## Authorities announce 10 worst behaviors and locations

ORLANDO — The "Worst First" meeting put on by MetroPlan Orlando March 10 disclosed measures taken by Orange, Osceola, and Seminole county officials to make roads safer.

Politicians, law enforcement agencies, and transportation experts in the three counties announced the 10 worst driving

behaviors and the 10 target locations.

Randy Morris, Seminole County commissioner, and MetroPlan Orlando chairman, said he and his family "were blessed," but some families have not been so lucky when it comes to the outcome of accidents on Central Florida roads.

The 10 target locations were the intersections at State Roads 50 and 436 and east on

He said no charges would be filed against the boy. Robles said the boy's mother, Tonya Royals, 27, saw the fire started in her son's bedroom. She scooped him up and exited the white building with green trim.

Robles said the boy was curious about fire and told him that he started the fire in a trash can that had paper in it. Statistics

SANFORD — Jase Merritt of Lubbock, Texas, thought it would be worth a 23-hour drive to Florida to visit his brother, Josh, in Sanford and race in two supercross motorcycle racing events.

A nasty accident and two stolen motorcycles left him with a concussion and offering a reward for the bikes before he has to return home this weekend.

"I'm heading back to Texas on Sunday," said Jase Merritt, 21. "It's my livelihood. It's how I make my profession."

The police told Merritt that a lot of motorcycles are stolen, but usually recov-

## Zoo launches largest expansion

SANFORD — The Central Florida Zoo unveiled a \$3.4 million complex Tuesday, March 15, after a year of construction that included 63 days in a row of rain and three hurricanes.

The Wayne M. Densch Discovery Center and Zooblab, part of the Zoo Master Plan, represents the largest expansion the Zoo has ever endeavored. The Center includes two classrooms, a discovery lab and an animal holding area for an educational collection of animals, a news release from

## Sanford artist's peacock watercolor a festival favorite

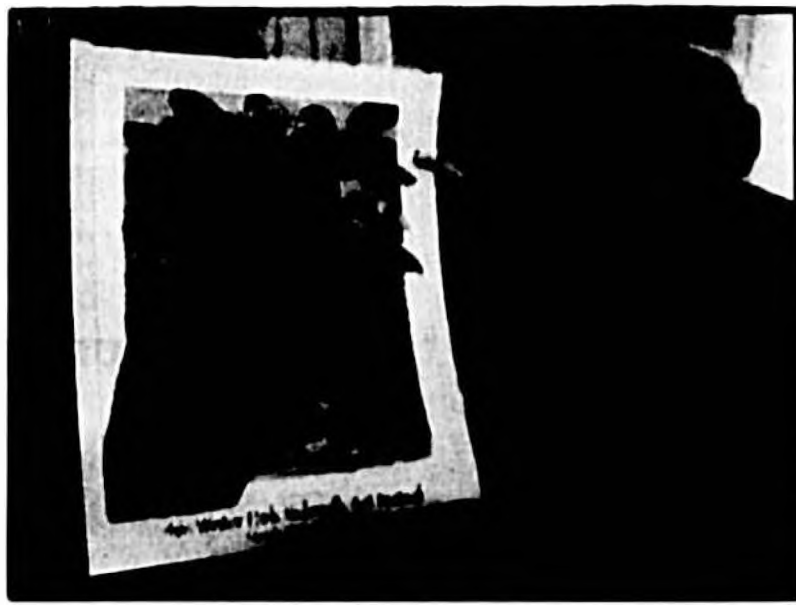

SANFORD — Anyone attending the annual Winter Park arts festival next weekend may notice a Sanford touch on the festival's promotional material.

Sanford artist Helen Hickey produced the official poster for the 46th annual version of the prestigious festival. The watercolor of a male peacock with banana trees and ferns in the background took months of work with the festival committee giving input throughout the process.

The committee had already viewed Hickey's work on the Crealde School of Art Web site. She had painted magnolia flowers. Hickey recently retired from Crealde to better pursue her own painting.

In fact, Hickey said, committee members already

knew they wanted a peacock design. She added that banana leaves and ferns from her own yard on Oak Avenue.

In an interview at her

home, Hickey said she had never painted a peacock in her numerous works, but it turned out later that she had painted at least one other. The

subjects of the watercolors in her home include cats, plants and her two daughters.

"It was my first peacock, but after this process I may do more," she said. "They are so beautiful."

