AAA executive charged with child porno

A pornography case, under investigation by the Seminole County Sheriff's Office for the past seven months, has finally resulted in an arrest. Richard Ira Whitcomb, 48, of Sunwood Drive, Longwood, has been taken into custody.

The case started on Nov. 3, 2003, when deputies were contacted by an Audit Services representative at American Automobile Association (AAA), reporting that an employee had pornographic images of children on a laptop computer owned by AAA.

The employee was identified as Whitcomb, a manager in driver training at AAA, who was questioned concerning the information. The laptop was seized and photographs and movie files were located in a file folder named "Dazzle." The images were of 7- and 8-year-old children in sexually explicit positions.

Whitcomb was subsequently placed on administrative leave.

According to the arrest report, there was probable cause to believe Whitcomb did knowingly possess photographs, motion picture, exhibition, show, representation or other presentations which, in whole or part, he knew represented sexual conduct by a child. Each representation is a separate offense, and there are 926 representations, each a felony of the third degree. The dates of the entries reportedly ranged from Dec. 15, 2002 until Oct. 31, 2003, a time during which the computer had been issued to Whitcomb.

The computer information was turned over to an investigator for a final Computer Forensic Examination on May 24 of this year. The report revealed 859 images of suspected child pornography and 67 movie files of child pornography.

On June 4, Whitcomb reported to the Seminole County Sheriff's Office and was placed under arrest.

Citizens not too high on school name

SANFORD — A sign off Lockwood Boulevard in Oviedo marks the future home of Paul J. Hagerty High School, set to open in August 2005.

When vandals painted an "F" over the "H" in Hagerty, parents vowed to get the name changed by the Seminole County School Board. They

also asked former superintendent Hagerty if he would consider an alternative.

Residents have been unsuccessful on both fronts, but will try again at the June 22 board meeting in Lake Mary, accord-

ing to a Web site hosted by the Concerned Citizens of Oviedo.

"This is wrong," said Carolyn Klages of Oviedo. She said the concern is for the community and especially the

young people.

"What about the one kid who is gay?" she asked. "How is he or she going to feel when they are called a Hagerty Hag or Hagerty Fag."

Hagerty retired in August

2003 after serving 11 years as superintendent. It also marked his 42nd year in education. The superintendent opened 14 new schools during his tenure, and the district saw increasingly good FCAT scores during Hagerty's time. Updating technology, securing funding for future education needs, and creating magnet programs were just some

3 school principals awarded top honor

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — The principal asked new students whether they thought the week had been worthwhile. Almost everyone raised a hand.

The former elementary students were participating in a transition program that Teague Middle School offers those entering sixth grade. Principal Roger Gardner asked for honesty and questioned who had not found the transition time worthwhile. Slowly two boys raised their hand.

Gardner thanked them for their honesty. Outside the classroom he said that was an example of trying to make students feel part of something larger. It is part of his philosophy that garnered him Middle School Principal of the Year for Seminole County Public Schools.

He was one of three principals who received the honor at the three levels of education. Barry Liebovitz, principal at Wilson Elementary in Sanford, and Boyd Karns, principal of Lake Mary High School.

Gardner served as assistant principal for 20 years at Sanford Middle School and led Teague for four years. At Sanford, he said, he learned to understand children of diversity. That helped him at Teague.

"This door is always open to kids, parents and teachers to communicate with me about the classroom," he said, pointing to his office door.

"I expect people to do their best," he said, and communication is the key.

Last year, for example, there was a problem with recidivism of minority students sent to the principal's office. They formed a plan to have these students "adopt" school personnel to guide the young people. The plan worked, he said.

"I'm not a micro-manager, but I'm inclusive of all in an attempt to make things better for everyone," he said.

Sanford man kills girlfriend, self

SANFORD — A three-hour police standoff in a neighborhood off South Sanford Avenue ended with two dead Thursday afternoon in an apparent murder-suicide.

Police responded to the Rose Hill subdivision at about 12:30 p.m. to a report of shots being fired. Sanford police Officer Mike Bernosky was immediately on the scene, but before he arrived, authorities say Francisco Rivera, 50, had fired a shot at his girlfriend and dragged her back into the home at 122 Rose Hill Trail.

"We had an officer — who lives in the area and was going to lunch — respond as it was happening," said Cleo Cohen, Sanford police spokesperson. "The response time was incredible with the first unit."

Unfortunately, quick police work couldn't save Evelyn Schumann, 28. She was pronounced dead at the scene, three hours later when police finally gained access to the home.

With a U-Haul parked in the driveway, Sanford police surrounded the home and tried to make contact with Rivera, but were unsuccessful many times as he repeatedly hung up the phone as police negotiators tried to reach him.

Police said Schumann's father and Rivera's son Francisco Rivera III were outside of the home when the incident began.

"She had arrived there with her father and (Rivera's) son with the U-Haul,"

Cohen said.

An argument apparently broke out as the three began moving furniture into the rental truck. Investigators said Rivera became upset because we claimed some of the furniture was his.

"That erupted him into anger," Cohen added.

Nearby homes were evacuated and the entrance to the subdivision was blocked off as about a dozen residents waited to return. Other family members

were allowed into the cordoned area to speak with Rivera by telephone, Cohen said.

Rivera did speak to several family members and gave conflicting reports of Schumann's condition, Cohen said. In a last attempt to negotiate with Rivera, he told police he was contemplating suicide.

"The last communication on the phone with him he said he had killed her and

Port of Sanford turns over \$300,000 to county coffers

SANFORD — The Board of Directors of the Seminole County Port Authority (SCOPA), presented a check on April 27, to the Seminole Commission in the amount of \$300,000. The money will go into the county's general fund.

Dennis Dolgner, administrator of the Port Authority, presented the check to Seminole County Commission Chairman Daryl McLain.

"This is the third consecutive year we have been able to turn over \$300,000 to the county," he said.

The money is in addition to the ad-valorem taxes paid by

the port's tenants, which now approaches \$150,000 annually.

"It is my pleasure, on behalf of the Board of Directors, to be able to present you with a check for an additional \$300,000," he told McLain, "bringing the total of direct contributions from the Port to just under \$1 million."

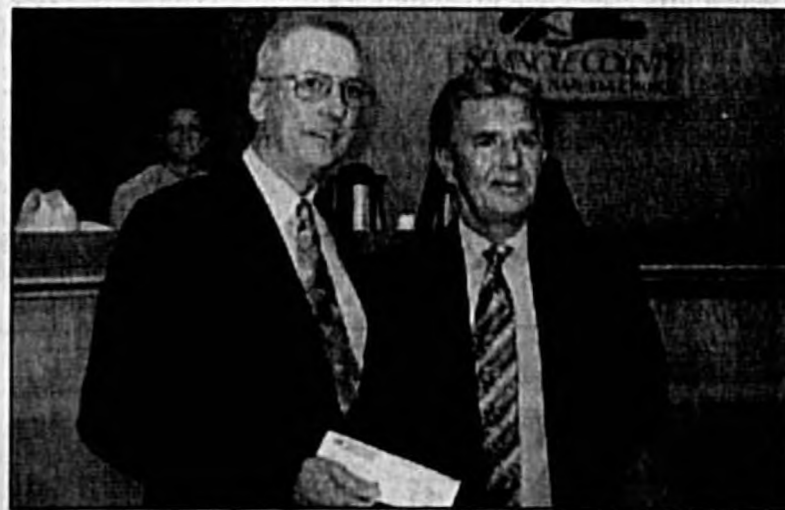
"As a thriving and growing small business center, we thank you for your commitment to use these funds to enhance Seminole County's outreach to the small business sector, and we look forward to continuing to work with you to perpetuate these community efforts in years to come."

