Sanford officials OK First Street bid

SANFORD — Two city boards approved a \$2.1 million contract to rehabilitate 1st Street, a project that is expected to close downtown's main avenue to vehicular traffic for at least four months.

The Downtown Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) convened a special meeting with city commissioners Monday

afternoon to award the contract to Gomez Construction. The city commission followed suit a few hours later during its regular bi-monthly meeting.

Renovations to 1st Street include replacing stormwater and

electrical infrastructure under 1st Street from Sanford Avenue to Oak Avenue. The project also includes extensive streetscape work including rebrickwork portions of the street, widening sidewalks and installing landscaping

and street lights.

This is the second time Gomez has been granted the contract. The Winter Park-based construction company originally submitted a low bid of \$2.7 million, substantially higher than the \$1.7 mil-

lion estimate the city's consultant at the time, Glattin Jackson, predicted the project would cost. City staff worked with Gomez officials to trim the cost to about \$2.1 million; however, city attorney's directed staff to rebid the project because the cost savings significantly change the project specifications.

The most noteworthy change in the project is the decision to

Schools debate phone abuse

Some officials say cell phones hinder students' safety

SANFORD — Seminole County Public Schools officials have initiated a debate whether to continue to allow cell phones in schools.

At the same time, a new law requires Florida school districts to adopt rules regarding cell phones and pagers.

Seminole County already has conducted codes about wireless communications. School officials said they would revise any part required by the new law that takes effect July 1.

"We are taking a look at the language of the law," said Raymond Gaines, executive director of secondary education/high schools. He said the district has allowed cell phones for two years.

The School Board also wants to talk with the student council members to see what can be done about curbing cell phone abuses.

"When we allowed cell phones on campuses, I was very hesitant," Board Chairman Sandra Robinson said. She led a discussion on cell phone misuse at the June 8 board meeting.

Cheating is the main concern, board members said. The phones can transmit text messages with test answers or even photos of tests.

The main reason usually given for allowing cell phones is safety, especially in the wake of Sept. 11 and school shootings.

"My concern is that a lot of school boards are making knee-jerk reactions under pressure that is actually driven by parental and student convenience," said Kenneth Trump, president of the National School Safety and Security Services, based in Cleveland, Ohio.

"School administrators and boards are giving in because they don't want to take on that battle," Trump said.

Trump said cell phones actually reduce safety.

Population growth continues in Sanford

About 9,600 more people call one of Seminole County's seven cities home according to annual population estimates released by the U.S. Census Bureau last week.

Five cities — Lake Mary, Oviedo, Casselberry, Sanford and Winter Springs — posted positive gains while Altamonte Springs and Longwood combined for a total loss of 329 residents from 2000 to 2003.

The estimates are based on Census 2000 population counts — updated using administrative records. Sanford City Manager Al Grieshaber said positive population figures each year can be helpful when applying for government grants and are equally important in mapping the future of the city.

"We will see where our areas of growth are and we will want to make sure our infrastructure is adequate and as we develop our plan to grow the city that we are moving in the right direction," he said.

According to U.S. Census figures, Sanford made the greatest leap in population from 2000 to 2003 with 5,265 more residents. While Sanford grew by only an estimated 36 residents from 2002 to 2003, it widens the gap between the largest city in Seminole County and the second largest, Altamonte Springs.

Sanford took the title of largest municipality in the county between 2001 and 2002, when its population

Freedom School bridges summer reading gap

SANFORD — The home rooms sound like a cheerleading camp: "G.O.O.D. J.O.B. — Good Job (clap, clap) Good Job (clap, clap)."

That's what students at the Freedom School do when one of their classmates performs well. It's one of many chants, slogans and rules of Central Florida's newest summer program, this one aimed at inspiring a love of reading in order to "Leave No Child Behind," the national slogan of the school's umbrella, the Children's Defense Fund.

Central Florida Freedom School opened last week at the Betty Smith Cultural Arts Center in Sanford, serving 50 students ages 6-15. Freedom Schools, an eight-week program, is a national partnership between the Children's Defense Fund Black Community Crusade for Children and local community organizations.

There are only two in Florida,

Gifford (near Vero Beach) and Sanford.

Central Florida Freedom School, directed by Sanford native Dr. Gail Choice, former assistant principal at Midway Elementary and current professor at the University of Florida in Gainesville, is a partnership with Free to Be Me, Inc.; Goldsboro Front Porch; Goldsboro A.L.I.V.E. and Universal Needs Alliance and other community sponsors.

With all the hoopla of schools rising and falling in student improvement, Freedom School is providing a solid solution for keeping students moving forward.

"One of the problems we find is that students lose three months from their reading level during the summer," said Dorothea Fogle, coordinator for the Central Florida Freedom School. "Our answer to the problem is the Freedom School, where students read on a daily basis and must complete certain projects, including producing a

school newspaper.