She used yellow, red and blue to create all the colors on the poster, which can also be purchased on T-shirts and hats. Hickey said she earned \$1,000 for the project. She signed over the rights to the painting so the festival can use it for promotional materials.

For the peacock's tail feathers, Hickey said she let the colors run down the piece to add to the texture.

"They wanted it to look watercolor," she explained. The leaves and trees in the background were initially further away from the bird in the foreground, but the committee asked Hickey to move them closer.

"I started over rather than try to change it," she said. So she has that first peacock painting in her home. That's at least one other peacock painting.

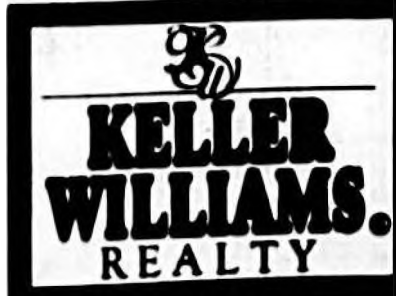
Hickey said her work appeared in the Winter Park festival on its 25th anniversary 21 years ago.

She once owned a gallery in Sanford from 1980 to 1982 at First Street and Palmetto. It was called the HMM Gallery, but she closed it after a tornado hit the building. Many might remember the hail-storm connected with that storm.

In between, she has worked as an art teacher. Hickey has a degree in art education.

She has resided in the Oak Avenue home for 32 years. She showed a reporter and photographer around the

### Pioneering fleet reservist Paul dies March 12

SANFORD — Horace E. Paul, 83, a pioneer with the Fleet Reserve was laid to rest with full military honors Tuesday. He died Saturday, March 12, 2005, after a four-year struggle with myelodysplastic syndrome.

Paul was active for more than 45 years in the Fleet Reserve Association. He served as president of the Sanford and the Umatilla branches.

With help from fellow shipmates, he organized and chartered the Fleet Reservists of Seminole County, Inc., in 1965. The organization provided a home and club for the Sanford Branch 147.

While serving as president of the corporation for more than eight years, the mortgage was paid off, according to an obituary statement.

In 1981, Paul was elected to the post of regional president southeast, and he served on the National Board of Directors of the Fleet Reserve.

The syndrome Paul had is described as a collection of disorders in which the bone marrow does not produce enough blood cells. According to a leukemia Web site, myelodysplastic syndrome is not considered a cancer, but some forms can progress into leukemia, a type of cancer.

Paul resided at 310 East Crystal Drive in Sanford.

He was born in Jackson, Tenn., July 28, 1921, the second son of Mary E. and Irvin D. Paul.

He attended elementary and high schools in Jacksonville, graduating from Robert E. Lee High School in 1939.

Paul enlisted in the US Coast Guard in 1939 where he sailed aboard four Coast Guard Cutters. During WWII he was engaged in submarine warfare with Nazi U-boats in the American and European-African Theaters while doing convoy duty and submarine patrol in the North Atlantic.

After WWII, Paul joined the U.S. Marine Corps and served in Fighter Squadron VMF-144. He then joined the U.S. Navy, serving aboard three ships and at three stations.

During the Korean War he saw action aboard an attack amphibious ship (AKA-94), landing troops in Korea. Paul retired from the U.S. Navy in 1963, with the rank of chief warrant officer after 23 years of military service.

After retiring from the Navy, Paul worked at Dynatronics/General Dynamics at the Longwood, plant as manager, marketing administration. He was responsible for compiling, editing and submitting company bids to space program contractors.

He retired from General Dynamics in 1973 and turned his attention to veterans affairs. He chartered the Veterans Council of Lake County to coordinate the activities of county veterans organizations and served as president and secretary.

In 1990, he was elected president of the Seminole County Veterans Affairs Committee and served two terms. Later he organized the USS H.A. Bass Reunion Association in 1991 and held the post of Secretary/Treasurer for 11 years until his retirement in 2002.

Paul was an elder and long-time member of the First Presbyterian Church of Sanford. In June 2002, he was honored by the church with a Lifetime Recognition Award and Plaque.

Paul is survived by his wife, Claire; son, James A. of Debarry; and daughters, Patricia E. of Melrose, Laurel A. Compton of Holly Hill and Tina M. Baldree of Sanford.

He was predeceased by his first two wives, Haloloe "Happy" Paul and Doris Woody Paul and his eldest son, Michael E. of San Mateo, Calif. He is also survived by step-children Rick Fite of Orlando and Devron Shields of Palm Beach Gardens, three grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

A memorial service was held at the First Presbyterian Church, Sanford, Tuesday morning. That was followed by graveside services at Oaklawn Park Cemetery, Lake Mary.

