## Nude clubs may not fly at airport

### McLain: Adult entertainment study is good news for Sanford

Seminole County Commissioner Daryl McLain calls the county planning staff's newest adult entertainment study "good news" for Sanford, and one that offers a fair and reasonable shake for the entire county.

Although the Orlando-Sanford airport area remains on the list of possible locations for new adult businesses, 22 more zones have

been identified. This could mean the airport area eventually will be scrapped.

The report noted, too, that the entirety of the property currently zoned M-2 (east of the airport in Sanford) is identified within the current Airport Master Plan as a future airport expansion area. This would further diminish the chances of any adult clubs going in there.

At McLain's request, the county planners made a more in depth study of possible adult areas after

## Goff's gaffe: School official apologizes

Seminole County school board member Bob Goff has apologized for his recent actions and comments at an out-of-town conference, which resulted in a call for action against Goff by fellow board member Larry Furlong.

Goff's use of expletives and disparaging comments he reportedly made at a recent meeting in Fort Lauderdale and a conference in Tallahassee last week, were noted in an e-mail message dated Sept.

26 from school Superintendent Paul Hagerly to school board members. The message was the second sent out in a week by Hagerly regarding Goff's abusive treatment of school staff, which had recently extended to vendors and other citizens.

The latter message from Hagerly prompted Furlong to ask that Goff be censured by the board. If censured, the school board would disavow Goff's actions as a school board member and publicly reprimand him.

## Sanford hosts prestigious tour

### Members of Florida Trust for Historic Preservation to attend insiders' event

Sanford this week will be hosting one of the most prestigious tours in the state.

Florida Trust for Historic Preservation Fall Insider's Tour will be held Oct. 3-5 in Sanford's historic district. About 25 preservationists and members of the Florida Trust will be treated to landmarks not normally open to the public, and a walking tour of the downtown historic district.

"This is a very big deal because it exposes Sanford to statewide attention," said Jennifer Singelsen, co-chairman of the Fall Insider's Tour and project manager of Sanford Main Street Inc.

Singelsen said it was important to the community to host the event so people would remember the city, especially when Sanford is applying for grants for projects such as the Ritz Theater and Hopper Academy.

The tour will begin Friday when guests register at the Hopper Academy on Pine Avenue in Georgetown. Built in 1906, Hopper Academy is the first African American High

## Juvenile offenders: Sheriff lets you see them SWEAT

They are not government workers with the Department of Transportation, and they are not volunteers from a sponsoring organization working on Adopt-A-Road.

They are juveniles and this is the SWEAT Program in action. SWEAT is an acronym for Sheriff's Work and Ethics Training. SWEAT is also what these juveniles are putting back into the communities they have victimized.

No longer will juveniles be given simply community service to be carried out in an unspecified manner. Judges in Seminole County now remand juveniles to the SWEAT Program. Through SWEAT the juveniles work on targeted work sites at various locations throughout the county. Juveniles report at 8 a.m. on Saturday mornings. They change into jumpsuits and by 8:30 they have boarded a bus to go to that day's work site. Their day is completely structured.

The Sheriff's Office works with city, county and school officials, as well as religious and community leaders to determine work sites within the community. A Saturday is spent cleaning the roadside along West 15th Street

in Sanford. A clean-up detail at Rosenwald Exceptional Student Center prepared the grounds for an after school program directed by the Police Athletic League. A workday is spent on graffiti abatement in CasaLberry.

Project SWEAT began in July with the intent for juvenile offenders to have swift, decisive consequences for their actions and to give reparation to the community in the form of meaningful work. The program is a "two-sided sword" in the fight against juvenile crime according to Lieutenant Jack Cash. It teaches juvenile offenders that there is a consequence for their actions. The consequence in Seminole County is physical work to repay the citizens of the community.

The Director of the Sheriff's Office Department of Juvenile Crime, David Smith explains that SWEAT is just one initiative in the department's "balanced approach to combating juvenile crime". The balanced approach includes aggressive enforcement, aggressive prevention and aggressive intervention. To be effective intervention must be swift and it must have meaning.

