



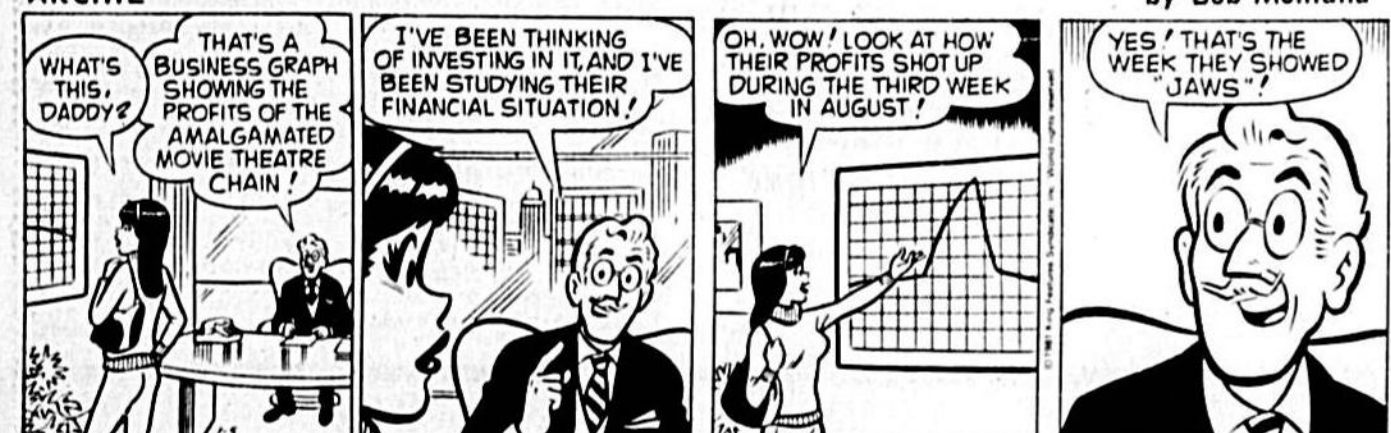

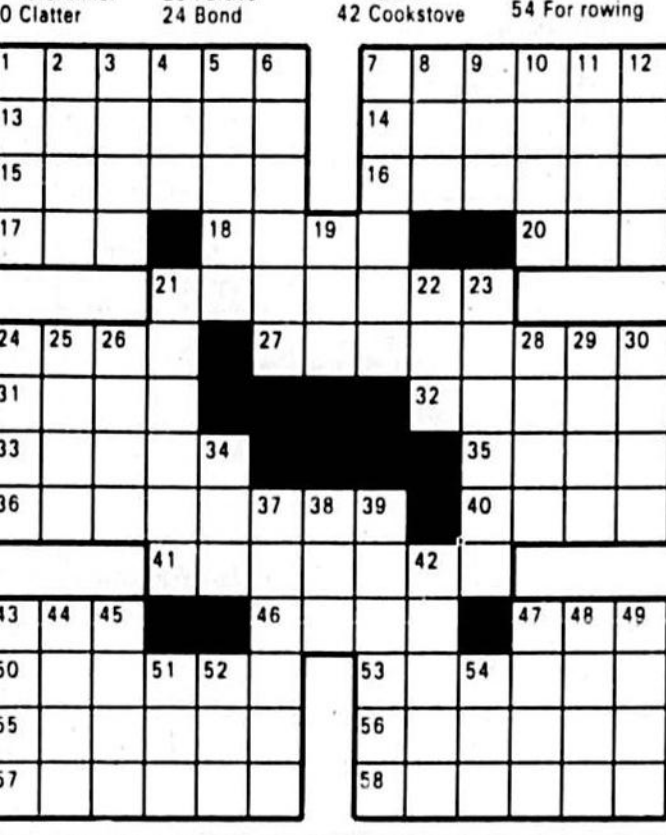

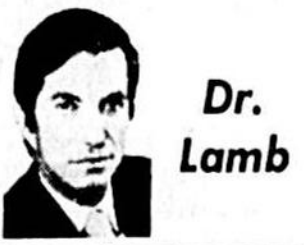

Antacids Useless Over Long Periods

DEAR DR. LAMB—I think my husband has an ulcer. He complains between meals of burning in the pit of his stomach. He has been taking a lot of bicarbonate. I've told him that it is not such a good idea but he won't listen to me. He has watched too many TV commercials and thinks that all he has to do is "plop, plop, fizz, fizz." Will he harm himself? What should he be taking?



