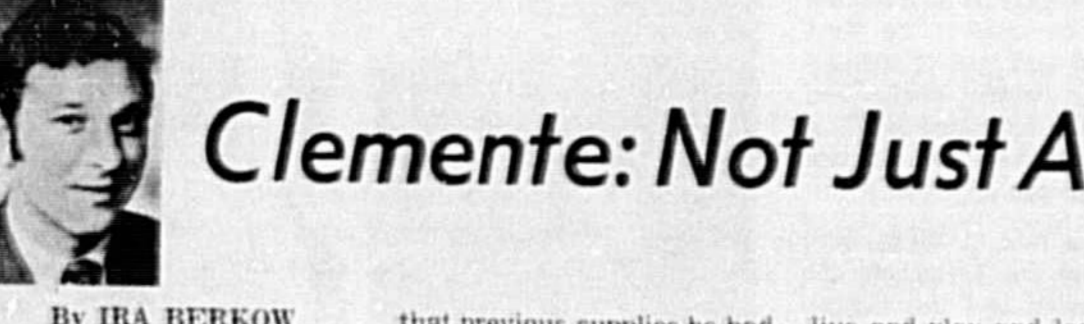

Dr. Julian Fried, Seminole County Health Department is concerned enough about the spread of venereal disease that it offers free examinations and treatment to anyone who cannot afford to go to a physician and gives the added assurance that all records of the case are kept confidential.

### Seminole VD Rate Doubled During The Past Two Years

Dr. Fried declared, "At the present time there is no need for any person, young or old, wealthy or poor to wonder whether he or she has VD." When an individual comes to the Health Department to participate in family planning, birth control or contraceptive clinics, he is tested for venereal disease. "It is