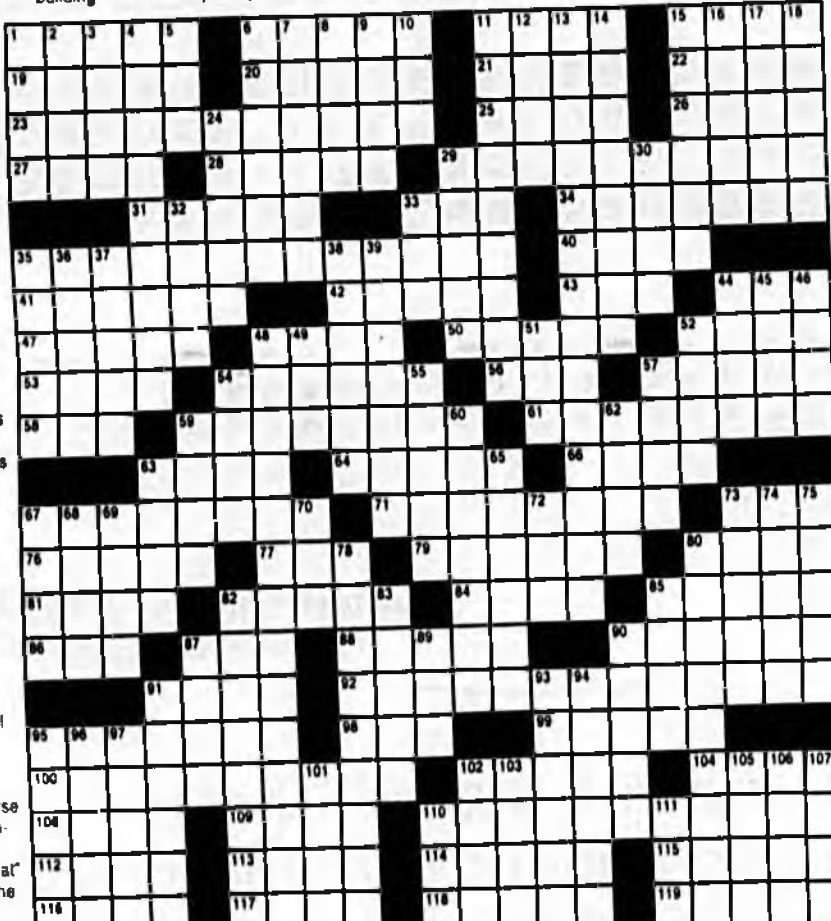
The physical evidence that the grand jury will see may answer that question.

"You can be charging someone who is innocent," he said, if an arrest is made right away. "Let's develop all the facts and circumstances."

Trip for two to Lakeland

Two Seminole County girls volleyball teams had their tickets punched for Lakeland on Thursday as Lake Howell and Orangewood Christian won regional titles in fairly easy fashion.

The Braves were able to refocus after the first game, taking early leads in the second and third games and at least staying with their hosts, but the Silver Hawks were simply too big and too strong.

The visitors led 4-1 in the second game before Lake Howell went on a pair of runs to build an eight-point lead. Lake Gibson came back to cut the lead to four before the Silver Hawks put the game away.

The Braves again led 6-4 in the third game and the score was tied at 9-9 before Lake Howell all but put the championship on ice when it went on a 10-3 run to take a 19-12 lead on the way to the 25-18 match-clinching victory.

King had an awesome 19 kills and four blocks, while Daiger chipped in with nine kills, six

blocks and four service aces.

The Silver Hawks will face Chiles High School from Tallahassee in a Class 5A Semifinal at The Lakeland Center on Thursday at a time to be announced.

Chiles (27-3) earned its trip to state by ousting fellow Tallahassee school, Lincoln (23-8), in five hard-fought games, 15-25, 28-30, 25-14, 25-23 and 15-12. Venice (24-7) will also be at Lakeland, but its opponent will not be known until at least Monday night.

Barron Collier (24-2) has already advanced to the Region 4 final, but West Boca Raton will host a three-team match on Saturday with West Boca facing Satellite Beach at noon today (Saturday) and the winner taking on St. Thomas Aquinas at 3 p.m. The winner of that match will Barron Collier on Monday.

The Class 5A State Championship Game is set for 7 p.m. next Friday.

