Would you spend a lot of government money to build it and keep America in competition with other nations building a similar plane? Or would you scrap the idea as silly in the face of unmet domestic needs such as poverty, hunger and disease? Would you give the go-ahead to build the plane so as not to lose nearly \$1 billion already invested in it and risk a multibillion-dollar loss in jobs and balance of payments? Or would you reject the SST as a dirty, noisy monster likely to benefit the few at the expense of the health and hearing of earth-bound millions? The questions may give you an idea of why the Congress is having trouble making up its collective mind on the fate of the superjet transport (SST). Some time before March 30, the 92nd Congress will make another decision on the SST. For the past 30 years, the decision has been, and work is due to start on two prototype models this year. ## State Canal Faces Court Injunction

JACKSONVILLE (AP) — Current projects continued on the Cross-Florida Barge Canal today and the federal agency building it said some work may go on even after a preliminary injunction becomes official. "We have received no official word to stop," said Col. A. S. Fullerton, U.S. district engineer for public works projects in most of Florida. Even if the shutdown order is given by a federal judge Wednesday and it affects work in progress, Fullerton said some projects must be carried to a certain point for safety reasons. The Environmental Defense Fund, Inc., which won a declaration of a preliminary injunction Friday, said it would not ask for a permanent injunction. Fullerton and his staff in the Army Engineers office are estimating how much it would cost the government to interrupt work on the \$18 million contracts in progress and how much it would cost to permanently cease work on the project which is about one-third complete between Jacksonville and Yanketown. These figures, after review by the chief of engineers, will be submitted to the court Wednesday.

## Jury Trial Opens For Zane Clark

### Jury Of 4 Men, 2 Women

### Hear Evidence On Drugs

Trial begins this morning in the case of Zane Edward Clark, charged with possession of barbiturates. Clark is represented by Richard Rhodes, of an Orlando law firm. Prosecuting for the state is Thomas Spier. A jury of four men and two women was seated this morning. Rhodes also questioned if the fact that an expert witness, which he anticipated to be a chemist, should testify, if the juror would give any more credence to expert testimony than he would to any other, and if he would recognize that an expert could make mistakes and have inconsistencies in his testimony. Rhodes told the jury that law enforcement has become a "big political issue" and asked if they had any attitude upon the matter which would affect their judgment. He stressed the juror's attitude upon the publicizing of cases being dismissed due to not being brought to a speedy trial but was interrupted on this point by Judge Thomas Waddell as being "too philosophical."

Clark, 30-year-old South Seminole resident, was found not guilty on Sept. 16 on charges of the sale of narcotics but was re-arrested on Sept. 18 upon the charges for which he is being tried. He was arrested on April 9 at the home of Andrew Caraway, Altamonte Springs, with five other persons. They were alleged to have been in possession of \$12,000 worth of marijuana; that is, 46 pounds of the narcotic. Since his acquittal on Sept. 16, Clark has been in and out of difficulties with the law. He was arrested on Sept. 17 on traffic charges, and had four jilts in his possession at that time. Clark was charged with no driver's license and no inspection sticker. Rhodes, in his interrogation of jurors, intimated that the defendant may not take the stand in his own defense, and inquired if this would prejudice the decision of the juror.