surprising how many cases of VD are discovered among unwed mothers or in young people who are in for contraceptive pills where the individual is completely unaware he has the disease," Dr. Fried said.

### Dr. Julian Fried Explains The Disease Easily Cured

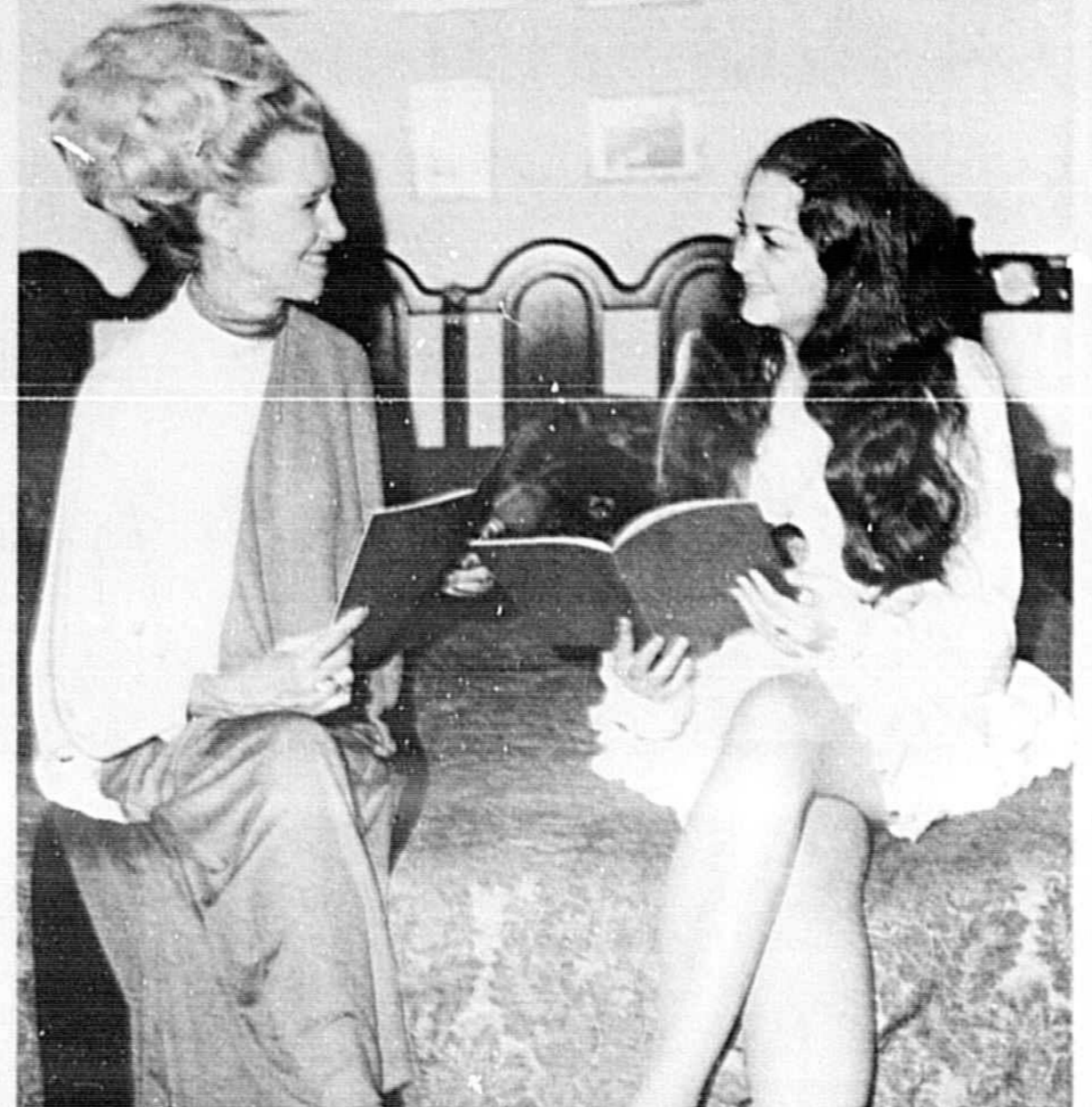
Dr. Fried said, "Both syphilis and gonorrhea can be so easily cured once it is detected that it becomes an indictment of our society and educational system these undetected, the rate continues to rise." Dr. Julian Fried of the Seminole County Health Department made the statement in an interview wherein he related that venereal disease (VD) can be prevented or cured with use of modern drugs.

