##### No public school on Friday

Students and teachers will have a day off from school tomorrow in the Seminole County school district.

The school district plans a day into each school year to use in case some natural disaster or other "act of God" causes the cancellation of classes district-wide that must be made up at a later date. There has been no such occasion this year.

Therefore, classes tomorrow have been canceled so the school district does not incur the expense of an additional day of operation.

##### Seaplane proposal moved

SANFORD — A businessman proposing a seaplane sightseeing and passenger service for Lake Monroe may locate the business at Monroe Harbour Marina instead of Sanford Boat Works.

County Planning and Zoning Commission members Wednesday night rejected a request by Richard Hensch of Altamonte Springs to begin a seaplane business at Sanford Boat Works at Celery Avenue. Hensch sought a ruling on whether the operation was already allowed in the zoning classification at the boat works. But P & Z commissioners hesitated granting the ruling because it would allow seaplane businesses in all areas with the C-3 classification.

P & Z members ruled Hensch should seek a special exception from the county Board of Adjustment. Hensch must file his application by tomorrow to be heard by the board at their next meeting June 22.

Hensch said he would speak with Sanford officials about starting the business at Sanford Harbour. He said he hasn't ruled out a BOA request, though.

"Why single out seaplanes?" said Hensch this morning. "Why not high-powered boats that have a continuous sound?"

##### Fueling begun for launch

## Boat works expanding

SANFORD — Rex-Meyer Yachts may soon expand their boat-building facility at Port of Sanford and hire up to 40 workers.

Members of the Seminole County Port Authority were to hold a special meeting today to consider terminating a hold-over lease at a vacant 52,500-square-foot building to facilitate the expansion.

Port director Dennis Dolgner said Rex-Meyer is expected to finalize a contract with another boat company to build their boats for three years. Dolgner said he did not know the name of the

boat company. Dolgner said the contract would lead Rex-Meyer to hire about 40 workers initially and may expand to two, 40-worker shifts.

Rex-Meyer president Michael Meyers could not be reached for comment.

Dolgner said the expansion represents a continuing effort by Rex-Meyer owners to diversify operations at a time the bottom has dropped out of the luxury yacht business.

Since first moving their operations from Davie, Fla. to build the world-renowned "Midnight Lace" yachts in 1990, economic and tax changes have forced Rex-Meyer to build luxury buses and furnish boats made by other manufacturers.

When Rex-Meyer first moved here, it began

building 40-foot yachts and planned to begin regular production of a 68-foot model by 1991. Within five years, the company wanted to expand to a water-side facility to build 100-foot yachts with a workforce of 300.

A small number of the larger boats were built but a \$3 million loss of state bond authorization in 1991 delayed full-scale production of the 68-foot model. The port received state authorization to sell \$2.5 million in bonds in June 1991, but by then, the recession and luxury tax had killed investment interest in yachts.

"They've been tenacious," said Dolgner. "They've diversified and lasted through this." See Boats, Page 5A

## Lake Mary considers subdivision

LAKE MARY — The developer of Eagle Creek subdivision is planning for a new development called Eagle Crossing. A rezoning request is due to come before the Lake Mary City Commission tonight.

The property, containing approximately 36 acres of land is located south of the intersection of the Humphrey Road and Wood Street intersection. Developer Steve Hardin is proposing a residential area containing half acre lots with possibly 40 homes.

The land, adjacent to the Eagle Creek area, is presently zoned RCE, Rural Country Estates, which calls for a minimum of one acre lot sizes. Hardin's request is to rezone the property to R-1AAA, Low Density Residential, which will allow the smaller lots.

The matter was approved unanimously by the Lake Mary Planning and Zoning Board during its April 14 meeting, with four conditions, most of which have reportedly been met.

What was considered to be an adequate right-of-way was acquired along Humphrey Road with paving and drainage to be made. The property will also be zoned to not exceed the requirements of the R1-AAA requirements. The third requirement agreed on was the establishment of larger 3/4 acre lots, to be developed adjacent to rural residential areas in order to enter transition with the surrounding area.

The only problem lies with a requirement for adequate right-of-way along Wood Street from Humphrey Road, so access into the area can be provided in the future.

According to Lake Mary Associate Planner Mark Reggentin, "Mr. Hardin has been unable to acquire the additional right-of-way for Wood Street. Because of this situation, the City Attorney was consulted regarding the legalities of the situation."

Reggentin reported, "According to Mr. Julian, (Lake Mary City Attorney), the City cannot require a" See Resene, Page 2A

## Arvida irks Heathrow condo association

HEATHROW — When homeowners in one upscale Heathrow condominium development began talking about painting their building, they were shocked to find money they believed should have been set aside in a special fund for upkeep could not be found.

"If we don't even have the funds to paint the place, the group has a serious problem," homeowners association President Larry Cahill said.

Racquet Club Villas at Heathrow and the Arvida Corporation, which manages Heathrow developments, are embroiled in a dispute over budgets under Arvida's control. The funds contained money paid by condominium owners.

Fees are pooled to cover upkeep on the building where condominiums are valued at between \$150,000 and \$200,000, according to Heathrow Realty.

Arvida has denied owing anything but has offered a financial settlement, according to a letter from David Guy, Arvida president. But, it is not acceptable to the association.

## SHS group insistent on zone change

SANFORD — The members of the Sanford Committee, a group of residents dedicated to improving the image of Sanford, especially in the schools, have said they don't object to the concept of neighborhood schools put forth recently by board member Sandy Robinson.

But, committee members want to see the attendance zone from which Seminole High School draws its students expanded before there is any more talk of building a new high school in northern Seminole County or of the district applying for unitary status.