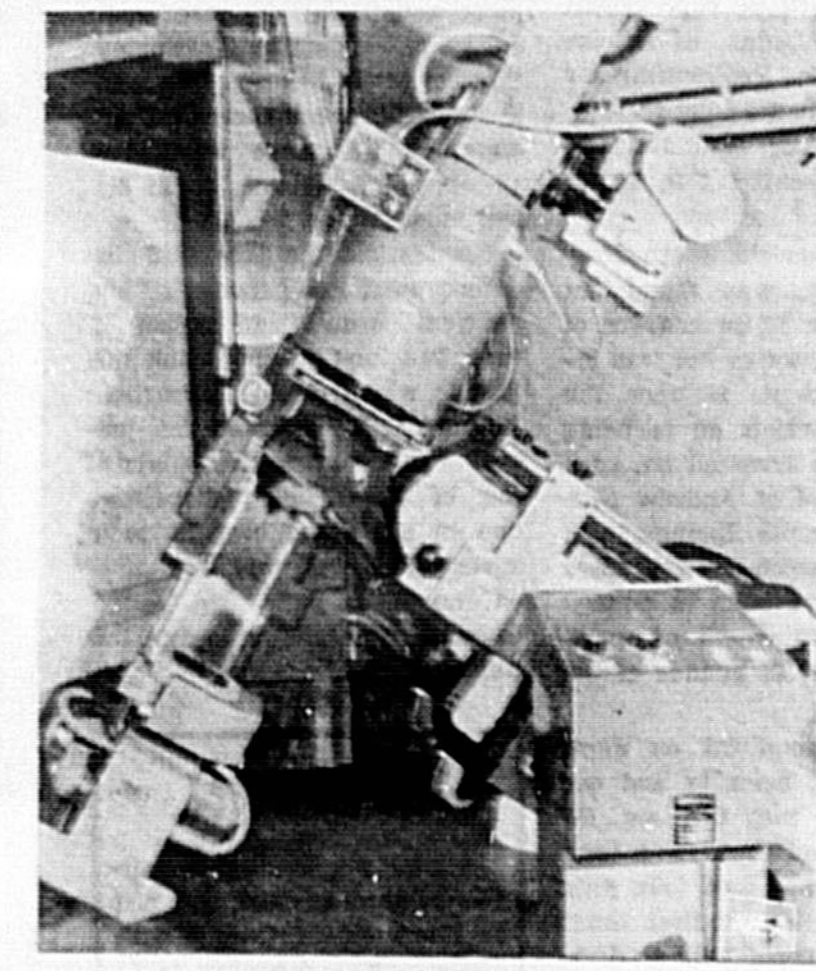

Cooper-Benton, Inc. was selected by the Seminole County Port Authority last night to build a 50,000-square-foot facility at the Port of Sanford which tentatively will be leased to Port Everglades Steel Company. The selected firm, Cooper-Benton, submitted the lowest bid of \$1,900,000 which was \$200,000 less than the next lowest bid.  
The engineering firm of Clark, Dietz and Associates presented an analysis of the final bids of all three firms, including alternatives. Both East Coast and Baldwin had submitted changes in their original bids and with the changes East Coast would have been the lower bidder but offered a completion date two weeks later than Cooper-Benton. This would have meant a loss of rental revenue to the Port of Sanford.  
Cooper-Benton also received the recommendation of Richard M. d'Ao, representative of Clark, Dietz and Associates.

## Senate To Operate Under New Rules

WASHINGTON (AP) — When the 93rd Congress opens Thursday the Senate will begin operating under new rules and procedures to improve its efficiency and fairness.  
And if proposals advanced by four first-term senators are accepted, the Senate, with thoughts of last year's marathon session still in mind, will try to eliminate some ancient time-consuming practices.  
The changes certain to take effect result from last year's Legislative Reorganization Act, an outgrowth of a 1960-66 committee study.  
Major changes under the new act curtail the power of committee chairs without touching the seniority system; eliminating much committee secrecy; curbing prerogatives of senior senators; give Congress tools for more effective control over the budget; and provide greater congressional oversight of all government operations.  
All of these provisions apply to the House as well as the Senate.  
Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif.; William E. Brooke, D-Ohio; Harold E. Hughes, D-Iowa, and Richard S. Schweiker, R-Pa., have met a generally friendly reception with their ideas for reorganizing the Senate's work practices.  
Their proposal would have the Senate meet each day at noon to give committees time to function. In recent years leaders of one party have set earlier convening times to their own convenience.

## Nixon Request 'Unfair'

The statewide season for hunting ducks and coots will close on Sunday, Wednesday, January 20, according to the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission.

A special scarp (shelduck) only season will follow the regular duck hunting season in certain designated areas of the state.

Also open for scarp hunting will be the open waters of Tampa Bay, open waters of Sarasota Bay south to the Albee Road bridge, open waters of Largo Bay, open waters of Lemon Bay, open waters of the Indian River from the Melbourne bridge south, and open waters of Biscayne Bay living south of an east-west line through the center of Featherbed Banks to the mainland from Boca Grande Pass east through Bokelits to the main land.

Maps and regulations governing the special scarp only season may be obtained from Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission offices in Tallahassee, Lakeland, Ocala, Orlando, West Palm Beach and Miami.

It was pointed out by the Commission that the special season is for scarp only. Ducks other than scarp and coots are protected, and may not be taken during the January 21 scarp season.
