CSA Regional Office Rescinds Earlier Directive Jones Wins Approval To Keep Two Federal Positions

An administrative directive from the Community Services Administration (CSA) has been rescinded, allowing Amos Jones to remain in two federal positions.

Spolski Wins State News Writing Honor

John A. Spolski, associate editor of The Evening Herald, Saturday was honored by the Florida Society of Newspaper Editors with a third place writing award in spot news reporting for papers under 25,000 circulation.

Spolski took the honor for a story entitled "Heroes" that detailed the rescue of four people at the Osteen Bridge last year by two young Sanford residents during a tragedy that saw five persons drown.

Young Sanford Couple Helped To Save 4 Lives

The award was presented during the spring meeting of the Florida State Newspaper Editors at the Sonesta Beach Hotel on Key Biscayne.

The honor was the second for Spolski during his tenure with the Evening Herald, taking second place honors from the society for page layout and general sports reporting in 1970.

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The award winning story detailed the efforts of Steve Richards and Susan Hoffman in saving four people from a van which had 11 persons as passengers.

Richards and Miss Hoffman had been fishing at the Osteen Bridge when the van was involved in a mishap and flipped over into the St. Johns, sinking some 30 seconds afterwords.

Spolski interviewed both Miss Hoffman and Richards after the tragic mishap and rescue had occurred and he detailed their thoughts and experiences.

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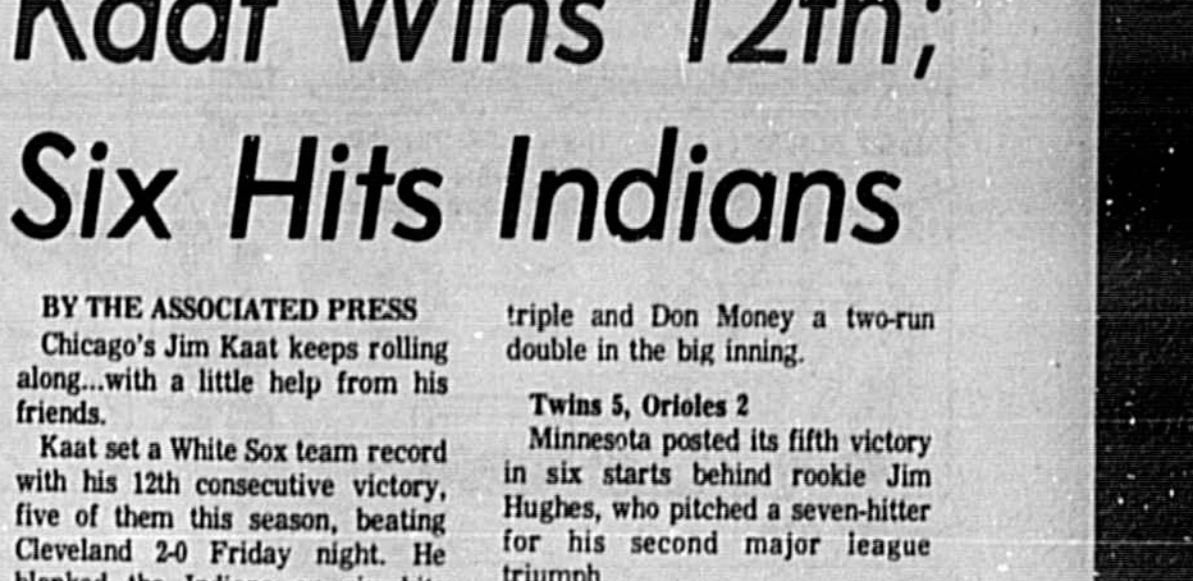