The work sites are specifically chosen to relate to juvenile crimes such as vandalism, graffiti and litter. The projects have meaning to

## The Babe was in a league of his own

The attention lately was on Mark McGwire and Ken Griffey Jr. in their pursuit of the 61-home-run record set by Roger Maris in 1961.

Today's tribute is reserved for the Babe.

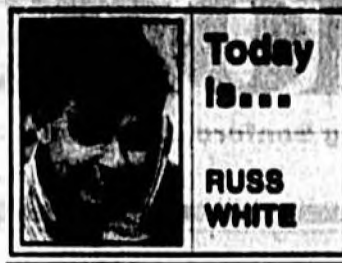
Babe Ruth hit his 60th home run 70 years ago today, on Sept. 30, 1927 against Tom Zachary of the Washington Senators.

The Bambino's record held for 24 years until Maris hit 61 for the New York Yankees in 1961, an expansion season.

McGwire, who began the 1997 season with the Oakland A's and finished with the St. Louis Cardinals, hit 68 home runs this year. Griffey had 59 for the Seattle Mariners.

Many baseball enthusiasts still consider Ruth the all-time home run champion - his records achieved long before the lively ball era and watered down pitching staffs.

The Babe was in a league of his own, of course.



James Meredith became the first black to enroll in the all-white University of Mississippi, Sept. 30, 1962. President John Kennedy sent U.S. troops to the area to force compliance with the law. Three people died and 50 were injured. Four years later Meredith was shot while participating in a civil rights march in Mississippi.

The late Truman Capote was born on Sept. 30, 1924. He died on Aug. 25, 1984. Among his best-selling books was "In Cold Blood" and "Breakfast at Tiffany's."

John Billington, one of the pilgrims to land in America, was hanged for murder on Sept. 30, 1630. He was the first criminal to be executed in the American Colonies.

The Colonial Room was selected as the site to begin Saturday's festivities. Lunch was served to a group of 400 who appeared so exuberant that waitresses immediately ushered them into the back room to protect the other patrons from what seemed to be teenage behavior. Everyone was encouraged to order their favorite 1957 delicacies so...the deluge of cherry cokes, ammoniated cokes, lime cokes, cheese crackers, hot fudge sundaes, fried bologna sandwiches, and cheeseburger royales began. A few folks even ordered vegetables, unable to overcome the bad habits of the past (40) years and were pelted by paper straw wrappers blown by coke drinkers.

Activities of the group shifted from the Colonial Room (site of Touchton's Drug Store) to the Seminole County Student Museum located in the Old Grammar School building where so many of the class at-

According to a report to comply with a judicial edict in June. The Board of Commissioners then reluctantly rezoned 158 acres east of the Sanford airport for as many as 38 adult businesses.

The new list of rezoning of sites can only improve Sanford's ability to reduce the impact of adult entertainment in our community," McLain said. "I'm optimistic we'll find another site - not around our airport." McLain represents District 2 which encompasses the Sanford area.

The next step in the adult entertainment process is a 7 p.m. meeting on Wednesday night by a select Planning Zoning/Local Planning Agency (P&Z/LPA). This committee will discuss the county staff report, and make recommendations to the board of commissioners.

The commissioners - not the P&Z/LPA committee - will pare down the number of sites at two public hearings. The first of the meetings more than likely will be in October, the second in November.

The county planning staff also is recommending that the "existing, lawfully operating" adult entertainment establishments be allowed to stay at their current locations - pri-

marily in the Fern Park area along U.S. Highway 17-92. McLain said today that he would consider grandfathering these clubs "if they can reduce the physical impact of their businesses on the community."

The 70-page report released on Monday identified a number of potential sites for adult entertainment business on or near highly visible roads such as State Road 436, State Road 46 and U.S. Highway 17-92. The sites on West 46 presented "serious environmental concerns contained in the Geneva Bubble Protection Act," McLain said.

Eventually the Board of County Commissioners will make a call that will be the least offensive to the least number of people. The whole idea is to comply to a judicial

edict that meets the criteria and legal parameters to evaluate the reasonableness and availability for sites.