DEAR READER—He should be taking himself to a doctor. Antacids for an occasional episode of indigestion are all right, but many of them are useless in even those circumstances. They should never be used on a long-term basis except upon the advice of a physician. Sodium bicarbonate is completely absorbed and too much can upset the body chemistry...

It is also a mistake to think that your problem is just a little acidity and you can just take some antacids yourself. Treatment of ulcers is complicated and inadequate treatment can lead to scarring, or complications such as a perforation. As a rule, it helps to know what you are treating before you start.

There are many different antacids on the market and what they contain is listed in The Health Letter number 10-4, Use and Abuse of Antacids, which I am sending you. Others who want this issue can send 75 cents with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for it to me, in care of this newspaper, P.O. Box 1551, Radio City Station, New York, NY 10019.

Incidentally, the complications that have been observed with the estrogen pills and shots have not been found to occur with vaginal creams. I believe that unless your doctor tells you otherwise that you could use such creams with complete safety and considerable relief.

You're also correct about lack of hormones causing bladder problems. Just as the lining of the vagina may degenerate if there's a lack of female hormones, there are changes in the cells in part of the bladder which predispose the bladder to infections.

DEAR DR. LAMB—I'm

wondering if you have any information on vaginitis. I have been having trouble with this ever since I went through the change of life. First I had trouble with my bladder for two-and-a-half years due to lack of hormones and now vaginitis for two years. What is the treatment for this? I'm taking Pimemarin cream regularly but I don't like to use it so I only use it when I can't stand it.

DEAR READER—Your reaction amazes me. Your doctor has already given you the proper treatment but you don't like to use it. Inflammation of the vagina is frequent after the menopause. The lack of female hormones causes the tissues to dry out. This in itself can set up itching and irritation. It also causes the linings to be more susceptible to infection. Vaginal creams that contain estrogen are very helpful in preventing this problem but, of course, for the benefit you do have to use the cream.

Gas Shoots Toward \$1.50 A Gallon

United Press International says the nation's refiners raised their wholesale gasoline prices by up to three cents a gallon, prompting industry predictions of \$1.50-a-gallon pump prices by the end of the year. Exxon USA, the nation's largest gasoline marketer, and other U.S. refiners raised their wholesale gasoline prices Monday by between a penny and 3 cents a gallon, industry sources said. "This is the season for a possible \$1.50-a-gallon price by the end of the year as decontrolled domestic crude oil prices, the new OPEC price increases, and higher refining costs work their way through the system," said Dan Lundberg, publisher of the Lundberg Letter in Los Angeles. The average U.S. pump price was \$1.25 a gallon in December, Lundberg said. The first round of 1981 price increases will appear almost immediately at pumps where dealers are not charging the maximum profit margin allowed under U.S. Department of Energy regulations. Exxon lifted its wholesale gasoline prices by a penny a gallon east of the Rockies; Sunoco by one cent in the Midwest and Southwest; Getty Oil by a penny in the Midwest, Southwest and Rocky Mountain States; Atlantic Richfield by 3 cents in the Southwest and 2 cents in all other markets; and Diamond Shamrock by a penny nationwide, the sources said. Within the last 10 days of December, Mobil, Exxon, Amoco, Conoco, Ashland, Crown Petroleum, Gulf, Marathon, Phillips Petroleum, Diamond Shamrock, Shell, Sohio, Skelly, and Texaco raised their gasoline prices by 1 to 2 cents a gallon.

