U. S. sources indicated they still have seen no evidence through any diplomatic channels of Communist willingness to negotiate an end to the war on terms even remotely ac-

tention of his audience by referring first to General Henry S. Sanford as one of the earliest persons to stimulate interest in horticulture in Florida. He reminded the group that General Sanford imported plants from all parts of the world and cultivated over 100 varieties of citrus at his home The Jaffa orange is the best know permanent introduction by Sanford.

The speaker also discussed the accomplishments of Theodore Mead who for many years made his home at an orange grove on Lake Charm near Oviedo. This hortculturist experimented with amaryllis and succeeded in developing what is now known as the Mead strain. The Mead Botanical Gardens in Winter Park com-

memorate his work. Other pioneers were George Lindley Tabor, founder of the Glen St. Maxy Nursery, who introduced the Satsuma orange; Pliny and E. M. Ressoner of the Royal Palm Nurserles in Manatee County which for years was the leading source of tropical ornamentals; David Fairchild, remembered for his far ranging expeditions and Feirchild Tropical Gardene in Coconut Grove, and H. 



Man vs Horse Sense

Seven hundred troops seems an impossible number of men for an airplane to carry. But that's how many will be lifted by a gigantic military plane which President Johnson has just O.K.'d \$750 million to develop.

It's a far cry from the "40 and 8a" of World War I fame, the French

boxcars which transported either 40 men or eight horses to the front in something less than comfort.

Come to think of it, 140 horses would be a lot of cavalry for an airplane to carry. Horses are smarter than humans, however. They don't go to war any more.

Tourist Tax: Danger Sign

When the richest nation in the world must seriously consider penalizing any citizen who leaves the country as a tourist the sum of \$100. then things are in pretty bad shape.

What is in bad shape is not just the balance of payments situation which is the reason behind the proposal. The common sense behind the proposal also seems subject to ques-

An unfavorable balance of payments means that the U.S. is spending more abroad than it is taking in from abroad and that our gold supplies are being depleted steadily.

American tourists contribute to the deficit. The two million of them who went overseas last year spent about \$1 billion more than their foreign counterparts spent in this country. That amounts to about a third of the total balance of payments de-

The \$100 head tax is frankly designed to discourage Americans from going overseas and to reduce their spending there if they do go.

It has a certain paper logic. Even if no one is discouraged from going abroad, the tax would bring in \$200 million, based on 1964's figures.

But tourist travel is more than a matter of X number of people on X number of ships and X number of planes, spending X number of dollars in X number of countries.

Such a tax could deny the retired couple who have been saving for years, or the young college student operating on a shoestring, the one opportunity they may ever have to "see the world."

The vast majority of travelers is not rich and \$100 could make the difference between going and not going on the dream adventure.

But subtract so many tourists from the X number and you subtract something more than money and people. You take away from the experience of the nation itself. To impose such a tax would be to put blinders on the nation at a time when it has raised itself to leadership of half the