Achieving unitary status would remove the school district from under the 1970 desegregation court order which mandates, among other things, that Seminole's student population not be "substantially lower than 2,000 students." Currently, Seminole High has 1,818 students.

## Midway says thanks to two for help

MIDWAY — Seminole County commissioner Jennifer Kelley and Sheriff Don Ealinger were recognized by Midway Citizens Against Drugs Wednesday for their support in turning the Midway Community Center from a 1989 "crack house" to a focus of pride for the neighborhood today.

A new door stands at the entrance of the Williams Street facility and the entire building, once scarred with graffiti, has been freshly painted. Burglar bars protect once shattered windows. Inside, plumbing fixtures have been replaced and repairs are underway in the kitchen and on the air conditioning system.

"We appreciate the support (Kelley) has given us in support of the community center," said Johnell Jackson, MCAD president.

## Network to help kids with severe asthma

GAINESVILLE — Red Alert, a regional network of medical professionals, is helping save children from potentially fatal asthma attacks.

The program, developed at the University of Florida's Pediatric Pulmonary Center, identifies children at risk and teaches their parents, teachers and doctors what to do in an asthma attack.

"Certain young people are more prone to have a fatal asthma attack," said Dr. Arlene Stecenko, chief of pediatric pulmonary at the University of Florida's College of Medicine. "The families and caregivers of these children and adolescents must be very aggressive in obtaining immediate medical care during an attack."

Red Alert has helped more than 60 young people and their families since 1988. Of those, two have died from fatal asthma attacks. Currently, 49 young people from throughout Florida and south Georgia are enrolled.

## Republicans quizzed on 'ulterior motives'

TALLAHASSEE — Lawyers for Democrats and the NAACP tried in federal court to discredit Republican plans for multiple black districts in Florida's congressional delegation as a ruse to boost the GOP.

"Isn't it a fact that you attempted to draw districts with the appearance of electability and that you had ulterior motives?" NAACP attorney Charles Burr asked Republican Rep. Miguel De Grandy of Miami on Wednesday.

"No, sir," De Grandy replied. "We tried to enfranchise as many African-American communities as possible."

The Republican proposal, also backed by some African-American groups, would carve out four black-oriented districts and two Hispanic majority seats among the 23 available for Florida.

## Mom to live with kids until trial

WEST PALM BEACH — Linda Cooney, charged with shooting her ex-husband to death, will be allowed out of jail to live with her two sons until trial — even though one of the boys saw the slaying.

Circuit Judge Marvin Mounts ruled Tuesday that Cooney, 44, is entitled to bail while she awaits trial in the first-degree murder of tax attorney James Cooney.

Mounts, who heard two days of testimony before ruling, said he will set the amount of bail on Friday. Prosecutor Peter Magrino asked for \$200,000 bail because "this was a planned, premeditated killing for money and so that the deceased could not gain custody of the two children."

Defense attorney Richard Lubin, who maintains Cooney fired in self-defense, requested the Juno Beach mother be released on her own recognizance to live with her sons, 8 and 10.

Testimony Tuesday included a dramatic demonstration by a prosecution witness who used two life-size mannequins to show the judge how the Feb. 7 shooting may have occurred. A prosecution witness said Cooney was trying to get away when his ex-wife was shooting him, and had a knife planted in his hand after he was killed.

"She helped us to obtain safety inspections and led the support for the county to give us \$40,000 for the park."

"There is definitely a change out there from what I remember even three years ago," said Kelley. "Lots of people are coming out to Midway Pride Day. People are sitting on their porches. We need to get that fear out of there and get people communicating."

Jackson said Kelley was also responsible for bringing the attention of Walt Disney World officials to the center, which resulted in a \$2,500 community service grant last month. The money was used to install fire safety equipment at the center.

Jackson also had praise for Sheriff Eslinger. Last year, Eslinger pledged \$8,500 to build a basketball court at the center. When the county estimated the court would actually cost \$20,000, he contributed the

money to MCAD for whatever improvements they wanted to make at the center.

"The center allows the young people of Midway to engage in activities not available to them in the past," said Eslinger.

developer to meet conditions which are not required in the Land Development Code. He determined that the code, "would not require a developer to acquire additional right-of-way," and would be unenforceable.

## Not all Republicans against taxes

TALLAHASSEE — The panel reviewing Florida's tax system devoted most of its last debate on constitutional amendments to keeping alive a proposed tax on businesses leasing sites from government.

The Florida Tax and Budget Reform Commission had its final meeting Wednesday on amendments it would submit to the secretary of state today to place on the November ballot.

Secretary of State Jim Smith talked about his own proposed changes in the tax system, meanwhile, telling a news confer-

ence some of his fellow Republicans aren't adamant against raising more money for prisons and schools.

The tax commission meeting was attended for a second week by lobbyists who said taxing businesses on government leaseholds would hurt Florida airports and seaports.

Some panel members also objected to putting the proposal in the constitution, because of its exemption for Daytona International Speedway, which has a lease predating the 1968 state Constitution.

Member Arthur Teele urged the group not to withdraw the amendment, however.

"It will have shown that this commission,

when the heat was on, when the Guccis came out, will have given in," he said, referring to the designer shoes supposedly worn by well-heeled lobbyists.

Smith's news conference concerned the role of the 18 state Senate Republicans in blocking tax increases, despite Democratic Gov. Lawton Chiles' push for nearly \$1.4 billion in new revenue to ease cuts for education, social services, corrections and the environment.

Smith said some Senate Republicans disagree with their leadership's no-new-taxes stand but Senate Minority Leader Ander Crenshaw won't talk to him about it.

## King verdict influences retrial switch

MIAMI — Blacks in the courtroom applauded when a judge said the violence in Los Angeles persuaded him to move the retrial of a Miami police officer from Orlando to a city with a larger black population.

