

# 1,400 Cops Put On Juvenile Duty To Curb Violent Youth Gangs

Police officers in New York City were ordered today to devote a portion of their time to patrolling the streets for juvenile delinquents, as part of a new strategy to curb violent youth gangs.

The police department announced that 1,400 officers would be assigned to juvenile duty, a move that would increase the number of officers patrolling the city's streets.

The new strategy was announced by Police Commissioner Thomas E. Dewey, who said that the police department had received reports of a sharp increase in juvenile delinquency in recent months.

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## Cone Photographs One-Sixth Of Earth On Record Flight

WASHINGTON (UPI) — One-sixth of the earth has been photographed from a record altitude of 70,000 feet by a camera in an Atlas intercontinental missile's nose cone.

The Air Force said the pictures were made on a 16-mile-long flight during the 5,100-mile flight of an Atlas over the Atlantic missile range Aug. 24.

The film showed a vast sweep covering parts of North America, the Pacific and Atlantic oceans, northwest Africa, Nova Scotia, the eastern seaboard of the United States and Mexico.

It showed such phenomena as a massive weather system extending all the way from Florida to England. At any instant, it showed a straight line distance on the earth of about 2,000 miles.

The film was launched from Cape Canaveral. The camera began taking pictures immediately after the re-entry vehicle separated from the Atlas booster missile.

The film ran for 16 minutes, from an altitude of 100 miles to the peak of the trajectory at 70,000 miles, or halfway from Canaveral to Ascension Island, where the data capsule was recovered.

## Doctor's Mistress Asks Separate Trial

POMONA, Calif. (UPI) — The mad-helmed mistress of a prominent society doctor charged with murder of his estranged wife was back in jail today while her attorney took legal steps to obtain a separate trial for her.

Carole Tregoff, 25, and her former paramour, Dr. E. Bernard Finch, 41, appeared together Monday for arraignment on murder charges for the July 18 slaying of Finch's wife, Barbara, 38.

Finch pleaded innocent and was bound over for trial Nov. 24. The attractive Miss Tregoff, who admitted she had been Finch's mistress, entered no plea.

Miss Tregoff's attorney, Robert Neeb Jr., argued that the murder charge against her was based on her "simply being present at the scene of the crime and a few other little factors."

Neeb also sought to have Miss Tregoff released on bail but was turned down by Judge James C. Whyte. Finch made no such attempt and the lovers were returned to the Los Angeles County jail.

Deputy Dist. Atty. Fred N. Whichecko has charged that Finch and Miss Tregoff planned the murder of Finch's wife so the doctor would not have to share \$750,000 in community property with her in a divorce settlement.

Whichecko said Miss Tregoff's role was that of a conspirator and said he did not believe she participated in the actual slaying.

## Ike In 'Toughest' Talk Today

PARIS (UPI) — President Eisenhower arrived in Paris today to a welcome that was cordial and friendly but far from the tumultuous demonstrations that overwhelmed him in London and Rome.

His companion of World War II, French President Charles de Gaulle, greeted Eisenhower with a warm welcome at Le Bourget airport when his plane arrived from London.

Eisenhower pledged to continue with de Gaulle on the "single goal of peace with justice" for the world and the French people. He gave his high words of peace.

Eisenhower came here with his "peace is possible" campaign for the final and perhaps toughest round of talks with the major allies in preparation for his meetings with Russia's Nikita S. Khrushchev.

Tens of thousands of Frenchmen turned out along Eisenhower's route in Paris, cheering and applauding as he drove with de Gaulle into the heart of the city.

The cordiality was evident, even in the strongly Communist neighborhood near the La Villette skyscrapers, but there were

posters and not too many flags along that section of the route.

Replying to de Gaulle's welcome address, Eisenhower at once indicated his determination to seek agreement with the French despite their deep suspicions of his trip and coming meetings with Khrushchev.

"Now we have an opportunity in these troublesome times to talk together and to concert all our efforts to one single goal of peace with justice," said the President.

In his speech of welcome, de Gaulle addressed Eisenhower as the "brave glorious leader of the armies of liberty. You are great-

est of a country which is dear to France above all in the world."

In Washington, the head of Eisenhower's secret police, Maj. Gen. Milton S. Eisenhower, is checking on early arrangements for the visit of Khrushchev.