Chemical Neighbors Ponder Court Action

By DONNA ESTES Herald Staff Writer Homeowners near the waste chemical storage facility off Airport Boulevard and Jewett Lane in Sanford will be meeting in the next few days to decide whether to join the city of Sanford in court action demanding removal of the chemicals. "We didn't learn anything new from our meeting Monday night," said Wendy Russell of Beaver Road today of today of the public forum held with Arthur Greer, president of City Chemicals Co. Inc. The Orlando-based firm is operating a temporary storage facility for 3,270 drums of waste chemicals, about 1,000 from the Russell home and other Beaver Road homes. Robert King from the audience responded to assurances from Greer that he doesn't believe the chemicals present a hazard. "The only percentage worth a damn is a 100 percent guarantee that the chemicals won't get into our water," King said. Mrs. Russell said she and Talley will be meeting with neighbors to discuss raising money to hire an attorney. The attorney representing the homeowners would probably seek to join with the city and DER in court action to acquire a definite schedule for removal of the chemicals from the Sanford site, she said. Greer, in answer to questions from the homeowners Monday night, sidestepped giving an exact schedule for removal of the chemicals. He said his intent has never been for the storage facility to be permanent. He said his firm soon will begin removing the waste chemicals at the rate of one truckload per week — about 70 drums. He added that many of the removed drums will be replaced with others from the firm's Orlando plant at Forsyth Road. He also said he intends to build a new chemical reclamation plant, but declined to say where the new plant would be. Greer said the plant will not be located on the site of the temporary storage facility. S.B. "Jim" Crowe, 78, a Beaver Road resident, said he may not live long enough to see all the chemicals removed. Greer estimated, however, it will take about six months to build the proposed new reclamation plant and about six to nine months thereafter to completely remove the drums. Those who feared their water supply may have been polluted by leaking chemicals at the site, Greer said he will be taking samples to test the drinking water. He didn't give a specific time when sampling and testing will be done. The homes are served by private wells. The homeowners indicated their water supply flows beneath the chemical storage site. Eenekevich said the state has a new law, but no rules and regulations to implement that law on hazardous wastes. He said the state may grant Greer's firm a temporary permit to operate. "We have to work with something like this after the fact," Senkevich said. He added that the storage site probably would not be there if approval had been asked of the state in advance. Greer said he attempted to obtain information on state requirements before he located the facility in Sanford, but was told that no rules and regulations existed at the state level. He said he complied with federal regulations by applying for a permit from the Environmental Protection Agency. He said in that application he listed the chemicals which would be stored at the site. Asked for a comment from the audience, Knowles said, "We weren't pleased with the judge's ruling. The suit is yet to come." Missing Map Big Issue In Deer Run Argument

By BRITT SMITH Herald Staff Writer The ongoing saga of the City of Casselberry's controversial annexation of the Deer Run subdivision is fast becoming "The Case of the Missing Map." It was a map, or the lack of one, which surfaced as a major issue Monday night in a hearing before three Circuit Court judges trying to bring the four-year case to a close. A map showing Casselberry's pre-annexation boundaries as compared to its post-annexation bounds would, according to Assistant County Attorney Robert McMillan, clearly show that the annexation was illegal because it created enclaves — islands of unincorporated county property totally surrounded by city land — which are prohibited by state law. A simple solution would be to draw up such a map and let the judges decide if the annexation resulted in the creation of enclaves. There is, however, a legal snag. The judicial panel can consider only what is already in the record — the documents the Casselberry City Council used during its hearing on the annexation question. The judges took no action Monday and set no date for a ruling. In the meantime, the county will continue to provide public services such as police and fire protection in Deer Run until the court can decide who has governmental jurisdiction over the disputed area. Board To Allow School Abortion Debate

By CHARITY CICARDO Herald Staff Writer Lake Brantley High School students Julie Johnson, Tricia Lenihan and Valora Smith excitedly left the Seminole County board room today after they won their bid to debate state funding of abortion as part of the senior political science class "mock legislation" session. The Seminole County School Board voted 4 to 1 to allow the debate after reviewing an outline of the material that will be presented during the debate. School Board member Allen Keeth voted against the proposal. "I don't feel this is the kind of subject that should have been selected to act out a mock legislation process," Keeth said. Keeth said he wouldn't have objected if the discussion would have been in a health education class. But the students feel they have not yet "bucked" the system. "When the board changes its policy on abortion, then we've bucked the system," said Valora Smith. The board's policy which the students want changed states: "The topic birth control and abortion shall not be incorporated in any classroom or teaching situation in any public school in Seminole County until written material, film, lecture notes, or any other form of communication has been reviewed and approved by the district school board in advance of presentation." At a Nov. 18 meeting, the board encouraged the students to change the policy, because it did not want to waive it. But at a Dec. 11 meeting, the board said it could make a decision based on the material presented and a discussion such as the student's wanted could be allowed under the current policy. Horner said the students were told Nov. 18 prior review of materials was impossible in this situation because it was a debate and discussion could not be controlled. Horner said the students would not have had to come before the board to change the policy but would have only brought it written material to approve if she would have known the board's interpretation of the policy. The board will decide Jan. 21 meeting whether to change the policy.