Orangewood Christian, the No. 1 ranked team in Class 1A, did not let a road trip to Pine Castle Christian bother it as the Rams rolled to their 28th win in 29 matches in four games, 25-13, 25-16, 20-25 and 25-16, in the Class 1A-Region 2 Championship Game.

Orangewood Christian dominated the front line as the trio of juniors Meg Weatherby and Ria Varnell and freshman Anne Pietkiewicz combined for 43 kills.

Pine Castle (15-13) tried to make a match of it, going on an 11-2 run in winning the third game, but the Rams quickly squelched any notion of an upset as senior Blair Muller served the visitors to a 22-12 lead in the final game.

Weatherby led the way with 18 kills, while Varnell chipped in with 12 blocks and Muller 38 assists.

Orangewood Christian will also be playing in the Final Four next Thursday at The Lakeland Center against Ocala-St. John Lutheran (24-5), which defeated visiting Tallahassee-John Paul II (14-15) in straight games, 25-20, 25-16, 25-17, Thursday.

And while BCC did get to 50, so dominant was the SCC defense in the final 20 minutes that no Titan scored more than five points and the guest's leading scorer, Megan Rigby, was the only player in double figures with 12 points.

Jackson, a returning All-Mid-Florida Conference performer from Fayetteville, North Carolina, was a monster in the

