



Keepin' it clean while wearin' green

This Saint Patrick's Day, March 17, some folks may find more green than they expected. In this case, it's the rubbish, junk

and debris in the St. Johns River, which has been their rotting for so long it's turn-

ing green. While other similar events are scheduled by various organizations, such as the Friends of the St. Johns, March 17 will see the biggest clean-up campaign of the year for this great river. It's the 2001 St. Johns **River Celebration.**

.... The most direct influence on the St. Johns River in Seminole County

is the Little Wekiva River, which flows into the Wekiva River on Seminole County's west side. The Wekiva enters the St. Johns on the northwest corner of the county, north of Lake Monroe.

On the east side, the Econlockhatchee River flows into the St. Johns. Lake Jesup, north of Casselberry and east of Longwood, is connected to the St. Johns south of where the river forms Lake Monroe. Another waterway in the county is Lake Harney, which is fed by Deep Creek.

All of these waterways have their share of contamination, much of which has been caused by debris being tossed from the shore or out of careless boaters.

This clean-up project is to remove the items. In the past five years, this St. Johns River Celebration, sponsored by the St. Johns River Water Management District and Keep Florida Beautiful, has taken two million pounds of trash from the waters.

Citizens are being asked to volunteer in this project. Sign up by calling Marie Lackey, county coordinator, at 407-665-5766. There is also a toll-free number for Keep Florida Beautiful, 1-800-828-9338

Participants are asked to bring a rake or a trash stick, dip nets, sunscreen, work gloves, and a boat or canoe if available.

This project isn't strictly for Seminole County. It will involve the entire St. Johns and all of it's contributing waterways from Jacksonville south. 

Thousands deserve pardons as result of unjust war on drugs

Karen Garrison didn't have \$400,000 to give First Brotherin-Law Hugh Rodham, so her twin sons didn't get clemency from former President Clinton.

Perhaps if Clinton had just seen Garrison's heartbreaking letter, written in October 1998 to the judge presiding over her



sons' drug trial: "I'm writing this letter with facts, feelings of indescribable despair, and (I am) at your mercy. (My sons) were found guilty by a jury. ... You may not remember, but next to childbirth, I will never forget that night. Now I'm asking that you consider (the facts) and my torm anoth here I and the torm facts) and my torn apart heart. Lamont and Lawrence are not guilty ..." But Garrison didn't have millions for

Clinton's presidential library or connections to well-heeled lawyers with access to the White House. So her sons remain in prison under harsh laws meant for drug kingpins, but which routinely bury penny-ante dealers

instead.

If Clinton cared about a legacy, he had a perfect opportuni-ty to leave one. Instead of granting clemency to just a few small-time drug offenders, as he did, he might have pardoned or commuted the sentences of thousands. He might have pointed out the folly of the so-called War on Drugs.

With many less-affluent Americans in prison rather than fancy drug rehab centers, Clinton could have redefined himself as a committed populist. With many African-Americans ensnared by the injustices of the system, he could have helped a black constituency that has been extremely loyal.

He could have started with the Garrison twins. Lamont and Lawrence were 25 years old, a month away from college graduation, when they were arrested in 1998. Friends, relatives and teachers all testify to their honesty, hard work and respect for the law. They had no criminal records, not even as juveniles. They wanted to become lawyers

But they had left a car for repair with a Maryland body shop owned by Tito Abea, and they had argued with him over the work. When Abea was arrested on drug charges, prosecutors offered him leniency if he implicated others. His testimony convicted the Garrisons. There was no hard evidence. Police could not tie the twins to drugs or guns or even money. Indeed, they were head-over-heels in debt with school expenses.

Now they are felons - Lamont serving 19 1/2 years while Lawrence serves 15 1/2.

While the case of the Garrisons is so heartbreaking because they are probably innocent, others - guilty of the charges deserved clemency because of sentences too harsh for their crimes Johnny Patillo, for instance.

In 1992, he was 27 and desperate for cash. Months away from completing a San Diego college, he agreed to mail a package for \$500. Although he admits he suspected the contents were illegal, he says he didn't know it contained 681 grams of crack cocaine. He is serving 10 years.

Then there is Duane Edwards, a decorated veteran of the Persian Gulf war. He doesn't deny selling 126 grams of crack to an undercover officer in June 1995; Washington, D.C. police found another 61 grams in his car. The U.S. Supreme Court rejected Edwards' appeal, although his lawyers pointed out



Shadow government shuns sunshine

Vision 2020's committee members are illegal. The Vision 2020 Committee has

been acting like a behind-the-scenes shadow government. This committee decided to impose a new tax on Seminole County. It also decided where the \$300 million raised by the tax is to be spent. It also expected the County Commission to approve the tax without even asking any difficult questions. At the Vision 2020 meeting this week, some committee members actually seemed offended mat Commissioners Maloy, Morris, and Henley had questioned whether it was a good idea for the County to spend approximately \$100 million to improve state and federal highways without any firm agreement with the state or federal government about when or if the County would ever be reimbursed. It seems even stranger for the County to do the State and Pederal government's work for them at a time when

legitimate County responsibilities such as jail and court facilities are not being accirement. The reason for this was explained in the Vision 2020 meet-ings this week. The committee has hired professional polisters to determine which promises will be effective in luring voters to sup-port the new tax. 