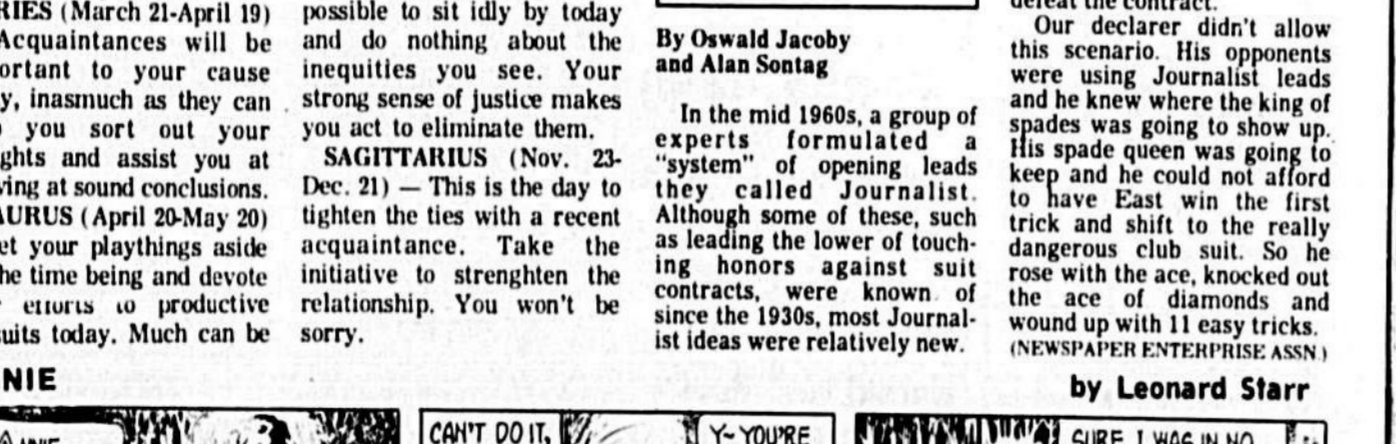

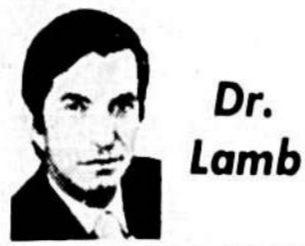

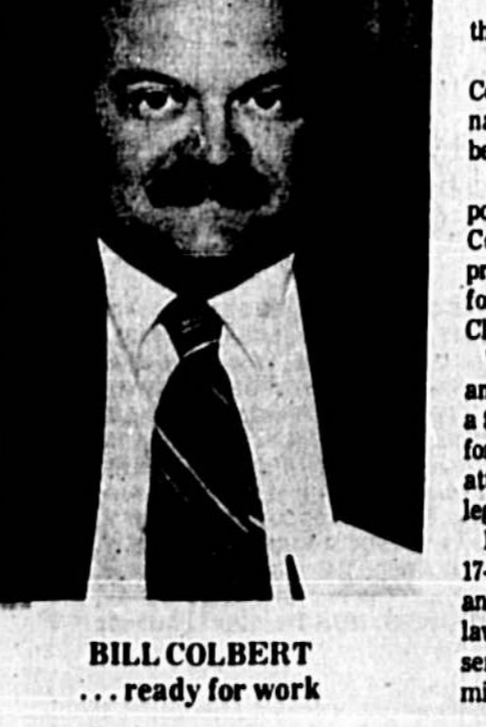