Official sources said today that Khrushchev and a top aide visiting the various cities where Khrushchev will stop and checking the routes along which he will travel during his 12-day tour beginning Sept. 15.

Khrushchev is head of Russia's KGB, the super-secret police organization charged with internal security in the Soviet Union and protection of top Russian officials.

## Army-Air Force Merger Studies Receive Backing

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congress is having second thoughts about its decision 12 years ago to establish the Air Force as a separate service.

The House Government Operations Committee disclosed Tuesday night it has endorsed a proposal to merge the Air Force and Army.

The committee is looking toward the merger of the Army and Air Force.

"Until the Air Force and Army are merged in a single service," it said, "the costs of defense will never be higher, duplication and waste will grow, and the nation will be exposed to the vitiating effects of inter-service jealousies, rivalries and wars for many years to come."

## Now You See Him, Now You Don't!

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Former Gov. Millard F. Caldwell announced today that he will not run for governor next year.

Caldwell said his decision was final and based on the fact that he just could not in the final analysis get my own consent.

Just Tuesday, Caldwell told United Press International that it was a "safe bet" he would run. He also has told some friends he was going to make the race.

Asked why he changed his mind overnight, the former governor said:

"I just plain did not want to do it. . . . And I could not bring myself to believe otherwise."

"The major thing that changed my mind is that every time I received substantial encouragement, I found myself resisting the idea and counting the reasons why I should not do it."

He said also that he was fairly convinced that he could win the governorship if he ran "and perhaps it was not enough of a challenge."

He said there is no candidate now being discussed in the field who represents his basic philosophies and he can not see where there will be any issues in the 1960 race.

"It looks like it's going to be just a popularity contest," he said. "They're all being nice to everybody and tolerant of all beliefs. I have talked to all the potential candidates and I like them all. . . . But they are all just 'in' to me."

## Hoffa Gets Squeeze By Orlando Bank On Fund Transfer

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Treasurer Boon James R. Hoffa appeared today to be caught in a squeeze between his union's court-appointed monitors and a Florida banker.

The monitors want him to transfer \$200,000 belonging to Local 502, Hoffa's "home" local in Detroit, from the Florida National Bank of Orlando, Fla., to another bank where it will earn interest.

Hoffa has told the monitors he's willing to make the transfer.

But the bank's president told United Press International Tuesday night that he was "honoring Hoffa's draft because Hoffa agreed to keep the money on deposit as loan collateral. Hoffa refused to confirm or deny this."

The three monitors were scheduled to meet today to consider their next move. They could report the matter to Federal Judge F. Dickinson Letts, who appointed them as the union's watchdog. Or they could issue a formal recommendation calling on Hoffa to make the transfer.

O. P. Hewitt Jr., president of the Orlando bank, said Hoffa agreed in 1956 to keep the money on deposit as collateral against a loan to Sun Valley, Inc. The corporation planned to use the money to develop a housing project in Broward County.

Hewitt said Sun Valley is controlled by Henry Lower. A Treasurer spokesman said Lower is an acquaintance of Hoffa and that Hoffa once held but did not exercise an option to buy into the corporation.

According to Hewitt, Sun Valley has been in default on a debt of \$300,000, plus interest, for nearly two years. The original loan was for \$450,000.

The retired carpenter had lived in Geneva since 1942 and was a member of the First Baptist Church and a charter member of the United Spanish War Veterans, Gen. Lawton Camp No. 15 of Daytona Beach.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Annie B. Wagoner of Geneva; four sisters, Mrs. Nettie Bailey and Mrs. Elsie Johnson, both of Atlanta; Mrs. Perry Johnson of Athens, Ga. and Mrs. Nellie Bailey of La Grange, Ga.

Funeral services will be at 10 a. m. Friday in the Geneva Baptist Church, with Rev. Jack Stewart officiating. Burial will be in Geneva cemetery. Brison Funeral Home will be in charge.

## Nehru Eases Indian Crisis, Praises Menon

NEW DELHI (UPI) — Premier Jawaharlal Nehru told a tense assembly in Parliament today that India's defense crisis had been eased by the withdrawal of Lt. Gen. K. S. Thimayya's resignation as army chief of staff.

Nehru heaped praise on Defense Minister V. K. Krishna Menon, making no mention of the fact that he also had offered to resign in the crisis touched off by his alleged playing politics with the armed forces.

