TAX NOTICE TO OWNERS OF PROPERTY IN SEMINOLE COUNTY

Under the new law enacted by the legislature the following interest and penalties begin, on April 1, 1942, on all unpaid taxes assessed for the year 1941:

On Real Estate:
A penalty of 3% on April 1st with interest at 10% per annum from April 1st, plus cost of advertising and tax sale, where not paid before tax sale.

On Personal Property:
Interest at 12% per annum from April 1st plus cost of advertising and tax warrants.

On Intangible Personal Property:
10% penalty added on April 1st plus 24% per annum, cost of advertising and sheriff's costs on collection.

Under this new law all unpaid taxes for the year 1941 become delinquent on April 1, 1942 and the penalties and interest become a part of the taxes which are a lien on the property assessed, upon the Intangible Personal Property laws and a lien on the personal property of the taxpayer.

Property owners who have not paid an amount to pay their taxes as ordered March 11, 1942 and avoid penalties and interest.

Opportunity In Bees

While people are being urged to plant defense gardens they are being cautioned not to start anything they are not prepared to see through. If they are going to allow their gardens to grow up in weeds or their vegetables to be devoured by bugs, it would be better not to waste the seeds.

As much might be said for those enterprising citizens who are planning to beat the sugar shortage by securing a hive of bees. Honey is certainly an excellent substitute for sugar and as prospects loom for a rationing system which may give one person less than half a pound a week, a nearby bee hive operating around the clock without time and a half for overtime, is not to be sneezed at.

We'll say it is not to be sneezed at, and it is not to be treated in any other discourteous manner either. If you do not know your bees and how to handle them, you had better buy your honey from those who do for there is nothing so admirably adapted to undermining the nation's war effort and filling the hospitals of the country with badly swollen and mangled victims as mistreated bee hives.

Florida already has 6,000 beekeepers who know what it is all about and can walk right into a batch of a thousand bees without benefit of headgear or risk of their lives. Some of them keep as high as a thousand colonies and together their income is estimated at over a quarter of a million dollars a year. This year all previous records will be exceeded as the nation prepares to satisfy its sweet tooth around the honey jar.

State Plant Board Apilist Foster says that the coming Spring finds millions of bees eager to go to work on Florida's citrus trees, just now bursting into bloom, and on Tupelo trees, gallberry, blackberry, chinquapin, palmetto, sunflower, and goldenrod as their seasons approach throughout the summer and early fall months. Some of the best honey in the country is made from the blooms of these Florida plants and trees.

But as we said in the beginning, don't fool around with bees unless you know what you're doing.

To End The War Quickly

The worst suffering is emotional, not physical, and physical reality, no matter how devastating, is never as unpleasant to endure as the terror of the unknown which precedes it.

That statement, made by the noted psychologist, William Moulton Marston in an article in Your Life Magazine, sets the pace for his contention that, from a psychological standpoint, the worst of the war is over.

Quoting a discovery of William James—"We do not run away because we are afraid, we are afraid because we run away"—Dr Marston pleads for all-out participation in the war that, with the attack on Pearl Harbor, was thrust upon the American people. He says:

"Let's quit running away from war, its consequences and its inevitable sacrifices. There's no longer the slightest hope of escaping war. But we still have our choice between fear and courage, reluctance and bold resolution, shrinking futility and fierce exhilaration. Since we have to fight, let's enjoy fighting!"

To end the war quickly, Dr. Marston suggests: "Realize that you are afraid only when you run away, stop trying to escape mentally from the war and its consequences.

"Stop waiting for national danger, it's here! Start attacking, mentally, emotionally and physically, the attackers of America.

"Realize that the worst of this war is over, psychologically, we're no longer defending ourselves against a shadow but attacking a real opponent who is ripe for a licking.

"Expect setbacks and they won't trouble you.

"Protect your mind from insidious assault. Reject enemy news bulletins, propaganda, rumors, defeatist suggestions and attempts to ferment confusion and discontent.

