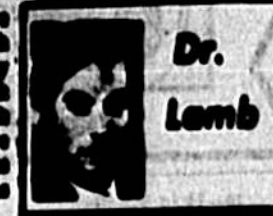

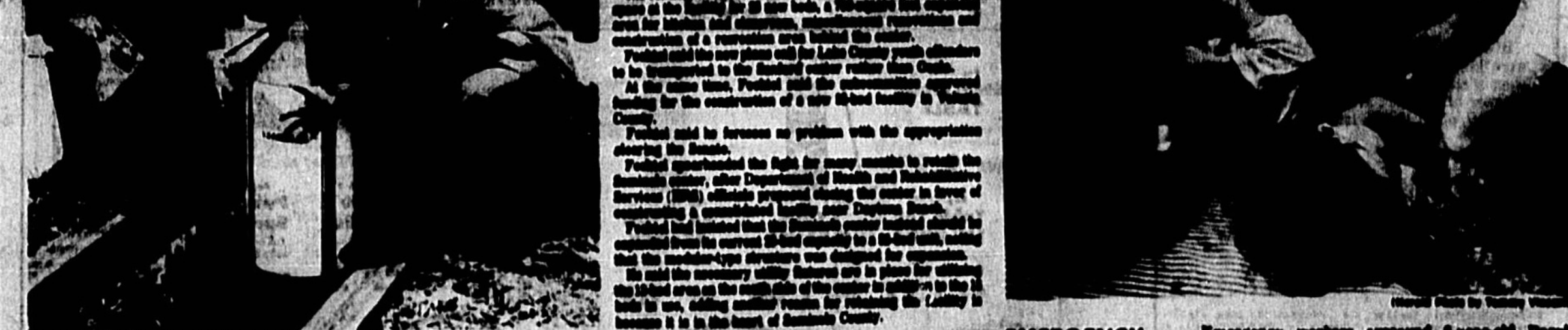

Many Questions, Few Answers

Tougan Park's appearance before the House Ethics Committee last week is a little more than a year ago. During his earlier days on the Watergate scandal...

His presence in the House didn't match the rest of the Watergate scandal. In 1976 to 1977, Mr. Park, he headed out at least \$500,000 to 20 percent and former U. S. congressman, doing what he could to make his way as a businessman and help along relations between the United States and South Korea.

Most of this money was paid in amounts small enough to look as if they were gifts and political contributions that members of Congress receive as a matter of course. Three former congressmen, however, received amounts approaching a quarter of a million dollars each, according to Mr. Park, and that's where the possibility of his own version of the story begins to get murky.

Mr. Park testimony didn't come very close to the list of recipients of the gifts, but led to no other answer to the three pertinent questions: Did Mr. Park accept or receive anything in return for his services? Was he acting entirely on his own, as he insists, or was he in contact with friends coming from the Democratic administration in a scheme to influence the Watergate inquiry?

Mr. Park's testimony didn't determine whether "friends" of his were only the political endorsement of their association with Mr. Park, or something more—actual contacts by the House of Representatives or even criminal charges like those brought against former Rep. Richard T. Hanna, D-Calif., and Otto Passant, R-Ill.

Perhaps he will answer these in a few weeks when he returns for more testimony. By asking Tom Jaworski to be chief investigator, the House has indicated it was going to the lengths Mr. Jaworski brought to the Watergate prosecution.

Now the committee follows up Mr. Park's suggestive testimony—and what is emerging from the Justice Department investigations—will be the test of the ability of Congress to honestly and objectively deal with scandal in its own family.

The progress of Mr. Jaworski on Capitol Hill should remain members of Congress on one condition: widely held about Watergate. That scandal might not have brought down an administration and left such scars on the presidency if the people involved, from Richard Nixon on down, had taken their lumps at the beginning instead of adopting a strategy of stalling and cover-up.

Private and former members of Congress whose names are coming up in the House investigation need deal with any legal or political consequences on an individual basis.

What the House of Representatives—and the public—do not want is anything but integrity and honesty in the investigation.

What the country doesn't need right now is another diversion of suspicion and scandal at the expense of its government.

The congressional leadership must avoid any hint of a protective reaction in any investigation that may hurt a member or the collective image of Congress.

First Quarter: Economy Falls By 0.6 Percent

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Hampered by bad weather and the coal strike, the nation's economy fell by 0.6 percent during the first quarter of 1978 for the worst performance in three years, the government said today.

The Commerce Department said the Gross National Product for the first three months of 1978 showed negative growth for the first time since the first quarter of 1975 — the end of the recession.

As a rule of thumb, economists say that six consecutive months — or two quarters — of negative growth constitute a recession. But the administration has projected a substantial improvement for the current quarter which began April 1.

Anti Leads Anti-Gay Rally

ST. PAUL, Minn. (UPI) — Focusing attention on next week's "gay rights" vote, Anita Bryant planned to lead a rally of 10,000 anti-homosexuals tonight and several thousand opponents vowed to protest next door.

Drug Dog (Visits): 1 Lake Brantley Drugs: 0

Dennis has shrunk. But he comes up empty-handed, almost. Dennis is the German shepherd used by the Lake Mary Police Department for K-9 patrol who has been trained to sniff out drugs.

Last week the Seminole County School Board authorized using Dennis on campus at high schools and middle schools in an effort to curb what some school board members said is a major drug problem at Seminole schools.