- These sites must:
1. Have a genuine possibility of becoming available to a commercial enterprise.
  2. Be reasonably accessible to the general public.
  3. Be reasonable for some commercial enterprise
  4. Be commercially zoned for the use.
  5. In addition, sites may include industrial areas that have proper infrastructure such as sidewalks, roads and lighting.
- There are currently eight adult entertainment establishments and sexually orientated businesses that are licensed within Seminole County (including cities).

## The one woman who wishes she could hide her identity

WASHINGTON--OK, so I'd never even heard of Marv Albert. As a girl child, I have a V-chip installed in my brain that blocks out TV sports and their announcers.

This man dribbled his way on and off the national screen without leaving a single imprint, let alone toothmark, on my consciousness.

And if there's anything I know less about than professional basketball, it's that other indoor sport invariably referred to as kinky sex. Is that when you do it with the lights on?

But for the past week, the subject du jour and de la nuit was Marvin: the man, the teeth, the hairpiece, the garter belt, the guilty plea.

Even in Our Nation's Capital where actual real live people talk about campaign finance reform over the dinner table, the daily TV reports from the Virginia courtroom where Albert was on trial bore no resemblance to the Congressional Quarterly.

The local stations offered phony little "warnings" that the upcoming report contains "lurid" material. The radio gave hourly updates on conflicting testimony over the use of toothpaste. (Don't ask.)

The question before the court was whether the encounter between this man and woman was consensual. Albert pleaded guilty to the biting assault to avoid a charge of forcible sodomy. After this NBC career-ending injury, the only thing he's fit for is refereeing a Mike Tyson fight.

Still, in the wake of all the hype and headlines--"Marv Wiggled Out!"--the legacy of this case is a general unease about, of all things, media restraint.

But a third group prevailed. We looked to the day when women could cry rape as coolly as they could cry thief. We agreed that women should be asked to reveal their names but not forced. We felt that privacy was a covered bridge women needed to get us to a post-shame society.

The William Kennedy Smith case in 1991 tested that consensus sorely. In the Palm Beach rape trial, the woman was outed by some papers to a great uproar. She then appeared on TV with a blue blob in front of her

face. Then after losing the case, she outed herself.

Now we are even further along in the great cultural shift. For one woman, coming out as a rape victim is empowering. For another woman, being outed is re-victimizing. It is a very uneven time. And it makes for some great news disparities.

In the Albert case the media protected the identity of the victim. But not the second woman who cinched this case by describing a separate and similar encounter.

The victim who admitted to a 10-year relationship with Albert had her name and face hidden from view. But the names of other celebrities she claimed to have "known" were indiscriminately printed.

Today we grant anonymity to an alleged victim in a criminal case, but print her name if she files a civil suit. And we haven't figured out whether an accuser should retain her privacy if she turns out to be a false accuser.

As the stigma lifts, the balance shifts. It tips back from the need to protect victims and prosecute criminals to the need to deal equally with the accuser and the accused.

I don't believe that the woman in this case required anonymity to press her case. In the end, ironically, Albert pleaded guilty to assault, not sodomy. No media policy I know of protects the privacy of victims of biting.

This is the problem: One policy does not fit all anymore. The one woman who wishes she could hide her identity now is Marv Albert's fiancé.

the community. They are restitution to the victims, the citizens of the community. The work projects also put the law abiding citizens back in control. The community does not have to accept the victim mentality. Juvenile offenders may try to trash neighborhoods, but they will be put to work cleaning up those neighborhoods. If they do it again, they will clean it up again.

Sergeant Willie Chandler oversees the juveniles during their work day. Chandler's demeanor in the office is congenial and helpful. In the field, Chandler is reminiscent of

an Army drill sergeant. He commands respect from the juveniles. The juveniles are told when to sit, when to work, when to talk, and when to take breaks. The juveniles work hard and see the results of their hard work. They may start the day smiling and joking, but they finish it tired, sweaty, and not anxious to have to do it again.

This is not busy work. This is meaningful work that benefits the community and it benefits the juveniles. "It is a program with teeth," comments Cash. The general consensus of the juveniles says it all. "What I did to get here wasn't worth what I had to do when I got here."

"I stuck my foot in my mouth. It was wrong and I apologize," Goff said Tuesday. "I'm sorry and I've written letters of apology that will go out today."

