Senate Bans Arms Buying From Aid Bill

Other Amendments To Foreign Relief Bill Approved As Final Vote Soon Is Seen

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (AP)—The Senate today (AP) rejected the Truman Administration's policy of "largely responsible" for the economic chaos in Europe.

Taking the floor to announce that he will vote for the emergency European relief measure, the Ohio senator said, however, that Americans "cannot continue much longer the rate of assistance they are giving to Europe."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (AP)—The Senate voted today to ban France, Italy and Austria from purchasing arms with any aid received under the Administration's \$597,000,000 emergency assistance bill.

Action on the proposal by Senator Taylor (D-Ill.) was taken by voice vote after Chairman Vandenberg (R-Mich.) of the Foreign Relations Committee said nothing in the bill "remotely contemplates" arms purchases of any kind.

Moving quickly through amendments to that a final vote can be taken Monday, the Senate also adopted:

A proposal by Senator Ferguson (R-Mich.) to allow an on-the-ground check on operations of the foreign relief program by members of the Senate and House Foreign Affairs and Appropriations Committees.

A proposal by Senator Donnell (R-Mo.) specifying that Congress shall have the deciding voice, so far as this country is concerned, in disposing of any leftover surplus in trust for foreign governments to purchase relief goods.

Senator Kern (R-Mo.), offering another amendment to require reports every three months from the countries receiving aid, sought to postpone a vote on his proposal until Monday, but Vandenberg objected.

\$100,000 Gift Sent To People Of Anzio

DUNKIRK, N. Y., Nov. 28 (AP)—A Thanksgiving day gift of \$100,000 in food, clothing, medical supplies and farm equipment to the people of Anzio, makes this community of 20,000 "a very big city of the world" in the view of Italian ambassador Alberto Tarchiani.

Tarchiani accepted the contributions yesterday in behalf of the Anzio people. He said that Dunkirk celebrated its second anniversary across the sea Thanksgiving—a cooperative effort with the neighboring village of Predonza.

A year ago, the residents of Dunkirk turned over \$75,000 in gifts for their namesake city of Dunkirk, France, and continued their international good will efforts last spring with a \$150,000 campaign for Polish relief.

"What you have done today," said Tarchiani, "is a touching memorial to Americans who died on Italian soil. This little town of America is a very big city of the world."

SAYS PRESIDENT DOES NOT ACT IN GOOD FAITH ON PROPOSALS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (AP)—Secretary of Commerce Harrison said today lower prices for meat, steel and lumber are "hopes" from President Truman's 10-point rationing program.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (AP)—Senator Taft (R-Ohio) declared today the Administration is not acting in good faith in asking "limited" authority to channel scarce materials to most essential uses.

The Ohio senator's statement brought vigorous disagreement from Secretary of Commerce Harrison who was before the Senate-House Economic Committee to discuss a part of President Truman's 10-point cost of living program.

Harrison had listed a number of materials which he said should be covered by "limited" allocation and priority when the exchange with Taft developed.

Smith today declared a mistrial in the case of Frederick George, charged with manslaughter in connection with the death on Oct. 25 of State Patrolman L. C. Bender, who died after being hit by truck driven by George on West First Street.

This verdict was reached by Judge Smith after Dr. J. N. Tolar testified this morning that Mr. Frazier would be unable, due to his illness, to serve for 10 days, and that it was advisable that he not serve at all.

The case will be reopened, following the selection of a new jury, on Tuesday Dec. 8 at 10:00 A. M., and the Court will convene at 10:00 A. M. on Monday morning. Today a venire of 80 names was drawn for jury duty.

NEW YORK, Nov. 28 (AP)—Police stressed a city-wide search today for red-haired Wanda E. Winchell, 20-year-old actress-daughter of columnist and radio commentator Walter Winchell, reported by her mother to have been missing since Wednesday afternoon.

Mrs. Winchell, who said that her daughter was ill, told police that the girl was last seen leaving her Fifth Avenue hotel at 3 P. M. Wednesday. She did not disclose the nature of Wanda's illness.

In Hollywood, Winchell declared "This is a believe Thanksgiving."

