





Revision Needed In Social Security Plan

THE SOARING burden of the Social Security tax - corresponding to soaring benefits - has finally caught the attention of worried

Instead of proceeding from a benefit base, says the author of a Brookings Institution study. federal policy must adopt a finance system that recognizes the taxpayers' inability to absorb steadily increasing payroll deductions.

The Social Security tax, John A. Brittain points out, has grown faster than any other tax since World War II.

And in 1972, it made up more than one-fifth of total U.S. tax revenue.

When conceived 35 years ago, Social Security had a simple, single objective: to supplement savings, private insurance and other investments in replacing income lost upon

Today, Social Security pensions are considered adequate only if they are high enough to provide full support for the elderly.

THE BILL to the worker in 1972 went up to \$936 - assuming that he earned the maximum in covered earnings and considering the reality that the so-called "employer's contribution" comes inevitably from the employe's paycheck. In 1973 the tab will be \$1,263.80. In 1974, it will

spiral to \$1,404. More than increased benefits is involved in the escalation of the payroll tax. Coverage has been extended to workers in virtually all fields of employment. The wife and children of retired workers have been brought into the program.

Survivor benefits have been instituted. Disability payments and medicare benefits have placed further demands on the workers'

And benefits no longer are tied to earnings. The contribution rate is virtually ignored in establishment of minimum pensions. Mounting pressures for a national health

Solution To Atomic Waste?

insurance program hint at further demands on the Social Security System. Pleas for earlier retirement ages for workers and widows suggest higher and higher costs.

WHY HAS THE tax-conscious American public allowed without protest such proliferate assaults on the paycheck?

Not entirely innocently, the working man has been led to believe that Social Security is a form of compulsory insurance that will alleviate poverty, principally his own. He assumes that payments are listed under his name, accumulating over the years until they are disbursed to him on his retirement. Neither assumption remains true.

Further, since he does not total up deductions and exemptions against the Social Security tax on his income tax return, often he is unaware of the disproportionate rise in the assessment. Neither does he comprehend that it is a "poor man's tax" collected inequitably at the expense of low and middle-income families.

Nor is the working man aware that the reserve base of the Social Security trust fund has been slashed from an amount sufficient to cover a year's payouts to a nine-month level. Federal officials in both political parties have expressed fear of "future problems."

MEANWHILE a generous Congress prepares future benefit increases. U.S. News and World Report notes that by the year 2011, a retired couple could be getting monthly checks of \$2,729. The combined bite from employe and employer would be \$10,688 a month.

Such a peek into the future emphasizes the need to overhaul the Social Security System now.





Nine Out of Ten

If there is anyone who doubts the need to reform the nation's welfare system, he has only to read some recent spot studies to realize the incredible amount of graft which cheats the poor, the disabled and the taxpaver

These spot findings are back of President Nixon's decision to clamp down hard on welfare management. In one recent case, a spot check was made in one county on roughly 400 welfare recipients whose employers had reported earnings of \$1,600 or more in the three months checked. This check was limited to recipients who had given their correct names and Social Security numbers About one out of nine, it was found, had given an honest report of their earnings. In this sampling, the 400 had reported a combined i

come of less than \$400,000 for the three months. Their employers listed earnings of roughly \$800,000. That is, these recipients had been earning during this three-month period at an average rate of reughly \$8,000 . a year-but had been reporting earnings at the rate of \$3,900 a year.

More than a fourth of those in this sample reported no income at all during the three months. But investigation showed they had earnings, at an annual rate, in excess of \$8,400 The cheating was actually greater than indicated above

The earnings reports did not include self-employed in come, or jobs for which the worker had been paid in cash by an employer not under unemployment insurance. In many cases where several members of a family had earnings, there was no way to draw these numbers together and thus learn the total earnings per family. The investigators said they would assume that on average, those who listed their right name and Social Security number probably were less likely to be serious cheaters than those who worked under one

name and Social Security number and collected welfare payments under another name and number. Incidentally, these studies did not report on special assistance to the aged, blind or disabled, nor aid to chil-

