## Longwood Set To Put Brakes On New Development

By Jane Casselberry Herald Staff Writer

A 45-day moratorium, which will put the brakes on all new development in Longwood, has gotten preliminary approval from the city commission.

A public hearing and final action on the ordinance have been scheduled for Oct. 14.

The commissioners voted unanimously Tucsday night for the ban on acceptance of new applications or issuing of permits for such things as land use changes, site plan reviews, subdivision plats, annexations, variances, historical district applications, planned unit developments,

abandoning streets and rights-of-way and special

City Planner Chris Nagle said the moratorium would give the city a chance to adopt the proposed increase in fees for such applications and would give the staff a chance to eatch up with applications already submitted. Nagle said he has been flooded with approximately 30 applications a month and doesn't have time to complete work on the city's land use plan.

A conditional use request submitted by Mark Scime for Courtesy Pontiac to operate an thesite plan. automobile dealership in a C-3 general commercial zoning district was granted in a 4-1 vote. The

proposed new and used car dealership and body shop would be located on a 15-acre parcel on U.S. Highway 17-92 between Florida Avenue and Longdale Avenue. The dealership would occupy only the northeast corner of the property.

Dick Fess, who represented Courtesy Pontiac, said sale of the property was contingent on the granting of the conditional use request and his customer wanted to find out if it was feasible before completing the contract. He said they will comply with all requirements when submitting

A motion by Commissioner Perry Faulkner to reject the request died for the lack of a second.

and when Commissioner Larry Goldberg made a motion to allow conditional use Faulkner voted against it. Faulkner said he did not believe the applicant would benefit the city and cited the case of a dissatisfied customer who had done business with the car dealer.

Nagle said the property, which contains a dead orange grove, is one of the last large undeveloped sites left in Longwood.

The request was approved with the stipulation there be only one entrance to the property off of U.S. Highway 17-92 and that trees, which must

# Backyard 'Pools' Challenge City

Longwood installed a \$9,375 pump Wednesday to alleviate residents' flooding problems in Highland Hills.

The purchase was authorized by the city commission at Tuesday night's meeting.

John Citrone of 321 Heather Ave. told the commissioners tanding water has turned his backvard into a swamp. Commissioner Larry Goldberg agreed.

"His backyard is 18 inches under water," he said.

Citrone's neighbor, Jack England, who has lived at 323 Heather Ave. for seven years. said he never had a problem. even during heavy rains, until the Golden Grove aubdivion was built behind his house. Then in September of last year he had water laying in his backyard, he said.

"I had to rent a pump and take time off work to keep the water out." England said. He said he lost six trees in his yard because of all the water. The city has installed the pump in his backyard, with piping going around the side of the house and under the front lawn

out to the street.

Golden Grove developer David Maingot's solution was to put a drain between two houses and out to the street. England said. "But they also put about 18 truckloads of dirt in our neighbor's backyard in Golden Grove last year. That raised it 18 to 24 inches above the natural level causing water to run onto the lots in Highland Hills."

A pipe that was put in to drain the water-soaked lots into a Golden Grove stormwater retention pond, is not working. According to City Administrator Greg Manning. the end of the pipe is below the level of the retention area and instead of draining the lots it is siphoning water back into

Manning also said the retention pond is inadequate. He said the lots in Highland Hills that back up to Golden Grove are supposed to be higher than Golden Grove but at least three of the backyards are not.

Manning said he will have Longwood Engineering Director Charles Hasler check

the elevations to determine whether the Golden Grove's lots are according to the approved site plan. Manning said some of the drainage pipes were not on the approved site plan and the underground drainage is undocumented.

Hasler is scheduled to come back within 60 days with a major solution to the city's drainage woes.

# Weir: Captors Will Execute 6 Americans

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The release the hostages in exchange Rev. Benjamin Weir, released Saturday from 16 months of captivity in Lebanon, said today he has told President Reagan his former captors are demanding freedom for 17 Moslem prisoners in Kuwait as the price for the release of six other Americans.