Over the past five years, the Port Authority has transferred a total of \$690,000 of reserve capital to the county's general fund.

Dolgner said the Port is in an aggressive building plan, and during the next fiscal year, beginning in October, he expects the Port to be built-out.

"The engineering for the final building is underway right now," he added.

Dolgner predicted that once the Port is built-out, the amount of money which will be able to be transferred to the county general fund could reach \$1.1 to \$1.2 million annually.

Police crack 15-month-old arson case

It took 15 months of investigation, but Sanford police have made an arrest in connection with a burglary/arson case early last year.

On February 12, 2003, a possible burglary was reported at a residence in the 700 block of East Airport Blvd. When police responded, they found the house had been burned to the ground. Several items were reported missing from the burned home.

On July 15, 2003, an anonymous caller to the Seminole County Sheriff's office gave investigators the name of a man who may have been responsible. A subsequent interview with him however, supplied officers with the names of two other men believed to

have been responsible for the burglary and arson.

One of the men was located on March 22, 2004 and was interviewed. He reportedly admitted that he had been in the residence and removed a stereo, speaker, and three marijuana plants. He told officers however, that Robert Boutin had set the residence on fire during the burglary.

On May 24 of this year, Robert David Boutin, 25, of Country Club Circle, Sanford, was interviewed. According to the arrest report, he originally told investigators he was not in the residence and had no knowledge of any items being taken. He is said to have told officers the other man had

committed the burglary and set fire to the house. Later, he admitted he was in the residence, had knocked over a can of kerosene, and gave matches to the other man.

He is also said to have reportedly admitted to having knowledge about other property items the two had placed in the other man's truck.

Boutin was arrested on May 24 at the Sanford Police Station. He has been charged with first degree arson of a dwelling, unarmed burglary of a dwelling, and larceny of over \$300.

There was no immediate information on whether the other man had been located or charged in connection with the case.

of the highlights Hagerty oversaw.

Parents do not dispute that Hagerty, who has been a resident of Oviedo since he moved to Florida, served Seminole County schools well. They contend that the recent graffiti incidents and the prospect of future problems dishonor the good Hagerty did as superintendent.

Three parents sent an e-mail to Hagerty asking him to consider having the Educational Support Center of Seminole County Public Schools in Lake Mary after him. The e-mail writers — Dianna Mellers, Lisa Ingari, and Michelle Curtiss — sent the message April 15 to "dispel any rumors you may have heard regarding this issue."

They stated the effort was not a personal one. They expressed appreciation for everything Hagerty had done for the schools. They said, however, that they wanted a name that gives the community ownership of the school and one that they had a voice in choosing. They noted the negative nicknames that "unfortunately" could be drawn from Hagerty.

"The labeling has already begun, and the students are already aware of this and upset by it," they wrote. They even said some families had considered moving out of the school zone or moving children to private schools.

They concluded by asking to meet with Hagerty, who replied by e-mail the next day. He copied the message to school board members and current Superintendent Bill Vogel.

He rejected the notion of naming another building after him instead of the high school.

"I have NO interest whatsoever in being part of any such effort," he wrote April 16. "I am very pleased and honored to have the new high school named as the 'Paul J. Hagerty High School' and believe that any change now would do lasting damage to my reputation and demean my service and contributions to Seminole County Public Schools, even though you suggest that your efforts are not personal."

In his experience, he said, young people reflect their parents opinions and attitudes. Parents help to form children's reactions and perspectives on the future, he wrote.

"You have made your objections known in a variety of ways," he said. "I would hope you now will work to have the best possible attitude and atmosphere created for Hagerty High School."

The parents can contribute to the future of the community and school by expressing "your disapproval any time you hear an inappropriate nickname for Hagerty High School used," he wrote.

Oviedo parents still think the Educational Support Center would be more appropriate. His work helped everyone in Seminole County, not just those in Oviedo, they argue.

Parents also point out that since there are no competing teams at the educational center, there will be no incentive to deface the name.

Worst than the name, parents said, is that they feel they had no voice in the naming of a school in their community. They also said they feel ignored by the school board.

Parents have failed to get put on the school board agenda. They have spoken during

the "public comments" portion of the meetings.

Another objection parents raise is board policy requires a person whose name will be used for a building to reside in Seminole County at least 20 years. Hagerty moved here to take his position in 1992.

A petition submitted to the school board contained about 800 names from people in the Oviedo area, said Ingari of Oviedo.

"We're pursuing this cause because we know in our hearts it's the right thing for our kids and our communities," Ingari told the board April 27.

"We need (board) members who haven't forgotten to include the community in their decision making, members who genuinely care about our children and not just test scores, and most importantly members who act on integrity and not politics."

Hagerty was out of town and could not be reached for comment.

The school will be an expansion of the current Lawton Chiles Middle School, which will move to another site. Before that, the school was Lockwood Middle.

Three arrested following fight in Sanford

Sanford police arrested three persons Monday for an attack involving a metal pipe.

Police responded to a battery in the 3900 block of Sanford Avenue and found a man who told them he had been attacked by two white males identified as Jesse James Frazier, 22, and Marty Frazier, 23, both of Lisa Court West, in Sanford.

One of the men reportedly struck the victim with a metal pipe. The two then fled in a red vehicle with no license tag. It was later found the driver of the vehicle was Stephanie Leigh Gaubert,

24, of Plantation.

After the victim was transported to the hospital, a search got underway for the vehicle and the three persons. One Seminole County deputy spotted the vehicle on the north entrance ramp to State Road 417. The vehicle was stopped and Marty Frazier was taken into custody along with Gaubert.

Jesse James Frazier was eventually located at Park Avenue and Woodland Drive and taken into custody. A search of the vehicle uncovered a steel pipe in the front passenger seat containing traces of

blood.

The two men reportedly fled from the residence, and jumped into a waiting vehicle reportedly driven by Gaubert.

Marty Frazier was arrested on charges of burglary to a dwelling, false imprisonment, battery — touch or strike, and principal in a first degree crime. Jesse James Frazier was charged with aggravated battery using a deadly weapon, burglary to a dwelling, false imprisonment and violation of probation. Gaubert was charged with being an accessory after the fact of a third degree felony.

Family history day

Would you believe, Monday, June 14, is Family History Day. It's not a legal holiday, but it has been promoted for many years by Tom and Ruth Roy, in Lebanon, Pennsylvania. The main reason is that during the months of June, July and August, when the youngsters are out of school, many families have family reunions. In my family's case, it is in July, and occurs every three years.

What the Roys stress is the need for adults in the family to educate the small fry on the family's history through tales of the past, and the importance of family history. This can be accomplished, possibly more than ever, when everyone gathers for that reunion.

I have found that in many cases, the youngsters don't really care about family history at first. But as the years fly past, by the time they get to their late 30's and into their 40's, it becomes more and more important. They, as a result, are the ones who (hopefully) will continue the tradition of family values, and attempt to tell their own children about the past.

Yes, we've all heard that people shouldn't live in the past. Yet, I believe, and I hope you agree, that knowing about one's own family and its achievements during the past decades and centuries, is not only important, but it can be inspiring.

For example, your grandparents might have come to America from some foreign country, broke, and not knowing anyone - perhaps not even being able to speak English. Yet they obtained employment, worked hard, saved their money, invested wisely, and eventually moved into the middle or upper class. That's a story your youngsters should know about - the need for hard work with which to obtain success.

Want a project before your reunion? Compile a family tree. Put in as many folks as you can. Computers have family tree discs that will help if you need it. There are also a number of sources available through libraries and others.

Then, take it to the reunion and let others see it. No doubt there will be relatives who will correct what you have compiled. Rather than take that as an insult, take it as another source, and use this additional information for your family tree. Then, the next time you all meet, you'll have even more to share with folks.