If the men and women who deservedly need aid are to receive what they require, and if the taxpayer is to be allowed to keep enough to provide a decent life for himself and family with all the demands of government, education and growing living costs which he now faces, there is no national problem deserving of more urgency than the elimination of grossly illegal payments to welfare

Nonvoters Mostly Of the Minorities

WASHINGTON (NEA There were, by Census Bureau estimates, 139 million Americans potentially eligible to vote in the 1972 presidential election. Of these, 100 million were registered. Yet only about 76 million voters cast their ballots, o

54.5 per cent of potentially eligible voters. In other words, 24 million Americans registered but did not bother to vote and an additional 39 million did not register at all-a total of 63 million Americans who, for whatever reasons, did not participate in this most basic function of citizenship. The result was that the United States maintained its record of having the consistently lowest voter turnout of all the democracies.

Without a doubt Malcom already holds the title of a "walking boxing encyclopedia" of Central Florida. There's not too much that escapes the knowledgeable "man about town" when it comes to sports and boxing especially. The first of what Tait hopes to be a series of boxing shows

is slated for the Orlando Sports Stadium this coming Wednesday, Jan. 10 and it promises to be a ready dandy. Tait is really keen on this show and feels the two "feature" bouts that have been lined up should be enough to get the Florida boxing fan's adrenalin flowing as it never has

Heading the Jan. 10 program is a lightheavy battle between Mike Quarry and Paul Kasper. Quarry was the number one ranking lightheavy prior to his loss to the light

Tait feels Quarry is already quite a boxer at the tender age of 21. "He's already had 38 fights," says Tait. "And he's been fighting only two and a half years. It used to be that it

took around five years for a tighter to get 40 bouts."

Quarry has won 36 lost one and had one draw during his career. He currently holds the number seven spot in the lightheavy class ratings. It's amazing that he dropped that



far after the loss to Foster since he has beaten just about all of the fighters who are ranked ahead of him. Kasper, like Quarry is of Irish descent, but unlike Quarry is one mean fellow, in and out of the ring. His manner in and out of the ring is the reason he has been given the nickname

Tait says Kasper supposedly has the style of the late great Rocky Marciano, in that he is continually coming at you. Kasper has been saying that he will dispose of Quarry in seven rounds. Whether he has the "guns" to back up the promise remains to be seen. Kasper has a 44-11 record thus

"The pairing of Kasper and Quarry is really the fight promoters dream," tells Tait. "You have the boxer going against the fighter and with those ingredients there is little chance for a dull fight."

Present plans call for two-minute rounds in all of the fights on the program. Should this hold true it could make for even more action since the longer rounds tend to slow the fighters down as the bout goes on.

In the second "headliner" popular Dennis Riggs, who holds the title of the Southern champions, is slated to battle Stick Mitchell. Riggs, who fights out of Jacksonville brings a 35-11-1 record into the fight but Promoter Tait does not feel that record indicates the true talent of Riggs. In doing this, let's pay particular attention to the most costly part of a golf course, that is, the greens. Let me ask you a question.

14. At the nineteenth hole - keep your eye on the highball and swallow through. 15. If all the above fails, remember you can win by one

Homestead Exemption Filing Time

Within a day or two you will be receiving from the Seminole County Tax Assessor a very important envelope. In that envelope will be your avenue to saving \$7.00 for every \$1,000 of assessed evaluation on your home against your City of Sanford taxes and \$23.08 for every \$1,000 of assessed evaluation on your home against your Seminole County and School Board taxes.

If your home is assessed at more than \$5,000 - and there are very few left in Seminole County these days and times that aren't assessed for at least that much - this means a savings to you of \$35 against your City taxes and \$115.50 against your County and School taxes.

