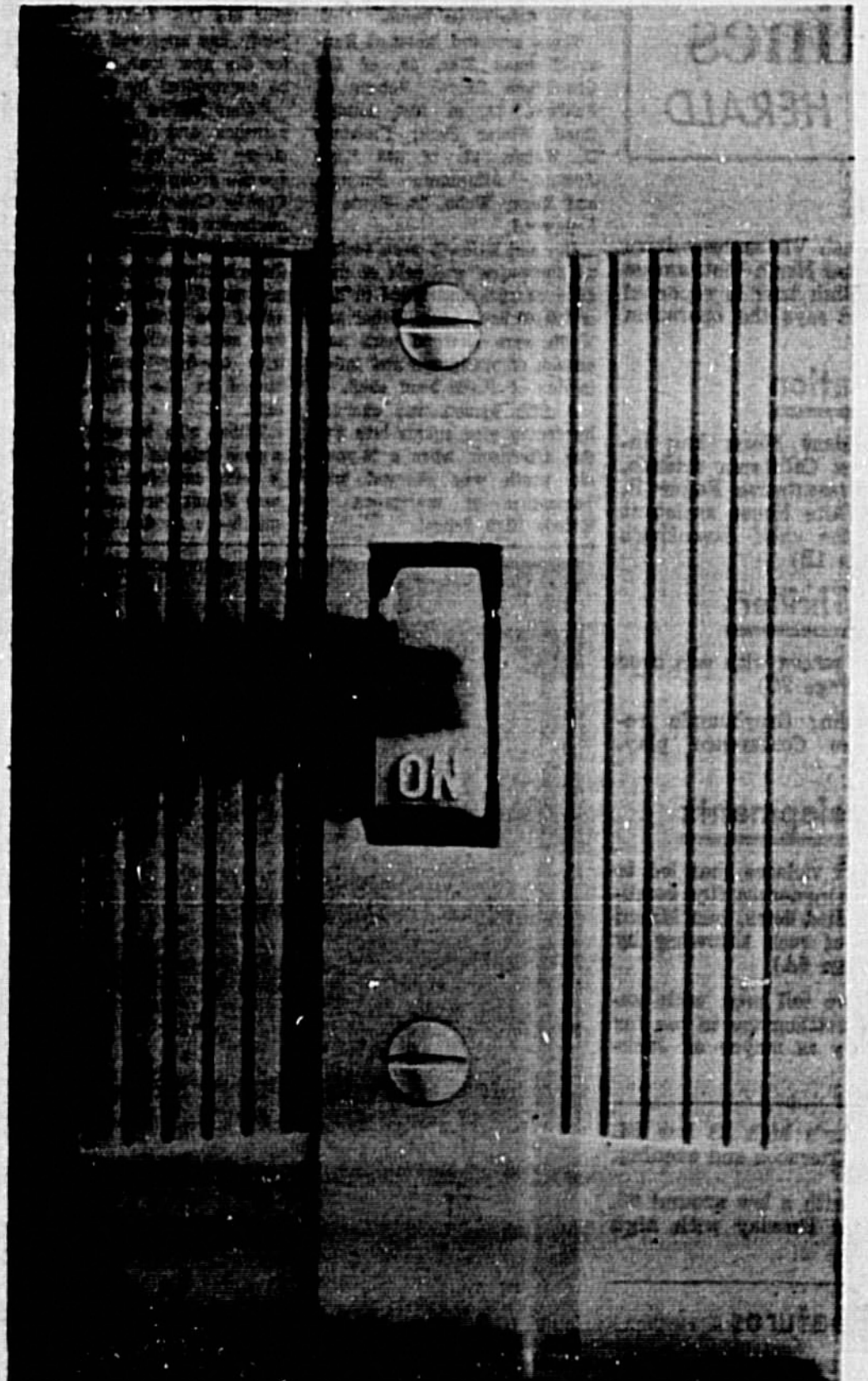

Apartment Complex Going Up

Ground has been broken for a 285-unit, \$4.8 million apartment and townhouse complex at Howell Branch Road and State Road 436 to be known as Sorrento Apartments.

The complex is being developed by Sorrento Apartments, Inc., which has principals United Associates, Inc., and John F. Lovandes, Orlando attorney, and will feature a traditional Spanish motif.

Occupancy of the first units is expected by about April 15, with total completion slated for late 1971.

Sorrento will consist of 28 single story buildings, except that within 19 of the buildings there will be two two-story townhouses.

It will feature one of the most extensive arrays of individual models in any Central Florida apartment complex. There will be a total of eight different floor plans from which to choose.

Sorrento will be a total-enclosed complex featuring Gold Medalium accommodations. Kitchens will include self-cleaning ovens and frost-free refrigerators.

Other features include four large swimming pools, social rooms and facilities for tennis and shuffleboard.

Alan Berman, AIA, Orlando, is the architect, and United Associates is the builder. Financing has been arranged through the Prospect Company. Sorrento will feature the theme "Another Adventure in Living" by Bill O'Brien and Jim Russell.

Head Start Project Extension A Wise Move

Petitions for the extension of "Our Present Project Head Start" from an eight months status to a full year have been prepared by the League Of Women Voters of Seminole County and will be circulated this week for voters' signatures.

The Seminole County Commission is on record as supporting this drive for petitions to bring about the four-month extension. Under the present funding, the eight months operation has been stretched to as many as 10 months.

Head Start is supported by 80 per cent federal funds plus community contributions of space, materials and volunteer time. It is considered as a remedial factor in preventing the need for expanded pre-school programs and preventing later drop-outs.

Indeed, the wisdom of Head Start programs is supported by just such observations. Not less Head Start but more vocational-technical training is an answer.

GAINESVILLE (AP) — Attorney Carol Wild Scott, representing 36 Raiford Prison inmates in an American Civil Liberties Union suit, was found shot in her home today. Police picked up her law assistant for questioning.