If you can, add stories about some of them - even if you find someone who may have been hung for being a horse thief. Anecdotes about some family members may be humorous, but they will make remembering them that much easier.

Take those older photo albums along when you attend the reunion. Everyone has pictures of past relatives - those that the youngsters may not remember. "Oh look, there's great-grandma sitting on her rocker in front of the old farm house. She used to make moonshine in a shed out back, but no one ever knew about it." You tell your teenager, and he or she will have a better remembrance of grandma.

As a personal suggestion, if you have most of your family living in Central Florida, pick a location such as a park or campground in which to hold the gathering. NEVER have it at a relative's home - that's putting too much work on one family.

If half of your relatives live out of the area, pick a location midway between where they live and where you live. Then everyone can attend more easily, and you can ALL share the work connected with a reunion.

Have fun. Renew your family ties. And remember, as Tom and Ruth Roy are stressing, it's a Family History Day. Be proud of it.

The long goodbye is over for my father

On Saturday afternoon, after what Nancy called "the long goodbye," my father went home.

My first reaction was to recall Edwin Stanton's words when Abraham Lincoln breathed his last: "Now he belongs to the ages."

That can only be said about giants, and my father was a giant - he towered above his contemporaries and the great majority of the world's most famous political figures past and present.

Nowadays much is said about the legacies American presidents leave behind, and only a tiny handful of presidents of the United States left behind them legacies as abundant as that which my dad left behind.

When he came into office the nation was nearly an economic basket case. The morale of the American people was at rock bottom - we had lost that confidence in ourselves that had created the American colossus, and our leaders had surrendered to the idea that the Cold War would be a permanent fixture on the world scene.

When he left office after eight years, the economy was boom-

ing, we had recaptured the can-do spirit that had motivated Americans for generations, and the Soviet Union was approaching collapse and with it the Cold War.

His legacy included far more than his accomplishments in statecraft. His optimism was contagious, he showed us the shining city on the hill, and taught us that we could reach it.

Throughout it all he never lost his sense of humility, his innate decency, his love of country, and his love of the American people. He was a gentleman to the tips of his fingers in an age of incivility.

In all my life with him I never saw him do anything to hurt another person. He would have rather cut off his hands than offend a fellow human being.

Above all, my father lived as close to his maker as it is possible for a mortal to be. Every morning

he put himself in God's hands, accepting whatever happened as the will of the Lord with absolute confidence that he would receive whatever he needed to cope with whatever the Lord put in front of him.

Today as I joined my family at the first of the memorial services, I felt grief at his passing. But, as I stood over the casket this morning I was comforted in knowing that with all of the gifts that my father had given to the nation that the greatest gift he had given

to me was knowing that at one o'clock Saturday afternoon when my father closed his eyes for the last time he went to be with his Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. A finer gift cannot be given to a son.

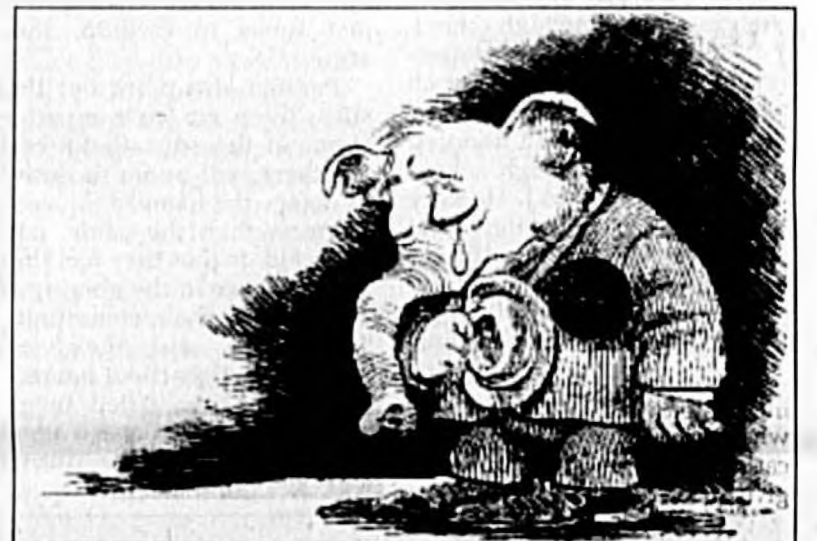

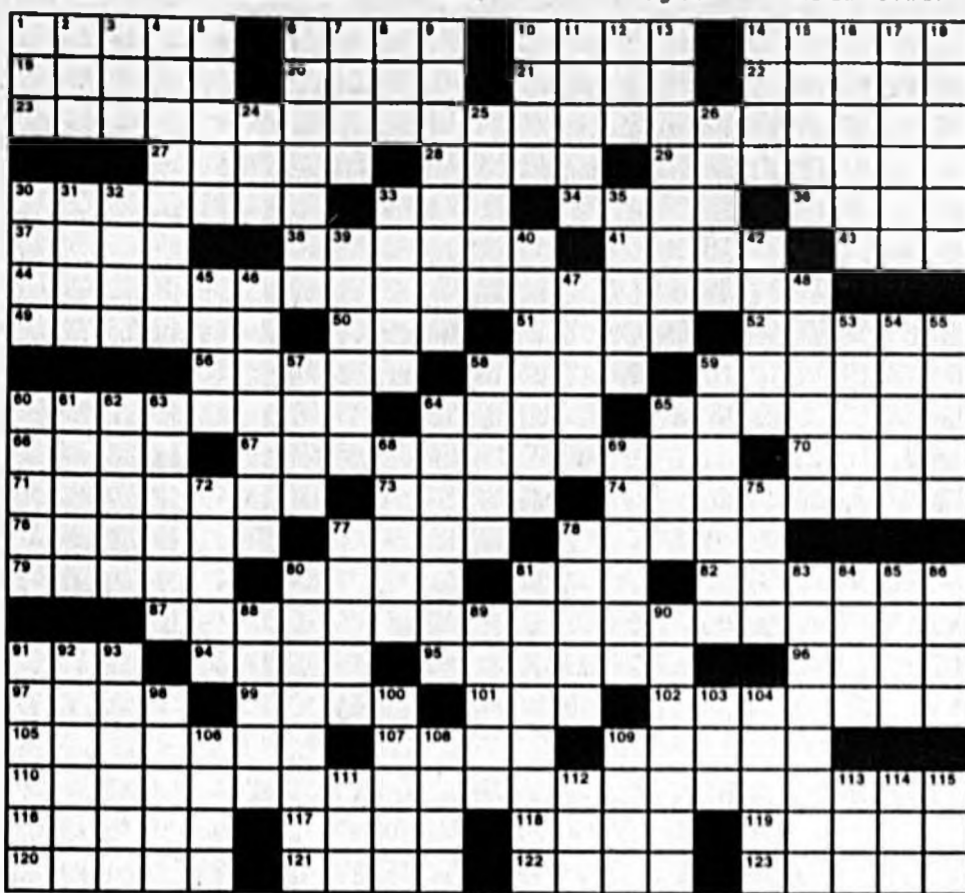

Pharmacist known for his compassion

When Steven Letchworth died last week in a car accident it left many Sanford residents wondering who would fill the void of filling their prescriptions.

For 30 years, many of the same customers had been coming to Letchworth — no matter where he worked — to have the caring and honest pharmacist give them the best of service.

Letchworth, 57 of Lake Mary, died Thursday, June 3, when his vehicle struck a tree on Osceola Road near State Road 46 between Geneva and Sanford. He was born March 6, 1947, in Farmville, N.C. and moved to Sanford in 1974 after completing his degree at the University of Florida.