Weir said the captors have threatened to execute their hostages and to kidnap other Americans if their demands are not

"They have one demand. namely the release of 17 prisoners in Kuwait," Weir, 61, said in a statement prepared for a news conference at the National Presbyterian Church.

Weir said, "They're ready to

for the 17 prisoners."

The minister said, "They have released me as a sign of their good intentions. However, they are not willing to walt much

"They state that if there is not a postive response to their demands in the near future they're prepared to kidnap other Americans and that though they do not want to harm anyone, they will go so far as to proceed to execute their hostages if the demand is not met," Welr said.

Weir and the other Americans were kidnapped during the past 18 months and held in Lebanon by Shiite fundamentalist Moslem group called Islamic Jahid or

Peggy Say, sister of one of the six Americans still being held. Terry Anderson, a reporter for The Associated Press, joined Weir at the news conference and, along with other family members were to meet with administration officials this week to push for increased efforts to release their loved

Welr, a Presbyterian minister from Berkeley, Calif., said in his statement that he relaved the message from his captors to President Reagan Wednesday by telephone.

## Lake Mary Land Code Final; **Building Moratorium To End**

Lake Mary commissioners, in a "remarkably short" special session, reviewed and approved a finalized Land Development Code, according to Commissioner Harry Terry.

The code, spurring no citizen opposition Tuesday night, simplifies existing regulations and is designed to make clear to new developers what they are allowed to build in Lake Mary, he

There was no official vote to adopt the code because it had earlier been agreed upon and the meeting was to review final changes.

Lake Mary is nearing the end of an eight-month moratorium on growth and development. The purpose of the moratorium was to give the city time to prepare ordinances, laws and plans for developers to follow in presenting building proposals to the city for approval.

The once tiny hamlet tucked between Interstate 4 and U.S. Highway 17-92 will begin to accept applications for new development Nov. 21. Expected to make public their building plans will be a housing development named Timucuan; an office park to be named Northpoint; and a 225,000-square-foot office complex built by the Primera Company.

City Manager Kathy Rice said the code, "will make all of our (city of Lake Mary) regulations a lot more detailed and specific to prospective builders. For instance it reduces our zoning districts from 22 to 11 and makes the language on zoning requirements much clearer."

Included in the regulations, Mrs. Rice said, are traffic laws, drainage plans, parking requirements, public utility regulations, flood hazards, borrow pits, site plan reviews, combined fire and safety codes, an arbor ordinance and a comprehensive set of zoning regulations. Mrs. Rice said all of these building requirements will now be found in one book rather than having to be taken from a variety of different sources and being widely misinterpreted.

The Land Development Code book was prepared by the city's consulting engineers, Camp Dresser and Mckee Inc. of Orlando. According to Mrs. Rice, "this book is the combination of efforts of the city commission, the board of adjustment. the planning and zoning board and all other staff members. It was a group effort to prepare this city for its anticipated growth."

She said another objective of the manual is to simplify building plan terminology for residents and builders and she cautioned that the book is not recommended for leisure reading.

## Doctors Chastized For Financial Conflicts Of Interest

BOSTON (UPI) — The editor of the New England Journal of Medicine Wednesday chastized the growing number of physicians who have financial conflicts of interest that could interfere with their treatment of patients.

With increasing frequency medical practitioners are seeking profits from business arrangements with hospitals, face the threat of

companies providing ambulatory health care services, Dr. Arnold S. Relman said.

Physicians also now have flnancial interests in diagnostic clinics, walk-in surgery centers. dialysis units, physical therapy centers and other such facilities.

Relman, a Boston physician. urged the medical profession to

equipment manufacturers and entrepreneurialism and take a firm stand in defense of professional ethics.

"We cannot expect to take any practical steps in defense of our professionalism until we publicly agree that physicians serve their patients' interests best when they divorce themselves from financal interests in the medical marketplace," he sald in an editorial in journal.

#### Effort To Retain 16-Cent Cigarette Tax Up In Smoke

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Republicans on the Senate Finance Committee thought they had an agreement with Democrats on the 16-cent-a-pack cigarette tax, but the deal has gone up in smoke.

