First, if the hands have finshed high, the shoulders have maintained a vertical plane and the weight and hips have shifted almost completeerally have nothing to check. Using the follow-through as a checkpoint, I would have to conclude that the swing was executed properly. On the other hand, if one of these checkpoints has gone awry, then I start looking for the trouble spots. A bad follow-through itself only says trouble is present; it does not point directly to the error it-self. Sometimes, I use the follow-through to help me correct a small error that has been hard to pinpoint by any.