From the Super X on 25th Street and U.S. Highway 17-92 to the Sanford Medco Pharmacy, Letchworth finally was able to own his own drug store in 1986. Until 1999, Steve's Pharmacy on U.S. Highway 17-92 near State Road 417 was owned and operated by Letchworth.

He sold the business to Eckerd's and went to work at the chain drugstore, but even with the change his old customers kept coming back and he kept providing.

"He had a little box of accounts that people owed him money," he wife Carol said. "It's not like he would tell me, but I have heard that some couldn't afford the medicine and he would give it to them."

The Way We Were: Highlights of the '50s for SHS reunion

The Seminole High School Class of 1954 will celebrate its 50-year reunion June 25 and 26. This is my class so naturally my thoughts have been going back to happenings in the early 1950s. Today you will be reminded of some highlights of national events during the years 1953 and 1954.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower was inaugurated on Jan. 20, 1953. He was the first Republican President in 24 years. Another world leader, Joseph Stalin, died on March 5.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare was created with Oveta Culp Hobby as its first head.

Julius and Ethel Rosenberg were executed at Sing Sing Prison for espionage. They had passed secret information about the atomic bomb to the USSR.

Some of the popular songs in 1953 included "I Believe," "Doggie in the Window," "Till I Waltz Again with You" and "I'm Walking Behind You." Emmy awards went to Donald O'Connor (Colegate Comedy Hour), Eve Arden (Our Miss Brooks), and the U.S. Steel Hour (Best Dramatic Program). Edward R. Murrow was the most outstanding TV personality.

Academy Awards were given to The Greatest Show on Earth, Gary Cooper (High Noon), and Shirley Booth (Come Back Little Sheba). "The Old Man and the Sea" by Hemingway and "Picnic" by Williams won Pulitzer prizes. Frank Lloyd Wright won a gold medal for architecture.

On Dec. 16, Charles Yeager set a new airplane speed record of 1,600 mph, and Dizzy Dean was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame.

On March 31, 1954, a hydrogen bomb capable of destroying any city was declared attainable.

The U.S. Air Force Academy was authorized on April 1.

The McCarthy Hearings were held for months, investigating charges of Soviet espionage in the United States.

Racial desegregation in schools was declared unconstitutional by the U.S. Supreme Court on May 17 in Brown vs. Board of Education.

On Sept. 30, the first atomic-powered submarine, the USS Nautilus, was commissioned. "Stranger in Paradise," "Hernando's Hideaway," "Hey There" and "I Love Paris in the Springtime" were a few of the popular songs in 1954.

Danny Thomas in Make Room for Daddy and Loretta Lynn in the Loretta Lynn Show won Emmys. Some 29 million households now had television sets, 60 percent of the population.

Academy Awards went to From Here to Eternity, William Holden (Stalag 17) and Audrey Hepburn (Roman Holiday). Frank Sinatra and Donna Reed were the best supporting actors in From Here to Eternity.

The construction of the St. Lawrence Seaway was authorized and the bill was signed by Eisenhower on May 13. On July 12, a highway modernization program was proposed by the president. This eventually led to the Interstate System.

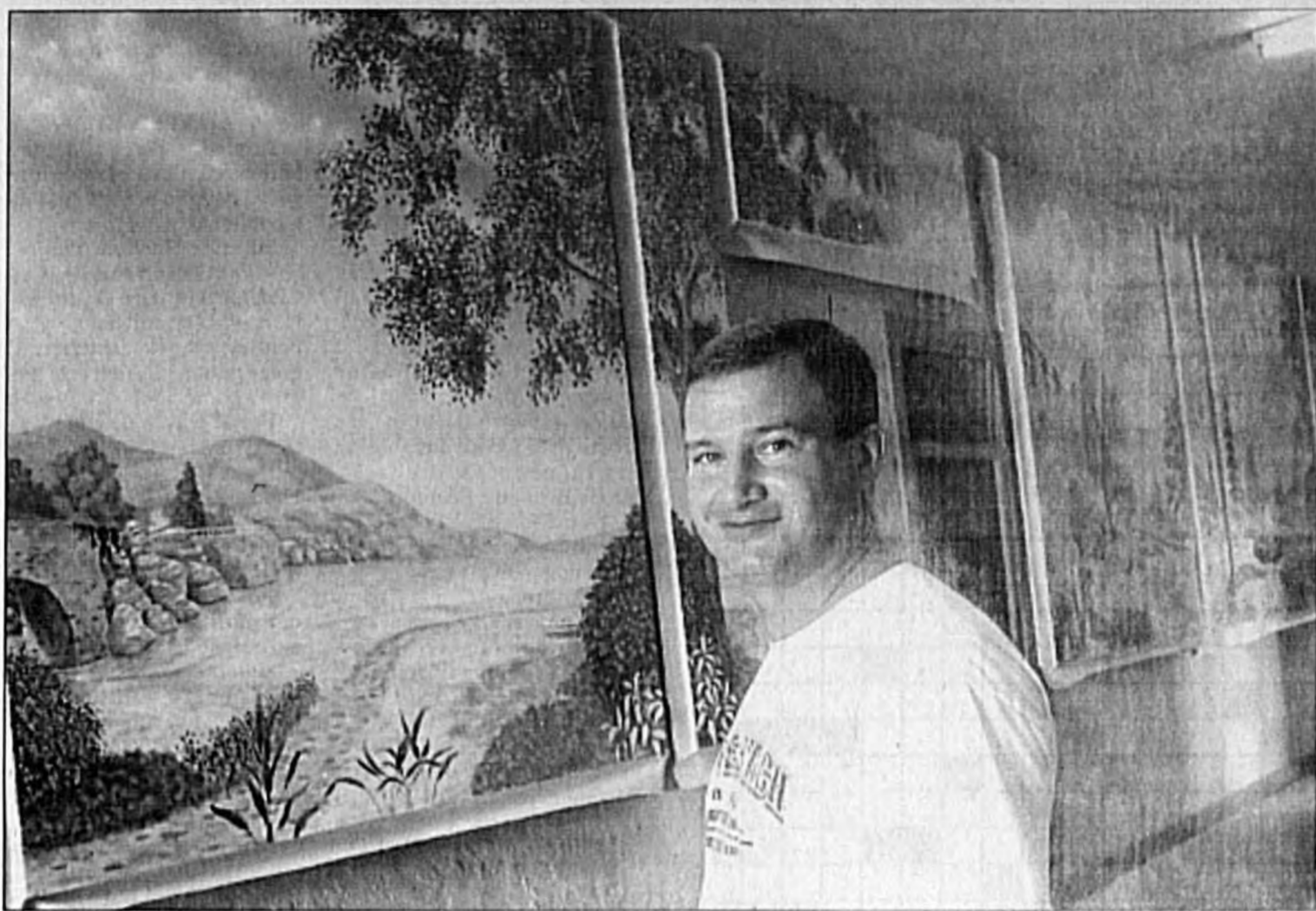
The Nobel Prize in chemistry was awarded to Linus Pauling and on Sept. 11, Lee Meriweather was crowned Miss America. Sixty percent of the male population and 30 percent of the females were smokers.

The average American's favorite meal in 1954 was fruit cup, steak and potatoes, peas, roll with butter and pie a la mode.

What was happening in Sanford in September, 1953? Where was Peter Schaal when I needed him? I have relied repeatedly on his two books, "Sanford as I Knew It

Sanford artist completes 16-paneled mural for Isleworth resident

Robert Casler, owner of Interior Artworks, Inc. recently completed a large painted mural based on Feng Shui principles. The mural was commissioned by an Isleworth resident to decorate her newly constructed Pellegrini Home. Casler was recommended for the commission by the highly respected local interior designer, Carolyn Franklin of "Carolyn Franklin Design."

The painting was accomplished over a 10-week period, in a studio in the second floor of the building at Palmetto and First Street in downtown Sanford.