The Republicans offered their support to tobacco-state senators to continue the tax for an agreement on a new tobacco program. But Democrats strongly objected and the action was postponed.

The Finance Committee faces a tight deadline because the cigarette tax — now 16 cents on a pack — is scheduled to go down to 8 cents Oct. 1.

Senate Republican leader Robert Dole, a member of the Finance Committee, said Wednesday he had an agreement from tobacco-state senators to reverse their position and support the cigarette tax if the committee would attach proposed tobacco price support legislation to the tax bill.

Before action was stalled, the Finance Committee rejected a move by Sen. John Chafee, R-R.I., to double the cigarette tax to 32 cents a pack.

'Smoking is just truly bad for your health," Chafee said. and the higher tax would discourage teenage smoking. The panel rejected it 10.8.

#### Statistics Nothing To Snort At

WASHINGTON (UPI) - More than 25 percent of American young people have tried cocaine at least once, despite widespread publicity the drug is addictive and can be physically harmful, a federal report shows.

Dr. Donald Iain MacDonald, administrator of the Alcohol, Drug Abuse and Mental Health Administration, said Wednesday studies by researchers around the country show, "Even young teenagers - an estimated 60,000 12and 13-year-olds — have tried" cocaine.

"Among young adults age 18 to 25, the figures are even more startling: 28 percent, more than one out of four, have used cocaine," MacDonald said.

The high numbers of cocaine users demonstrates many still do not realize that cocaine is addictive and can be physically harmful, MacDonald and other researchers said. High doses can cause respiratory or cardiac arrest or coma.

The number of cocaine-related deaths and emergencyroom admissions tripled between 1981 and 1984, he said. Some research has linked cocaine use to bleeding under the skull, heart irregularities and, if used by pregnant women, birth difficulties and birth defects.

#### Tax Reform Dead This Year?

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Reagan has been actively seeking grassroots support for tax reform, but congressional leaders say they are more likely to adjourn before considering the measure.

After meeting to discuss when Congress should leave Washington for the year, House Speaker Thomas O'Neill and Senate Republican leader Robert Dole said Wednesday they expected the House to act on tax reform this year but doubted the Senate could complete passage and send a bill

to Reagan. Dole and O'Neill said they expected Congress to leave Washington for the year by Thanksgiving.

However. White House congressional lobbyist Max Friedersdorf said Reagan is still insisting on passage of the tax bill this year and will ask Congress to come back into session if it decides to adjourn early.

#### **Hawkins And Chiles Press** For Tough 'Designer Drug' Law

The administration and two Florida senators say new legislation is necessary to help authorities head off the potentially frightening problem of "designer drugs," highly potent, synthetic narcotics.

Justice Department and Drug Enforcement Administration officials Wednesday explained the bill is needed because of a hole in the current law allowing the drugs which have caused Parkinson's disease-like symptoms to remain legal.

Designer drugs are made by taking the formula of a controlled narcotic and changing it slightly. Because authorities must specify the makeup of drugs they want declared illegal, the analogs fall out of reach of the law.

Currently, by the time authorities get through the lengthy process of identifying and outlawing one synthetic drug, often a new one is on the street.

"Synthetic drugs are a whole new class of killers. supplying a whole new set of victims," said Sen. Paula Hawkins, R-Winter Park, who along with Sen. Lawton Chiles. D-Lakeland, has held hearings on the issue.

The law would declare it illegal to make, possess or distribute designer drugs - defined as substances chemically similar to a controlled substance or which are designed to produce the effect of a controlled substance.

#### 4 Indicted In Cocaine Cartel

MIAMI (UPI) - An alleged associate of Bahamas Prime Minister Lynden O. Pindling and three others have been indicted in state and federal investigations into what authorities say was a cocaine cartel in the islands.

Bahamian attorney F. Nigel Bowe, 46, faces a maximum penalty of life plus 40 years in jail and \$1.5 million in fines because of the indictments.

Authorities said there was no connection between Pindling and the indictments announced Wednesday, but past testimony has indicated Bowe was a courier in payoffs between drug smugglers and the prime minister.