In answer to the question of how venereal disease can be contracted, Dr. Fried was very explicit and clear. "For all practical purposes VD can be contracted only through the sexual relationship. There are very few exceptions. It is not contracted anywhere except sex organ to sex organ," he declared. "It is not possible to contract VD from a toilet seat or from dirty dishes in a restaurant," Dr. Fried said.

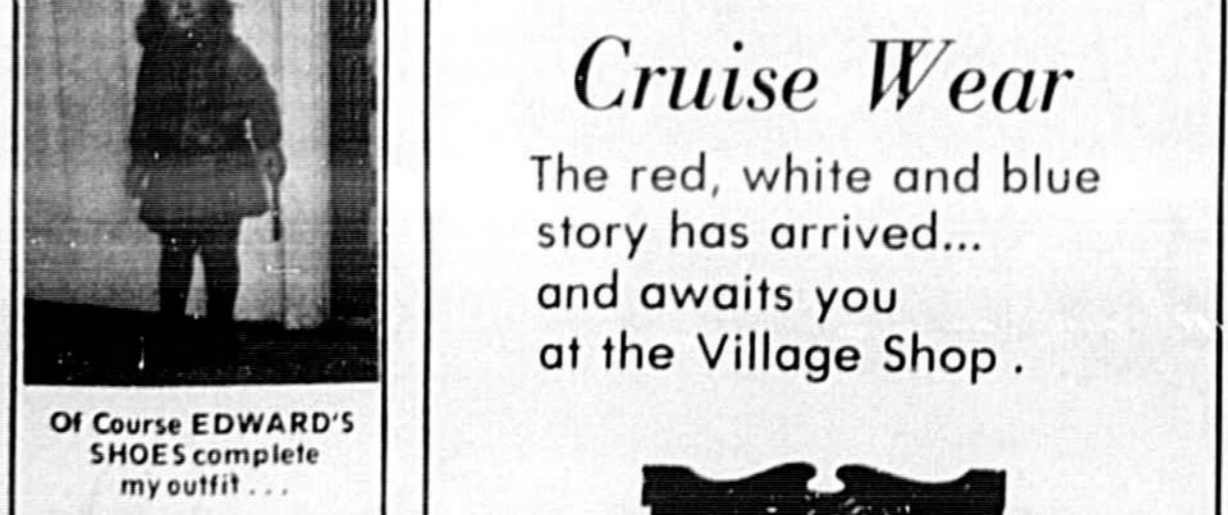

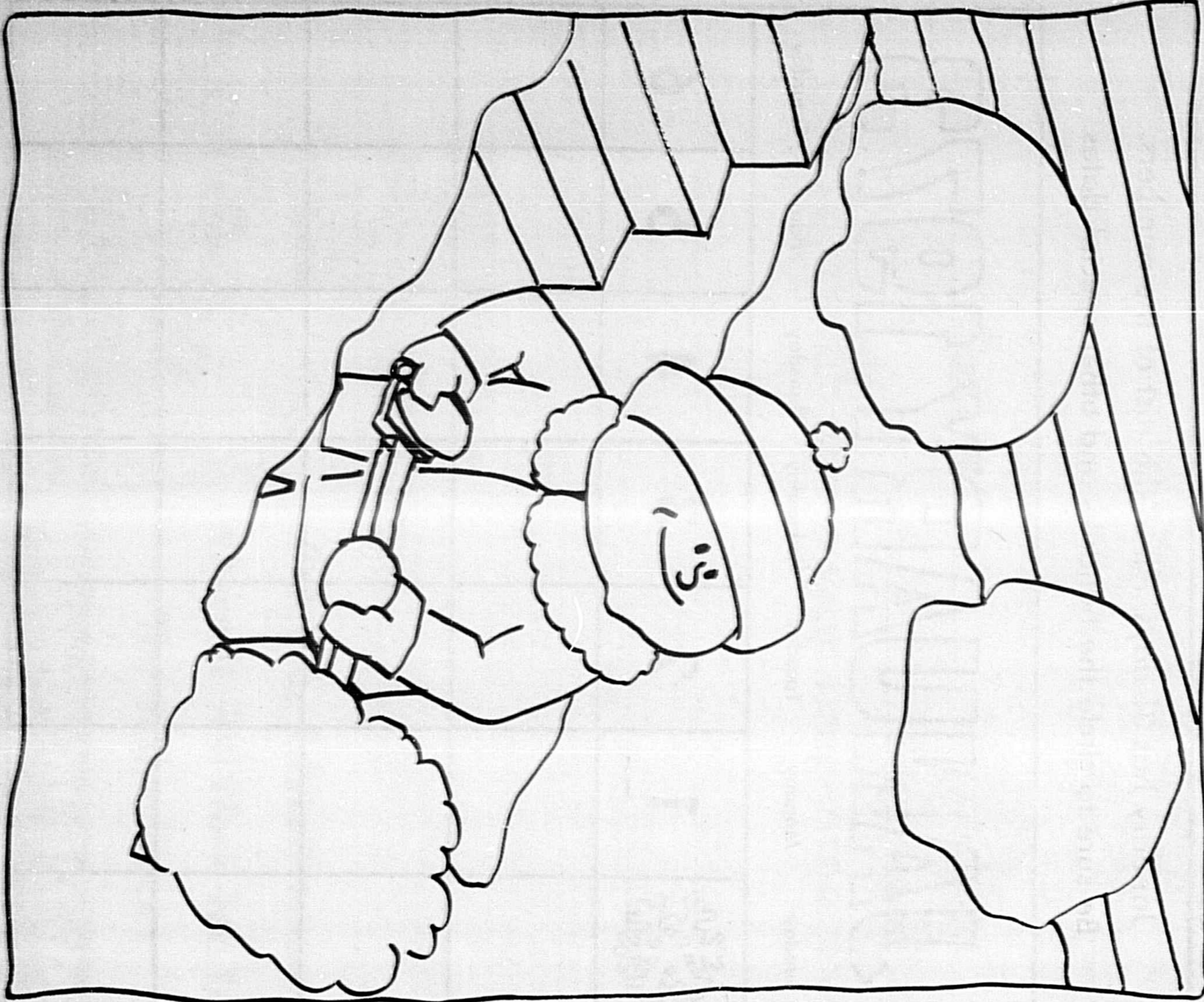

# In New Orleans Gun Battle Snipers Still Hold Police At Bay

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP)—  
Two of the heavily armed snipers  
involved in a marathon  
gun battle that has left seven  
persons dead and 16 wounded  
held police at bay from the roof  
of an 18-story hotel today, virtu-  
ally paralyzing a large section  
of downtown New Orleans.  
The snipers continued to fight  
it out with police sharpshooters,  
who pounded the roof of the ho-

tel throughout the night with  
continued helicopter assaults.  
By early morning, the heli-  
copter apparently forced one  
of the snipers off the roof and into  
a stairwell.  
Three policemen were  
wounded in today's round of  
fighting.  
Police said there were three  
snipers at the outset Sunday,  
with the gunmen setting fires in  
the Downtown Howard Johnson  
Hotel as they prepared the area

around the building, en-  
dangering firemen who contin-  
uously ducked bullets while  
keeping the flames under con-  
trol.  
One of the snipers was killed  
during a helicopter assault Sun-  
day.  
In today's fighting, it was not  
known whether the snipers  
were hit, but police said that  
the gunman setting fires in the  
stairwell was back on the roof.

The incident happened short-  
ly after the two remaining sni-  
pers apparently separated,  
with each one taking a position  
on either end of the hotel.  
Police said one of the gunmen  
remained in a bunker-like  
concrete-block house at one end  
of the roof of the Downtown  
Howard Johnson Hotel and the  
other moved to a ledge above  