Sixteen canvas panels, rising over seven feet in height, with a combined length of over 60 linear feet are to be installed in the formal dining room. The eight separate "zones" of the Fantasy Garden landscape represent the areas of life set forth in the Bagua, a tool used by Feng Shui practitioners.

The landscape design encourages Chi, the energy present in all things, to flow such that desired results are brought to that portion of your life. As an example, the Health and Happiness section shows a garden wall positioned in to hinder the influx of "bad" chi, while a large weeping willow symbolizes longevity. A guidebook written by

Casler accompanies the mural to explain the significance of each of the mural's symbols to the viewer.

Casler explained, "At first glance, you see a serene landscape that instills a sense of peace, but the mural is actually full of Feng Shui symbols. Understanding the symbols adds a deeper dimension the viewer would not otherwise have without the explanations contained in the guidebook."

Robert Casler is an award-winning artist born in Lansing, Michigan. He now lives in Sanford with his wife and three sons. He is active in the arts and is Chairman of the Board of the Sanford/Seminole Art Association.

Sanford joins other Central Florida cities that are promoting local art and culture. On display in Casselberry City Hall is an exhibit called "Orlando Furioso," a collection of paintings from local artists who traveled to Italy.

The idea for artwork in city hall is not a new one. Fox said she spoke with city officials a couple of years ago, but nothing was officially organized. Fox approached city

officials again with the idea, and worked with the Sanford Seminole Art Association to select which paintings would be used. The exhibits will be changed every three months and will include the work of at least five local artists.

"It's a cooperative effort of the artists and the city to showcase the many talents that are within the city and Seminole County," Grieshaber said. "We want city hall to portray our vision for the community which is that we are a very family friendly community."

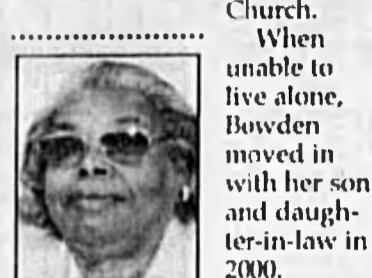
Grieshaber said the paintings have "enlivened city hall."

1912-1935" and "Sanford and the World War II Years, 1936-45," but he never published his third book which was to go through about 1960.

Since I wanted to find out what was happening in Sanford, 1953-54, I had to do my own tedious research through *The Sanford Herald* on microfilm at the Sanford Museum.

Silly me, I thought I could look through a whole year in a few hours. It took me at least four hours to go through just the month of September, 1953. And most of the *Heralds* had printed on them "Original Illegible." That meant I had to squint and use other means to read much beyond the headlines in many of the articles. Several, I just gave up on.

I have gleaned information interesting to me and probably to my classmates, hopefully to the rest of you. There is a lot of information here so it will take at least three columns. And when my eyes and neck have returned to normal and I have more time than sense, I may go back to these microfilms. In the meantime, enjoy the following.

Seminole County Public Schools activities in 1953

On the opening day of school, Sept. 8, there were 6,249 students in Seminole County schools, 1,405 more than in 1952. Seminole High had 511, Sanford Junior High 287, Sanford Grammar School 404, Southside 636, West Side, 168, Lyman (grades 1-12) 526, Oviedo (1-12) 265, Lake Mary (1-8) 93, Geneva (1-8) 40, Lake Monroe (1-6) 95 and Wilson, (1-6) 57.

One of the first articles I came across in the Sept. 2 edition was one written by me entitled "Plans in making for big school year."

Here are just a few items covered: The SHS band was holding daily practices to get ready for the upcoming football shows. The annual football game with Orlando would be with Edgewater (OHS had just been split into Boone and Edgewater) and would be played in Sanford.

The lunchroom had been painted and new equipment installed. Registration Day was the next Wednesday. New teachers were George Dabbs, John Angel and Bill West.

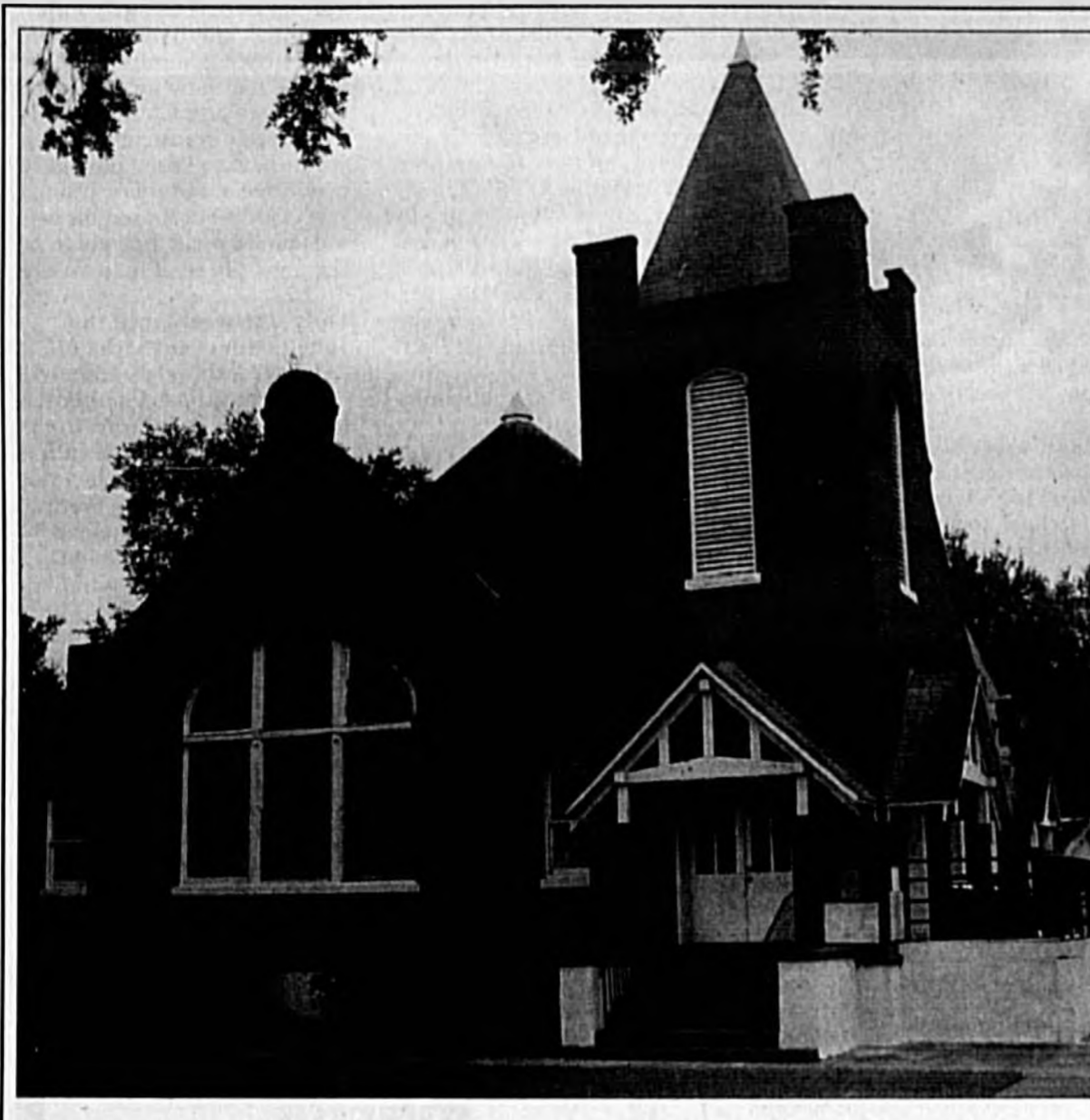

Dreggors informs county historical society of past ghost towns

A program entitled "Ghost Towns of the St. Johns" was presented recently by Bill Dreggors at a meeting of the Seminole County Historical Society.