France Offers Proposal For Austrian Pact

Attempt Is Made To Break Deadlock On Reparations Asked By Soviet Russia

LONDON, Nov. 28 (AP)—France proposed today that Russia receive \$100,000,000 from current production in Austria as part of the general reparations settlement, a qualified source said.

The proposal was made to deputies of the Big Four foreign ministers who were seeking agreement of a treaty of independence and peace for Austria. The ministers themselves were considering the future of Germany and its boundaries.

The informant said the French suggested that Russia receive a third of the production of the Zisterdorf oil fields indefinitely and take over virtually all Austrian shipping on the Danube. A Russian source forecast that the Soviet Union would reject the French compromise on the issue of what constitute German assets in Austria.

The French proposals were said to have been made in a new attempt to break the deadlock among Russia, the United States, Great Britain and France on what constitute German assets in Russia and what might be used for reparations.

The Russian deputy H. V. Kotelomov questioned his French counterpart General Paul Chauriere, more than two hours about details of the French compromise. The French proposal appeared to be based on the reparations agreement reached between Russia and Finland, by which Finland in effect agreed to "buy" all German assets in her territory for \$300,000,000. Thus, Soviet ownership of former German property in Finland was avoided.

Dr. Karl Gruber, Austrian foreign minister, told interviewers in London this week his government was willing to accept the French formula. American and British officials were inclined also to favor it, mainly because it presented the most promising way open to writing off the debt.

The deputies have been snarled for four months on the issue of German assets in Austria. The French compromise avoided definition of assets. It called upon all countries to list their reparations claims. Austria said and say for how much they would settle.

8 U. S. Engineers To Give Turk Roads Aid

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (AP)—Eight Public Roads Administration engineers will leave for Turkey tomorrow to help build a national system of modern highways.

Whether the proposed road network will extend to the Russian-Turkish border, for a link with the Soviet transportation system has not been fully worked out. H. E. Hills, deputy public roads administrator and head of the mission, told a reporter.

Although road links with Iran and Iraq are neighbors on the east and south, might give Turkey greater access to the oil production of those two countries, Hills said, he was not prepared to discuss this aspect of the undertaking.

Expenses of the mission, plus the cost of machinery and equipment, will be paid for out of a \$5,000,000 sum set aside by the State Department from the \$100,000,000 Turkish aid program approved by Congress last spring.

Caroline Rationing

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Nov. 28 (AP)—Standard Oil Co. of Kentucky announced today it would begin rationing gasoline to its distributors in Alabama Dec. 1. Indications were that the program would be put into effect on virtually a nation-wide basis.

A spokesman for Standard Oil said its 3,000 dealers throughout Alabama would be limited to 85 per cent of their purchases during October. The allocation program probably will be continued indefinitely.

128 Persons Are Killed In U. S. During Holiday

AIRPLANE CRACK-UP IN ALASKA BRINGS DEATH TO THIRTEEN

By ASSOCIATED PRESS—Nearly 128 persons were killed in traffic accidents and 16 others died in violent accidents over the Thanksgiving holiday.

A survey across the country today disclosed that since 6 P. M. (local time) Wednesday, 107 persons lost their lives as a result of automobile mishaps, with 14 fatalities. The 16 deaths from unexplained causes resulted from drowning, hunting and airplane accidents.

The traffic toll surpassed the total of 69 reported on Thanksgiving day last year and the overall total of 128 this year compared to 83 in 1946.

Indiana reported thirteen traffic fatalities and of the seven persons killed in motor mishaps in Washington state three were killed in a train auto collision. There were three violent deaths reported in Florida.

Cold Weather Hangs Over Northeast U. S.

By ASSOCIATED PRESS—Cold weather lingered over the northeastern quarter of the country today and federal forecasts said there was no immediate relief in sight.

In other sections of the country, temperatures were moderate and sunny skies were predicted for most of the South and West. The mercury climbed into the 50's in Kentucky yesterday and was expected to reach that mark in parts of Oklahoma today.

New seasonal lows were reported in some sections of the Midwest. The coldest weather was in Minnesota with Duluth's morning weather map. Minneapolis and St. Cloud suffered in zero temperatures. Chicago's 12 above was a new low for the season.