The letters, Goff said, will go to Dell Computer representatives attending the conference in Tallahassee, who had complained about Goff's language, and to the school superintendent of Brevard County, who had complained about Goff's behavior in Fort Lauderdale.

Goff, who said some of the remarks he made were in jest, apologized for temporarily forgetting where he was.

while he spoke to Dell representatives about the purchasing cycle of computers for the school district. Goff said that during that conversation he discovered that the school could be saving up to 10 percent, or about \$300,000, if computers were purchased as a bundle order and not as separate orders as is currently done.

He said he then swore under his breath and smashed a coke can in his hand. Goff denies making any negative comments about Hagerty as had been reported. Goff maintains that Hagerty is controlling the board rather than the board controlling Hagerty, which is the way it should be.

Goff said he was elected by the people in Seminole County to ask questions and that is what he is doing.

"I'm not polished three-piece suit," Goff said. "I'm a person who says what I mean."

Regarding Furlong's request for censure, Goff said it comes at a time when Furlong is trying to become chairman of the school board.

Goff also said that if the board, in its quasi-judicial role, acts on his First Amendment rights, he will pursue remedies just like any other citizen would as guaranteed by the United States Constitution.

"The day they can strip me of my rights and duties is the first step toward George Orwell's 1984 form of government," Goff said.

By my reckoning, until age 35, he is an adolescent.

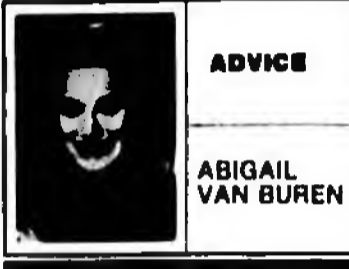
From 35 to 55, he is a young man.

## Minor problems of orange trees solved

Very often homeowners experience problems with their citrus trees that are very difficult to diagnose. Temperature, humidity and other environmental factors contribute to the development of those problems but, sometimes the genetic characteristics of the varieties will determine the kind of problems that will develop. Here are some of the most common citrus trees minor problems.

**Spray Injuries:** Liquid copper formulations have been shown to occasionally result in fruit blemishes. Ethion and oil combinations, applied as sprays under extremely hot summer conditions, have been associated with spray burn, leaf drop and twig damage. Generally, oil tends to increase the phytotoxic potential of any compound because it increases the penetration of chemicals through the stomatal pores and plant cuticle.

**Brown gum spots:** This type of injury usually occurs on the lower surface of leaves which are exposed to direct sunlight. Leaves which are not mature are particularly susceptible under high heat stress conditions. Usually only a few leaves are affected, but sometimes when the weight of a heavy crop is removed from the tree, resulting in changes in positioning of branches, a high

percentage of leaves may be affected due to exposure of previously shaded surfaces. Affected areas show layers of cells impregnated with a hard gumlike material. The symptoms can be mistaken for greasy spot or melanose. Greasy spotlike blotch areas observed on the upper leaf surface of certain mandarin hybrids, particularly Sunburst, have been associated with late summer mite damage and heat stress.

**Dead wood and twig dieback:** As citrus trees mature the upper foliage shades out the lower leaves. As foliage is shaded out, defoliation can occur and branches and twigs may die. The development of a certain amount of such dead wood is natural in the normal development of a citrus tree. Excessive dead wood, particularly in the tree interior and

base of the canopy, may indicate a need for pruning to allow the penetration of more sunlight to these parts of the canopy. Excessive twig dieback on the outside of canopies may result from a number of factors which cause defoliation including freezes, drought, nematodes, decline diseases such as blight, root loss due to water

damage, copper toxicity, greasy spot defoliation and spray burn, among others.

