





To realize what may happen, we have only to consider that numerically the Soviet Union is where the United States of America was in auto population 50 years ago, when Henry Ford began mass production of his famous Model Ts. There are only five cars per 1,000 persons in Russia - mostly owned by the Communost hierarchy-compared with 400 per 1,000 in the U.S. There are only 10 gasoline station to serve all of Moscow; there are few paved roads

Today, however, improved communications tell the average Russian something of how the rest of the world lives, he will not be denied much longer. This pent-up public demand is one reason that Moscow planners have invited foreign manufacturers in to supplement their own sluggish automobile production.

As more cars are produced, we can expect that consumer demand will feed upon itself. creating new, related appetites. Wouldn't it be wonderful if the Kremlin became so busy turning out cars, paving vast distances between cities, and providing filling stations, garages, motels and drive-ins that there were neither time nor money left for international adven-

TALLAHASSEE - Florida hunters have always been in the front line of conservation movements, and proof of sportsmen action is established in the record books of 1828. Seven years after Florida was purchased from Spain, a conservation law was passed which prohibited hunting with a light in the area located west of the Suwanne River. Today, 143 years later, the law embraces all of Florida and receives the continued support of hunters both as indi-



The statewide season for hunting ducks and coots will close at sundown. Wednesday, January 20, according to the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission. A special scaup (bluebill) only season will follow the regular duck hunting season in certain designated areas of the state. The special scaup only season will open one-half hour before sunrise on January 21 and continue through January 31. According to the Commission, the special scaup hunting season will apply only to the open waters of Charlotte Harbor from the power line four miles east of the U. S. 41 bridge on the Peace River,, and from El Jobean bridge on the Myakka River to a line running from Boca Grande Pass east through Bokeelia

Also open for scaup husting will be the open waters of Tampa Bay, open waters of Sarasota Bay south to the Albee Road bridge, open waters of Estro Bay, open waters of Lemon Bay, open waters of the Indian River from the Melbourne bridge south, and open waters of Biscayne Bay lying south of an east-west line through the center of Featherbed Banks to. and including Barnes Sound.

Maps and regulations governing the special scaup only season may be obtained from Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission officers in Tallahassee, Lakeland, Ocala, Orlando, West Palm Beach and Miami.

It was pointed out by the Commission that the special seain is for scaup only. Ducks other than scaup and coots are protected, and may not be taken during the January 21 31 sea-

A word to the wise about this scaup season. Every Federal Wildlife officer in the state will be stationed in the three areas mentioned above and you had better be dead sure it's a scaup, scaup, or as we know them, bluebill, before you send that charge of No. 4's on their way. This season is a very difficult one to hunt and proves to be impossible for those who can't identify a duck at a distance (very costly also). The hours are the same as the regular season; one half hour before sunrise until sunset. The bag limits are five scaup per day and a possession limit of 10 after the first day of hunting. There is no

hunting allowed within 160 yards of any main shoreline. At the meeting of the GFC Deputy Wildlife Officers held here in Sanford last week, plans were disclosed to implement a statewide Hunter Safety Educational Program under the direction of a full time instructor-co-ordinator recently acquired by the Game and Fish Commission.