Suspended officer William Lozano now faces trial Oct. 6 in Tallahassee on charges that he killed two unarmed blacks on a motorcycle in January 1980, sparking three nights of racial violence in Miami.

The choice of Florida's capital angered Lozano's defense attorney and failed to please prosecutor John Hogan and black community leaders, who wanted to keep the case in Dade County.

"Tallahassee has the perception in the black community of being a redneck town," said Billy Hardemon, who formed the grassroots group "People United for Justice" to monitor the Lozano case.

"There may be slightly more blacks there than in Orlando, but they might as well have sent it to south Georgia," Hardemon said.

## Transient workers charged after kidnapping ordeal; child is safe

LAKE PLACID — Three Mexican transient workers were arrested and another was caught following a daylong kidnapping ordeal that ended with the safe return of the boy and recovery of \$250,000 ransom.

The ordeal began early Monday when three masked robbers snatched 8-year-old Daniel Murphy, grandson of a suc-

cessful Highlands County nurseryman, and sped off in the family's car.

Ten minutes later a man called the boy's mother, Heidi Murphy, and told her the ransom would be \$250,000 and that further instructions would be forthcoming.

After a few harrowing hours, the caller instructed her to take the money to a Circle K convenience store.

Investigators watched as a man scooped up the box. He made a telephone call and then drove to a deserted road, where he hid the box under some brush.

A few minutes later, someone dropped Daniel off at a coin laundry near the Home Savings Bank north of town. The man gave him a quarter, told him to call his home and left.

But Dade Circuit Judge Thomas Spencer said the "terrible aftermath of the Rodney King verdict" has only increased the "level of violence in Miami."

"This court cannot ignore the national tragedy of the urban riots that followed the Rodney King verdict," Spencer said.

## Two boys witness shooting of mother

COCOA — Two young boys who saw their mother gunned down in their home are "holding up pretty well," a relative says, while their mother recovers in a Rockledge hospital.

The man who did the shooting turned the gun on himself several hours later and was found dead in his apartment, Brevard County sheriff's officials said.

The shootout in the home of Debbie Teague on Monday night came just three days before a judge was to help resolve a long-standing dispute between

Ms. Teague and her ex-boyfriend, Johnny Grounds.

Her two sons, Kenneth, 8, and Brandon, 6, were watching television when the gunman burst in and pumped three bullets into Ms. Teague.

Kenneth called 911 and then tried to give his mother first aid.

"I need help! Someone just came in and shot my mom," the nearly hysterical boy told dispatchers. "His name is Johnny Grounds. Hurry up! Hurry up, please. She's dying!"

Grounds, 32, was found dead early Tuesday. He apparently turned the same gun on himself.

said Brevard County sheriff's spokeswoman Joan Heller.

Kenneth and Brandon, who were unhurt, were staying with their father on Merritt Island, officials said.

"They are holding up pretty well," said Renee Vickers, Ms. Teague's stepmother. "They don't know how bad it is."

Ms. Teague and Grounds had a long history of domestic violence, police said.

Court files show that a circuit judge issued a restraining order last month prohibiting the two from contacting each other after Grounds beat the woman and threatened to kill her.

"We've all said it was going to come down to this," Ms. Vickers said. "Johnny had told her about two weeks ago he was going to buy a gun and kill her."

Ms. Teague had asked authorities for help April 12, saying Grounds had threatened to "put a bullet in myself and my two children," according to court files.

Circuit Judge Edward Jackson had scheduled a hearing for Thursday on recent petitions by Ms. Teague and Grounds, claiming that each had violated the judge's order to stay away from each other.

## Kansas City-area superintendent interviewed by Seminole schools

SANFORD — Dr. S. Gene Denisar toured Seminole County and faced questions from the School Board yesterday afternoon. Denisar is the second of five top candidates being interviewed for the School Superintendent position.

At the present time, Denisar is superintendent for the North Kansas City School District in Missouri. He has held the post for over two years.

Board members each presented questions which are expected to be asked of each of the candidates. Chairman Nancy Warren explained, "Our questions deal with work you may have been dealing with in Missouri, and how you might bring your approaches to Seminole County."

Board member Sandy Robinson asked the first question regarding how Denisar "broke the ice when he first started his job in Missouri."

"I didn't even go into the office," he responded, "I spent my first few weeks visiting every school and looking into every program, listening to people's concerns." He added, "I got some very positive feedback from everyone, from custodians to teachers to principals."

Regarding his approach to handling leadership of the school system, Denisar said, "I believe trust is the most important value we can have." He explained, "Trust must be built through accountability, communication and credibility."

Board member Barbara Kuhn asked about how he communicates with the board, principals, teachers, parents and children. He responded that he believes strongly in verbal as well as written communications. "I issue a one page communications report every Friday," he said, "a weekly calendar that is delivered to each Board member, a 12-month planning agenda, and an annual report."

He also commented on meetings with various groups on a regular basis, and regular communications with approximately 500 business leaders who assist in various areas of school requirements.

Kuhn also asked how he deals with group problems. "I meet regularly with ethnic and minority groups," he said, and I am on a panel with the Police Chief of Kansas City, regarding gang problems. I also work with the Justice Department in some areas."

Denisar admitted he has not worked under the requirements of a Sunshine Law as is in existence in Florida. He gave an example of how his school board is currently conducting secretive negotiations to purchase some property for a new school. "If the people we are negotiating with learned it was the School Board," he said, "they would probably double the asking price, and end up costing us a lot

more money."

Regarding dealing with the Florida law however, he said, "I have no hidden agendas, and I don't like surprises. If something is coming up, I think people should know about it, and learn the true facts behind the reasoning." He added, "As for the press, my door is always open to all reporters, in fact, I have regular luncheons with them."