Dreggors is a fourth generation Floridian who is credited with the restoration of the Henry DeLand House in DeLand and turning it into a museum. He served as its curator for several years and is now executive director. He has written three books and produced numerous tapes on various area history topics.

All three ghost towns on the St. Johns that he discussed were in Lake County. They were once thriving villages that were major stops for

steam boats, but there is barely a trace of them now.

The three towns were Crows Bluff, St. Francis and Hawkinsville. Slides of each were shown, many of them from the late 1800s. There were houses, stores, hotels at each site, plus all kinds of boat such as paddle wheelers that delivered mail and row boats. At St. Francis there was a newspaper office that published "Florida Facts."

Many tales were told such as the one about the steamboat "Lollifoy." As it was about to dock one day, the passengers were told to go to one side of the boat. When they docked, it was learned that this was to keep the boat from sinking before they reached land.

Shown was a ferry connect-

ing Volusia and Lake counties, located where State Road 44 is now. Another ferry was shown as one in which a person had to pull his own conveyance across the river.

The first bridge there was of boards, just laid across without being fastened. When a board rotted, it was thrown in the river and replaced.

He emphasized a cracker barrel pictured on a porch. He explained that this did not hold crackers, but was filled with brine. This was where meat was kept.

During the business meeting conducted by President Millard Hunt, it was announced that the bronze plaque containing the names of donors to the new building had been attached to the building. Alex Dickison was

commended for his work on this project. During her report, Museum Specialist Karen Jacobs announced that the new building, which houses agricultural exhibits, would be the site of a traveling exhibit in October.

She told the group that the Museum of Seminole County History was receiving excellent exposure as evidenced by 884 hits on its Web site in April, and that the museum was featured in a brochure, "Unexpected Orlando."

It was announced that the Seminole County Historical

Society had been invited to attend the July 29 meeting of the Sanford Historical Society. At this time, Jimmy Sawgrass and his son would present the program. "He was extremely, fair, honest and giving."

Known for his level of service and strong sense of community, Letchworth would often go beyond the call of duty for a pharmacist by writing lists to help people try to remember when to take their pills or even make deliveries. When it came down to it, Letchworth would also give away medicines to those who could not afford it.

"It was kind of like an old-time pharmacy for the community," Carol said.

Some say he shared a special bond with his customers and

would do anything for them.

"I can just remember meeting people that would say you just wouldn't believe what he did for my mother or grandmother," Carol said. "A lot of his customers go back to 1974. That was the goal in his life — a family business."

His unwavering support in the community was evident at his funeral service Monday when more than 500 people showed up to pay their respect.

"I can't believe how many people loved us and how many people he cared for," said Carol who was also able to feel the love

of the community when she was recovering from leukemia several years ago. "They have come back and done even more."

A devout family man and fisherman, Letchworth finally took the time two years ago for a vacation. His idea of a vacation, however, was much different than many others.

He studied hard to earn a national pharmaceutical certification and then spent the last two summers in Idaho with his wife. While they enjoyed the countryside and Steve would spend time fishing, Carol said he worked at a small town pharm-

acy as sort of a "working vacation."

"He always said he would be a pharmacist," she said. "Steve just had a big heart and he was pretty unconditional with everything."

He is survived by his wife, Carol; his mother "Dot" Letchworth of Farmville, N.C.; son, Josh Letchworth of Lake Mary; daughter Sarah Letchworth of Orlando; brother Glenn of Greenville, N.C.; and sister Anne Grant of Virginia Beach, Va. Carol said his grandchildren Max and Ruby were the "sunshine of his life."

students meet income criteria for free-and-reduced lunches, that does not necessarily make things any easier, he said.

was going to kill himself," she said.

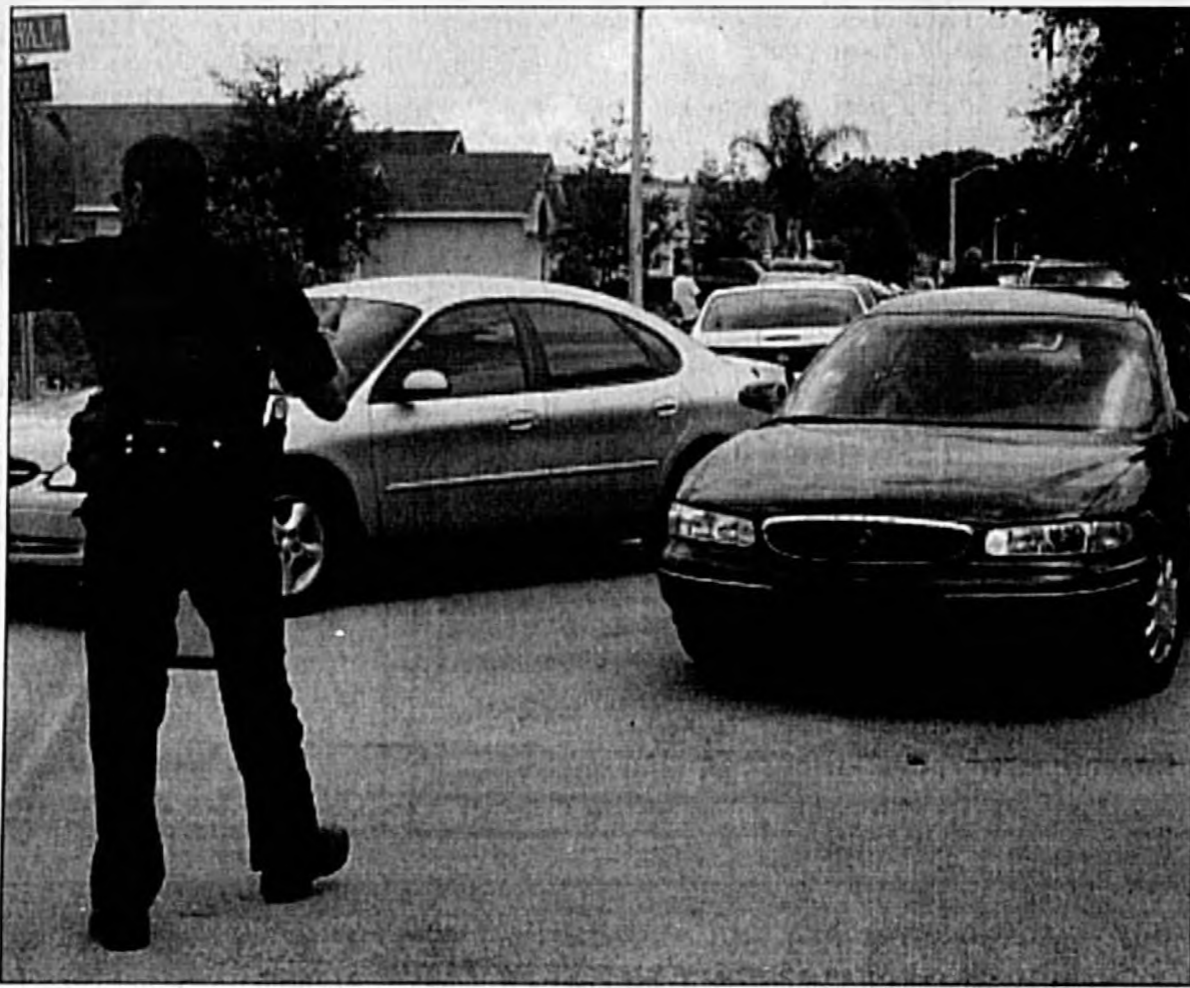
Officers fired tear gas into the home and entered with the possibility that Schumann could still be alive. As they entered, police heard a gunshot, and officers found Rivera — who shot himself in the head — and a lifeless Schumann. She had reportedly been shot three times, once in each leg and another time in the abdomen.