U. S.-Russia Partition Plan Is Denounced

Supporters Are Accused Of Employing Pressure Tactics To Win Votes

NEW YORK, Nov. 28 (AP)—Supporters of the "Soviet-American" plan to partition Palestine were accused today of using "pressure" tactics today as the holy contested issue approached a fateful vote in the United Nations Assembly.

The charges were made on the assembly floor by Pakistan, Cuba and Iraq—all opponents of the plan to split the Holy Land into separate Arab and Jewish countries.

No individual countries were mentioned in the accusations, but Cuba and Iraq referred to some "great powers," Russia and the United States are the only big powers vigorously supporting partition.

Pakistan, Cuba and Iraq stood firm in opposition to the plan, which was expected to reach the final voting test some time this afternoon.

The contest continued in a class that neither the partitionists nor the Arab-led anti-partitionists would predict the outcome.

Partitionists needed a two-thirds majority of those present and voting.

Warren's Entrance Into GOP Race For Nomination Hailed

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 28 (AP)—The entrance of Governor Earl Warren of California into the contest for the 1948 Republican presidential nomination was hailed as encouraging today by Daniel J. Tobin, president of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters (AFL).

Tobin, who headed the Labor Bureau of the Democratic National Committee during the four campaigns in which Franklin D. Roosevelt was elected President, said, however, "There is not much hope that Governor Warren will get the nomination."

The teamster president made his comments in a signed article in the International Teamster for December. He described Warren as "right on nearly everything for labor" and said "in our opinion (Warren) will have an enormous backing from organized labor throughout the country."

Tobin said the Democratic Party will undoubtedly nominate President Truman, but what is labor going to say about supporting the Democratic Party and its platform?

Dr. Gilbert Osincup, Orlando Doctor, Dies

ORLANDO, Nov. 28 (AP)—Dr. Gilbert S. Osincup, 52, Orlando pediatrician for 25 years, died here Wednesday night following a long illness.

Dr. Osincup, a veteran of both World Wars, was stricken with his fatal illness in 1945 while doing rehabilitation work in Greece.

In World War One, he was an American Army medical officer on duty with an Indian cavalry regiment of the British Army.

He later became one of the first Florida pediatricians to join the American Academy of Pediatrics. He was a past president of the Florida State Medical Association, and head of the medical staff of Orange Memorial Hospital here and had been chief pediatrician for 20 years.

Harriman listed textiles, soda ash, aluminum, nails, soil pipe, plywood board and newspaper. The secretary said a newspaper shortage probably will continue for some time. French Labor Is Called To Action Against New Law

PARIS, Dec. 1 (AP)—Strikes halted the Paris subway today and leaders of the Communist-dominated General Confederation of Labor defied the government's anti-strike legislation. CGT leaders summoned all workers "to action," asserting they would refuse to negotiate further toward ending nationwide walkouts if the legislation was enacted in the national assembly. Subways halted shortly after noon, when electric power was shut off by strikers. Gas pressure was reported at "danger levels" in the capital and service was reported stopped at Nice, Marseille and Cannes. The assembly, which last night approved a call of 80,000 men to the colors to combat the creeping paralysis induced by the strikes, became such a well of tumult that it suspended for two hours its consideration of the strike law. Neither the chairman nor speakers could be heard. With thousands stranded by the subway shutdown, Paris was plagued by a traffic jam at all points (Continued on Page 5)

Freight Traffic Is Resumed On River

Freight traffic on the St. Johns River, discontinued by Sanford since 1941 on account of the war, has now been resumed by the reorganized St. Johns River Line, its LCI-freight boat arrived late last week and docked at the Municipal Pier. Otto Caldwell, central Florida agent for the new line, stated today that Mrs. Sadysa Moses, former owner of Sady's Specialty Shop in Sanford, is president of the new company and lives in Brunswick, Ga. The LCI freighter will be loaded with canned citrus at the recently repaired St. Johns River Line dock and was expected to leave today via inland waterways for Baltimore, Md., said Mr. Caldwell. The freighter is 158 feet long, has a beam of about 400 tons and has a speed up to 12 knots. It is Diesel powered, 1800 horsepower and will reach Baltimore from Sanford in about six days. Another LCI is being reconditioned for river service at Brunswick, Mr. Caldwell revealed. The LCI here has a crew of nine.