In lieu of flowers, the family requests donations to the Scholarship Fund of the First Presbyterian Church, Sanford.

50; the Interstate 4 ramp to Lake Mary Boulevard; U.S. Highway 441 and Gore Street; Pine Hills Road and Silver Star Road; International Drive and Kirkman Road; U.S. Highway 192 and John Young Parkway; 436 and Howell Branch Road; U.S. Highway 17-92 and State Road 434; State Road 551 (Goldenrod Road) and University Boulevard; and 17-92 and Poinciana Boulevard.

The 10 worst behaviors MetroPlan Orlando recognized were broken into seven behaviors of motorists, one behavior of pedestrians, and two behaviors of bicyclists.

Motorists' bad behavior included running red lights; driving aggressively (speeding, improper lane changes, tailgating); failing to yield to pedestrians in crosswalks; failing to wear seat belts; driving under the influence (DUI); driving while distracted and driving with a suspended or revoked license.

The problem with pedestrians is blatantly violating crosswalk signals; and bicyclist behavior included wrong way cycling and cycling without lights at night.

The three Seminole target locations had a combined number of 310 "more serious" traffic crashes, according to the 1998-2003 Florida Department of Transportation Crash Analysis Reporting System.

The report also revealed 211 injuries in those 310 crashes.

The leading contributing cause at all three locations was careless driving, while running red lights came in second. Other contributing causes in these three areas were following too closely, failing to yield, changing lanes improperly, exceeding a safe speed limit and backing improperly.

At State Road 436 and

Howell Branch Road five pedestrian crashes and three bicycle crashes were reported during the years 1998-2003.

Morris said the local "Worst First" forum will address these locations and behaviors through the three E's — engineering, education and enforcement.

Seminole County Sheriff Donald Eslinger said the county is one of the smallest in Florida but one of the most dense in population. The Sheriff's Office in partnership with all city police departments in Seminole County and representatives from the Florida Highway Patrol and Florida Department of Transportation began a Traffic Fatality Sub-Committee a few months ago. The purpose is to examine each fatality to determine if there was a way of preventing other serious and fatal accidents from happening at those locations.

"I'm very proud of the nurturing relationship we have between all agencies in Seminole County," Sheriff Eslinger said.

Another measure Sheriff Eslinger told the "Worst First" audience that Seminole County is using to discourage bad driving behavior is with a program called SHARP, or Seminole Homeowners Association Radar Program. (See separate story, Page 1A.)

Local homeowners associations are able to team up with the Sheriff's Office and are trained in the use of speed radar equipment. The citizens can then begin recording speed in their neighborhood.

MetroPlan Orlando and Seminole County have declared March 2005 as Traffic Safety Month for Central Florida. Residents and visitors are encouraged to drive, walk and cycle safely and responsibly at all times, a MetroPlan Orlando

The committee members were informed of SHARP and they asked to take part in the program.

SHARP stands for Seminole Homeowners Association Radar Program.

Seminole County deputies held classes for homeowner groups who were interested in their residents being more cautious of traffic laws. The members have a procedure they must use, and when they do clock a violator, the person's tag number is written down with a description of the car and the date and time of the violation.

"We do give some leeway," Dayton said. According to Dayton, if you are traveling slightly over the speed limit they are not going to write your license plate number down.

The SHARP members wear orange and yellow vests and generally radar during peak traffic times.

"In an hour and a half

time, we'll come up with 60 to 100 people," Dayton said. He calculated during an interview with The Herald that those drivers only account for about 7 or 8 percent of Heathrow Woods traffic.

"We noticed that by and large, the speed limit of most people lies between 29 to 31 miles per hour. They are trying to obey the speed limit," Dayton said.

The group from Heathrow Woods began participating in S.H.A.R.P. this past December, but the program has been around since the early part of 2002.

Currently there are three districts out of the six that have programs in place: Lake Mary and Longwood area, the Geneva and Chuluota area, and Fern Park and English Estates area.

"Other districts are set to implement the programs. It's a work in progress," Chief Deputy Steven Harriett,

Seminole County Sheriff's Office, said.

There are approximately 75 citizens who have been trained, not including Citizens On Patrol.

During the training, members of homeowner's groups or Citizens On Patrol, or anyone else who has done the training are given reconditioned radar guns that the Sheriff's office has in surplus.