Rivera was rushed to a nearby abandoned parking lot and airlifted to Orlando Regional Medical Center where he was pronounced dead shortly after arrival.

One neighbor who lived only a couple houses from the incident said some sort of domestic argument had happened at the home the night before.

"Something happened last night, and I heard she was coming back today to get her stuff," said the resident who did not want to be identified.

Cohen said according to police records, officers were not dispatched to the home for the reported domestic squabble. Police learned Friday the couple had been together about 10 years, and there no immediate reports of violence between the two previously.

SANFORD — If it is true that pitching and defense win championships, then the Sanford River Rats look to be in pretty good shape.

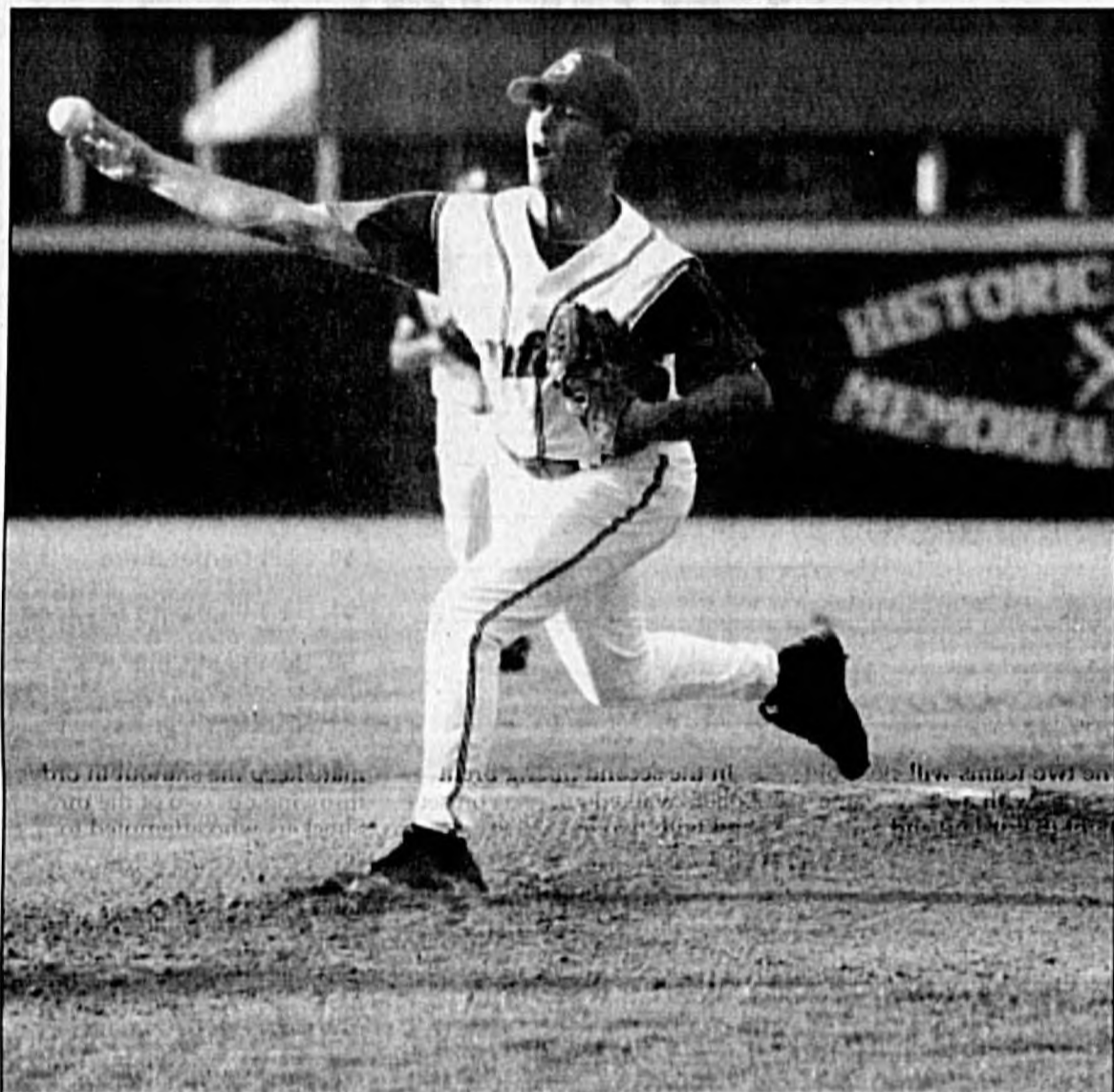

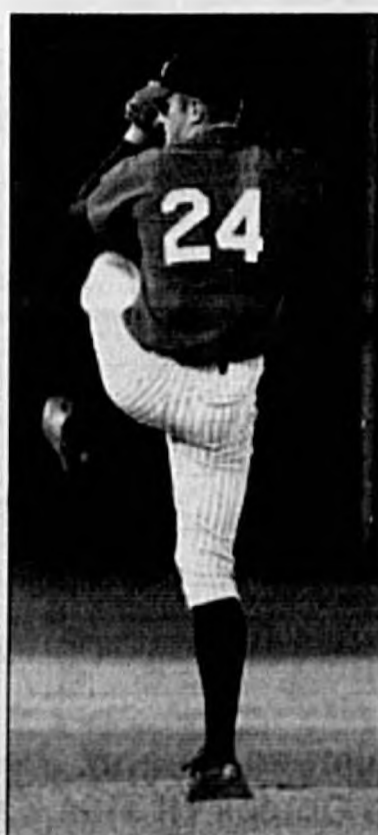

"You can order a five-year license and have the effective date for the license set up for 60 days after the purchase," Wattendorf said. "The offer is first-come, first-served while supplies last. Vendors will be notified and the agency's Web site (MyFWC.com) updated before we run out of supplies."

FWC SETS NET MEASUREMENT WORKSHOPS
The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) has scheduled a series of workshops across the state concerning a proposed rule to standardize net-measurement procedures.

Rules that regulate net fishing in Florida's waters are scat-

tered throughout the Florida Constitution, Florida Statutes and FWC rules. Plans are to bring all the regulations together in a single rule to reduce confusion.

The FWC plans to gather public testimony concerning the preliminary draft rule.

FWC CONTINUES PUFFER FISH BAN INDEFINITELY

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) Thursday approved a rule to continue prohibition of all harvest of puffer fish from

the waters of Volusia, Brevard, Indian River, St. Lucie and Martin counties indefinitely. The Commission previously issued four consecutive executive orders to ban puffer fish harvest in east central Florida since April 2002, based on verified occurrences of severe illnesses caused by consumption of puffer fish.

Health advisories have warned people not to eat puffer fish from the Indian River Lagoon in the Titusville area (Brevard County) because the fish may contain saxitoxin, which causes a reaction similar to paralytic shellfish poisoning in humans. Saxitoxin differs from tetrodotoxin, which occurs naturally in puffer fish and can cause serious illness or death if the fish is not properly cleaned and prepared.

Unlike tetrodotoxin, saxitoxin poisoning can occur even from a puffer fish that has been thoroughly cleaned, cooked and frozen. The only way to prevent illness from puffer fish containing saxitoxin is to not consume the fish.

There are several theories to explain the origin of the saxitoxin found in Indian River puffer fish. One theory suggests that puffer fish are accumulating saxitoxin by eating micro algae containing the toxin.

Twenty-one cases of saxitoxin poisoning from consumption of Indian River Lagoon puffer fish

were reported in 2002. Two additional cases were reported in 2003, and five more cases have been reported so far this year.