Bidault Says Zone May Join British, U. S.

LONDON, Dec. 1 (AP)—French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault said today that if the London conference of foreign ministers fails to agree on the future of Germany, the French zone may be merged with the British and American zones to establish a unified western Germany. Bidault, who is going to Paris tonight for conferences with French government leaders, stated this position at a meeting with French reporters shortly before the Foreign Ministers Council opened the second week of its sessions at Lancaster House. Meanwhile, it was authoritatively reported that Russia had turned down today a French proposal for settling the issue of German assets in Austria, which is the chief barrier to completion of an Austrian peace treaty here.

Reds Turn Down Plan Of French To Settle German Assets In Austrian Issue

The French plan has been under consideration by a committee of foreign ministers who are due to report to the Big Four tomorrow. Action by the deputies may not necessarily be final. The Russians contended they are entitled to all assets in Eastern Austria formerly owned by Germans. The French proposed that by way of settlement they accept payments of \$100,000,000 plus the Danube Shipping Company and a share in the Zisterdorf oilfield production. American informants, reporting on today's deputies meeting, said efforts by the United States and Britain to get the Russians to accept the French plan were total claims proved unavailing. Secretary of State Marshall and his aides prepared specific proposals for the unification of Germany and the eventual creation of a central German government. Bidault told newsmen he still considers the London conference offers the last real chance for a four-power settlement on Germany. If the meeting fails, he said, he expects negotiations among Britain, France and the United States to form the condition and manner of a fusion of the French (Continued on Page Two)

Search For Fire Bugs Proves Fruitless

LOGANVILLE, Ga., Dec. 1 (AP)—The search for persons responsible for the burning of all negro schools and churches in this north Georgia community during the past month has been futile. Mayor C. H. Byrd said today, despite a \$100 reward offered by the city. Loganville is about 20 miles east of Atlanta, and is in Walton county where mobsters lynched two negro men and their wives on July 25, 1946. Federal, state and local authorities joined in an investigation of the brutal slayings, but the case has never been solved. Mayor Byrd said that while he did not believe the church and school fires resulted from racial animosities, he felt that they were of incendiary origin. He said a feud between negro factions was possibly responsible, but that negroes were seeking to draw nationwide attention by burning their own schools and churches. Negro leaders in the community were not immediately available for comment.

He also declared that he is contemplating a number of improvements for the local station and a presentation of a wider variety of programs. He added that within the next few days two additional announcers will be added to the present staff.

Violence Is Growing In All Middle East; Americans Warned At Syrian Legation

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Dec. 1 (AP)—Tiyave Laj, secretary-general of the United Nations, called his top aides to meet late today to consider problems growing out of the General Assembly's decision to partition Palestine. Informed sources said one of the problems was whether the Security Council should be called into a special meeting to get reports on disorders the partition decision touched off in the Holy Land. The council was expected to meet late this week to consider the Dutch-Indonesian question, but there is a possibility an earlier meeting may be called in view of developments. Under the partition plan, the council was called upon to act in case peace is threatened. Violence stemming from the United Nations decision to partition Palestine has resulted in a dozen deaths in the Holy Land and Syria and brought the threat of war from the 33,000,000 Arabs clustered in the Middle East. Eight Jews died violently in Palestine and police blamed Arabs, who were pouring around in armed bands. The United States was under insulting attacks from Arab demonstrators in Egypt and Syria because this country supported partition. 7 Persons Are Killed In Airplane Crash

SEATTLE, Dec. 1 (AP)—Seven persons are dead and 10 others critically injured today following a fiery crash in which a four-engine Alaska Airlines transport overbore a runway yesterday at the Seattle-Tacoma airport and smashed a passing automobile. Twenty-six of the 28 aboard the big plane scrambled from door and emergency exits or were pulled from the flames by rescuers. All however, were scarred by the gasoline-fed flames that flashed through the fuselage. Four of the rescued died later. The latest casualty was the plane's stewardess, Miss Reba Monk of Santa Monica, Calif., who is credited by survivors with having led many of the passengers to safety.