The Premier also had nothing to say about the nation's other chief of staff, Vice Adm. R. D. Katari and Air Marshal S. Mukerjee, who handed in their resignations along with Thimayya.

Nehru said there is no truth to reports that Menon had been allowing favoritism or political factors to influence army promotions.

In Calcutta beleaguered police units opened fire on Communist-led mobs at least four times Tuesday night, killing at least seven rioters and wounding more than 1,800.

The riots virtually paralyzed Calcutta, and it appeared likely that the army might take over unless order could be quickly restored.

## Gas Tax Boost To Be Debated

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A penny increase in federal gasoline taxes today was cleared for a showdown in the House Thursday on a "take it or leave it" basis.

The House Rules Committee cleared the highway financing plan for debate under a procedure which will bar all amendments. A vote on passage is likely by night-fall Thursday.

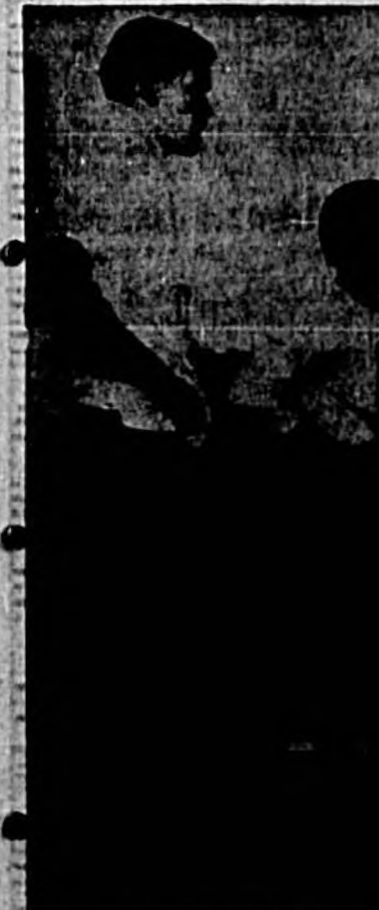

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# Single Vote Upholds Veto Of Works Bill

**Both Sides Shift Votes In Decision**  
WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House today by one vote failed to override President Eisenhower's veto of the \$1,267,000,000 public works bill and gave him a stunning legislative victory.

The vote upset all advance predictions and kept intact Eisenhower's record of never having had a vote overturned by Congress.

In a stunning setback to Democratic leaders, the House voted 274 to 159 to override. This was one vote short of the required two-thirds majority.

The bill's passage was achieved when several Republicans who had voted to override the veto changed their votes after the rollcall had been completed. They did so after some Democrats who had voted to sustain the veto switched and voted to override.

The projects include those in Florida: International Waterway, Caloosahatchee River to Apalachicola River (\$20,000); improvement in local interests for work on two Apalachicola Bay projects, \$20,000 for channel at East Point and \$20,000 for St. George Island.

**Residents Petition For Drainage Aid**  
Flood and bad drainage conditions in the Lakewood and Magnolia Ave. districts of south Seminole County brought complaints to the county commission today.

Water when it rains here has sometimes against the side of the house, said Edward A. Powell, 1902 Magnolia Ave. The stagnant water produces bad odors and mosquitoes, said Ray T. Williams, 1907 Magnolia.

"The only outlet to draw off water is the drainage ditch, which has the right to be dry most of the time," said Powell. "As deep as the drainage ditch is, the houses, consequently stagnant water remains constantly in these ditches, making an unsanitary condition and breeding myriads of mosquitoes. Spraying tanks along the street are needed and do not operate," said the petition signed by 20 neighborhood residents.

A dry well 12 inches in diameter would quadruple the capacity of the present six inch wide Orange County well, Seminole County Engineer Robert Davis said. He and Orange County Engineer Fred DeWitt have discussed the two committees jointly replacing the six inch well with one 12 inches wide. The new one would cost about \$3,000.

The work should be given priority along with the Bear and Cat Lake projects, the commission voted yesterday. Davis, DeWitt and commissioner Vernon Dunn were to discuss the project today.

**Another Official Gets Negro Threat**  
MONTGOMERY, Ala. (UPI) — State Highway Director Sam Engelhardt, a former state chairman of the White Citizens' Council, says he has been "tried in absentia and sentenced to death" by a northern Negro group.