## Rock 'n Roll Rated 'R' Stars To Testify At Record-Labeling Hearing

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A parents' group played on the radio, and Dee Synder, the brings its case for labeling records that have objectionable lyries to a Senate panel but some of rock's biggest stars are banding together to fight the "unconstitutional ratings.

The Senate Commerce Committee scheduled a hearing for today on the subject and testimony was expected from a group headed by Tipper Gore, wife of committee member Sen. Albert Gore, Jr., D-Tenn., and Susan Baker, wife of Treasury Secretary James Baker.

The group favors labeling or rating records to alert buyers to sexually explicit or other potentially objectionable lyries.

Rock musician Frank Zappa, whose songs sometimes contain material that cannot be

wild-haired leader of the heavy-metal band Twisted Sister, were to testify against labels

The American Civil Liberties Union announced Wednesday the formation of a special committee, the Musical Majority, to fight "unconstitutional" record rating or labeling proposals.

The committee includes music stars Prince, Tina Turner, Cyndi Lauper, Lionel Richie, Dolly Parton, John Cougar Mellencamp, Don Henley and members of the groups Chicago, the Pointer Sisters, Kiss and Duran Duran.

But the Parents Music Resource Center. founded by Mrs. Gore and Mrs. Baker, and the National Parent Teachers Association. see the issue differently.

They claim many rock albums routinely purchased by or for young people contain lyrics that glamorize rape, incest, devil worship, drugs, alcohol, violence, aberrant sexual activity or deviant behavior.

The groups want an "R" label on records and tapes containing such lyrics so parents will know they can restrict that material.

They also want a record industry panel to determine what records should be rated and they want the lyrics of labeled records available to consumers before purchase.

The record industry so far has agreed only to add a warning label saying "Parental Guidance: Explicit Lyrics" to potentially objectionable records or tapes.

The savings rate slowed in August to only 2.8 percent of disposable income, the lowest since monthly savings rates

were first recorded in 1959. Economists consider the quarterly low for savings to be the third quarter of 1950 - 2.6percent - when Americans

> Income without adjustment for inflation rose at an annual rate of 4.1 percent in the first half of this year, less than half the improvement last year.

The housing industry, which the Census Bureau Wednesday said started 6.2 percent more housing units in August than July, has resisted any deterioration. And clearance-sale financing rates for 1985 automobiles have boosted auto purchases dramatically.

# 5-Year-Old Boy With AIDS Banned From Classroom; Taught At Home

ORLANDO (UPI) - An unidentified Orange County kindergartener infected with AIDS began the school year at home Tuesday. showing a lack of skills but a willingness and an ability to learn, his teacher said.

"This little boy is very environmentally deprived. He Insurance Firms doesn't even know we call Consider Limit clouds, 'clouds,' or the sun, 'sun,'" said Sandra Osborn, consultant with the public school system's Hospital-Homebound Program.

'I don't see him as retarded, however: I see him as deprived," she said. "We worked non-stop this morning for about an hour and he just loved it."

Although she is a supervisor, Osborn is teaching the 5-year-old boy because none of her staff are willing to work with him, fearing they might somehow contract incurable acquired immune deficiency syndrome, she said.

At the recommendation of the county health department, public school officials decided the boy should be taught at home rather than risk exposing him to the high incidence of among children his age.

'His immune system is very delicate," Osborn said, "and the state telling us we could not things like chicken pox or measles could be deadly."

AIDS destroys the body's ability to fight disease. Of the 13,228 confirmed victims in the United States, about half have died, according to the federal Centers for Disease Control.

Osborn said the boy's cognitive development probably is "far below kindergarten age" due to a lack of interaction with other children and normal socialization.

"It's my understanding he was denied day care because of his condition." she said. "Most kids are coming into school from day care situations where they learn a lot of the basic things like

vocabulary and counting. "This little fellow has not had

that.' Osborn will spend an hour to 11/2 hours a week with the boy, expanding instruction as his attention span develops. When he has learned basic skills.teaching will be conducted by phone link with other teachers through the program's

Osborn, a mother of two teenage children, said she does not fear getting AIDS after reading the medical literature.