After a vehicle has been clocked by a SHARP member, the tag number, date and time, and vehicle description is sent to the Sheriff's office. In turn, the Sheriff's office looks up the registration and does a vehicle check.

A letter is then sent to the registered owner that explains what SHARP is and informs the person that their vehicle was observed traveling a certain speed at a certain date, and reports the actual posted speed limit in that area.

"It's an educational aware-

ness approach," Chief Deputy Harriett said.

The letter does not constitute an infraction and is not included in any formal record in relation to the vehicle or the driver, a sample letter said.

"In the interest of neighborhood livability and safety, we encourage you and hope you will encourage drivers of your vehicle, to slow down and use caution when traveling neighborhood streets. By doing so, you will help us enhance the quality of life in Seminole County," the letter said.

SHARP member, Dayton, Sheriff Don Eslinger and Chief Deputy Harriett all said they have noticed a small decline in speed limit violators since the inception of this program.

"Our job is not to write tickets. It is to be visible to people and to make them take a look at their speedometer," Dayton said.

Lake Mary plans building dedication

## Sheriff's deputies arrest couple after bank reports fake checks

**APOPKA** — An Orlando woman and her boyfriend were arrested by the Seminole County Sheriff's Office March 10 for allegedly organized fraudulent activity in regard to counterfeit checks.

The woman, Nicole Caradonna, 24, of Gatlin Avenue in Orlando was picked up for a voluntary interview with investigators after a tip from People's First Bank, in Apopka, that Caradonna had opened up an account with three counterfeit checks at various People's First branches.

According to a Sheriff's Office news release, during a two-hour interview with the suspect, she made statements that she allegedly opened multiple bank

accounts, with multiple counterfeit checks, throughout the Central Florida area.

"She allegedly had these checks printed up as payroll checks, from an unknown black male and then would go to various banks to deposit and cash them," the report said.

The arrest report said Caradonna deposited three business checks with a fraudulent account number and fictitious company name imprinted on the face of the checks.

All the information was confirmed with Lois Duffield, of Wachovia Bank Inc.

On March 10, Caradonna then withdrew \$980 in cash from People's First in Apopka, the report said.

During the investigation, contact was made with

Caradonna's boyfriend, Whitman Herrera, 24, of Cedarstone Lane in Orlando. Herrera had an active warrant out of Orange County for failure to appear for grand theft auto.

At the time he was driving a stolen rental vehicle. He was arrested on the warrant and while speaking with investigators he also admitted opening multiple accounts with counterfeit checks.

Investigators will be attempting to gather further information from all local banks to combine charges on both Caradonna and Herrera, resulting in a Scheme to Defraud case.

Child Protective Services took Caradonna's 1-month-old baby into protective custody.

Jase has ridden motorcycles since he was 5 and started racing at 13. He had planned to run in the Orlando supercross event this coming weekend, but he wiped out in a 250 qualifying race at Daytona last Friday.

The accident knocked Merritt out. He was taken to a Daytona hospital and released later. His father quickly packed up the two motorcycles Merritt brought for the race. Merritt had been given medication and his wife

backed the motorcycles on their trailer into his older brother Josh's carport at about 12:30 early Saturday morning. Josh lives on 24 th Street and owns a landscaping business.

When everyone woke up to take their father to the airport at 5 a.m., the bikes were missing.

The thieves left a bunch of other equipment, Jase Merritt said, such as a tool box.

"I was amazed that they didn't take anything else," he said Monday. He said they probably saw the bikes parked there on previous nights. That night the trailer could have been backed in further and the chains attached, he said, but he was out of it from the accident.

This was the first race Merritt ran with the new Honda. Both Honda CRF 450 dirt bikes are worth about \$6,000, but the one from the accident now has some identifying features.

That bike sustained a bent radiator that would probably

have to be replaced. Merritt has checked with local repair places. It also has the radiator cap missing. The subframe is bent which makes the rear fender look crooked. Brand new Bridgestone tires ride on the wheels and a black 50-tooth gear sprocket has a gold chain, according to the police report.

Both bikes have Pro-Circuit Suspension decals on the front forks and the rear shocks. The older bike has blank number plates with factory graphics and Michelin tires.

Merritt is offering a \$500 reward per bike for their recovery or a \$500 reward for information that leads to the arrest and conviction of whoever stole the machines.