Engelhardt said he received the threatening letter from the "National Negro Congress of the U. S. A., Supreme Headquarters, Inc., 1220 Bedford Ave., Brooklyn, N. Y." The letter was signed by "Rufus T. Washington III."

Sheriff Willie McCall of Leesburg asked the FBI Tuesday to investigate a similar letter sent to him Monday and signed by the same group.

The letter to Engelhardt said he had been condemned for his "crimes against the glorious Negro race."

The highway chief turned the letter over to the FBI for investigation but discounted any threat saying he had received such letters in the past.

The Brooklyn address is that of a chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, but NAACP officials denied ever hearing of Washington.

About \$5,000 is needed by the local unit to keep its program going. All funds raised locally will be spent in the county.

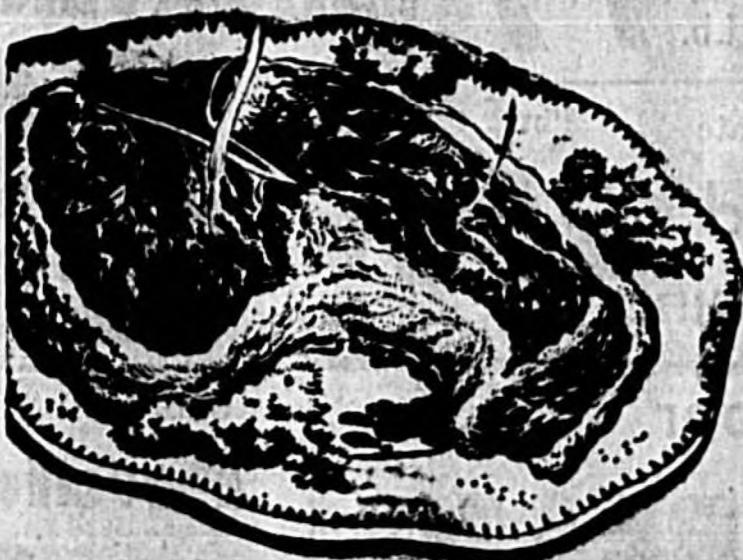

# Businessman Speaks Up For Service

George Tandy, vice president of the First Federal Bank & Loan Assoc., spoke at the Rotary meeting this evening on the subject "Are Our Business Ethics All They Used To Be?"

"Our business men are entitled to be clever when they want to be wise," Tandy said, quoting the author and publisher, Frank Lloyd Wright. He stressed the third rule of the Four Way Test: "Will it build good will and better friendships?"

"Our business men can defeat a local competitor, but they may be injured by the competitor of us all," Tandy said.

"Only an institution can survive if it is dedicated only to profit," he said. "It must make a contribution to society as well as a profit for itself. It is to survive, it must show as much as it takes. It must be success-dominated, but not at the expense of its own survival."

"Business survival depends not on self preservation, but on community service. No profits more who serves best," Tandy said.

As long as our businessmen are pushing that idea, we're safe.

The county school board estimated a few weeks ago that there would be an enrollment this year of 10,084 students. As of Tuesday, there were 10,023 enrolled.

That's pretty good predicting and it goes to show that the school people have been working hard all summer. The fact that they have devised ways to prepare for a number of students to vary close to the actual enrollment shows they know what they're doing.

Enrollment this term apparently will be about 1,000 more than last year. If the school officials can keep up with the anticipated growth in the coming years as well as they have this time and plan—and be furnished the funds—for more and better schools, Seminole County ought to wind up well-educated.

LONDON (UPI)—There is the least of Adolf Hitler's "Proclamation to the German Armed Forces" on Sept. 1, 1939, that triggered World War II.

"The Polish state has rejected the peaceful settlement of our relations as neighbors, for which I have driven, and indeed has appeared to arms."

"The Germans in Poland are being persecuted with bloody terror and driven from farms and lands. A series of frontier violations, intolerable for a great power, proves that the Poles no longer are willing to respect the German Reich frontier. There remains for me no other means of putting an end to the madness but from now on to meet force with force."

"The German armed forces will wage with stern determination the struggle for the honor of the German people that once more has arisen."

"I expect that every soldier, mindful of the great tradition of eternal German soldierhood, will fulfill his duty to the last."

"Remember always and in all situations that you are representatives of National Socialist Greater Germany."

"Long live our people and our Reich."

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# Assignment Washington

WASHINGTON—A rat can look at a big, but we've had rats looking at our President. From across the street from the White House.

