

Wendell Wilkie, who has just returned to the Unit-ed States from a first hand inspection tour of the "bat-Unfielda" of England, gave opponents of the lease-lend bill, who have been insisting it would get us into war, something to think about when he testified yesterday that if Britain falls we will be at war a month or two

If Mr. Willkie knows what he is talking about, and certainly he is as well informed on the subject as anybody in the country with the possible exception of the President who feels the same way about it, the only way to keep out of war is to keep the British fighting, to supply them with sufficient ships, planes and armaments to fight off the Gormans and eventually win the war, mean-while keeping it on the other side of the Atlantic. Why will it mean war for the United States if Britain

fails? An invasion of the British Isles would be followed by the bloodlest fighting since the world began. Hundreds of thousands of people would be killed, millions wounded, many of them civilians. But the defeat of England on her home grounds would not necessarily end the war. NO. 13 DEDUCTIONS FOR PROFES-SIONAL EXPENSES A professional man may deduct

A professional man may deduct all necessary expenses incurred in the pursuit of his profession. These include the cost of supplies, used in his practice office rent, cost of light, water, fuel, and telephone in his office, the hire of office assistants, and expenses State Fair and to get a preview of the cost of the paid in the operation and repair of an automobile, based upon the proportion of time it is used for professional purposes.

Many physicians use their residences both as their office and their homes. In such instance the

their homes. In such instance the physician may deduct as a business expense the rental value of the rooms occupied for office purposes. If he actually pays rent, and also the cost of light and heat, furnished these rooms. Also, he may deduct a portion of the wages paid domestic servants whose time is partly occupied in caring for these rooms. Membership dues in professional societies are deductible. Physicians and dontists who keep in their waiting rooms current magazines and newspapers for the benefit of their patients may deduct this item as a business expense. The cost of professional journals for the taxpayer's own use is also a deductible item.

The cost of technical books is not a deductible item, being a capital expenditure, but a proportionate amount for each year's depreciation of the books may be deducted. Depreciation may also be taken on office furniture and equipment. Insurance premiums on office or other professional equipment and liability insurance should be apportioned and that part of the premium attributable to business may be deducted as a business expense. physician may deduct as a busi-