"They have four-stroke engines that make more of a thunderous noise," Merritt said. "They have a low, deep roar, not like a chainsaw or Weedeater."

His topic was "Women's Role During the Revolutionary War." His speech was both educational and entertaining.

He stated that before the War the men protested for political purposes while the women protested the high prices of goods coming from England as well as the low quality of items. When the reality of war approached the Committees for Safety raised the militia and the women were given the job of making clothing for the army. As husbands went off to war their wives took on many responsibilities previously reserved for men. Davis commented that men who were from 17 to 50 years of age were often shamed to join the army. The only qualifications were "Ability to see day light and to hear thunder and have two opposing molars."

When the army came to a town, the women were to provide food and shelter and also care for the injured. Some women who lost their husbands in battle became "Camp Followers." These women cooked, washed clothes, took care of the injured, carried supplies and also died. It was said that the spirit of the women was not to be conquered. They were an army of spinning wheels and with the war their rules began to change. They

were able to sign petitions and they took care of farms while their husbands were away. The speaker shared Martha Washington's cake recipe as well as an eggnog recipe from Georg Washington. He closed with a prayer by Abigail Adams.

After the program a short business meeting was held. Seven DAR members attended the Naturalization Ceremony for 220 new citizens the day before the March Chapter meeting. Sallie Harrison Chapter continued its 12-year custom of providing patriotic leaflets to new citizens. This year the selections included "The American's Creed" and "The Bill of Rights."

Virginia Powell closed the meeting with prayer. The next meeting is scheduled for April 8, with Lt. General Jay Garner (Retired) as guest speaker.

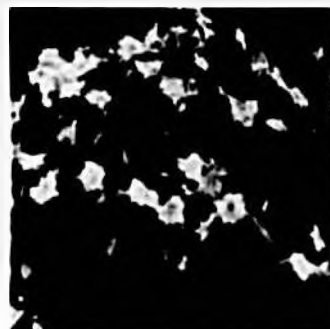

# Naturalist will lead hike into Lower Wekiva River preserve

SANFORD — Naturalist and author Bill Belleville will lead a hiking trip sponsored by the Friends of the Wekiva River into the Lower Wekiva River State Preserve on Sunday, March 20, beginning at noon.

There are two legs of the hike — a shorter 1.5-hour round trip hike to the edge of the Wekiva River, and a second longer one of three hours duration that continues from there to the edge of a cypress swamp. Participants can choose to participate in both or either leg of the hike.

Belleville, who has written books, magazine articles and produced films about aspects of the watershed, will take participants over trails and fire break roads through a pine flatwoods and down to the margins of the river. It will include viewing a bald eagle's nest, numerous gopher tortoise burrows, and an ephemeral pond where sand-

hill cranes often feed. The expedition will look for migrant birds, including swallow tail kites which are just now returning to the area from the Tropics.

There will also be an opportunity for photography. Signs of bears, bobcats, coyotes and other wildlife may be sighted. The group will see the results of a prescribed burn and how it is revitalizing parts of the landscape.

The Lower Wekiva River State Preserve is more than 23,000 acres (36 square miles). It is part of a larger 110 square mile tract of publicly owned land designed to protect the Wekiva River system and allow a wildlife corridor between Wekiva and the Ocala National Forest to the northwest.

The tour will meet at the trailhead promptly at noon. It is marked with a park service sign on the north side of SR 46 just to the west of the Wekiva

River. Be sure to bring water, snacks and wear comfortable hiking clothing and shoes. The public is invited to participate. There is no fee.

Belleville is the author of "River of Lakes: A Journey on Florida's St. Johns River." He has written and co-produced the PBS documentary, "Wekiva: Legacy or Loss?" and written for such publications as the national Sierra Magazine on the river system.

the Central Florida Zoo said. The new facility also houses a multi-purpose room, which can be used for corporate retreats, weddings, bar mitzvahs, and other large group meetings.

"This is a great gift from many people," CEO Joe Montisano said.

The Discovery Center was made possible by donations from local foundations, governments and private companies in Seminole County.

The main hall is three stories tall and the main building is 5,200 square feet. The multi-purpose room takes up 3,400 of the 5,200 square feet and can be divided for multiple configurations. The facility will be one of the largest meeting facilities in Seminole County.

Construction, which began last summer, overcame some interesting obstacles, the most apparent one being the mud and water. Construction Management for the project was done by Wharton-Smith, Inc. of Sanford.