This has been going on for some time, and a lot of tourists who've come to Washington with the thought that a visitor shouldn't be surprised at anything he sees here have taken this rat invasion of Lafayette Square with quiet indignity.

Lafayette is where folks like Bernard Baruch have done their contemplative in park benches. It's a picturesque, flowery, grassy plot shaded by ornamental trees. It affords a nice view for the President and the First Lady, but, rats—rats!

A few weeks ago, a couple from West Ridge, Cal., almost jumped out of their skins when a rat jumped out at them. Other rats bounded boldly from one bush to another, feasting on leftovers that tourists had fed squirrels and pigeons.

They complained to Senator Gordon Allott (R-Colo.). He checked with the National Park Service people. Yes, they said, rats in all downtown parts of Washington.

Things had gotten so bad that several weeks ago park service officials fired their old exterminator and hired a new one. Since then, nearly 100 rats have been killed by cyanide gas in Lafayette Park alone.

What about the White House itself? Any rats there? Nobody there would admit it. But I have a fascinating story of one rat-killing expedition at the executive mansion. It happened in 1952 during Teddy Roosevelt's term.

As the published account goes, a professional rat exterminator, who used trained ferrets, was secretly assigned to get rid of the White House pests. A reporter friend, William Atherton Depuy, talked the man into letting him go along as "assistant."

That evening, disguised as a workman, reporter Depuy was waved through the White House

# U.S. To Bore, Scare Or Tire Nikita

WASHINGTON (UPI)—From the hundreds of invitations pouring in here for Nikita Khrushchev's forthcoming visit, it's hard to say whether the plan is to bore him to death, scare him to death, or just wear him out.

His presence is being sought for civic club luncheons, local fairs, and meetings of county commissions. It has been suggested he would enjoy visiting a Glenridge, N. J., girl scout troop and the junior women's club of Elk Grove Village, Ill. He also has been urged to attend a turkey day fete in Worthington, Minn., and to address the Brooklyn Ocean Front Men's Civic and Social Club.

Defense officials are offering him a guided tour of secret missile and bomber bases. It is said that watching an Atlas missile blast off its pad, or a B-52 jet leap from the runway, is an experience to shake anybody, even one of us natives if we could get security clearance to see it.

President Eisenhower said he wants Khrushchev to see ordinary homes, maybe those at Levittown, Pa.; a view of the Washington area from the helicopter; farm country; and the boyhood home of Abilene, Kan., where he said he can prove how hard he worked as a youth.

Nothing much is firm yet on which invitations Khrushchev will accept. Meantime they arrive in each mail. Ambassador Mikhail Menshikov says the Russian embassy is considering "hundreds" already in hand. Some 150 invitations have reached the State Department, for consideration and relay if desired.

Khrushchev has expressed an interest in Washington, New York, Chicago, San Francisco, a corn farm at Coon Rapids, Iowa; Florida; a plastics plant. He also wants to go on TV, but no decision has been reached on who ought to be scheduled. So do a whole batch of cities with not near so good an excuse. All Los Angeles wants is the Democratic National Convention next year.

The National Coal Assn. thinks an old miner like Khrushchev may want to go underground while he's here. It is offering a nice choice of mines for his visit. A Detroit salt mine has been made available by the International Salt Co., in case he would feel more at home there.

Tyler, Tex., has asked the State Department to invite Khrushchev to visit Van Cibus, the pianist who proved music lovers in Moscow, at Tyler, "the epitome of small town America." Well, not quite the epitome. There's Kilgore, Tex., about 20 miles away, where Cibus actually lives. According to Tyler folks, Kilgore is too small to accommodate Khrushchev's big party.

# 'Spoilers' Halt Sox, Dodger Drives

Take it from the White Sox, Dodgers and Braves—a "spoiler" is a pennant contender's worst enemy in September.

The true "spoiler" almost always is a fellow who'll have to pay his way into the World Series in October but is happy to spoil the party for the contenders. And, more often than not, he's a pretty ordinary performer except where his favorite opponent is involved.

Jim Bunning of the Tigers, Larry Jackson of the Cardinals and Don Cardwell of the Phillies all pretty much fit that description today—much to the chagrin of the contending White Sox, Dodgers and Braves.