Dr. Denison and his wife, Diana, spent most of the day touring the Seminole County area. "I'm very impressed with what we have seen," he said.

The School Board questioned Denisar for over one hour before several dozen school leaders and teachers who gathered in the meeting room.

Dr. Gary Mathews went through his questioning period last Friday. The third meeting this afternoon will center on Dr. Paul Haggerty, Philip McDaniel will be interviewed on Friday, and Dr. Diana Cabbage is scheduled on Monday.

The next regular meeting of the Seminole County School Board is Tuesday, May 12, and a decision could be made at that time.

## Surrender

Germany's terrorist Red Army Faction, born as the Baader-Meinhof gang in the late 1960s, may have called it quits. In a letter to a news agency, the RAF renounced violence against "imperialism and monopoly capitalism" because, it said, violence had only weakened it politically. Indeed, its crimes have won it no popular support nor led to the repression it sought to provoke as a way of inciting its ultimate objective: a Marxist revolution.

This surrender, if that's what it is, must come as a relief in a society in which more than 50 people, most of them government and business leaders have been murdered by terrorists, the most recent just a year ago. Yet there's a catch: The RAF wants its imprisoned colleagues relocated in a single prison and demands early releases for those who are ill; moreover, it promises to renew violent attacks if, in its view the German state oppresses the "underclass."

That may be face-saving rhetoric: Officials say that only about 20 hard-core RAF members remain. More to the point, the group's chief sponsor and safe haven — communist East Germany — has disappeared into a unified, democratic Germany. And although the German justice minister spoke recently of "reconciliation," which may have encouraged RAF leaders to sue for peace, he also has flatly rejected negotiations or concessions.

A similar terrorist phenomenon seems to have expired in Italy, whose notorious Red Brigades killed more than 400 people, including a former prime minister, Aldo Moro, in 1978. In Italy, as in Germany, democratic society did not yield to the repressive temptation.

Now, much of Europe faces a new threat of instability generated by the collapse of communism; ethnic warfare in Yugoslavia and parts of the former Soviet Union; angry, often violent reaction in the West to the resultant flow of refugees, and the growing popularity of right-wing, nativist political parties.

These threats must not be minimized; yet it's heartening that Germany and Italy, which gave birth to fascism, continue to hold fast to the democratic doctrines they have lived by for nearly half a century.

## Problem with 'life without parole'

Whenever a well-briefed opponent of the death penalty is reminded that, according to the polls, a large majority of the American people favor it, he is likely to reply, "Yes, but if those questioned are offered the alternative of life imprisonment without hope of parole, support for the death penalty tends to fall off sharply."

If it does, that's because those questioned have accepted another of liberalism's famous exploding cigars.

When the average person hears that somebody is to be sentenced to "life imprisonment without parole," he naturally visualizes the prisoner as spending his remaining years in a narrow cell, largely cut off from human contact — the type case being the high-ranking Swedish naval officer who was caught spying for the Soviets and now (or so I'm told) is awaiting death from old age in solitary confinement in an underground cell, being fed through a trap-door and never getting so much as a glimpse of the sun. Whether that is worse than a death sentence or not is debatable, but it is certainly a serious punishment.

But that is a far cry indeed from what the busy foes of the death penalty in this country have in mind when they slyly offer to settle for "life imprisonment without parole."

For starters, parole is one thing; "furloughs" are quite another. Let me remind you that the famous Willie Horton was a "life prisoner without hope of parole" when, on his 10th — I repeat, 10th — furlough from prison in Massachusetts, he raped that woman in Baltimore and brutalized her husband. What good does it do to sentence some bloodthirsty murderer to "life imprisonment without hope of parole" if he can, just by behaving for a while, earn the right to furloughs to help him ward off claustrophobia?

Then there's the matter of the physical conditions under which the sentence of life imprisonment is to be served. I have no desire to see prisoners maltreated; in fact, reasonably decent treatment of prisoners is, or ought to be, mandatory. But that very fact makes a lie of the mental picture that foes of the death penalty are peddling when they call for "life without parole" instead.

Let's agree that, assuming good behavior, every prisoner ought to have (and incidentally almost always does have) three meals a day, an opportunity to exercise, the right to have visitors, and access to radio and TV. But how about "conjugal rights"?

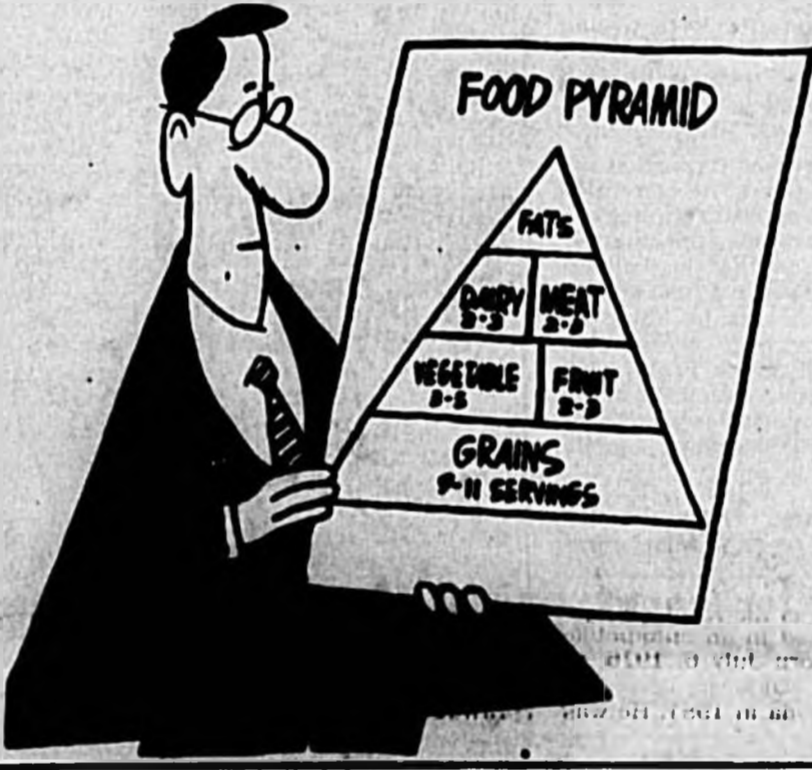
Sometime during the past 30 years, when I wasn't looking, it occurred to the bleeding hearts who are now battling the death penalty that even a prisoner ought not to be denied those physical and emotional consolations summed up under the euphemistic heading "conjugal rights." So, hey, presto! On the grounds of many (or, for all I know, all) prisons in America today, there are little bungalows where an inmate can shack up every so often with his Significant Other. That's what's known as "progress," and you wouldn't want to stand in the way of that, would you?