"The building is basically built in a swamp," Murlin Jones, senior project manager, Wharton-Smith, Inc. said in an interview with The Herald.

Jones also said the company had 63 days in a row, during the construction, that it rained. Luckily, the project sustained little to no damage during Hurricane Charley, Frances and Jeanne.

John Miller, Vice President, Wayne M. Densch Foundation, said plans for the Center had been in the works since 2000.

"This is just the first step," Miller said.

Mayor Brady Lessard echoed what most said about what a great educational opportunity the new Center will be for the community.

During the opening ceremony Zoo CEO Montisano said it was the largest project in capital in the Zoo's history. "Hopefully, not the last," Montisano said.

With the new facility the Zoo will now be able to

accommodate 60,000 kids a year, compared to the 20,000 they were able to accommodate before.

**WHY SHOULD I READ THIS SUMMARY NOTICE?**

Your rights may be affected by class action lawsuits filed in Arizona, the District of Columbia, Florida, Maine, Michigan, Minnesota, New Mexico, North Carolina, North Dakota, South Dakota, Tennessee, West Virginia, and Wisconsin (the "Settling States"). Courts in the Settling States have preliminarily approved two settlement agreements (the "Settlement Agreements") which (1) provide for partial settlements of these lawsuits with Defendant International Paper Company ("IP") and Defendant Panolan Industries International and Pioneer Plastics Corporation (collectively "Panolan"), (2) appoint counsel for the Settlement Classes ("Class Counsel"), and (3) schedule hearings to consider the fairness, adequacy, and reasonableness of the proposed settlements. "HPL" or high pressure laminates are composite structures composed of multiple layers of melamine-impregnated paper, foil or plastic bonded together on the top with resin-impregnated paper under pressure (typically 1000-1400 psi), which are heated to form a single monolithic sheet or panel. "HPL-Containing Products" are products containing or made from HPL in a whole or in part (for example, HPL kitchen cabinets).

**WHO IS AN INDIRECT PURCHASER?**

An indirect purchaser is a person or entity: (1) who bought HPL manufactured or sold by Defendants from someone other than Defendants or their subsidiaries or affiliates, or (2) who purchased an HPL-Containing Product.

If you elect to remain in the Settlement Classes, and the Settlement Agreements are finally approved by courts in the Settling States, you will be bound by the terms of the Settlement Agreements, including the release of claims against IP and Panolan.

If you wish to exclude yourself from the Settlement Classes you must submit a Request for Exclusion to Plaintiffs' Co-Lead Counsel postmarked on or before May 21, 2005, at the address under the last heading.

**WHAT ARE THE PROPOSED SETTLEMENT TERMS?**

In exchange for the release of claims by the Settlement Classes, IP has agreed to pay \$4,000,000 and Panolan \$1,225,785 (collectively the "Settlement Amounts") for the benefit of Class Members in the Settling States to be allocated on the basis of the Settling

States' respective populations, minus Court-approved costs, expenses, class representative incentive awards, and attorneys' fees up to 33 percent of the Settlement Amounts, which will be determined by the Supervisory Court in Tennessee. Plaintiffs' Co-Lead Counsel currently plan to defer any request for Court approval of a plan of distribution of the Settlement Amounts, minus Court-approved costs, expenses, class representative incentive awards, and attorneys' fees, until the litigation has been resolved with the remaining Defendants. At that time, Plaintiffs' Co-Lead Counsel will submit a plan of distribution to the Court that, depending on the amount of any additional recoveries or settlements with the remaining Defendants, will either provide for distribution of all amounts recovered in the litigation, less Court-approved costs, expenses and attorneys' fees, to: (1) Class Members through a Court-approved claims process; or (2) Court-approved cy pres plans of distribution to public and/or non-profit entities that use HPL or HPL-Containing Products, if a claims process is not appropriate due to the impracticability of processing a potentially large number of claims and the high cost of doing so relative to the small size of likely payments to individual Class Members. If cy pres plans of distribution are used, payments will not be made directly to Class Members.

**WHAT IS THE SETTLEMENT APPROVAL PROCEDURE?**

The Supervisory Court in Tennessee will hold a fairness hearing on June 14, 2005. Courts in the other Settling States have scheduled fairness hearings at the locations and on the dates and times listed for each participating state in the full Notices.