Allamanda: The buttercup

One of the best climbers for central Florida is the yellow Allamanda. A native to Brazil and relative to olean-

der and confederate jasmine, this vine produces very showy yellow flowers nearly year-round. It is a very popular flowering vine for home gardens but must be protected from frost. There are three

main species cultivat- Ferrer ed, the common yel-

low Allamanda, with the bright yellow flowers, the bush Allamanda with yellow flowers streaked with orange, and the purple Allamanda with its large magenta-violet flowers.

The Plant

The yellow Allamanda is a woody evergreen vine, with a milky sap, often pruned to grow as a shrub can grow up to 15 feet tall. The leaves are leathery and glossy, lance-shaped or elliptical, opposite or sometimes in whorls of three or four, measuring up to 6 Inches long.

The flowers, clustered near the ends of the branches, are yellow, very showy, waxy, trumpet shaped, with 5 flar-ing petal lobes, measuring 2 to 4 inches across.

The main flowering season is summer and fall, but produces flowers throughout the year. The fruit is a prickly capsule measuring about 2 inches wide. When mature, it splits

lar flowers with petals that flap in the wind like butterfly wings; "Halley's Comet" has

both double and semidouble yellow flowers: "Caribbean Sunrise" has pink flowers; "Hendersonii" has smaller yellow flowers than other cultivars, unopened buds are brown on the outside; "Nobilis" has large open yellow flowers. buds are brown outside and the flower tubes are narrower in diame

ter than other varieties; "Jamaican Sunset" has smoky

pink flowers; "Schottii" has large yellow flowers which have swollen tubes and brown stripes inside.


Uses

This plant can be used in containers or planters, grows very well in a hanging basket and can also used as a ground cover. It can be used as a vine to cover fences or trellises, as a hedge or as a freestanding, clipped specimen. It can become a handsome house-2011 plant.

Indoor Use As an indoor plant,

Allamanda do best in at least 4 hours of direct sunlight a day, night temperatures of 60-65 degrees and day temperatures of 70 degrees or higher. Keep the soil moist and fertilize every two weeks from April through September.

Apply less water and no fertilizer the rest of the year.

Culture

Allamanda requires full sun to light shade. It must be planted in a protected area because its tenderness to frost. It freezes about 30 degrees. It tolerates many soil types with good drainage, can grow well in acid to alkaline pH but grow best with pH values between 5.5 to 6.0. It has a relatively high drought tolerance once established.

Prune severely before growth starts in spring, and keep shoots trimmed during the year because it grows very quickly and can cover the fence, trellis or tree where it is growing very rapidly. Prune to develop a low, upright, spreading shrub that will pro-duce more blooms. It requires very little care.

Fertilize lightly in the spring and in fall with a general complete fertilizer. It may show iron or manganese chlorosis in alkaline soils.

Varieties

The "Henderson" and "Brown Bud" are two of the most popular cultivated varieties. The variety "Golden Butterflies" has yellow tubuPropagation Altamanda is usually propagated from stem cuttings obtained during the spring.

Toxicity

The plant is considered to be poisonous, but not know to be fatal. All parts of the plant, especially the fruit and seeds, and the ap of the stems and leaves, cause mild to severe stomach upset and vomiting. Bark is also said to be poisonous. It may cause dermatitis to sensitive persons. It is considered to have emetic and purgative properties. Toxin is self-limiting and treatment is usually not necessary.

Pest and Diseases

Allamanda can be affected by plant parasitic nematodes. Mites and scales can produce some damage and should be controlled as soon as they are detected using insecticidal oil and soap sprays. Caterpillars can occasionally defoliate the plants severely.

Bookkeeper sentenced for stealing \$202,000 worth of tax checks

An Altamonte Soringe bookkeeper has been sentenced to a lengthy probation term for cheating 22 Central Florida businesses out of more than \$200,000 in state and federal tax payments according to the Florida Department of Revenue.

And if the former accountant doesn't repay all of the stolen tax money, he'll go to prison, the judge in the case warned.

Samir G. Morar, 33, of DeLand, pleaded no contest to 23 felony orga-

nized fraud and theft charges stemming from a tax fraud scheme that involved stealing tax payments submitted by businesses that were bookkeeping clients. Morar was the president and sole corporate officer of SKM Tax Ald and Accounting of Altamonte Springs.

Morar was sentenced to 15 years probation by Circuit Judge Anthony H. Johnson. Under the terms of the probation, Morar is not permitted to engage in the accounting or bookkeeping business, must repay \$195,737.73 to the Department of Revenue, in addition to \$7,527.45 in federal taxes that also had been stolen from businesses between 1995 and 1996. Judge Johnson gave Morar 60 days to repay at least \$20,000 in stolen tax funds, with \$1,000 per month until the remaining stolen money is repaid.

money is repeid. While the state's sentencing guidelines did not provide for Morar to be sentenced to a prison term, the judge warned Morar if he failed to repay the stolen money or violated any other term of his probation, he would be sent to prison.

According to Revenue Department investigators, Morar worked as a bookkeeper for at least 22 businesses in the Central Florida area, some as far away as Fort Pierce and the Tampa area. Many of the businesses were owned by Immigrants unfamiliar with Florida law. Some were owned by Morar's relatives.

While Morar was to have deposited tax payment checks to state and federal tax agencies, he actually deposited them to his own bank account in Altamonte Springs, keeping the money.

Altamonte Springs, keeping the money. While he told clients he was a Certified Public Accountant, and Identified himself as a CPA on his business cards, he was not licensed.