But how about murderers who have been spared the death penalty and sentenced instead to "life imprisonment without possibility of parole"? Would they get "conjugal rights," too?

## George, we're cynical, too

I think I have finally figured out why Ronald Reagan chose George Bush as his running mate: They are both from the same planet. Trust me, it is not Earth.

Remember how Reagan would say those utterly preposterous things that made you wonder whether somebody had spiked his jellybean jar with morning-glory seeds? Things about killer trees, for example. Or my personal favorite, uttered after the former actor's retirement from office as an explanation of why he accepted \$2 million for two brief speeches in Japan: He couldn't go "back to pictures," he said, because that "would be cashing in on the presidency." There is no other word for it, the man was surreal.

Bush manifests exactly the same trait, but he's more subtle and it took a while to recognize it. Take, for example, the "cynicism" theme he has been chewing on as of late. There is a "deepening cynicism about the way things work, or fail to work, in Washington," he said in a recent speech in North Carolina.

Guess what he was doing when he said that? He was hitting up fat cats at a fund-raising dinner. Guess why he's talking about cynicism in the first place? Because his image specialists told him the public wants change. So Mr. Insider, Mr. Resume, Mr. Ready-On-Day-One is now — presto — a reformer.

Put another way: Bush is cynically using the cynicism issue to win votes. It tends to make a body cynical.

Take the speech he gave in South Carolina last March. "Life means nothing without fidelity to principles," he said. Too often, he continued, "politicians do the easy things, the popular things, but it is the tough things that tell you something about character and honor and leadership."

This from the man who coddles the murderous Chinese gerontocrats, demagogues on flag-burning, displays half a dozen positions on abortion, flip-flops on taxes, advocates six amendments to the Constitution.

Yeah, George, we're cynical.

Something else he said in North Carolina: "Government has grown more distant. Too often, the government we get is not accountable, it is not effective, it is not efficient and, regrettably, it's not compassionate." This from the president who vetoed a minimum-wage bill because it paid pick-and-shovel people 30 cents too much, and the president who vetoed a bill that funded abortions for impoverished women who had been raped.

Yeah, George, we're cynical.

And something else he said in North Carolina: Americans "want a government that spends within its means, the way families do."

This from the president who submitted a budget proposal this very year that is \$400 billion in the red.

Yeah, George, we're cynical.

Last month, the Republican Party held its biggest fund-raising event of the year at the Washington Convention Center. More than 4,000 participants coughed up the minimum contribution of \$1,500 to attend. Many groups bought tables for \$20,000 or more. A donation of \$92,000 entitled the donor to a short photo-op with the president. The purchase of two tables earned a private reception with George and Barbara, or a reception with Cabinet members, lunch with Dan and Marilyn Quayle and a meeting with congressional leaders.

The event was called the "President's Dinner," but the money raised from corporations and wealthy contributors — an incredible \$9 million — is "soft" money. It cannot go to specific candidates for federal office and is usually spent for general party purposes. Contributions do, however, buy the donor access to and influence with the high and mighty.

Congress recently passed a campaign spending limits bill that closes the "soft money" loophole. Bush vetoed it.

Yeah, George, we're cynical. Does it ever cross your mind that people like you have something to do with it?

No, of course not. People from — where did you say you were from? — people from the planet Hypocrite just don't think that way.

## Inner cities need 'enterprise zones'

No more commissions, with their eye-catching memberships and dust-catching reports. No more blue-ribbon panels, with their high-toned rhetoric and high-minded reforms.

No more political recriminations. And most of all, no more blueprints-for-a-brighter-tomorrow that never make it off the drawing boards of today.

Let the legacy of Los Angeles '92 — the latest in our history of racially triggered urban explosions — be a different kind of national resolve. Let it be, in a word: action.

We are all ready to act. We understand the problem — the McCone Commission's explanation of it to us after the Watts riots of 1965. Then the Kerner Commission explained it all again after the urban riots of 1967.

We can act now because we know one of Washington's few remaining secrets: The Great Domestic Policy War is all but over — liberals and conservatives are finally talking the same language.

Consider the solution to inner-city problems, as proposed by conservative Housing and Urban Affairs Secretary Jack Kemp: urban "enterprise zones."

And consider the solution, as proposed by liberal Rep. Maxine Waters, D-Calif., whose district was the battleground of the latest riot: urban "enterprise zones." Let all facets of government work together to bring investment, jobs, health care and education into an inner-city enterprise zone.

They differ on spending levels, but agree conceptually. Now ask Kemp and Waters about the needs of people living in public housing; they'll answer: "Empowerment," as in the old civil rights chant, "Power to the People." Help project residents gain the power to control their own lives and homes, and they'll conduct themselves responsibly; allow them to appoint the managers of their housing projects, and they'll take pride in their homes.