Bunning, rocking along on a no-no season, extended his career mastery over the White Sox to 18-3 Tuesday night when his three-hitter gave the Tigers a 4-0 win over the American League leaders. The loss snapped the White Sox' five-game winning streak and altered their lead over the idle second-place Cleveland Indians to five games.

Jackson, a "300-pitcher" since he joined the Cardinals in 1953 and struggling to beat last mark all this season, raised his career mark against the Dodgers to 12-3 with a two-hitter that gave St. Louis a 3-0 win. The defeat dropped the Dodgers 1½ games behind the idle first-place San Francisco Giants and to within two games of the fourth-place Pittsburgh Pirates.

Cardwell, a 23-year-old right-hander had won one game up to July 1 but has been knocking off contenders with happy abandon ever since. He's won a mere nine games this season—and seven of them have been against the four top contenders. He picked out the Braves Tuesday night pitching a six-hitter and hitting a two-run ninth-inning homer for the Phillies' 3-0 victory.

Harmon Killebrew hit his 20th homer as the Washington Senators downed the Boston Red Sox, 7-4, and Whitey Ford and Ryne Duren combined in a seven-hitter as the New York Yankees whipped the Baltimore Orioles, 6-0, in other games.

Harvey Kuenn hit a double and three singles to raise his average to .336 and lead Detroit's 12-hit attack on 14-game winner Bob Shaw. Bunning, meanwhile, walked two batters in the first inning but did not allow a White Sox runner to reach second as he struck out eight the rest of the way. It was his first shutout of the season.

Jackson's second shutout of the year ended Johnny Podres' four-game winning streak and prevented the Dodgers from moving to within a half game of the Giants.

Ken Boyer, who stretched his hitting streak to 20 games, and Alex Grammas homered for the Cardinals.

Cardwell, who had made only one single in 44 previous at-bats, homered off Bob Buhl in the ninth to hand the Braves their fifth loss in eight games. The Phillies had taken the lead with three runs in the sixth inning but Joe Adcock homered in the bottom of the frame to tie the score.

Killebrew tied Cleveland's Rocky Colavito for the American League home run lead and also completed

the circuit of homering in every park with a 300-foot chest off Boston's Al Schroll. The Senators clinched the division in the eighth when Billy Conesa singled home one run, and Roy Sievers doubled home two more.

The Yankees sent Ford off tops 3-0 lead in the first inning with the salvo of five singles and a sacrifice fly against 26-year-old Jerry Walker. The little lefty, who won his 14th game, was lifted in favor of Duren when the first two Baltimore batters singled in the seventh.

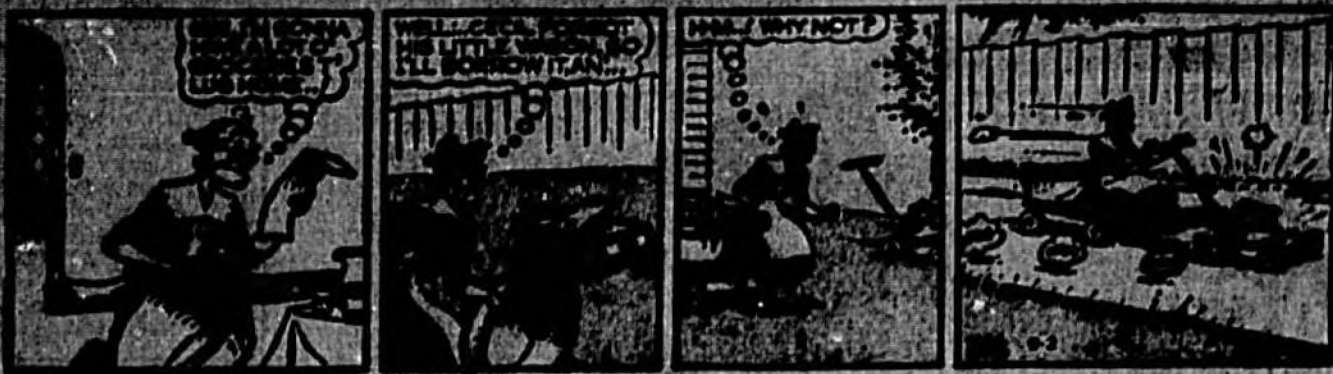

**Ward, North Carolina Schools**

Eight Negroes attend white public schools in Durham, N. C., today for the first time.