"Studies suggest that children who read as few as six books over the summer maintain the level of reading skills they

achieved during the preceding school year," Fogle said. "Reading more books leads to

Orlando Sanford International Airport reports a record month for total passenger traffic in April

Total passenger traffic at the Orlando Sanford International Airport for April 2004 was 157,191, up 106 percent compared to April of 2003. It represents a new record for the month of April at the airport, breaking the previous record of 95,968 set in April 2002. The traffic mix for April 2004 was 81,155 domestic travelers, up 186 percent, and 76,036 international, up 59 percent. Cargo volume and aircraft operations were both up 12 percent.

Year-to-date figures show an increase of 133 percent in total passenger traffic with increases of 193 percent for domestic and 78 percent for international. Larry Dale, president of the Sanford Airport Authority commented, "These first four months of 2004 are the most successful in the history of the airport with over 439,000 passengers. As we head into our traditionally busy summer season we are well on our way to having a record year."

Suspect arrested in Altamonte Springs double murder case

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office has arrested 24-year-old Clemente Javier Aguirre (a.k.a. Clemente Javier Aguirre Jarquin) as a suspect in an Altamonte Springs area double murder.

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office had Aguirre in custody last week as a person "of significant interest" relating to the deaths of two Altamonte Springs area women found dead in their manufactured home last Thursday.

The women were discovered dead in their home at 121 Vagabond Way. The area, located off State Road 434, was formerly known as Mobile Manor.

The women were identified as Carol Bareis, 68, and her daughter, Cheryl Williams, 47. The mother was reportedly confined to a wheelchair.

A family friend discovered the bodies early Thursday morning and notified the authorities who were required to obtain a search warrant before entering the home Thursday afternoon.

During their investigation, deputies obtained information which led them to question Aguirre, who lives next door to the victims, at 117 Vagabond Way.

He allegedly admitted to being at the crime scene after the deaths, but prior to the discovery and notification of law enforcement officers.

even greater success. The integrated reading experiences and activities of Freedom School bridge the summer reading gap and provide extra development of children's critical thinking, leadership and conflict resolution.

Freedom School students sign a commitment to read a certain amount of books, maintain proper behavior and work toward self-improvement. Most of the activities are fun-oriented, with students dabbling in arts and crafts, swimming, recreation, music and writing.

"By introducing the students to a wide variety of books that reflect different culture and experiences it will help them develop a love of reading," said teacher-mentor Cynthia Oliver. "We want them to pick up a book on their own and read it."

In addition, students take field trips to such places as the Central Florida Zoo, Sanford RiverWalk, Tajiri Arts, Winter Park and the Sanford Museum.

The program also has a parent component directed by Sanford City Commissioner and

30-year educator, Dr. Velma Williams.

"We understand the vital importance of parents in supporting their children's education, therefore, we host weekly parent workshops and solicit active parent participation in the project," Williams said.

In addition to instructors with degrees in education, the Freedom School is managed by a group of college-age "servant leaders," who attended Freedom Schools' national training at Alex Haley's farm in Tennessee.

The servant leaders are Oktavia Black, Chris Newman, Tenesha Wells, Carron White, Courtney Newman and Cy Wynn.

The cost of the program is a one-time fee of \$25, and students are required to make a commitment to attend daily from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. The program ends July 23. The Bettye Smith Cultural Arts Center is located at 119 W. Fifth St. (between Oak and Park avenues).

boomed by 3,112 residents. Population estimates in Altamonte Springs have remained stagnant, as the city has recorded a .6 percent decline from 2000 to 2003. Sanford officials expect estimates for next year will reflect even more growth when two new large subdivisions on Celery Avenue begin attracting more residents to the city.

While Sanford's growth registers a 14 percent increase it was not the highest in Seminole County. The honor of largest percentage jump in population was reserved for Seminole County's smallest city, Lake Mary.

Since 2000, Lake Mary has boosted its population by 16 percent for an estimated total

of 13,260 people. But Lake Mary may be relinquishing its title of smallest city in Seminole County if population trends continue.

Longwood has averaged a decrease of about 24 residents each year since 2000. With the current estimates Lake Mary sits only 414 residents behind Longwood as the smallest city. While Lake Mary continues some residential growth, Longwood is nearly built out. According to Longwood City Administrator John Drago the recently released population estimates of declining population in the city are not alarming to Longwood officials.

"We're probably too small where the impact would be too great," he said.

close 1st Street to vehicular traffic during construction. Earlier plans called for shutting portions of the street in phases.

That change is crucial to downtown business owners, as is the projected completion date of the work. The contract calls for "substantial completion" by Dec. 31. That date may change depending on when the work begins. Merchants have told the CRA and city officials that January to May is their busiest retail season.

"We need four months to do the hard work in the road," said Al Grieshaber, city manager. "Depending on when we get the notice to proceed, it will be four months from that date."

City Commissioner Art Woodruff asked the probability of 1st Street opening by Dec. 31.

"It depends on several things," said CRA Chairman Bob Parsell. "That's what we want and that's what's in the contract. But you know, there are some factors out there that are trying to sidetrack that. It depends on what occurs."