So, from the left and right, poles and ideologies have converged.

"I think there's an apparent consensus, rather than a real one," says Dr. Stuart Butler, domestic and economic policy director at the Heritage Foundation, a conservative think tank. "The liberals see the enterprise zone as a sort of domestic Marshall Plan. Our view of it is that government's role should be mainly to clear away the obstacles to private investment — the regulations, the tax-code restrictions."

Harvard urban politics expert Margaret Weir, who will soon be joining the moderate-to-liberal Brookings Institution, is indeed leery of some conservative proposals, such as scrapping minimum-wage requirements for inner-city businesses. But she adds: "We learned in the 1980s that there are some areas, notably in housing construction, where there is real potential for the convergence of liberal and conservative strategies." Programs in New York, Boston and elsewhere have proven that private funding packages for new housing can be assembled with support of public officials.

It is a sad-but-true commentary that it took the shocking acquittal of policemen we saw beating Rodney King, and the horrifying riot that followed, to provoke George Bush into giving the most statesmanlike speech of his presidency. After three years of fomenting racial division with controversies over Willie Horton and job quotas, Bush declared: "... We must allow our diversity to bring us together, not drive us apart."

#### Congressional pay raise decided today

New Jersey and Michigan raced to cast the decisive vote today in favor of a constitutional amendment barring Congress from giving itself a midterm pay raise — an idea first proposed by James Madison in 1789.

As of Tuesday, the amendment had passed in 37 states. One more legislature was needed to get the three-quarters majority required for ratification.

"The leadership has assured me there's a green light. Michigan will become the critical state. We'll be the 38th," said Democratic state Sen. John Kelly, who sponsored the resolution in Michigan.

But doubts remain about whether the amendment is so old that it's a legal dead letter and whether ratification — by many states that didn't even exist in Madison's time — will count.

#### U.S. backs poultry irradiation

WASHINGTON — The government is proposing that the poultry industry be allowed to use gamma rays to zap illness-causing bacteria in chicken.

The Agriculture Department believes irradiation holds significant promise to improve the safety of the food supply. But critics say the technique could be dangerous.

USDA on Wednesday proposed rules that would allow poultry irradiation to control bacteria that can cause food-borne illness. The public has until July 6 to comment on the plans before they could become final and irradiated poultry begins showing up at meat counters.

#### Government after doctors who owe

BALTIMORE — Twenty years ago, the government decided one way to get doctors to work in poor or remote communities was to put them through medical school. Now, Uncle Sam is after doctors who took the money but skipped the work.

The government says more than 1,156 health-care workers nationwide — most of them doctors — owe more than \$186 million to the National Health Service Corps.

Those who didn't live up to the bargain must repay triple what they borrowed. And on Monday, the Health and Human Services Department said defaulters must hand over part of the

Medicare payments they receive for treating the elderly. "Some of those physicians are really playing with fire," warned U.S. Attorney Richard Bennett of Baltimore, who is trying to recover \$3 million from nine Maryland doctors.

#### Researcher may lose grant

WASHINGTON — A University of California researcher has been using federal money to study the mating habits of aggressive Nicaraguan fish. He says his work eventually may lead to a better understanding of spousal abuse.

But the scientist, George Barlow, concedes that the connection is still unclear, and the Senate is in no mood to wait for the results. The balance of Barlow's \$270,000 federal grant, as well as money for 30 other research projects, would be eliminated under a bill to slash government spending by \$8.3 billion.

The bill cleared the Senate on Wednesday on a 61-38 vote.

Scholars may find the studies valuable, but they are "difficult to justify given the current fiscal crisis that is faced by our country," the Senate Appropriations Committee said.

#### Gorbachev promotes global society

FULTON, Mo. — Mikhail Gorbachev took the same lectern from which Winston Churchill warned of the Iron Curtain to declare the Cold War won and to promote his vision of a global society.

"One epoch has ended, and a second is commencing," the former Soviet leader told 15,000 people gathered at Westminster College to witness the historical symphony. "This is a turning point on a historic and worldwide scale."

#### Dietrich to be buried in Berlin

BERLIN — To some, Mariene Dietrich was as tough and as tempting as the city of her birth, a "good German" during a nasty time, a woman with iron conviction and fabulous legs.

The fact that this screen legend, this sultry chanteuse of smoky cabarets, spurned the sensuous city of night she so epitomized has for decades upset Germans who idolized her.

The nation's greatest star was a relentless foe of Nazism who spurned the exhortations of Adolf Hitler to return home as World War II loomed. Instead, she became a U.S. citizen.

She embraced U.S. troops at the front as they fought against her homeland. When she finally returned to Berlin for a performance in 1960, editorials and demonstrators denounced her as a traitor.

"Seminole has been losing students for the last five years," said Billy Higgins, chairman of the Sanford Committee. "The other schools in the district have been gaining students during that time."

Higgins said that the school board has repeatedly said "projections show that more students will be going to Seminole High soon." He said they are still waiting.

"We don't want projections," he said, "we want to see students."

In the county, district records show, Seminole has far fewer students than other schools. Oviedo High in Oviedo, with 2,060, has 13 percent more students; Lyman High in Longwood, with 2,241, has 23 percent more students; Lake Mary High, with 2,436, has 34 percent more students; Lake Brantley High in Altamonte Springs, with 2,558 has 40 percent more students and Lake Howell High in Winter Park, with 2,604, has 43 percent more students.

As Seminole loses students they also lose financial support from the state.

In addition to receiving money for each student enrolled in the school, high schools receive extra money for programs such as advanced placement classes and gifted classes.