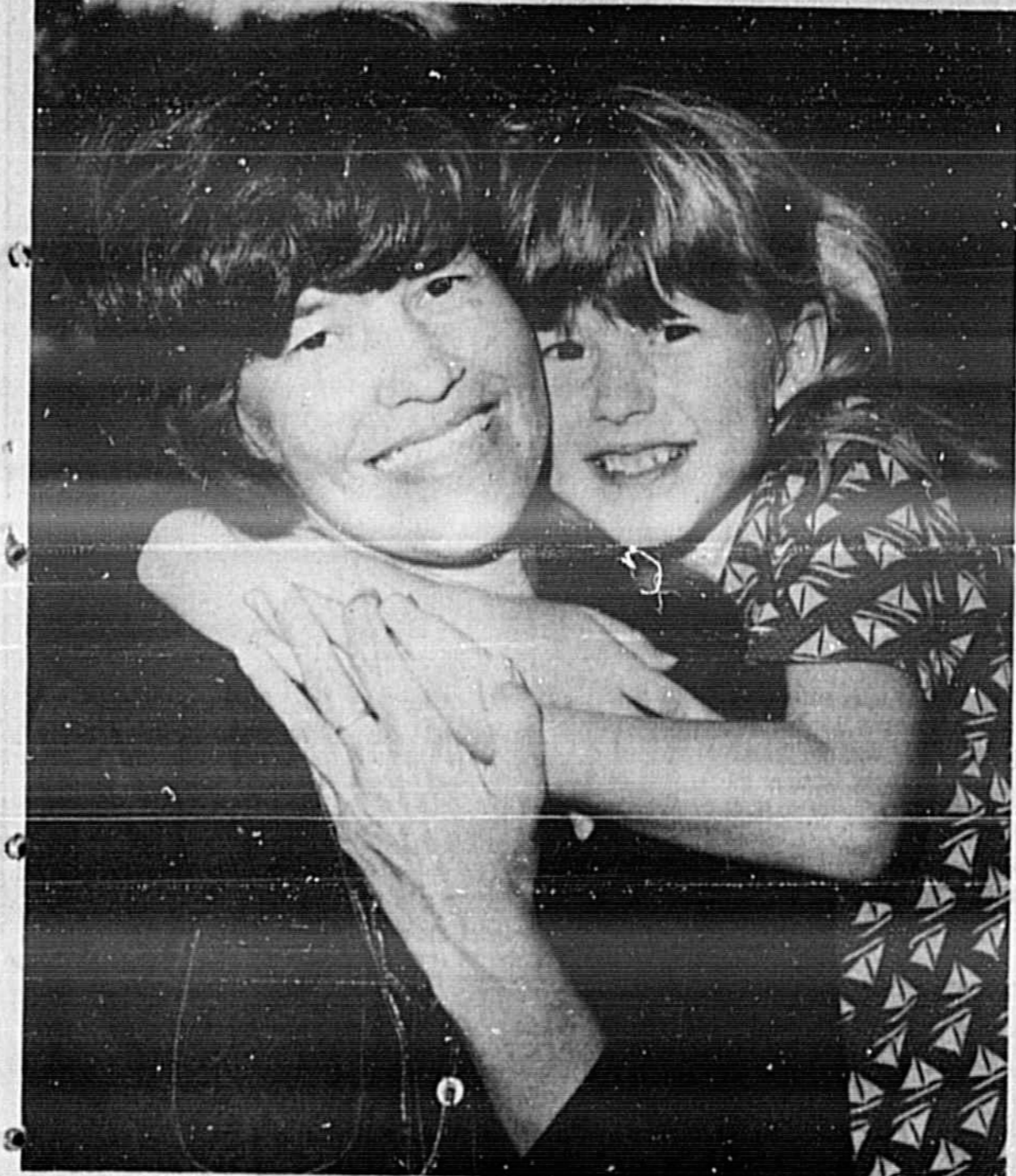

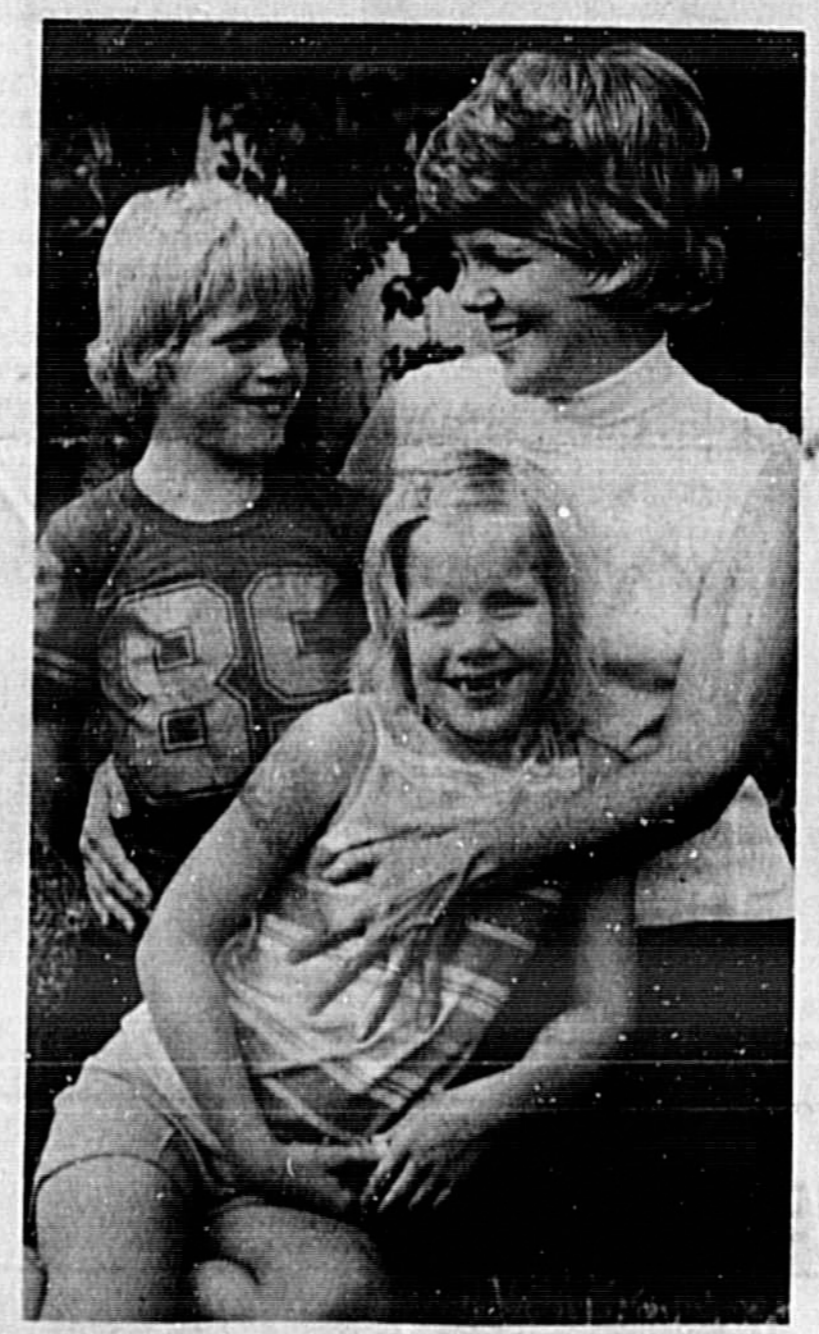

Seminole Sews America's Largest Celebration Banner

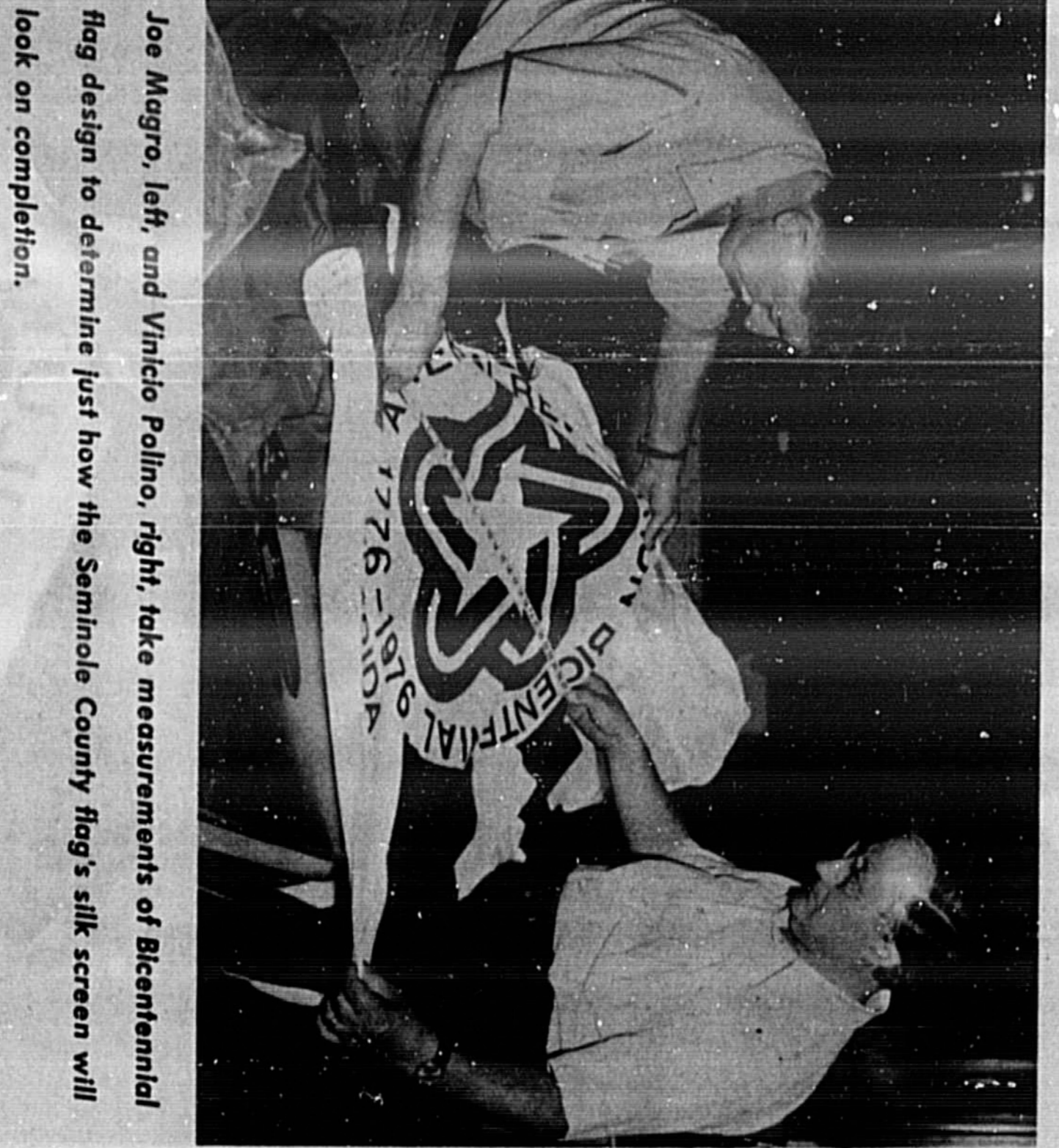

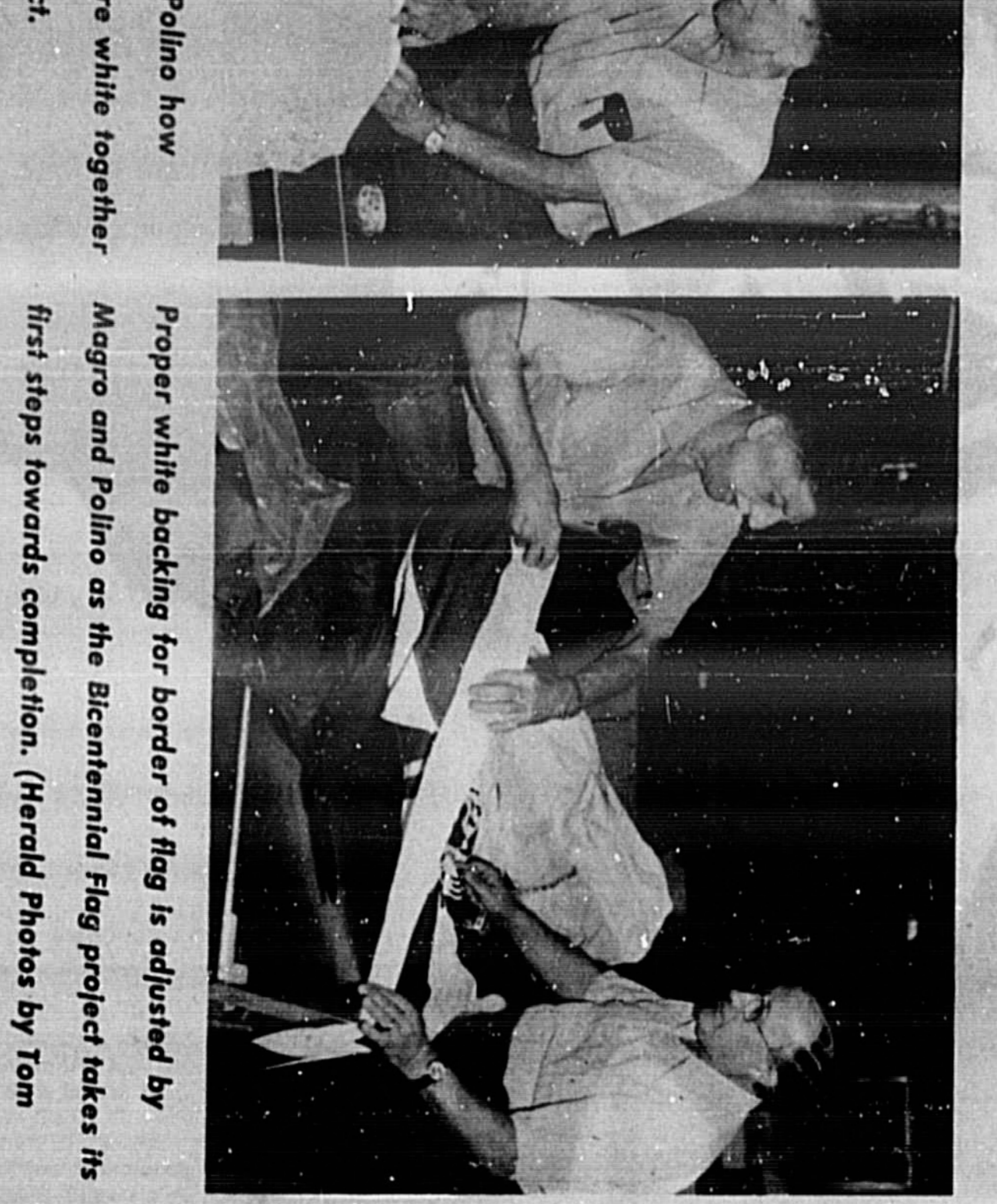

Special Group Formed To Study Double Taxation Issue

A special commission to study the double taxation issue in Seminole County has been established by members of the county's Legislative Delegation.

At a meeting last week in Tallahassee, State Senator Lori Wilson, I-Merritt Island, proposed the "in-depth" study to determine if double taxation exists here. The measure was unanimously adopted.

Most all of the county's cities are up in arms over the issue, and the city of Sanford and other cities are even considering lawsuits to reclaim tax money for which they claim the county provides no services.

In Casselberry, city officials tonight will consider a complex proposal which will be presented to the County Commission asking that money be returned this year and taxes not be collected in the future for certain services for which city officials claim they receive no benefit.

"Because of the widespread interest and concern on the part of the citizens of Seminole County, it is my feeling that an in-depth study to determine if double taxation does exist is the very least this delegation can do to try and resolve the serious question of double taxation," Wilson said.

The commission will be composed of two members appointed by each of the four members of the delegation and one financial representative from each governmental unit in Seminole County.

Wilson says the commission is to make its findings known no later than Jan. 15, of next year. Appointments are to be made no later than July 15 of this year, according to Wilson.

