Eight Million Cars Sales Picture For '65

plagued with labor difficulties shortages, ended its first 8 million-car sales year with predictions 1965 will be even

Top industry executives imports, will be sold in the United States in 1966, marking the first time in history back-to-back 8 million cars have been recorded.

The final count for 1964 car sales won't be in until after the first of the year, but it will top the 8 million mark. And that milestone came despite strikes by the United Auto Workers at General Motors, Ford and American Motors and parts shortages affecting all four U. S. car manufacturers.

Another record was the size of the settlement package between the industry in the UAW. The new three-year contracts will be worth from 54 to 57 cents an hour for each of the nearly 600,000 union members employed in

Despite the lush agreements, the union waged a 45day strike on national and local issues at GM, a twoweek strike over local contracts at Ford and a fourday work stoppage over the national contract at AMC.

The strike cut an estimated 675,000 units from the industry's production schedules and resulted in car shortages at the dealerships around the country. But the fourth quarter shortages were expected to cause an unprecedented first quarter demand for cars and spur sales next year. Optimism

All four companies completely restyled most of their 1965 model offerings. The fastback, or sloping rear roofline, came into vogue. Cars -crewon clean lines -mith a minimum of chrome.

Buyer demand appeared to be continuing strong and the youth market more potent than ever.

And, as Donner said: "Thus, 1965 bids fair to be the fourth consecutive good year for the Free World automobile industry."

Outlook

The state of the economy is excellent with the coming year promising "uninterrupted and vigorous expansion." Such perennial problems as employment, and prices are not fully mastered but "we are well on our way to their

Jobs And Output About 1.5 million new Johs opened up in the past year and the unemployment rate fell from 5.7 per cent to 5.2 per cent. A further drop in the jobless rate is expected in 1965 but the decline could be offset if the gross national product showed no greater gain than the \$38 billion increase forecast for 1965, same as in 1964.

Personal income rose to national average of \$2,228 and corporate taxes hit \$32 billion last year. Further gains were seen in both individual and corporate income this year.

Prices And Spending The cost of living showed a 1.2 per cent increase but price stability was maintained generally during the year and is expected to continue in 1965. "Consumers' confidence is strong."

Taxes

Last year's income tax cut did the job it was supposed to do in keeping the economy moving, and proposed reduction or elimination of \$1.75 billion in excise taxes is expected to help further this year. If the economy begins to weaken additional remedies will be proposed .



U. S. Not Alone

Americans may understandably have the feeling that we alone, of all the non-Communist world, care about what is happening in South Viet Nam. In terms of the sheer bulk of the aid this nation is expending, in numbers of men fighting and dying. we are carrying the main burden next to the Vietnamese.

There are, however, 24 other nabrangrouiding or committed to provide help to this beleaguered land, reports the Christian Science Monitor. This help may range from token gestures, such as 30 microscopes given to Saigon University by Switzerland, to a \$37-million dam and hydroelectric project being built by Ja-

Aid takes the form both of materiel and people. Not surprisingly, France has the largest number of nationals in South Viet Nam excepting the United States-482 teachers and medical personnel. Australia has about 167 pilots and jungle warfare experts serving with Vietnamese for-

From New Zealand has come a 25man detachment of army engineers; from Thailand, 17 air force personnel. Malaysia has trained about 2.000 Vietnamese officers on its soil since

Two other Asian nations with abundant experience with Communist aggression or guerrilla warfare are also aiding the South Vietnamese: South-Korea has recommilitary contingent of 140 men, as well as a mobile army surgical team; the Philippines, an expert psychological warfare outfit.