Consequently, if you reside inside the City of Sanford, the total savings can mean \$150.40. If you are over 65 years of age, if you are a widow, or if you are blind or disabled, filing for homestead exemption can mean even more. So, when that envelope arrives it will pay you not to

procrastinate but get on the proverbial ball and follow the instructions. Sign where instructions indicate you should sign and return it at once to the Tax Assessor's office. Now, if you are a newcomer to Florida, or even if you've resided in this area all your life but during 1972 you purchased a new home, you will not get one of those envelopes

we've previously mentioned from the Tax Assessor's office. In order for you to qualify for homestead exemption during 1973 you will have to take your deed and all other allied papers to the Seminole County Courthouse and you will have to apply in person for the first year's exemption on your new home. It isn't even necessary for both busband and wife to go. But one must go!

just one-half acre if the property is situated within the corporate limits of a municipality.

Must Be Legal Residents

Applicants for homestead must be legal residents of Florida. If they have not been a resident of the state for at least one year they will have to file a declaration of domocile with the clerk of the court.

Those filing for homestead exemption the first time for the age exemption will have to furnish proof that he or si.e is over 65. This can be done by using their Medicare card. birth certificate for their driver's license. Oh, yes, to be eligible for the age exemption the applicant must have been a resident of Florida for at least five consecutive years since

Those filing for widow's exemption for the first time will have to provide the Tax Assessor's office with a copy of the husband's death certificate.

Disabled exemption applicants will have to provide certification from the state health department, the Veterans Administration, or from two licensed physicians who are residents of Florida. Disabled veterans applying must display a current VA eligibility certificate. Now, the question is when.

You must do this between now and April 1, 1973. April 1 is positively the last day. If you show up at the Tax Assessor's on April 2 all you can apply for is sympathy And, you probably won't get too much of that.

Don't Be Late

You'll feel bad then, but not as bad as you will feel when sometime in November your mortgage company writes you one of those letters stating that your escrow account is short about \$150 and the firm would appreciate your check by return mail so they will a sufficient amount to pay your taxes

And, don't think this doesn't happen. Quite a few Sanford and Seminole County residents got such letters in November. After getting over the initial shock

they immediately began investigating why. And, they are mighty disappointed when they find out that one quick trip to the Courthouse back in January, February, March, or even on April 1, would have been worth about one and a half bills. Not all the people who got these letters were new homeowners and forgot to go to the Courthouse. Some of them were old homeowners who let that letter

from the Tax Assessor's office get laid aside. Oh, yes, they intended to do it tomorrow or the following week. But, the first thing that happened was that it was laid aside, then misplaced, and then discarded probably with some of that unk mail that can so easily accumulate. Also, filing for homestead exemption also establishes

your home as your legal homestead. This means that aside from mortgage, tax and other type leins, no other claims can be made against the property to deprive a spouse and children a home in which to live. In other words, using an extreme illustration, once your

residential property has been homesteaded there is no way Mor hubby to put the home up as a bet in a poker game and lose it, thus depriving the wife and kids of their home. One young couple purchased a home in 1970. In 1971 they received one of those letters from their mortgage company stating that the escrow account was short.

What Happened? They immediately telephoned the broker to inquire what

could have happened. "Did you file for homestead exemption?" they were "Didn't you file for it, honey?" he asked his wife. "No.

she replied, and she asked, "Didn't you?" So decide right now who is going to file for your homestead exemption. Determine which spouse shall be tesponsible. The other spouse should assume the responbility of reminding the one who is to do it to be certain it is

If you will stop and think what you can do with \$150 next year you just might remember to file for homestead exemption between now and April 1, 1973. Just one more word or two of caution. If you put if off until April 1, you'll be in a line a mile long

just like there was when you waited until the last day to get your auto tags. The only difference will be that instead of paying you'll be saving yourself money.

But if you do completely forget to file don't feel too bad about it. You've simply contributed \$150 or so to your City, County and School Board, and you can still deduct it on your income tax return.

Dear Mrs. LMT:

Question Box

We are from another state which has a community property law. Our real estate broker told us when we purchased our home here that Florida is a dower state. What is the basic difference between the two?

The dower right as it is established in Florida is designed to protect the rights of a wife to property after her husband is deceased. On the other hand, the community property law in most states is designed to protect both the husband and the wife from the beginning of the marriage in income as well as property. Should you need a detailed explanation of the two, we recommend you see your attorney. By the way, you might be interested to know that in the event of a divorce the wife no longer has dower rights. This is not true in the case of community property.