At the fairness hearings, the Courts will consider, among other matters, whether the Settlements should be granted final approval as fair, adequate, and reasonable, and in the best interests of the Settlement Classes. Although you may attend these hearings in person or through your own attorney, you are not required to do so. If you choose to remain in the Settlement Classes and you wish to intervene, comment in support of, or in opposition to, any aspect of the proposed settlements, you may do so, but you must intervene or file your detailed comments or objections in writing with the Supervisory Court in Tennessee on or before May 13, 2005. If you wish to be heard in person, or through your own attorney, at the June 14, 2005 fairness hearing before the Supervisory Court, or in the Court in your State, you must file a written notice with the Supervisory Court on or before May 13, 2005, setting forth your intent to appear personally and stating in detail the nature of your comments or objections. The address of the Supervisory Court and further instructions on what to file are stated in the full Notices. A copy of any written comment, objection or notice must also be sent to each of the Counsel for the Settlement Classes, IP and Panolan listed in the full Notices.

### Raider men can't outrun Miami-Dade

The Seminole Community College men's basketball team showed that they belonged, but just as it did in their last appearance 16 years ago, the Raiders saw their season end at the hands of Miami-Dade College, 92-83, in the First Round of the FCCAA/NJCAA Region VIII Basketball Tournament Thursday night at Milton Johnson Health Center of the campus of Chipola College in Marianna.

The Mid-Florida Conference champions were making their first to the state tournament since 1988 in which they lost in the semifinals to then Miami-Dade Community College, North.

The time has come for Big Red.

That's right, the Big Reds are going to school.

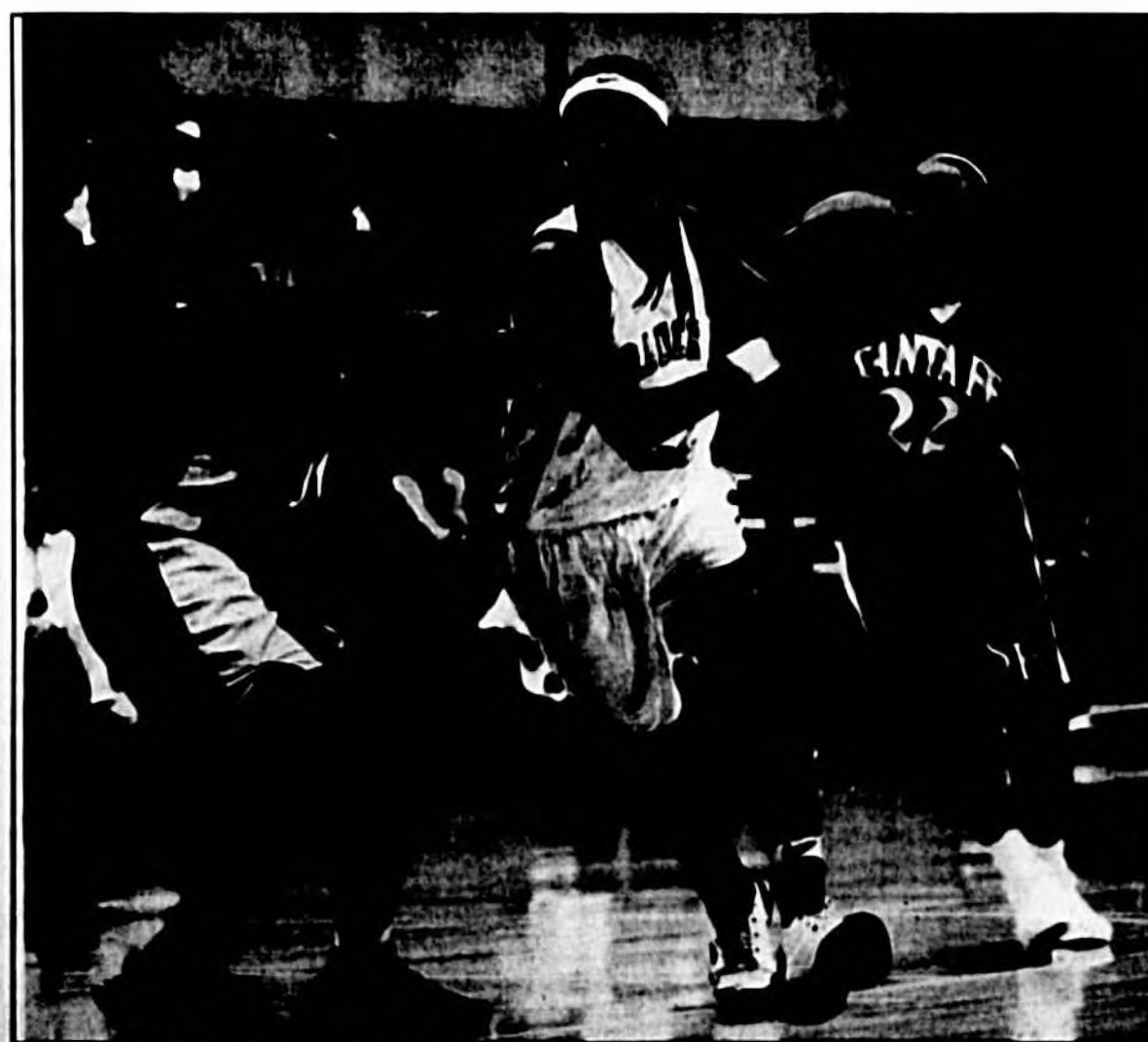
In the past few weeks we are beginning to see schools of Big Reds gathering in some of their favorite places. The Whale Tail in Mosquito Lagoon has been a hot spot for red drum and black drum.

