Printing Press Money

In spite of President Roosevelt's persistence in his pol-icy of credit expansion, propagands for currency inflation continues. Senator Harrison, chairman of the powerful Senate finance committee, led off the other day with a strong plea for more money. He was followed by our own Senator Fletcher, chairman of the Senate banking committee, and Senator Pittman of the Senate foreign rela-ions committee, both powerful men in this administration, and both committed to greenbacks and free silver.

None of them has yet suggested how it is proposed to get this new money into circulation once the government decides to create it. It is necessary of course that the money be put into circulation if it is to do any "good." It would have little effect at all if it were printed, or minted, and simply allowed to remain in the treasury vaults. The question is what is the government going to do with the money once it is made.

That is a rather touchy problem and possibly accounts for the reason why the inflationists are saying very little about distribution. It might be out into circulation by paying the soldiers' bonus. But that would make a lot of people sore who were not soldiers and not entitled to any bonus. Or it might be distributed by paying it out to depositors who lost money in the banks which were closed on March 4. DAY, SEPT. 16, 1938 But that would seem to be an infustice to those depositors who lost their money in banks which closed prior to that time.