Tuesday, Dennis, accompanied by Seminole Sheriff's Deputy John Hawkins and Lake Mary Police Sergeant Dale Pico, searched the school grounds.

"I guess the dog spent about four hours searching around"

Pico, the dog's handler, made his first unannounced campus search at Lake Brantley High School in Forest City.

The only thing the dog found was a pack of rolling papers used to roll tobacco for cigarettes or marijuana joints, according to sheriff's department spokesman John Spauld.

But that wasn't the extent of Dennis' activity on his first visit to Lake Brantley, according to those involved in the drug hunt. Soon after Dennis arrived on campus, about 8:30 a.m., students who spotted the canine spread the word like wildfire.

Dennis had his picture taken by students, had to endure heckling and jeering from some, and was driven to a semi-drowsy state sniffing at some lockers he tried desperately to get into.

"I guess the dog spent about four hours searching around," said Lake Brantley principal Darvin Booth, who himself had been told about the search plan only about 20 minutes before the dog arrived that day.

Booth said the dog and the two law enforcement officers were joined in the search by at least two school personnel, the dean of students and the assistant principal.

The dog, according to Booth, sniffed long at 10 to 15 student lockers. And "nearly tried to tear off the handles on two or three of them," according to Lake Mary Police Chief Harry Brown.

But no drugs were found, authorities said.

"We feel that the lockers where the dog went crazy trying to get into are those lockers drugs might have been kept in."

"We nearly tried to tear off the handles on two or three of them (lockers) recently," speculated a sheriff's department investigator.

One other sheriff's department detective

sergent said he felt all the publicity that followed the school board action led to the intended use for the dog put the students on alert.

"They know the heat's on," said the detective sergent.

"Ever since that publicity, every student in every school in the county knows they might be hit any day. And they know we'll bring that dog at erratic times,

so they might keep drugs off the campus."

So effective is the student awareness about Dennis, in fact, that the sergent related a story about another dog, not Dennis, not a drug sniffing dog, just an everyday German shepherd, who visited a school after the publicity and "the students were that was our dog. If any of them had drugs, I'm sure they got rid of them long ago."

Italy Rebel Photo Has Moro Alive

ROME (UPI) — Red Brigade terrorists today produced a photograph they said proved that kidnaped ex-Premier Aldo Moro was still alive.

But they said he would be "executed" within 48 hours if the government refused to release their jailed comrades.

The photograph, said to be the same as one produced by the Red Brigades last week, showed a man with a mustache and a beard, wearing a dark jacket, sitting in a car. He was looking out the window of the car.

In a long communique released simultaneously in Milan, Turin and Genoa, the group said its intention would run out at 2 p.m. (7 a.m. EDT Saturday).

Anti-terrorist squad investigators said they considered the new communique authentic.

The communique came on a day of new violence, in which Red Brigades terrorists attacked a police barracks in northern Rome with hand grenades and machine guns five days and shot and killed a prison guard in Milan as his wife looked out the window of her apartment screaming "No! No!"

The group's photograph showed Moro in a shirt and trousers and clean shaven. The trait politician appeared to be in better health than he did in a photograph released immediately after his kidnapping.

The latest Red Brigades announcement in Milan was the 10th published killing and the fifth attributed to the Red Brigades this year. The victim was Francesco C. Colabici. Police said three masked gunmen pumped seven bullets into the 39-year-old guard who was assigned to the hospital clinic at San Vittore prison.

A Red Brigades communique said Colabici had been "employed at San Vittore jail as a bartender of prisoners."

The death came only a few hours after two men and a woman attacked the Punta Salaria carabinieri police barracks in northern Rome, containing the secret residence of Gen. Carlo Alberto Dalla Chiesa, who is in charge of security around Italian prisons that hold 160 Red Brigades prisoners.

It was the most daring raid since Moro was kidnaped March 16 by a gang who killed his five bodyguards. No communique was reported in the latest attack. The Carabinieri returned the five and hit the attacker's vehicle which was later found abandoned with a flat tire and damaged engine in a Rome public park.

The latest communique attributed to the Red Brigades said, "The communique distributed April 18 and attributed to our organization is false and provocative." That returned in an earlier message saying Moro had already been executed and his body dumped in the trunk waters of Lake Duchino.

"The Christian Democratic must give a clear and definitive answer (to the freeing of Communist prisoners) if they are going to take this road — it should be clear to others as possible," the message said.

PSC: Picked, Elected?

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Coco Beach Sen. John Vogt today gave up trying to get the Senate to make Public Service Commissioners appointed, but he said the issue could be resurrected later this session.

Senate approval of a bill (SB7) repealing the PSC from three to five members who would remain elected became dead when Vogt did not pursue his reconsideration motion. The proposal was sent down to the House but Speaker-designate Hyatt Brown, D-Daytona Beach, who wants an appointed commission, said it probably won't be taken up.

The bill was approved Wednesday but held up when Vogt moved to reconsider it.

"The issue is too clearly focused. It would be virtually difficult for anyone to change their vote. I saw no point in bringing it up at this time," Vogt said.

"I think there is still a realistic chance (for an appointed PSC) this session. I don't consider it a totally dead issue by any means."

If the switch to an appointed PSC isn't done by the Legislature it will be done by Florida voters, he said, predicting approval of a proposal going to the November ballot as part of the Constitutional Revision Commission's recommendations.

Sen. Harry Johnson, D-West Palm Beach, gave up his bill (SB8) repealing the death penalty for sexual assault on children 11 years old or younger in an effort to get more provisions.