Also, the Tiger Shoals area is producing some nice big reds. The warmer it becomes the more Big Red will tail. I have seen schools of over 200 fish recently and there are several reports of people catching 40-pound redfish. Each year these local schools seem to gain about five pounds. It seems like the 20-pound fish we were catching two years ago are now 30 pounds.

Mosquito Lagoon is the only place in the world that large schools of redfish live throughout the year. Our residential fish are born here and stay here. There is no reason for them to leave. Since the net ban there is so much bait in the Mosquito Lagoon. As the weather warms and the cold fronts fade expect to see more schools of Big Red in the waters of the Mosquito Lagoon and Indian River.

Redfish will float high in the water column as the water warms. You can spot them several ways. The most obvious way is a large tail gently waving above the surface as they forage for crabs and shrimp. Look for water moving as they form a v-shape in the water. Sometimes it looks like a torpedo speeding through the water.

## Gulf Coast stops ice-cold Raiders

For nearly 30 minutes, the Seminole Community College women's basketball team put a scare into three-time defending state champion Gulf Coast Community College, but the Commodores' experience came through as they eliminated the Raiders, 61-47, in the first round of the FCCAA/NJCAA Region VIII Tournament in Chipola College's Milton H. Johnson Health Center in Marianna.

Gulf Coast (26-3) has won three straight state titles and six of the last seven and was the national champions two years ago. Under the leadership of head coach Ronnie Scovel and assistant Grover Hicks, the Lady Commodores have made nine consecutive state tournament appearances, finishing as the state runner-up in their first season in 1997 and losing in the first round in the 2001 tournament.

SCC, which had 11 freshmen on its roster, winds up the season 21-9. The Raiders showed some improvement since play-

ing Gulf Coast in Ocala back in November. The Commodores won that contest, 78-60.

Both teams came out cold to open the contest with SCC holding Gulf Coast scoreless for almost three minutes.

The Raiders' pressure defense gave the Commodores big time problems in the first half as coach Lisa Nuxoll's charges forced 20 first half turnovers.

SCC led for much of the first half and did not relinquish the lead until Helen Johnson hit a three-pointer to put Gulf Coast on top, 29-28, with 2:08 to play in the half. The Commodores wound up leading at the break, 33-30.

The Raiders rallied back in the early part of the second half to regain the lead, 39-36, but Gulf Coast took the lead for good, 40-39, with 14:40 to play and then outscored Seminole 21-8 the rest of the way as the Raiders went ice-cold from the floor.

SCC's defense did a great job of denying the Commodores their bread-and-butter three-

point shots, holding the champs to only 1-for-4 from beyond the arc.

Another way to spot a large school is to look for a dark spot or big wad of red in the water. You may also see the fish busting bait. Be careful when you approach these fish so you do not spook them. A stealthy approach is important. Try to keep the fish to the side and do not get behind them and push them. They will just keep going and then will be very hard to

catch.  
Top water plugs are a great way to start the day. A Rip Tide Flats Chub rigged with a Dacinhi Bleeding Bait Butt Dragger 3/0 hook works very well. Another bait that works great is a Rip Tide 3 or 4 inch Mullet rigged on an 1/8 ounce Rip Tide Pro Jig Head. Remember to cast in front of the fish and try to lead them like a quarterback would lead a receiver. Try to cast across the

face of the fish.  
Whatever you do, get out on the water and find Big Red.