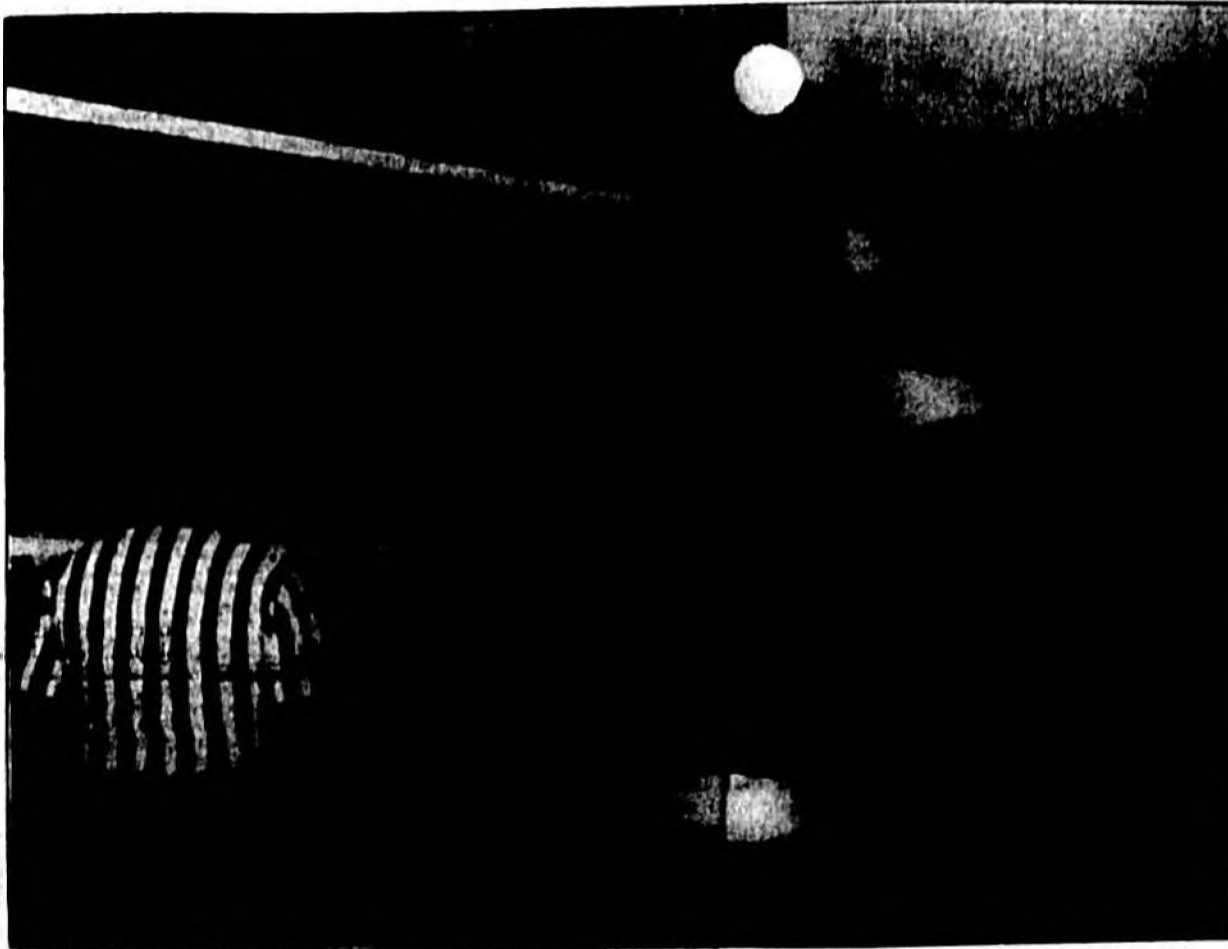

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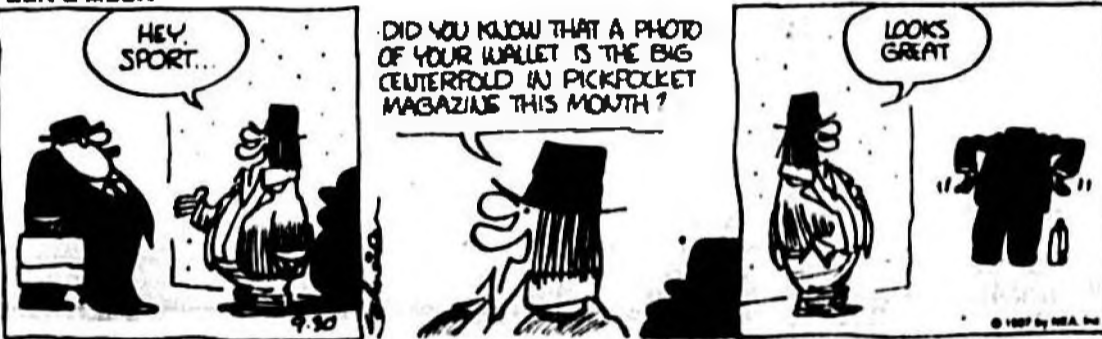