the 18th floor.  
When the gunman appeared  
in the new position today, police  
sharpshooters opened fire from  
several positions but appar-  
ently did not hit him. Police  
Supt. Clarence Giarrusso or-  
dered all firing stopped except  
by marksmen 600 yards away in  
the federal building.  
His order came when police

men on the 17th floor of the ho-  
tel said they were being fired  
upon, apparently by their own  
men.  
Giarrusso, who lost his No. 2  
man and two other officers in  
the sniping which began Sun-  
day, had said earlier he would  
take no chances.  
"Time is our ally," he said.  
"They're at our will now. We're  
going to win."  
The snipers had started their  
shooting before noon Sunday,  
peppering the area with gunfire  
throughout the day after setting  
sections of the hotel afire. The  
hotel is about six blocks from  
the city's famed French Quar-  
ter.  
Police on Sunday evening had  
reported a total of 10 persons

killed. Early today, they low-  
ered the count to seven and said  
the mistake apparently was  
made in duplicate count of the  
dead found on the top floor of  
the hotel. They said three  
bodies, instead of the six origi-  
nally reported, were found on  
the top floor. The other dead  
included the three policemen and  
a body found in a stairwell.  
It was not immediately  
known whether all of the victims  
died of gunshot wounds or in  
fires set by the snipers.

Police said the snipers were  
armed with pistols and rifles,  
including .44-caliber magnum  
bullets. Their big-caliber guns  
were a huge boom compared to  
the sharp crack of the smaller,  
high-velocity police weapons.

Police and firemen first were  
drawn to the hotel before noon  
Sunday by fires apparently set  
by the snipers. Firemen man-  
aged to keep the flames under  
control even while ducking vol-  
leys of bullets hurled at them by  
the gunmen.  
Two separate fires in which  
arson is suspected and which  
authorities say may be linked  
with the shootings destroyed  
two downtown warehouses Jan.  
1.