In other school integration developments, limited integration in Wadesboro, N. C., was scheduled to begin today for the third consecutive year. As in the case of Tuesday's school openings at Arlington, Va., and High Point, N. C., where Negroes attended previously all-white and predominantly white schools for the first time, no incidents were reported.

Several other North Carolina cities opened schools Tuesday to integrated classes without incident.

Other Virginia cities scheduled to hold integrated classes open today when most other southern public schools open.

One incident in the Delaware school district in Arkansas, which postponed its opening until Tuesday, Sept. 21, to await the results of a hearing before the U. S. Court of Appeals. The Delaware district is seeking to stay a federal district court's order which has ordered three Negroes integrated in a white high school.

Integration was reported in Virginia, where Negroes are petitioning boards, courts and officials for more integration.

One unusual highlight in the integration picture was the refusal of 77 Negro students to attend a Negro school at Fort Tampa, Fla. The school had been erected for the Negroes when they sought to integrate the white elementary school. But Tuesday they refused to attend the new four-room Negro school and Negroes picketed the building.

**Maine To Stress Driver Education**

AUGUSTA, Me. (UPI) — A drastic change in the driver's license requirements for boys and girls in the State of Maine will be used in an attempt to cut down on the rising number of motor vehicle accidents involving teen-agers.

The state legislature recently passed an act raising the minimum driving age from 15 to 17, unless the applicant has successfully completed an approved driver education course.

Under current law, any youngster may obtain a license at the age of 15, provided he or she has passed a written examination and a road test.

The new act provides that any youngster under the age of 17 must complete either the standard high school driver education course or a commercial driver training school course approved by the State Department of Education.

### The Works Proposal Defeated

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Appropriations Committee, chaired by President Eisenhower's vote of a public works bill today rejected a new bill tailored to meet all his objections.

The committee rejected, by a 20 to 19 vote, a measure which had been stripped of 67 projects to which the president objected.

The committee then voted, 20 to 19, to turn over to a subcommittee the task of drafting another bill. The subcommittee planned its first meeting this afternoon.

Eisenhower was a tremendous victory Wednesday when the House, by a one-vote margin, failed to override his veto of the bill, often referred to as the "anti-works" measure. The veto of the bill would have appropriated \$2,500,000 for the public works program.

Committee members included some who demanded that any new bill include at least some of the 67 disputed projects. Others wanted to eliminate some projects the president approved.

### Argentine 'Rebel' Generals Detain

BUENOS AIRES (UPI) — Argentine "rebel" generals barred new challenges to President Arturo Frondisi's government today, rejecting his dismissal of Gen. Carlos R. Toranzo Montoro as commander of the army.

The Cordoba garrison and the anti-aircraft academy in the Mar del Plata had proclaimed their open defiance of the government order, and a "great majority" of the nation's other garrisons were reported siding with Toranzo.

Gen. Pedro S. Castaneda, chosen by the government to replace Toranzo, said he had no idea how soon he would be able to assume command.

The Cordoba garrison, cradle of the revolution that overthrew President Juan D. Peron in 1955, was the first sizeable military organization to reject Toranzo's dismissal.

### Labor Bill Approval Expected

WASHINGTON (UPI) — An 84-vote majority in the House is expected to pass the labor bill today by a vote of 84 to 76, according to the House floor manager, Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson, who said he would hold the vote tonight, if necessary, to get it passed. The House was expected to follow suit Friday.

Virtually everyone in the Senate except Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) looked forward to the vote although many were not entirely pleased with all the provisions in the bill.

Another highly displeased person was Teamster President James R. Hoffa, whose giant union was the prime target of the bill. Hoffa called it "a last day for labor."

Morse, a member of the conference committee which forged the compromise Wednesday after 12 days of negotiations, said he would speak at some length to explain why he refused to sign the conference report.

Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell hailed the legislation, with his new curbs on "backlash" picketing and secondary boycotts, as "the type the president has long requested" to stamp out union racketeering.

He promised it would be used "only to help labor and management clean their ranks of corrupt elements" and not "to hurt unions or harass management."

He said "no honest trade unionist or employer had anything to fear."

Rep. Robert F. Griffin (D-Mich.) and Phil Landrum (D-Ga.), co-authors of the House bill, said the compromise was basically their measure "with a few clarifying amendments."