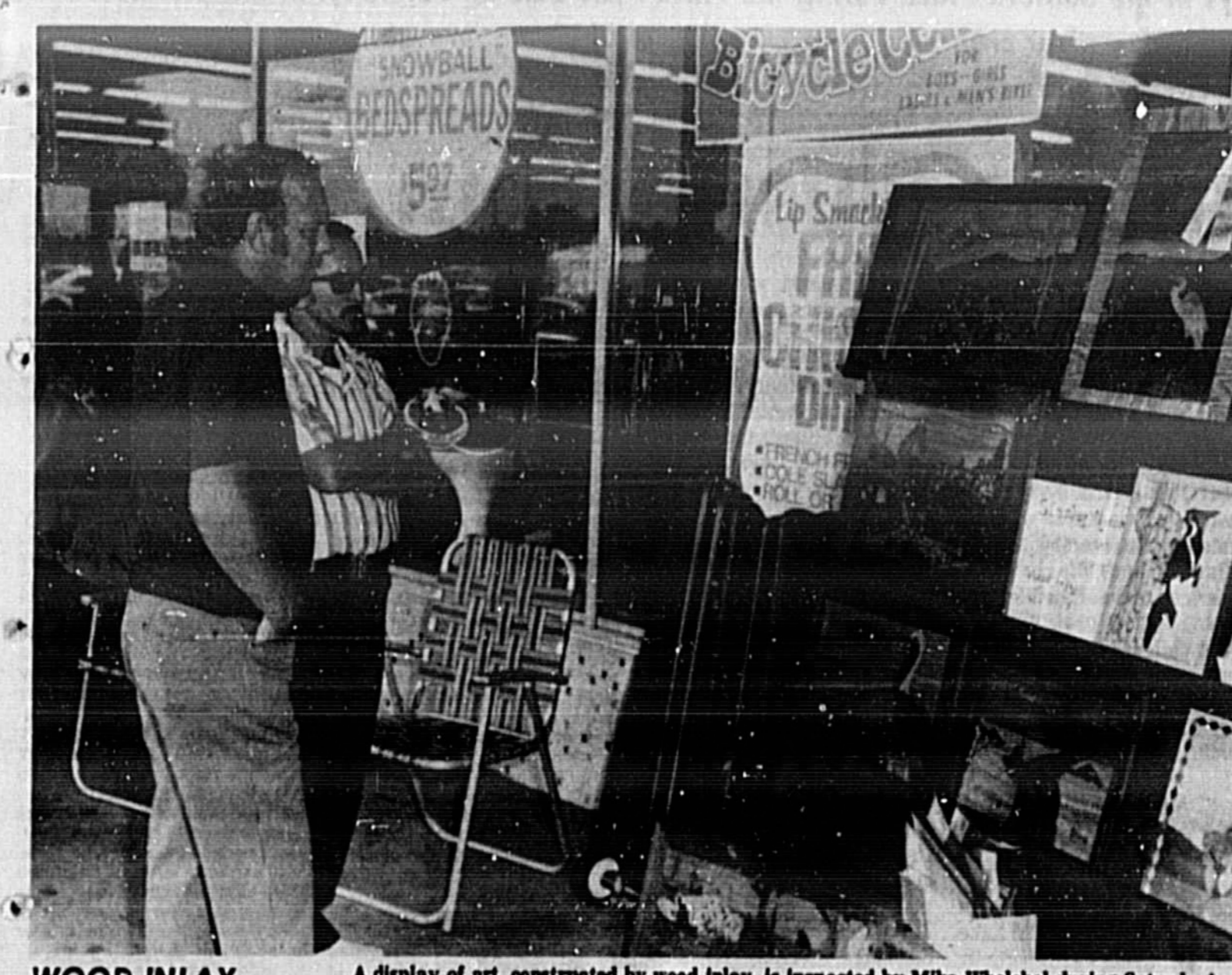
In addition to Wilson, the delegation consists of State Senator John Vogt, D-Cocoa Beach; State Rep. Vince Fichtel, R-Leesburg and State Rep. Bob Hattaway, D-Altamonte Springs.

County Commission Chairman Sid Vilhen Jr., has been quoted as saying he welcomes any detailed study such as the one prepared by Casselberry and has promised a speedy reply.

One such speedy reply went out to officials of Altamonte Springs, who questioned the county about the controversial double taxation issue.

That speedy reply said no double taxation exists in the City of Altamonte Springs.

More Data Is Sought On School Bargaining

The issue of collective bargaining is riling teachers in Seminole County.

And more and more informational meetings are being scheduled to better inform parents and taxpayers about what goes on when a teachers group — such as the Seminole Education Association (SEA) begins bargaining with School Board officials.

For example, since SEA began talks and stories began appearing in newspapers, some school representatives say their offices have been flooded with requests for information.

Mrs. Constance R. Moore, faculty representative for Longwood Elementary teachers, held a meeting last week in which a representative from Florida Professional Educators (FPE) explained the organization's views.

"I'm trying to do what teachers asked me to do. Teachers asked for this," Mrs. Moore said this morning.

Longwood Elementary is the school where an Orlando labor negotiator claims to represent a group of teachers. The labor relations specialist, Al French, says he may even go so far as to challenge SEA's certification by the state.

Mrs. Moore says a host of parents and teachers are seeking additional information.

SEA has presented a 75-page master contract proposal which asks for a starting salary of \$10,000 for beginning teachers.

Mrs. Moore says her desire is to have as many views as possible presented to teachers at her school. Soon, she hopes to invite a representative from the American Federation of Teachers (AFT) to speak. AFT is affiliated with the powerful AFL-CIO.

Also scheduled to speak is a representative from the School Board's negotiating team. And Gene Grooms, SEA's executive director, already has made a presentation to the group of teachers.

Another group which has formed calls itself the Seminole County Concerned Taxpayers. A meeting is set for that group tomorrow night at 7:30 at the St. Augustine Church in Casselberry.

The group's purpose, spokesmen say, is to learn more about the master contract SEA is negotiating with school officials.

Spokesmen say French has been invited to the meeting to try to explain how the master contract proposal will affect parent-teacher relationships in the county.

French is an executive of an Orlando firm which specializes in labor relations. He has been quoted as saying he is investigating the possibility of challenging SEA's certification on the basis that some SEA members weren't properly informed of SEA aims.