### Watergate Defendants Reach Trial

Im 't it ironic that in one part  
of today's edition we carry the  
story of a retired businessman  
who charges police brutality in the  
recent Ft. Lauderdale riot  
where there were approxi-  
mately 5,000 persons in-  
volved...  
And over in neighboring  
Orlando, one of the top officials  
is removed from his position  
because of unnecessary  
violence by he and his men  
while leading a narcotics raid.  
Meanwhile, in New Orleans,  
we have two less "pigs" in  
uniform...thanks to the ac-  
curacy of three sniper-killers.  
Now if they were pigs, what do  
you call the others who were  
also killed and/or wounded?  
Certainly the firemen who  
lost their lives cannot be called  
suckers, now can they? No, of  
course not...cause that "title"  
is reserved for the rest of  
us...cause just as sure as the  
shootin' is concluded, we'll  
make all kinds of preparation  
for a fair and proper trial for  
these nuts - making absolutely  
certain that their rights aren't  
violated!  
Well, dad-blame-it all...how  
about the rights of Mr. Joe  
Citizen who wants nothing out  
of life other than to try and live  
a normal, self-respecting life?  
And what about the "rights" of  
the widows and children who  
are left behind?

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Watergate  
affair, one of the spicier issues of last fall's  
presidential election, has finally reached its  
day in court. Seven men go on trial today on  
charges of breaking into the Democratic  
party's national headquarters.  
The trial could take up to three months to  
complete, with the jury sequestered to in-  
sulate it from the anticipated glare of  
publicity. Because of the controversy and high  
interest in the case 1,000 prospective jurors  
have been called.  
The defendants, including former White  
House aides and officials of President Nixon's  
reelection campaign, are charged with  
breaking into the Democratic National  
Committee's headquarters in Washington's  
Watergate complex.  
Five of the men were captured at gunpoint  
inside the sixth-floor offices at 4:30 a.m. last  
June 17 at a time when Democrats were  
winding up a long run of presidential primary  
races.  
The incident immediately became a cam-  
paign issue because of the links between the  
men and the Nixon administration and  
campaign. But the White House and  
Republican party have consistently denied  
any connection with the break-in and the  
alleged related electronic eavesdropping and  
theft of documents.

The only way  
to telephone was outside the door where a sniper  
was shooting down on the street. A policeman  
told me I would be safe until I got to the corner if  
I hugged the wall.  
"He can't shoot straight 'down at you, and  
you'll be all right to the corner as long as you  
don't wander out to the curb," he said.  
I had been held up in the  
Howard Johnson Hotel lobby  
with other newsmen for about  
30 minutes, getting information  
from police, and had no way to  
relay it to the office since au-  
thorities had taken over the ho-  
tel phones for their operations.  
So I eased onto the sidewalk  
and inched my way toward the  
corner, but I had chosen the  
wrong time. A fusillade of gun-  
fire broke out from the 100 poli-  
cemen surrounding the hotel  
and I crouched behind squad  
cars.  
I was looking toward the cor-  
ner when I saw an officer  
crumple near a squad car. I  
hugged the wall even tighter,  
and stood frozen for about five  
minutes.  
NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Of-  
ficials say there were "in-  
dications" of possible con-  
nections between Sunday's sniper  
shootings from a New Or-  
leans hotel and earlier violence  
in the city.  
The snipers at the Howard  
Johnson Hotel struck one week  
after Police Cadet Alfred Har-  
rell, 19, was killed by an unseen  
sniper as Harrell stood outside  
postal headquarters.  
The fires set by the hotel  
snipers came six days after two  
fires, in which arson also is  
suspected, destroyed downtown  
warehouses.  
Arson is suspected in a fire  
Nov. 29 at the Rault Center, a  
17-story office-apartment build-  
ing across the street from the  
hotel. Five persons died as a  
result of that blaze.  
Six persons died in a July  
1971 fire at the same Howard  
Johnson Hotel. Authorities said  
that blaze was the result of ar-  
son, but no one ever was  
charged.

(AP)—When the consolidated  
city of Jacksonville was created  
little more than four years  
ago, there was a dispute over  
how much power it had over  
four satellite towns.  
The fight is still going on.  
Most recently, there have been  
tangles over the right of Jack-  
sonville Beach to close off pub-  
lic access to the beach and over  
which level of government has  
the authority to levy and collect  
occupational taxes.  
When the people of Duval  
County and City of Jacksonville  
voted to combine their govern-  
ments into a single unit, those  
living in Jacksonville Beach,  
Atlantic Beach, Neptune Beach  
and Baldwin voted in a separate  
referendum to keep their munici-  
palities intact.