Results from field sampling indicate the public health risk associated with consuming puffer fish caught on Florida's central east coast continues. The FWC has concluded that a long-term ban on the harvest of puffer fish is necessary until it is determined that saxitoxin is no longer present in this area. The FWC has included the entire Indian River region in its closure as a precautionary measure.

Several species of puffer fish are included in the harvest prohibition: southern puffer, northern puffer, marbled puffer, bandtail puffer, checkered puffer and least puffer. Puffer fish, sometimes called "puffers" or "blowfish," achieve their globular shape as they swell by swallowing water or air.

TENOROC RIFLE RANGES TO BE CLOSED FOR MAINTENANCE

The rifle and pistol ranges at the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's

Tenoroc Public Shooting Range in Lakeland will be closed for repair starting Monday, June 15, for about three weeks.

Required periodic de-leading of the berms will close only the 15, 50 and 100-yard rifle and pistol ranges. The shotgun portions of the range, which include five-stand and sporting clays, the archery ranges and pro shop will remain open during normal operating hours throughout the maintenance period.

"The de-leading procedure is a regular part of the agency's maintenance plan for the range," said John Weatherholt, regional hunter safety administrator for the FWC.

The Tenoroc Public Shooting Range is open Thursday through Monday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sportsmen wanting more information about the variety of shooting opportunities and programs at Tenoroc may contact the pro shop by calling (863) 666-2500.

BOAT.U.S. URGES BOATERS NOT TO RELY ON GPS NAVIGATION NEAR CAPE HATTERAS, NC AND JACKSONVILLE THIS WEEK

With little advance warning to recreational boaters, the Department of Defense will be conducting radio interference tests on the Global Positioning System (GPS) near Cape Hatteras, NC, and Jacksonville, from Friday, June 11 through Sunday, June 20. The Department is advising boaters that they should not rely on any GPS equipment during the hours below because of "severe disruptions to GPS service," according to a notice posted by the U.S. Coast Guard's Navigation Center at <http://www.navcen.uscg.gov>. A "Local Notice to Mariners" was recently posted and warnings are also expected to be broadcast by the Coast Guard

on VHF Ch. 16. "GPS should not be relied on for navigation by boats transiting...approximately 50-60 miles seaward" of Cape Hatteras and "Out to 80 miles in the area of the Florida coast between Jacksonville and Melbourne," said the notice. The periodic tests are done to help determine the Global Positioning System's resistance to jamming and whether cellular phones, ham radios, CB radios and other similar ultra-high wireless transmitters degrade the system's reliability. Cell phone reception in the areas could also be affected, according to the Coast Guard.

"GPS navigation is widely used by recreational boaters and sometimes the only tool that gets them home safely," said Elaine Dickinson, Boat.U.S. Asst. Vice President of Government Affairs. "We are very concerned about the late notification and the scheduled timing during peak summer boating periods. Boaters can help spread the news that GPS, particularly with an auto-pilot, should not be relied upon during these jamming tests," she said.

* Sunday, June 13 - 8 a.m. to noon.
* Monday, June 14 - 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.
* Thursday, June 17 - 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.
* Friday, June 18 - 5 p.m. to 8 p.m.
* Saturday, June 19 - 7 p.m. to 10 p.m.
* Sunday, June 20 - 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.

Non-aviation related safety-of-life activities that require immediate cessation of the GPS interference tests should be reported to the USCG Navigation Center (NAVCCN), 24-hour phone 703-313-5900 or via email, webmaster@navcen.uscg.gov or by visiting <http://www.navcen.uscg.gov>.

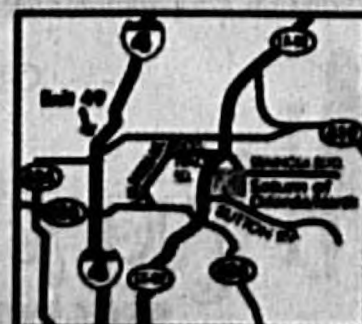

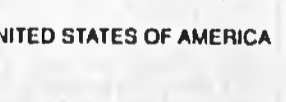

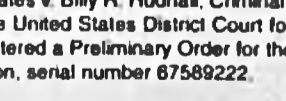

Medical records disposal results in no charges

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office has consulted with the Seminole/Brevard State Attorney's Office and the United States Attorney's Office, and has determined that no Florida criminal law had been violated regarding the disposal of patient medical records by Dr. Parviz Brahman.

The sheriff's office reports that at this time there is no indication that any of the private information contained within the files was compromised in order to facilitate a crime.

The sheriff's office was called out to an Altamonte Springs dumpster May 27 when records with sensitive information were found in the trash by an employee of a dental office, which shares space in the building with the doctor's office.

The case has been referred to the Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Civil Rights in Atlanta. That agency will make a determination about civil violations, and possible prosecution, within 30 days.

The medical records are temporarily being retained by the sheriff's office pending further direction from the Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Civil Rights.

Patient inquiries regarding medical records should be directed to the Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Civil Rights at 1-866-627-7748, and should reference the following complaint number: 04-23791. It should be noted, however, that the telephone number (1-866-627-7748) is a recorded/electronic message, and phone menu, with limited information.

All previous inquiries to the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, regarding patient records, will be updated by a telephone call as soon as further information is available.

Moving?: Sanford eyes 1st Street building

SANFORD — Downtown's most prominent building may soon be owned by the city of Sanford.

City Manager Al Grieshaber informed commissioners Monday night that the city has an option to purchase the six-story building that houses Wachovia Bank at the corner

of 1st Street and Park Avenue. The city is conducting its due diligence, and Grieshaber will present his findings, as well as a plan of action, to commissioners June 28. The city's

option expires June 30.

"We'll be looking at how (purchasing the building) fits into the overall plan of the city of Sanford," Grieshaber said. "We've got to determine if this

is an appropriate use for which to spend taxpayer money. We're looking at the short-term and the long-term benefits."

In determining whether the

city should purchase the property, which is listed for \$1.715 million, city officials must consider a number of factors, Grieshaber said. For example, the city must establish how much revenue can be generated by tenants. The top five floors are vacant and have been for at least a decade. The building needs upgrades to

Relatives charged in slaying of 11 year old

SANFORD — The Sanford police and Florida Department of Law Enforcement cold case unit solved its oldest homicide case to date and possibly its most disturbing.

Sanford police Chief Brian Tooley announced Tuesday afternoon that authorities had arrested Paul Robinson, 36, and Wanita Robinson Edwards, 43, both of Sanford, for the 1989

slaying of their 11-year-old niece, Curnetha Ammons.

Since its inception last year, the partnership between the two law enforcement agencies has now solved four of the 27 unsolved murder cases in Sanford. Some of the cases go back as far as the 1950s.

It had been four months since the cold case unit had made an arrest. Its last success with an unsolved homicide came in late January when Marcus Sheppard, 23, and Clifton Mulkey, 27, were charged in the 2001 murder of Milton Roundtree Jr.

According to investigators, the Curnetha Ammons case was much more time consuming as potential witnesses were as far away as Indiana and they needed to reexamine evidence gathered nearly 16 years ago. Sanford police committed six investigators full time to the murder case in 2001 and gradually chipped away at it.

The formation of the cold

Sanford hospital, airport conduct disaster training

SANFORD — For any other Sanford resident Tuesday morning was quiet and peaceful, but for emergency officials it was their worst nightmare — that is if it actually ever came true.

During a two-part disaster training drill, a dirty bomb filled with lethal anthrax detonated at the Orlando Sanford International Airport and "victims" were rushed to Central Florida Regional Hospital (CFRH).

Due to cost constraints, only one was transported to the hospital, but two sets of volunteers simulated the disaster for emergency personnel