"It's a question of sound underwriting practices. We need to consider all the facts," said childhood diseases common George Hardy, legislative counsel to Northwestern Mutual.

"If we were forced into it by even find out what a person's condition is, we would have to consider (exclusion) of some

Blue Cross & Blue Shield United of Wisconsin, the state's largest insurer, and Wausau Insurance Co. also are considcring options on health insurance policies excluding AIDS

State legislation approved in July bars an insurance company from requiring a test for AIDS. Rep. Gervase Hephner, D-Chilton, has drafted a proposal that would allow insurance

companies to look at test results. "In the case of all other diseases, we're permitted to get all the facts, but this legislation prohibits us from requiring a test to determine if they have the AIDS virus," Hardy said, "We think we can show that it's a reliable test."

So far, Northwestern Mutual has not received enough claims to cause a serious problem.

Amy Biderman, spokeswoman for the Health Insurance Association of America, a Washington-based umbrella group for insurance companies. said she has heard of no firms in other states considering similar action, although California has a law similar to Wisconsin's. They are the only states with such

The escape plan was foiled after a jail guard patrolling outside the jail twice reported seeing an inmate at a cell window who moved away when he spotted the guard Tuesday evening. The guard reported the incident to jail officials and the cell was searched and its two occupants moved to another cell, the report said.

In the vacated cell, a sheriff's deputy noted a cup containing concrete chips, apparently from around the window, and a piece of metal hidden in a bed roll, the report said.

Spolski said the caulking had been removed from around the window, but the window could not have been removed because of steel bars that re-enforce it into its casing. Cambre was attempting to capture King in a

## Deputies Probe 2 Cases Of Animal Abuse

Seminole County sheriff's deputies are investigating two cases of alleged animal abuse, one involving the decomposed remains of at least 20 dogs found in garbage bags off State Road 419 near Chuluota.

In the other incident, the neighbors of an 11-year-old Sanford boy told deputies they saw the child pour gasoline in his yard, set it aftre and throw a live chicken into the flames. The boy also allegedly threw firecrackers into the blaze and had been firing shots from a firearm just before setting the fire, a sheriff's report said.

The dogs' bodies were found stacked in black plastic garbage bags on July 20 by

Fred Kuklo, 48, of Tropical Avenue, Chuluota, as he searched for bottles in the woods off of State Road 419 just north of Lake Mills Road.

Kuklo didn't report his find to authorities. but told a friend who called the Seminole County Humane Society. A Humane Society investigator called sheriff's deputies into the investigaton Tuesday, the report said.

Sheriff's deputy Daniel LaFleur reported seeing dog skeletons outside the bags and dog bodies with some flesh on the bones stacked inside.

He counted 20 skulls, but reported the animals were so decomposed it was im-

possible to determine what breed they might have been. Deputies and the Humane Society are investigating the find.

## FAA Foot Drags As Safety Lags

The Midwest Express airliner that crashed soon after takeoff from the Milwaukee airport recently, killing all 31 persons aboard, was the 19th commercial plane disaster in this most catastrophic year in aviation history. All told, a record 1,542 persons have died in airline disasters in the United States and abroad during 1985. Urgent questions are being asked around the world about the safety of commercial aviation.

A critical eye is being turned on the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), which has responsibility for air safety. Unfortunately, there's no reassurance there.

A recently concluded study by the U.S. Department of Transportation finds fault with the FAA for not implementing safety rules in a timely manner, and cites delays of as much as eight years. The study, moreover, criticizes the agency's internal communications system saving, for example, that aircraft inspection results are not generally transmitted among its nine regions. Part of the problem stems from the FAA's slowness in keeping pace with commercial aviation, particularly the increased competition resulting from deregulation of the industry.

The Transportation Department's study comes on the heels of a General Accounting Office report suggesting that the FAA does a spotty job of inspecting commercial airplanes. That report also discloses that some U.S. passenger planes underwent few, if any, inspections between mid-1983 and mid-1984. Indeed, we're told the FAA may lack the resources to ensure that all carriers are being operated safely.