But, Grooms says French's claims are, in essence, hogwash and that SEA has adequately met all requirements of the Public Employees Relations Commission (PERC), the agency set up to establish collective bargaining guidelines for the entire state.

'Farm-City' Section Offered In Today's Evening Herald

Estimate population figures for the city by 1990 are more than 50,000. Sanford's present population is more than 22,000.

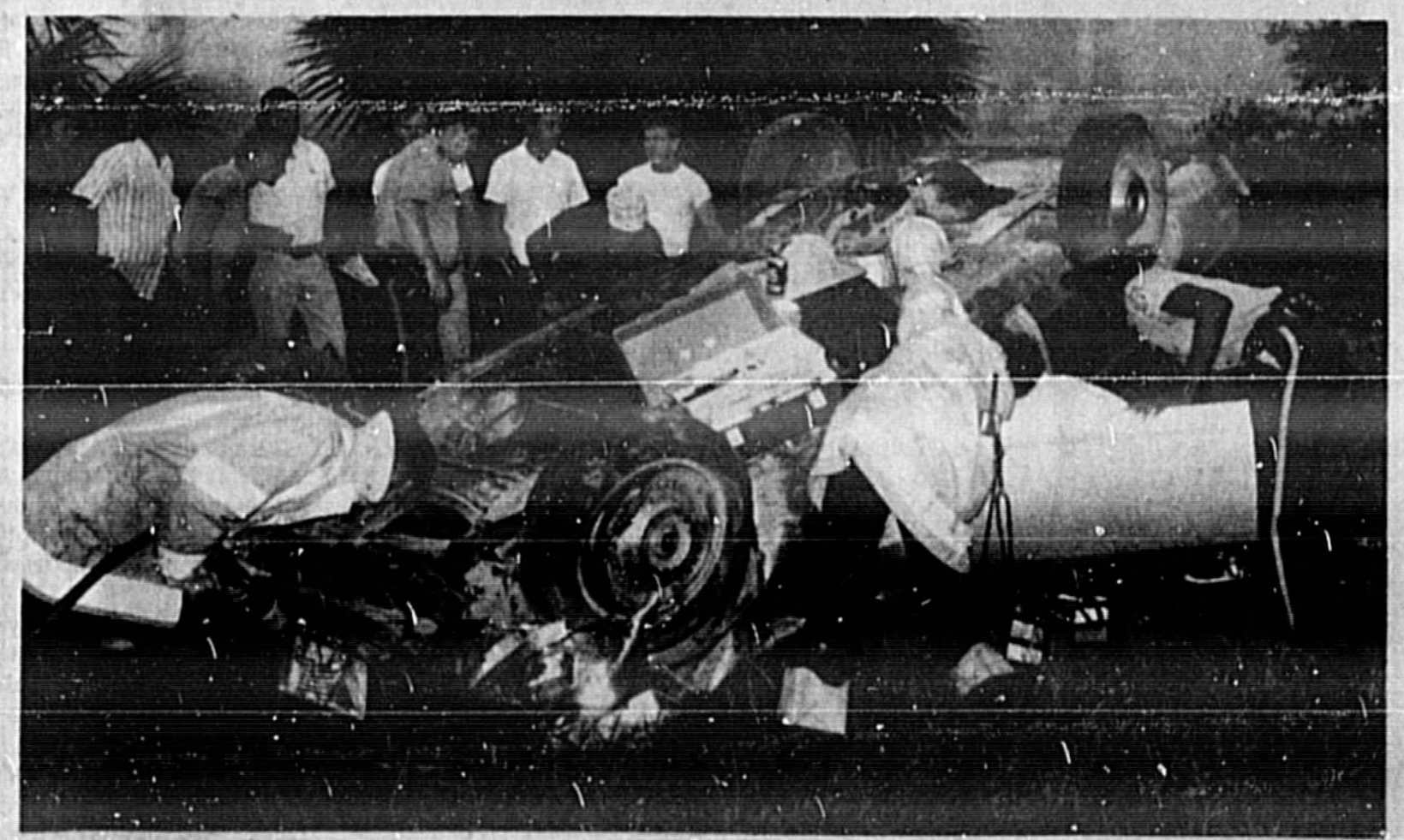
The water recharge policies, compiled by the planning and engineering departments, outlines the areas of the city which are the high, or prime water, recharge areas.
