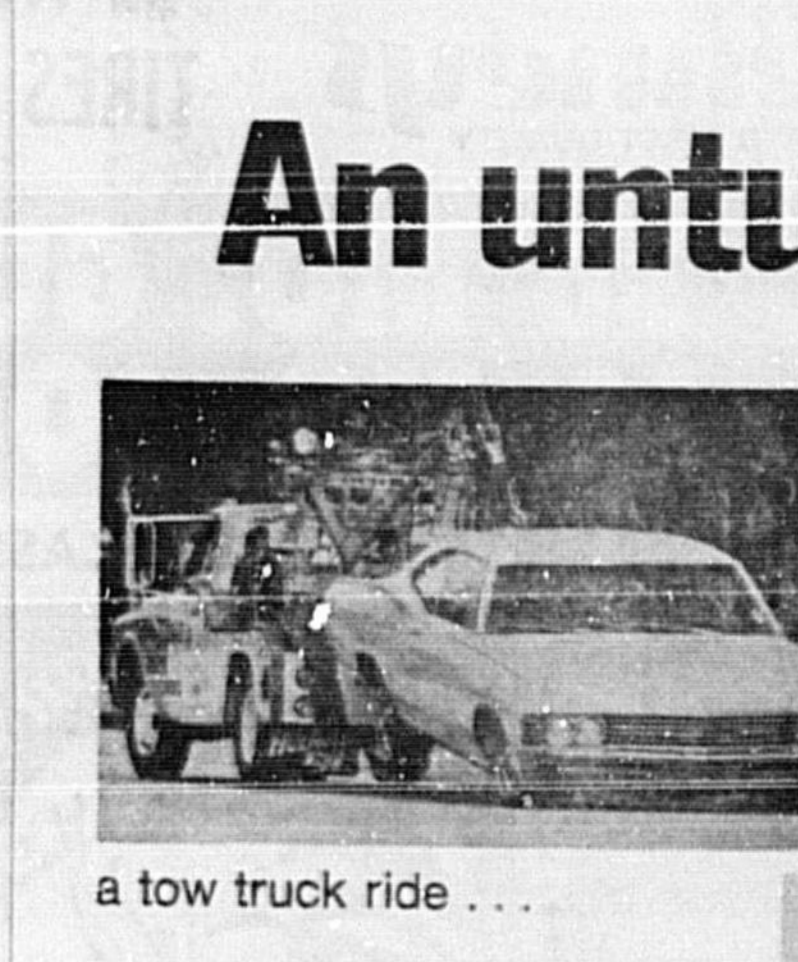

The bill passed by the committee would require promoters to obtain \$500 rock festival permits that county commissions would be required to issue.