During the current school year, for example, Seminole was at the bottom of the list in terms of state funding for those programs.

"It's a numbers game," Higgins said. "And Seminole is losing."

This year, for example, Lake Mary High School in Lake Mary, received, according to school board records, \$635,171 for its 2,436 students and its AP and gifted programs. Seminole received \$143,470. That is a difference of 443 percent.

He emphasized that the issue with Seminole is not a racial one as some have suggested.

"This is not a racial issue," he said. "This is a funding issue. Because a couple of neighborhoods have resisted rezoning, the school board is talking about building a new school while Seminole is still under capacity."

Pooler confirmed "delicate negotiations continue with Arvida." He said he hopes to settle the issue amicably.

Guy wrote that Arvida's offer to pay \$15,548 and to submit homeowners' claims to binding arbitration expires May 8.

"If we cannot reach a compromise by May 8, our offer will expire," he wrote.

When a resident board took over and hired Sentry Management Company, Cahall said, Arvida could not account for all of the money.

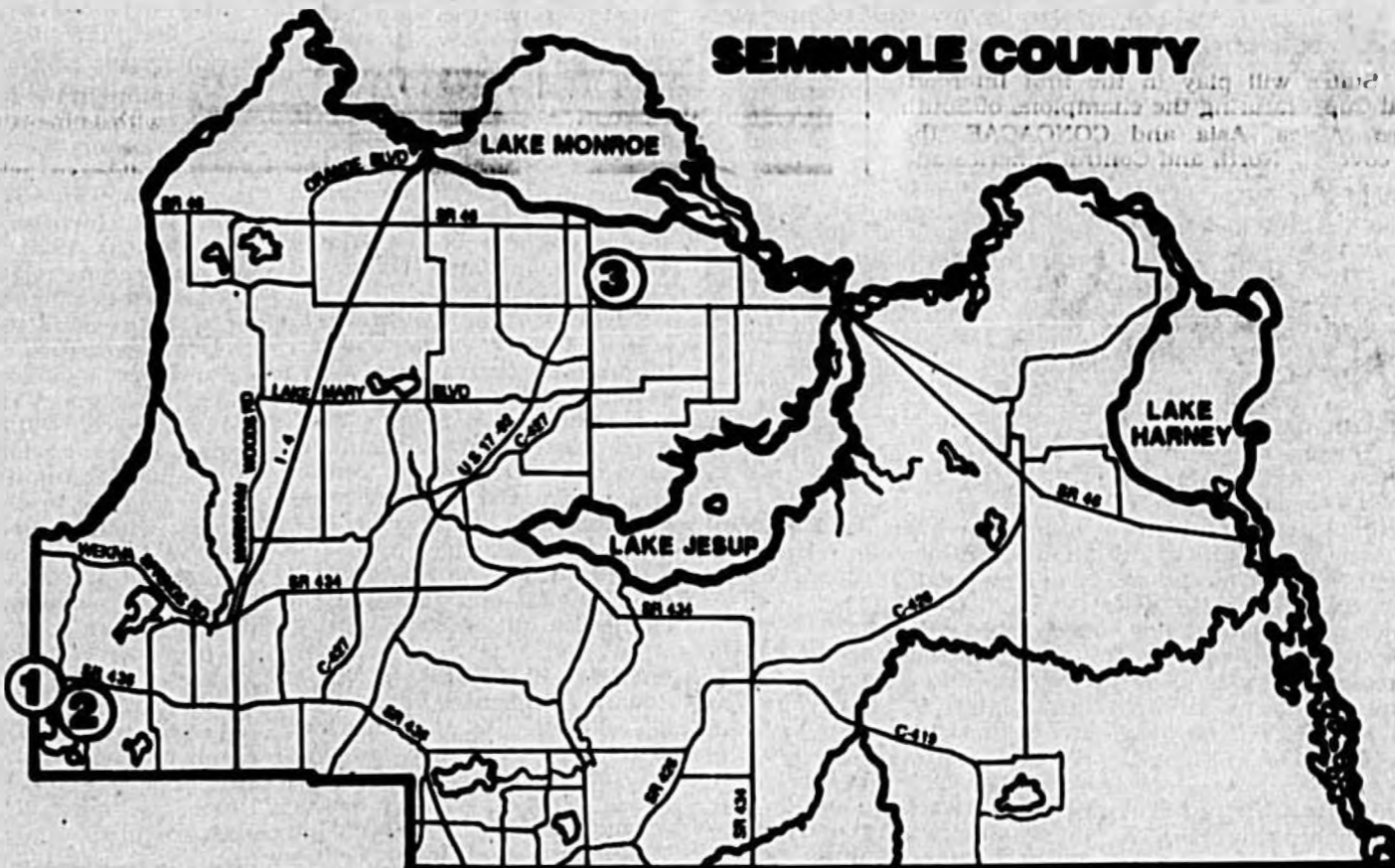

# Checklist when renting to own

I have been getting a lot of calls lately from people questioning Rent to Own as an option. It does seem tempting when we hear, "No Credit Check," "No Down Payment," "Free Service To Your Home!" Rent to Own companies are increasing in number rapidly in our area. The variety of merchandise is also expanding. A few years ago RTO companies handled only major appliances and household furniture, now many small appliances, office furniture and even jewelry may be purchased in some stores.

In Florida, RTO Companies must display the cash price of the merchandise. They must also display the monthly "rental fee," but not the total cost of the merchandise when purchased through the rental plan. A quick comparison with prices charged by other stores selling similar items will show the RTO cash prices are high.

To find out what the total "out of pocket" cost will be for the RTO item, multiply the quoted weekly or monthly rate by the number of months required for purchase. This total will be from 150 percent to 300 percent more than the quoted cash price.