"Give all you have to the fight and in your giving share the triumph of victory.

Travel Note

In less than seven weeks following the attack on Pearl Harbor, some 600,000 troops were moved within the boundaries of the United States. That fact is unparalleled in the history of the country—and, as David Lawrence writes, it "must be credited to the railroads of America, their executives and their workers."

Nearly all of the railroads, involving more than 200,000 miles of track, were used. Seventy-five percent of the soldiers actually had sleeping accommodations, and the remainder traveled in day coaches, so not a single company had to be moved in freight cars, as was the case in the first world war.—Key West Citizen.

TAX NOTICE TO OWNERS OF PROPERTY IN SEMINOLE COUNTY

Under the new law of Florida, the following interest and penalties begin on April 1, 1912:

On Real Estate:
A penalty of 3% on the tax with interest at 18% per annum from April 1st, plus cost of advertising and sheriff's costs where not paid before tax sale.

On Personal Property:
Interest at 12% per annum from April 1st plus cost of advertising and tax warrants.

On Intangible Personal Property:
10% penalty added on April 1st plus 1% per annum, cost of advertising and Sheriff's costs on executions.

Under this new law all unpaid taxes for the year 1911 become delinquent on April 1, 1912 and the penalties and interest become a part of the taxes which are a first lien on the property assessed, except that Intangible Personal Property taxes are a lien on all property owned by the taxpayer.

Properly owners who have not done so are urged to pay their taxes on or before March 31, 1912 and avoid penalties and costs.

Japanese Land, Air Forces Stage Heavy Attacks In Bataan

Corregidor and U. S. Positions Raided, Sharp Encounters Occur On Ground

The Associated Press. A heavy bombing attack on the Corregidor fortress and American positions in Bataan by 54 Japanese heavy bombers of a new type was reported today by the War Department, which said only slight damage was inflicted.

Several sharp encounters occurred in Bataan as fighting was resumed there, the Department added. Three of the enemy bombers were shot down by anti-aircraft fire.

American artillery laid down a heavy fire on enemy positions in Bataan, and Japanese losses are believed considerable.

The Japanese continued heavy attack in Burma, according to British military spokesmen, but land action was limited to patrols operating in the Toungoo sector.

A considerable Japanese advance against the Chinese held left flank of the Allied line in Burma was acknowledged in a Chinese communique reporting "vigorous fighting" only seven miles from Toungoo, one of two key points in the British-Chinese position.

The first major land battle for central Burma was being fought along the Pyu river 35 miles south of Toungoo on the Rangoon-Mandalay railroad. British and Chinese troops made a junction in that area last week and an initial sortie the Chinese threw the Japanese.

Initial reports of the battle, published in a Chinese army communique here, said it was still in progress. The Chinese troops employed were a shock force armed with United States battle equipment. It was assumed that they were part of the crack fifth and eighth armies, commanded by Lieutenant General Stilwell.

At the outset, the Japanese appeared to have won the advantage in the battle for air superiority over Burma. The Allies were reported suffering from a lack of heavy bombers.

On the Kwangtung front in South China the official announcement said heavy fighting was in progress near Chungsha, west of Hongkong, following a new Japanese landing on the coast.

Hotelmen Hike Price; Negotiations Dropped

MIAMI BEACH, Mar. 21 (AP)—Hig. Gen. Ralph W. Wooster said yesterday the army air corps has dropped negotiations for the establishment of a replacement center here because of five hotel owners' bid their price at the last minute.

They had agreed originally to a price for housing personnel, he said, then unexpectedly asked for as much.

"The Japs and the Germans are not waiting for hotel men to make up their minds as to what they are going to do," General Wooster said.

Later, Miami Beach hotelmen unanimously passed a resolution agreeing to lease their facilities to the Army on the Army's terms.

There was no immediate indication that the Army would resume negotiations.