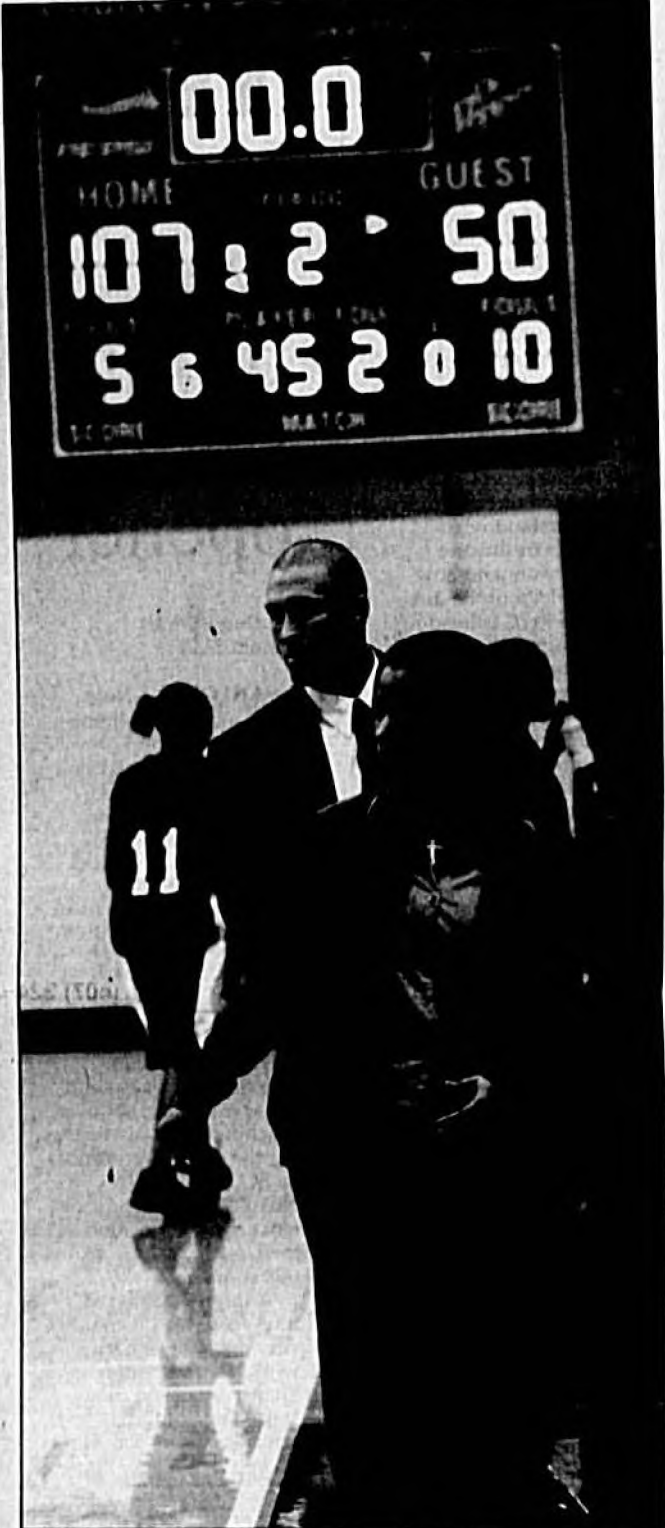
UCF hosts Houston in final home game

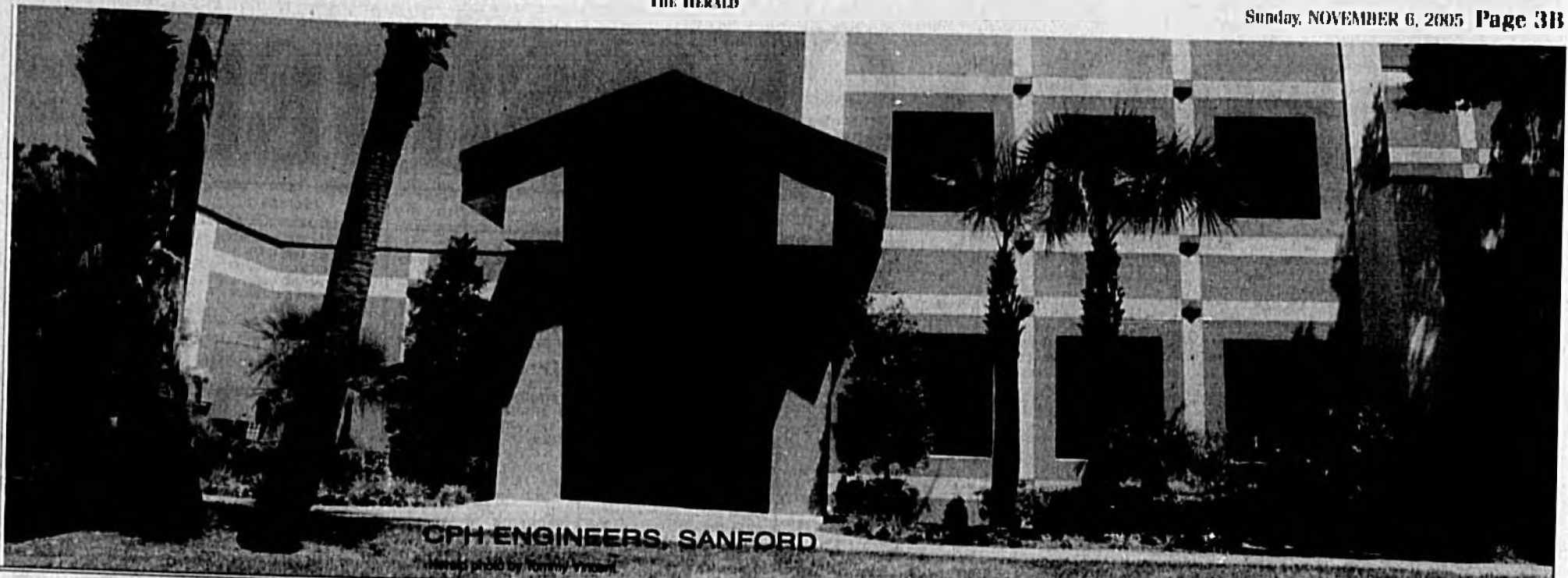
Rose Bowl - The first Rose Bowl was played in 1901. It was a rout with Michigan defeating Stanford by 49 to 0.

Orange Bowl - Another slaughter first played in 1934. Bucknell defeated Miami of Florida 26 to 0.

Sugar Bowl - First played in 1934 with Tulane beating Temple 20 to 14. The lowest score in a Sugar Bowl was in 1941 when Fordham beat Misouri by a score of 2 to 0. The second lowest score was in 1935 when Texas Christian defeated Louisiana State 3 to 2.

Fiesta Bowl - First played in 1971 with Arizona State taking Florida State 45 to 38.

Pro-Football Records - The highest total scoring game was on Nov. 27, 1966 when the Washington Redskins beat the New York Giants 72 to 41 (113 total points). The widest margin of victory was Nov. 6, 1934 when the Philadelphia Eagles beat the Cincinnati Reds 64 to 0. The longest game was Dec. 25, 1971 with the Miami Dolphins beating the Kansas City Chiefs for a total of 82 minutes and 40 seconds (two overtimes).