Although the ads claim no credit check, many RTO companies do check to see if the potential buyer has a job, how long she/he has been employed and their prospects of continuing the job. The company may also get the names and addresses of relatives and friends.

Rent to own is often a costly way to buy. Prices do vary among companies. Most RTO companies have aggressive bill collectors and there is no grace period on RTO payments. If a payment is late, the item can be reclaimed without any credit for what has been paid, even if it is the 23rd out of the 24th payment.

It is wise to do a lot of comparison shopping before buying through the RTO company. Investigate credit options. Some merchants will extend credit to people with blemished records. Another option could be to shop from a thrift or second hand store. Prices are usually lower. Consider classified ads. Some RTO merchandise is used, some is new. The new items are more costly.

When considering an RTO purchase, get answers to the following questions:

- What will the total cost be?
- Does the company guarantee the item is new? If not, are you charged less because it is used?
- Can you buy the item outright at a reduced price at some point during the contract?
- Does the company provide repairs without charge?
- Does it provide a substitute or stop payment if the item is out of service during the repair period?
- Does the company require a large or "balloon payment" from the renter to become owner at the end of the lease?

• If a renter misses one or more payments, can they be reinstated without losing the investment up to this point?

• What are the penalties for late payment?

• With no grace period, will ownership be lost immediately?

• Does the company require renter to purchase insurance?

• Is there a delivery charge for the rented item?

• Is there a penalty payment if the lease is terminated before the end of the term?

Make sure all blanks are filled in before signing your contract! Read what you are signing, get a copy at the time you sign. Keep it in a safe place.

Then she gets real mad and starts yelling at my brother and me. I try to do everything I can to keep her from getting upset, but it never works. Either my brother or I do something she doesn't like and the yelling and drinking starts again.

I've tried to tell her that I'm worried about her but she says that having kids like us would drive anyone to drink and she can stop anytime she wants, so I should just mind my own business.

What can I do to keep her from drinking so much and yelling at us all the time? She's all my brother and I have and I don't want anything to happen to her.

**DEAR MELANIE:** First, you must understand that you and your brother do not cause your mother to drink and nothing you can do or say will make her stop. It sounds like your mother is an alcoholic and alcoholism is a disease that affects every member of the family. You didn't cause her disease, and you can't control or cure it. It's important that you and your brother understand these three "Cs" of alcoholic families. The best thing you and your

brother can do is to separate yourselves from your mother's drinking and attempt to have your own lives and activities. Many schools in Seminole County have special support groups for children of alcoholics.

Talk to your teacher or guidance counselor about possibly joining one. Also, there is a great deal of helpful reading material for kids on this subject. Check the "Bookfinder" in your local library or school media center. In it you will find many books about kids with problems like yours, and how they dealt with them.

Above all, remember the three "Cs" for families of alcoholics, and find some trustworthy and caring adults and friends to share your thoughts and feelings with. It isn't easy, but you can cope with the difficulties of living with an alcoholic parent.

**Call registry for breast implant research update**

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** With so many questions being raised about breast implants, it is important that women have every opportunity to receive the most accurate information about their implants.

There is a new International Breast Implant Registry that doesn't provide medical advice but offers women the option to participate in scientific research aimed at answering our current questions. By doing so, their physicians will be contacted about important product information, as announced by the manufacturer of the FDA.

Further, participants will receive a semi-annual report on implants. Women can register by calling 1-800-892-9211. All names are held strictly confidential.

**DEAR READER:** I was not previously aware of this resource. Thank you for writing. To provide further information, I am sending you a free copy of my Health Report "Breast Cancer and Disorders."

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** My wife has been plagued with boils in the groin area, buttocks and underarms. One doctor removed 10 glands from the groin, others have had special remedies that didn't work. Antibiotics have been successful but because of the constant return of boils, it's been unadvisable to take them on a continuing basis. Is there any hope?

**DEAR READER:** Your wife is probably suffering from repeated staph infections. These bacteria are common inhabitants of the skin and easily enter the pores, where they cause infection that eventually turns into abscesses. This is called furunculosis.

The condition is more common in diabetics and in people with immune deficiencies. However, otherwise healthy individuals may also develop recurrent boils. In my experience, the most effective way of preventing this unpleasant problem is to pay special attention to the skin.

Here's what I suggest your wife do:

- Bathe daily with a bacteriocidal soap, such as Dial.
- Avoid undergarments of synthetic material. Use only cotton and launder frequently.
- Do not use anti-perspirants. The aluminum salts in these products may block pores, trapping bacteria.

Shakespeare wrote: "Ha, ha! what a fool Honesty is! and Trust, his sworn brother, a very simple gentleman!" At the bridge table, it can be a bad idea to tell the truth with all of one's signals, especially when declarer has to guess the lie of the cards to make his contract. And it is doubly silly to signal if your partner never watches what you play. But on most hands it does pay to signal accurately, particularly at the beginning of the hand when less is known about the lie of the land.

Cover the East and South cards in the diagram. Against four hearts, you lead the diamond king; two, three, ace. Now declarer plays the heart king from hand. Plan the defense.

North's sequence, a transfer bid followed by a raise, showed at least six hearts and game-

invitational values. With only queens and jacks ("quacks"), this was a slight overbid.

An East probably has only one heart. West should duck the heart king. When South leads a second heart, West goes in with the ace and watches his partner's card closely. Here East discards the club two, denying any interest in that suit. This makes it easy for West to switch to spades and defeat the contract.

Are you thinking that, because there was a singleton diamond in the dummy, East could have given a suit-preference signal at trick one? That is true if you and your partner have discussed the possibility and — very important — if there is no chance of a trump promotion.
