Condon Is Called Weakest Link In **Atomic Security**

Hearings To Be Held Soon By House Un-American Group

WASHINGTON, July 27, (A2)-Rep. McDowell (R.Pa) said today the House Committee on Un-American Activities plans to hold heatings soon on its charge that Dr. Edward U. Condon "is one of the weakest links in our atomic security."

Condon, director of the government's Bureau of Standards, has denied the charge and demanded public hearings to answer them. McDowell said these will be held as soon as Chairman Thomas (R-NJ) is permitted by his physician to return to Washington.

"All we need is the doctor's permission for Mr. Thomas to come back," McDowell told reporters whom he summoned to his office to make the announce-

McDowell expressed the opin ion that the committee latelling port last spring is "almost a perfect description." Since then, the Atomic Energy Commission has investigated Condon and cleared him to examine atomic bomb information.

The committee's closed door sessions, said McDowell, have produced testimony to support the original charge -- which included a statement that the government scientist had associated "knowingly or unknowingly" with a suspected Russian spy.

There has been no charge that Dr. Condon is disloyal," Mc-Dowell said, "and I don't think there will be. However, he has associated with known Communists and other persons who we believe are espionage agents." Condon recently was cleared

By ROBERT E. GEIGER WASHINGTON — Would you know what to do if you saw a sign that said "Explosives — Keep Away"? Or "Polson—For Exter-nal use Only"? Sen. Harley M, Kilgore (D-W Va. says the census reveals that elightly over 10,000,000 Americans -che out of every seven adulta-wouldn't know. He calls them "sheer or near illiterates." He prenosed \$130,000,000 federal aid to help such people learn to read and write. His hill died, but educators say it is sure to come

What is an illiterate? Where do there 10,000,000 illiterates live? Kilgore says the answers to these questions are so amazing the situation can only be described as a national disgrace.

First, he describes illiterates as persons without the equivalent of a fourth grade education. They can't read or, if they can, they can't understand what they read sufficiently well to function as citizens.

Second, he says many of these cople-probably the majority of theiu-don't live for out in the sticks, where an education is hard! to come by. And the majority are not foreign born, but native Americans. He gives these figures: 4,200,000

are white people, born in this country, 3,200,000 are foreign born whites, 2,700,000 are Negroes. He says one-tenth of the 10,600,000 live in New York, 462. 666 in Illinois and 385,000 in Calforcia. Louislana has a higher percentage of illiterates among its total population than any other state. Kilgore estimates the number at 36 per cent. Iown has the lowest, 4.1 per cent.