The FAA has since drafted new safetyinspection regulations in an effort to eliminate the disparities between the agency's nine regions. FAA Administrator Donald Engen ways the agency plans to increase its roster of safety inspectors to 974 from 674 during the next two fiscal years. Similarly, the agency is implementing other reforms designed to expedite the Transportation Department's safety recommendations.

Still, the FAA's track record for implementing such recommendations is not reassuring.

A case in point is the 1979 crash of an American Airlines DC-10 near Chicago's O'Hare Airport. The worst airplane accident in U.S. history killed 273 persons and prompted eight recommended changes in maintenance, repair, and reporting procedures throughout the industry. The FAA rejected most of the recommendations, however, arguing that existing regulations and procedures are adequate. For example, it rejected the recommendation that airlines be required to report to the FAA the repair of any structurally significant component. The agency concluded that this would cause the airlines an economic burden without yielding a corresponding increase in safety benefits.

The FAA's foot-dragging stands in stark contrast to the prompt investigation b Japan's Ministry of Transport following the crash of the Japanese airliner that killed 520 persons in August. The ministry ordered that the tail areas of all Boeing 747's registered in Japan be re-examined with special attention to the link holding the tail fin to the fuselage.

Soon thereafter, Boeing officials advised the 70 airlines worldwide that fih 747s to check their planes for similar problems. Meanwhile, the FAA, which monitored the Japanese crash investigation, did not direct U.S. airlines to perform extensive inspections of their 160 747s. Rather, the four major U.S. carriers - Pan Am. TWA. Northwest Orient. and United ordered their own inspections.

The FAA's lack of initiative in this case confirms a conclusion by the 1974 House investigative panel that the agency tends "to avoid the role of leadership in advancing air safety which the Congress intended it to assume.'

Clearly, the Federal Aviation Administration cannot be held responsible for this year's airline catastrophes. But the agency is responsible for improving the present system for the aviation safety. And that responsibility requires a scrupulous attention to detail,

Doing so demands that the agency seize the initiative by placing passenger safety ahead of airline profits.

This is exactly what the Bell report concluded.

The report is extremely thorough in some areas - but at times it seems to ignore evidence that might disprove its major thesis.

#### On Trade With the return of Congress from its August recess, the White House is insisting that priority be given to tax reform. However, Congress has something very different in mind, namely trade legislation to prevent

the further erosion of America's

basic industries. Congress plans to take over the shaping of trade policy because it has concluded that the administration won't do anything about the trade deficit. The congressional determination to act is bipartisan with Sen. John Danforth (R-MO) spearheading conservative fair traders, including Strom Thurmond of South Carolina, William Cohen of Maine, John Heinz of Pennsylvania, and Robert Kasten of Wisconsin all members of the President's party. The leading Democratic spokesman for fair trade is Sen.

Lloyd Bentsen of Texas. The call for action also is coming from prominent citizens outside the Congress. In late August, Howard H. Baker Jr. of Tennessee, former GOP Majority Leader in the Senate. criticized what he called "the largely cosmetic action package of trade reforms announced by the Japanese government." He warned about the 'one-sided nature of trade" between the U.S. and Japan.

The business media is stepping up its demands for action. Industry Week is launching a seven-part series on trade, deindustrialization, and America's slippage as a world economic power. In an editorial, the magazine states: "Let's not kid ourselves. Survival - in economic terms - is what we're really talking about." It asks: "Are we about to become a vast warehouse for imported goods - goods we will be unable to buy because we'll lack the purchasing power? Will U.S. industry be forced to continue to move to overseas locations to survive, causing a further loss of American jobs?"

The White House may find these pressures overwhelming. The old arguments for free trade purity aren't likely to work when, as Professor John M. Culbertson of the University of Wisconsin writes, free trade as practiced today — what he calls "wage-cutting trade," is pulling advanced nations "down to a lowest common denominator level."