**Doctors should explain delays**



**MEDICINE**

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** My ophthalmologist kept me waiting in a darkened room for two hours after the nurse had put drops in my eyes. Although the doctor apologized for being late, she offered no explanation. I have lost faith in her. Should I have walked out on her? What do I do now?

**DEAR READER:** All doctors have occasional emergencies or run late in the office. These setbacks are, unfortunately, part and parcel of medical practice. Therefore, I don't fault your ophthalmologist for keeping you waiting. However, I will criticize her for not explaining the delay to you and giving you the option of returning on a less busy day. Her insensitivity was, in my opinion, reprehensible.

Rather than losing faith in her ability, I suggest that you contact her directly by telephone or mail to explain your dissatisfaction. If she's smart, she'll respond openly and forthrightly to your criticism. Your comments may actually encourage her to improve her office policy.

If she stonewalls you, take your business elsewhere.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** I have read that a certain medical writer has claimed that aspirin increases the risk of stroke. You have stated the reverse. What gives?

**DEAR READER:** The confusion arises because there are two kinds of stroke.

One, called "hemorrhagic," is due to a ruptured blood vessel with bleeding into the brain.

The second, called "thrombotic" or "ischemic," is caused by a blood clot in an artery in the brain. This type of stroke is the most common and is often preceded by "mini-strokes" (or TIAs) that result in temporary neurological disorders.

It is now standard medical procedure to recommend an aspirin a day to prevent thrombotic strokes. In patients with TIAs — or even full-blown strokes — the aspirin will slow blood coagulation, thereby lessening the chances of another neurological event.

This is not true of hemorrhagic strokes, however, in which an anticoagulant — even one as mild as aspirin — might cause further bleeding.

Hemorrhagic and thrombotic strokes can be differentiated by CT or MRI scanning. Thus, although hemorrhagic strokes are uncommon (except in hypertensive patients), all stroke patients should be scanned before receiving aspirin therapy.

**DEAR READER:** Many healthy people are extremely sound sleepers and have difficulty waking up. The reasons for this are unknown but are believed to be individual patterns in the brain's sleep center. If your grandson is normal in all other respects — and isn't concerned about his sleep pattern — you can safely ignore his sleep habits.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** My 18-year-old grandson sleeps very deeply — so deeply, in fact, that he cannot be awakened by shaking or shouting. He's always had this problem, but it's worsening. His parents can awaken him only by putting cold water on his face.

He is otherwise quite normal and doesn't fall asleep at inappropriate

**Get into the schools**

We must get more children to learn bridge. How do we do that? First, we have to persuade principals that bridge isn't the first step to gambling. To play well, one has to think clearly and to cooperate with one's partner — useful attributes for life.

In this year's end-of-term tournaments, the winners were David Young, Ben Schweitzer and Orrin Pail. This deal helped Young triumph.

I am glad to see modern-style bidding. (Why are so many beginners still taught 1950s methods, many of which haven't been played in tournaments

for 20 years? Two clubs was strong, artificial and forcing. Three diamonds was a positive response guaranteeing a good suit. After spades were agreed, South knew not to use Blackwood with a void. So, a couple of cue-bids led to the good small slam.

Well, good until you see the East-West hands. After a heart lead, declarer would probably fail by drawing three rounds of trumps ending in the dummy and discarding his heart losers on the top diamonds. Here, West ruffs the second diamond and must come to a club trick.

Young, though, received an ill-judged club lead. He won with dummy's nine, cashed his ace-king of spades, played off the two top clubs, ruffed out the club queen, and pitched his heart losers on dummy's diamond winners. West's ruff only stopped the overtrick.