### Mr. J. S. White II Dies At His Home

The Election Board recently appointed by Mayor Williams and approved by the aldermen is legally unauthorized to conduct election of a Charter Board Sept. 5, say plaintiffs C. Raymond McCord, Benjamin N. Evans, Herman E. Joyce and Joseph Mulson. Election Board members must be elected by qualified town electors, according to Florida law, the plaintiffs declared.

The Election Board chosen by the mayor and aldermen July 13 is composed of Raymond Morris, Junius Allen, David Thomas and Rocco Burrows.

The Board was to serve in the election of a five person Charter Board which would prepare a new Casselberry town charter.

### Menon To Remain Head of India's U.N. Delegation

NEW DELHI (UPI) — Premier Jawaharlal Nehru said today Defense Minister V. K. Krishna Menon will head India's U. N. delegation this year as usual despite the Communist threat to the northern borders.

Nehru spoke in Parliament in answer to a pointed question from Socialist leader Acharya Kripalani, who asked whether it was wise for the defense minister to leave India at a time of crisis.

"The country's defense is in my hands," Nehru said. "If necessary, further arrangements could be made without difficulty. The defense minister could be called back."

Kripalani was active earlier in the week in a campaign led by the opposition in an effort to force Menon to resign.

Newspapers here said today India is preparing to rush troops north to meet the threat of Communist infiltration of the border states of Bhutan and Sikkim.

The Hindustan Standard said a regiment of Gurkhas, tough mountain men from the border state of Nepal, is reported already on the way from Darjeeling to an unannounced point.

Unconfirmed reports earlier this week said armed Reds from China had already invaded Bhutan. Other Communist units were reported massing opposite Lachen and the Natula Pass, points where it is practical for men in large numbers to cross the rugged Sikkim border.

## Eisenhower Says NATO Has 'No Second Place'

PARIS (UPI) — President Eisenhower assured the Western Allies today there are no "second place" nations in NATO. He called on the 15 members of the North Atlantic Alliance to stand firm behind their collective principles in the interest of world peace.

The President made a sudden, uncheduled visit to NATO headquarters before beginning top secret talks with French President Charles de Gaulle in an effort to heal their glaring differences before Eisenhower meets with Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev.

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### News Programs Gain Exemption

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate today passed by voice vote and sent to the White House a bill exempting news programs from the requirement that equal time be granted to political candidates.

The measure, drafted by Senate House conferees, was approved by the House Wednesday, 85 to 70.

No dissenting Senate votes were heard. Approval came, however, only after brief but lively debate in which several senators expressed concern over the exemption provided for regularly scheduled news panel shows.

Sen. Clark M. Rorabacher (D-Calif.) said his concern over the panel shows stems out of his own political experience and the kind of treatment he said newspapers have given to Democratic candidates. He called radio and TV "the last refuge" for campaigning Democrats.

Clark said he did not want to see broadcasters and television free to "give us the business the way the newspapers of the nation have."

### Bill To Hike Bond Interest Okayed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Ways and Means Committee today approved by voice vote a bill to permit payment of higher interest on government savings bonds.

The legislation which Democratic leaders plan to ram through Congress before adjournment would permit higher interest on bonds now held by an estimated 60 million persons, as well as on bonds purchased in the future.

The bill would allow President Eisenhower to ignore the present 2.5% per cent ceiling on interest rates paid on Series E and H bonds.

But the committee rejected 14 to 11 a move to broaden the measure so it would also permit the Treasury to disregard the 4% per cent interest rate limit on marketable government securities.

Eisenhower has hinted he might call Congress back into special session this fall if it adjourns without repealing the 4% per cent ceiling on marketable securities as well as that on savings bonds.

Circusland is designed to have a town and country motif, according to Marshall. The eight blocks of Circusland town will contain educational and merchandising exhibits, with goods to be sold. Buildings as permanent as those in any town will be constructed on a seven-eighths scale, he said.

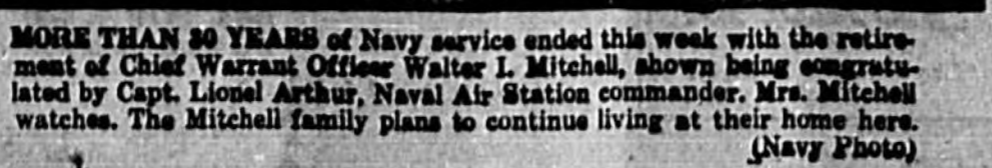
### Canaveral Wage Dispute Settled