The adminstration can't really afford to paint itself in a corner on the trade issue. The growing congressional and public demands for action on trade suggest that the President's advisers soon will have to accept the inevitability of a new course and begin to work with Congress on developing prudent

## Senate Mulls Joining House On Live TV

#### By Jack Anderson Joseph Spear

WASHINGTON - A mighty television battle is building - but it's not among the networks over the new season's ratings. The arena is the U.S. Senate, whose members like to think of themselves as the world's greatest deliberative body.

What the senators are mulling over, for the fifth time in recent years, is whether to allow live television coverage of Senate proceedings, as the House has done for the past six years. Proponents of TV coverage have gained support since their last defeat, and think they may have a chance to win this time.

In fact, a recent poll by C-SPAN (Cable Satellite Public Affairs Network), which sends the House debates to client stations around the country, found that 62 senators would support TV coverage in some form, while only 18 would vote

against it no matter what. The rest, as senators are wont to do, hedged.

One of the flercest opponents of Senate TV coverage, Sen. Russell Long, D-La., is retiring, but will still be around to vote against the idea one last time. His opposition is unflattering to his colleagues.

"Every senator with an inflated ego or higher political aspirations would always be tempted to take the floor and make eloquent speeches," Long has predicted, adding that most Senate floor speeches are "uninspired" to begin with. He presumably doesn't want to demean an institution he loves by displaying its shortcomings to a nationwide TV audience.

Sen. Albert Gore Jr., D.Tenn., doesn't necessarily disagree with Long's prediction, but he doesn't agree that changed behavior by senators would be a bad thing.

In a survey taken shortly after the

House allowed the cameras in, 77 percent of the members thought colleagues were making speeches they wouldn't have made without TV. while only 10 percent admitted making such speeches themselves.

Gore not only believes the 10 percent figure is more accurate, he feels the Senate, by refusing to appear live on the tube, has sacrificed prestige to the House and the president.

"In a democracy, perception affects political power," he said. Gore thinks that changes in senatorial behavior caused by "concern about what the American people think" would be all to the good.

But many senators are wary of letting their chamber fall into the partisan mudslinging that characterized the snarling match between Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill, D-Mass., and New Right Republicans such as Reps. Newt Gingrich, Ga., and Robert Walker, Pa. Nettled by their ratings?

late-session harangues. O'Netll had the cameras pull back to show that the speeches were being made to an almost-empty chamber.

House TV coverage is still tightly controlled by the speaker, through his designated surrogate, Rep. Charlie Rose, D.N.C. The Senate will have to decide, if it chooses to allow TV coverage, whether it will work out a similar system of control, or abdicate its authority to the networks.

One thing seems reasonably certain: If the Senate does decide after all these years to let the television cameras roll, the House will be miffed. As one House staffer confided, the members have grown to like being TV stars, and they have no desire to share the limelight with 100 silver-tongued senators. 


Finke, who will also coach boys track at Lyman, is also looking forward to coaching in the competitive new Seminole Athletic Conference.

LINDSIDE, W.Va. (UPI) - Anglers who enjoy a one-on-one ducl with a healthy rainbow trout that has been enticed by a tiny, dry fly in a mountain stream are in debt to men such as the late Alton Douglas.

He isn't waiting anymore. Ordinarily, Ueberroth doesn't tip his hand. He likes to go around getting ideas but has a habit of keeping his own counsel. He has employed the same modus operandi regarding drugs in baseball. Bear in mind, he already

On the same floor of the Federal Building where the current trial is going on, a jury is being selected for a second trial involving another defendant charged with providing cocaine to major league players. Proceedings could drag on for weeks and Ueberroth doesn't want to wait that long.

He's right. Baseball never has been in greater need for some kind of remedy in my memory and I'm completely mindful of the fact that drugs aren't baseball's problem exclusively. But I also think the problem is serious enough to ruin the game if nothing is done about it.

I'm sure Ueberroth knows all about the Black Sox scandal and how Kenesaw M. Landis, the first commissioner, banished eight of the White Sox players from baseball for life in 1921 even after they had been acquitted of throwing games by a jury.