In one of your recent articles in the Lifestyles section of The Herald you stated that it is not necessary for a listing agreement to be in writing to be valid. When I placed my house in the Multiple Listing Service I was told it had to be in writing. When I checked with my real estate broker he said that all listings which are placed in multiple had to be in writing. Would you also tell me if there are any other real estate documents which do not have to be put in writing according to Florida law?

Dear Mrs. ABW:

To answer your first question, MLS listing are not regrared to be in writing in accordance with Florida statutes. It's simply that the Multiple Listing Service operated by the Orlando-Winter Park Board of Realtors, an organization to which many members of the Seminole County Board of Restrers also belong, requires the MLS listing to be a written agreement. We are sure that if you will read the agreement carefully you will understand why it should be in writing.

In answer to your second question, yes there is another real estate document which does not have to be in writing to be valid. It is a lease agreement for a period of less than one year. Frankly, however, you would be in a much better position if you would require a written lease agreement for any period of time. Your real estate broker will handle it for you. If you do not have a real estate broker by all means have an attorney prepare the document.

I am always getting confused by such real estate terms as "grantor, grantee, mortgagor, mortgagee, lessor, lessee and a bunch of others. Is there a rule of thumb one could follow to keep these terms straight in his mind? KAA, Geneva

Dear Mr. KAA: Yes, there is. Always remember that "or" gives and "ee" gets. For example, a lessor gives a lease to a lessee. A grantor gives a deed to the grantee. A mortgagor gives a lease to a mortgagee. Ot to put it another way, a bit more legal like, a lessor leases to a lessee, a grantor deeds property to a grantee, and a mortgagor morgages his property to a mortgagee. Remember the rule of thumb and you'll never run into any problems along this line.

Our son and daughter-in-law are contemplating a move to Central Florida. Naturally, we would like for them to live in the Sanford area and we have been checking some of the subdivisions. We found a nice home priced at \$24,000, which is just about the best we could find for the money. However, the salesman said the down payment would run \$1,350. We were a bit shocked because we thought under the FHA downpayments were supposed to be low, something like \$400 or \$500. When we purchased our home for \$13,000 under FHA the downpayment was only \$400. A lot of people in our section bought homes from the FHA for as little as \$100 down. I guess we are misunderstanding something. Could you explain why down payments today are so high?

Really, you have asked a whole bushel of questions and then some but we believe we can clear up any misunderstanding you might have.

Initially, when anyone buys a home insured by FHA down payments are based on three percent of the first \$15,000, 10 percent of the next \$10,000 and 20 per cent of any amount over \$25,000. When you bought your home for \$12,000, three percent of that came to \$390. But since FHA deals only in multiples of \$50 you paid another \$10 down and the total was, as you say, \$400. In the case of a house selling for \$24,000, the first \$15,000 requires a down payment of \$450 and the next \$9,000, calculated at 10 percent of that amount, comes to \$900. So \$900 plus \$450 equals the \$1,350 which the sales agent told you would be the down payment.

No matter how you slice it, it is still a low down payment for the price of the property you son and daughter-in-law would like to purchase.



Defendants Reach Trial

affair, one of the spicier issues of last fall's presidential election, has finally reached its day in court. Seven men go on trial today on charges of breaking into the Democratic party's national headquarters.

The trial could take up to three months to complete, with the jury sequestered to insulate it from the anticipated glare of publicity. Because of the controversy and high interest in the case 1,000 prospective jurors have been called.

The defendants, including former White House aides and officials of President Nixon's reelection campaign, are charged with breaking into the Democratic National Committee's headquarters in Washington's Watergate complex. Five of the men were captured at gunpoint

inside the sixth-floor offices at 4:30 a.m. last June 17 at a time when Democrats were winding up a long run of presidential primary The incident immediately became a cam-

paign isue because of the links between the men and the Nixon administration and campaign. But the White House and Republican party have consistently denied any connection with the break-in and the alleged related electronic eavesdropping and theft of documents.