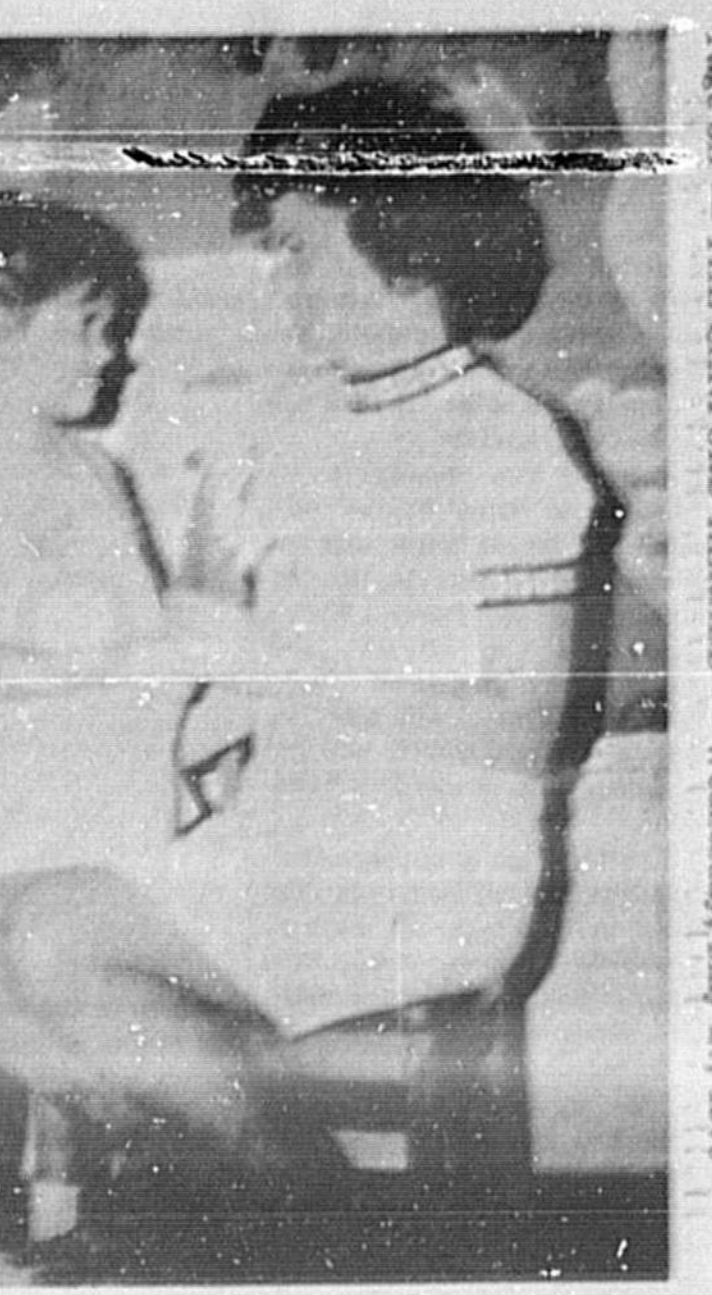

## Court Upholds Fast Trial Act

In BARRY SCHWEID Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court has again cautioned the states they must enforce the constitutional right of defendants to be brought to trial speedily.

But the right, contained in the sixth amendment and applied to the states by the court beginning in 1967, remains largely unenforced. The court's latest involvement was a decision Monday that upsets the holdup conviction of a Florida truckdriver who was not tried until 7 1/2 years after arrest.

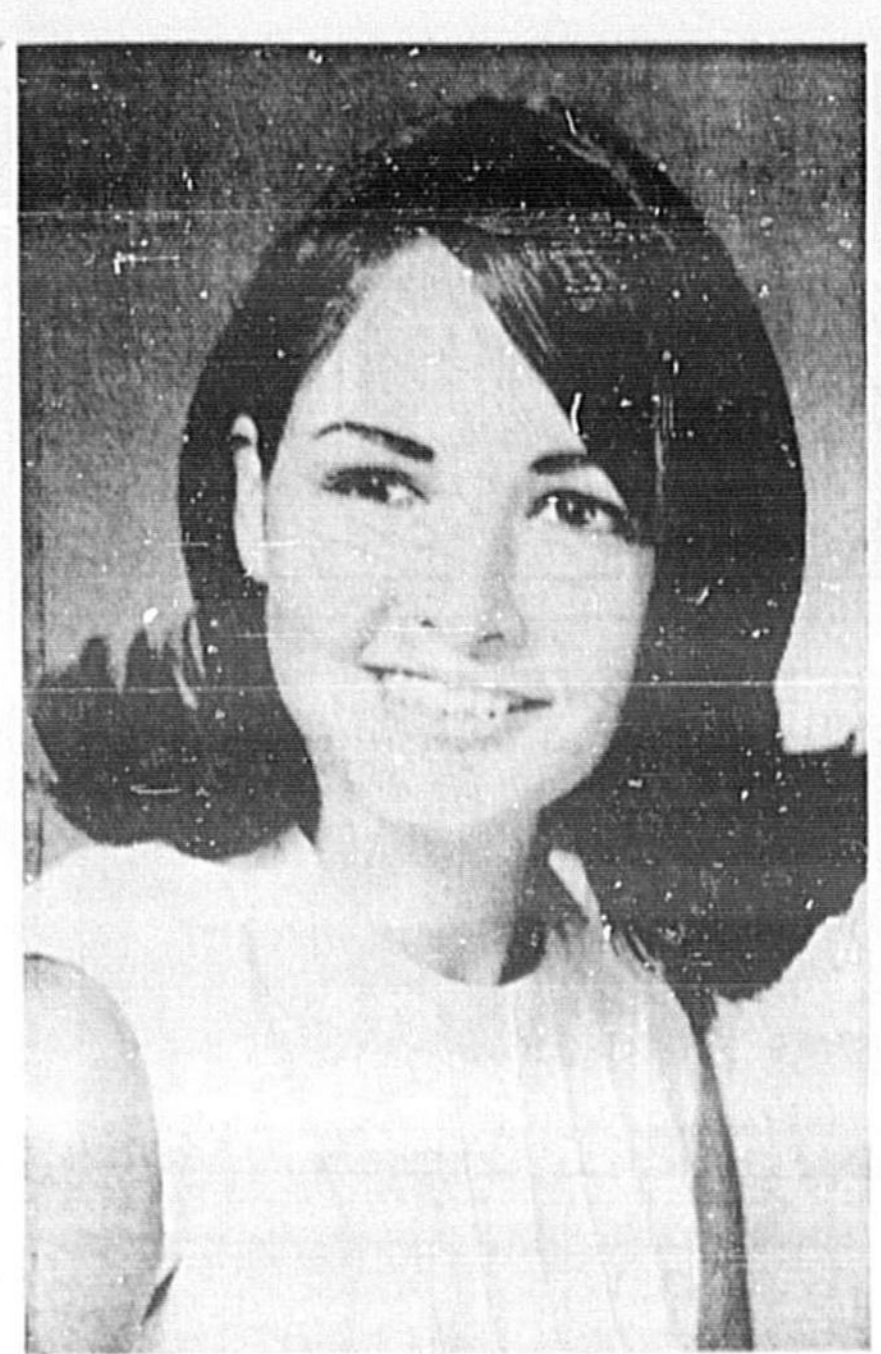