Landis did it by virtue of the powers vested in him as commissioner and in what he saw as being in the "best interests of baseball."

That paragraph in the book always intrigued Landis. He was anxious to know the precise definition of those so-called best interests.

'What does that mean?" he once asked baseball's attorney. Leslie O'Connor.

"It means exactly what you make it mean," O'Connor told him.

The paragraph is still right there in the book if Ueberroth wishes to use it. He could do worse. It worked for Kensesaw M. Landis.



#### More Defections, Arrests **Expected In Spy Scandal**

BONN, West Germany (UPI) - Investigators are keeping an eye on a suspected "mole" in the Defense Ministry, and more arrests or defections are expected in the growing West German spy scandal, the Bild newspaper said today.

The newspaper, whose reports on the 6-week-old scandal have proved very accurate, said security authorities are on the trail of five more spies, including a suspected Defense Ministry "mole" - an agent planted in the agency. It said authorities also have suspicions about a dozen other

Ten suspected spies have defected, been arrested or left the country since Aug. 8.

#### Police Kill 3 In Rioting

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI) - Police killed three people - including a 10-year-old boy - near Cape Town and clashed with mourners at the funeral of a 4-year-old black girl killed by police as she played in her vard near Pretoria.

The killings in the mixed-race, or "colored," townships around Cape Town Wednesday pushed the death toll above 50 in rioting that broke out Aug. 28.

# Bumper Height Rules Take Effect Oct. 1

"Excessively raised bumpers. or vehicles with no bumpers at all, sometimes, become lethal weapons on the road," said Colonel Bobby R. Burkett.

from business. In most of these business ventures, the investing physicians' profits depend, at least in part, on referrals of patients to these facilites or on other decisions they make in the care of their patients. Such arrangements could tempt doctors to order unneeded treatment.

Also questionable is some physicians' acceptance of inducements - such as quantity discounts, cash rebates, shares of stock, free vacations - from manufacturers to use their products, he said.

Relman noted that defenders of the marketplace approach tohealth care argue there is. nothing wrong with physicians acting as entrepreneurs.

They say that fee-for-service practice is essentially a business anyway, according to Relman. and the conflicts that arise when doctors make financial arrangements with health care bustnesses are in principle not much different from those already existing in private practice.

## Wife's Turn To Violence Not Normal

DEAR ABBY: "Mary" and I are both 41. We've been married 20 years and have four children. We both work. The last several years we have been slowly growing apart. We've had mar, riage counseling with positive temporary results.

Mary is quick-tempered and critical of me and our children. I am more even-tempered and laid-back. In the last two years she has lost her temper and thrown knives and garden shears at me. She has also threatened me with a hot flattron. In a fit of anger, she has destroyed photos of me and thrown out things belonging to our teen-aged children, knowing the loss would hurt them deeply. Last night at bedtime I had a coughing spell and apologized for making so much noise. Mary sald, "That's OK; you'll know when you wake up that I've cut your throat!"

I don't like the person I see her becoming. Is it normal for women her age to occasionally threaten violence? Will she get over it in time? I feel that she is unstable and wonder if she would ever harm me or the children if she were provoked.

I need some suggestions to help our family situation. **FEELING UNEASY** 

**DEAR FEELING:** Don't walt to find out if your wife would ever harm you or the children. Call your family physician now and report Mary's violent, aggressive behavior. She may have a serious problem that can be arrested and controlled if treated early. Mary's behavior is not normal.

**DEAR ABBY:** My husband and I have noticed a trend lately that we don't like. Very often when we visit friends, they don't have the courtesy to turn off the TV when we arrive, and they usually leave it on throughout our visit. We usually call ahead rather than drop in unexpectedly.

It seems to be getting worse. On another occasion, we were having a party at our home. There were a dozen guests present when one of our guests turned on our TV and spoiled the party. Please comment.

DEAR NOT TUNED IN: You say you "usually" call ahead. When you don't call ahead, if your friends are watching TV. you should not expect them to turn it off. On the other hand, if you were invited, it's rude for your host to keep the tV on during your visit.