The biggest factor is a July 19 hearing before the St. Johns River

Water Management District. St. Johns' officials must issue a stormwater drainage permit before work can proceed. That process has been delayed because Carey Farrell, a downtown business owner, has filed a lawsuit claiming the stormwater improvements are unnecessary.

Farrell has been an outspoken opponent of the 1st Street renovations, claiming businesses will be hurt with the realignment of parking spaces and that the city is needlessly replacing stormwater pipes. Farrell even began a newsletter in which he castigated city officials for their actions in pursuing the renovations.

Parsell, who was nicknamed "Bob the Bulldozer" in Farrell's newsletters, has long taken issue with Farrell's claims and said many new business owners located in downtown Sanford because of the city's plans to renovate 1st Street.

"That's what probably upsets me more than anything else about this whole deal," Parsell said. "We got people investing in Sanford and because some folks

don't like something about (the plan) or don't want things to change they're going to jeopardize these (new businesses)."

Charles Rowe, a member of the CRA board, said he believes Farrell's lawsuit will proceed "at his peril."

"Theoretically, if the city prevails and we receive the permit, I assume there might be some damages that could be pursued by not just the city but maybe some of the other commercial entities on the street," Rowe said.

Ted Cranias, owner of the building that houses Angelo's Pizza and the Tin Lizzy, has been active in filing petitions with St. Johns opposing Farrell's lawsuit and has indicated he would pursue legal action if Farrell's lawsuit further delays 1st Street improvements. St. Johns has granted Cranias intervener status as an independent third party opposing Farrell's claims. Other property owners along 1st Street have privately said they are exploring their legal options, as well.

"I think everybody should be afforded their right to due

process," Rowe said. "At some point you have to decide 'I made the good fight and I lost.' I think we have tried to address any concerns that might have come up, and I think all of the concerns have been addressed."

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Having freedom of speech, freedom of religion, freedom from tyranny is freedom indeed! Our forefathers strongly believed that "the truth shall make you free!" America's early freedom was born when the Pilgrims in 1620 stepped onto the new land seeking freedom and hope.

Over a 150 years later, this hope continued to materialize when the delegates from Virginia submitted a proposal to the Continental Congress to "declare the Colonies free and independent States, absolved from allegiance to or dependence upon the Crown." From this, five men wrote a historic document which was completed and accepted on July 2, 1776.

After two days (July 4th), the Declaration of Independence was formally adopted by the Continental Congress. This was the beginning of "Let Freedom Ring" in America some 228 years ago.

Freedom and hope continued but not without great struggle and war between the Colonies and the mother country, Britain. Amid the war, when Independence seemed to hang in the balances by only a thin thread, General George

Washington fell to his knees in the snow at Valley Forge and called upon God for help. By Divine intervention, Washington led his discouraged, exhausted and tattered army to victory.

Following the war years, the signing of the Constitution of the United States climaxed a four-month debate. During this debate the Constitutional Convention saw tempers flare and former agreements disappear. At one point on June 2, 1787, Benjamin Franklin rose to his feet and spoke these words: "How has it happened, Sir, that we have not hitherto once thought of humbly applying to the Father of Lights to illuminate our understandings? We have been assured, Sir, in the sacred writing that 'except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it.' I firmly believe this, I therefore beg leave to move that henceforth prayers, imploring the assistance of heaven and its blessing on our deliberations, be held in this assembly every morning before we proceed to

business."

Reliance on prayer helped bring forth the Constitution which we now hold so dear.

Freedom defines history, heritage

Fifty-six American leaders made this history possible by pledging their "lives, fortunes, and their sacred honor." This was no easy pledge as nine of the Signers died of wounds of hardships during the Revolutionary War.

Five of these were captured, brutally treated and imprisoned. Twelve of their homes were burned to the ground and another seventeen lost everything they owned. All fifty-six were labeled traitors. Many were offered immunity if they would recant their pledges.

However, not one Signer defected or changed his stand, and their honor for freedom was sustained.

Freedom rings forth from songs

During the night of September 13, 1814, Francis Scott Key, a noted Washington, D.C., lawyer, and Dr. William Beanes, George Washington's physician who had been held in the harbor by the British but released to Key that day, awaited in a small boat to return to land.

The British in an attempt to

take Baltimore planned to bomb Fort McHenry that night and detained Key's boat not wanting Key or Beanes to warn the American army. All night Key waited anxiously — walked the deck in anguish — wondering which flag would be flying over the fort at dawn.

Dawn came. The gun fire died down; but because of the haze and smoke, they could not discover the outcome. Then suddenly a rift in the mist came at seven o'clock. Key looked, and over the fort there was Old Glory tattered but still flying. Key, overcome with emotion, immediately penned the words to a poem on the back of an unfinished letter. He called the poem "The Defense of Fort McHenry."

The next day he shared it with a friend who took it immediately to a printer. An hour after the poem was printed, it was read all over Baltimore. These words became associated with the tune "To Anacreon in Heaven." By an act of Congress on March 3, 1931, this poem — "The Star Spangled Banner" — became our national anthem.

Freedom comes from our God

Abraham Lincoln's creed exemplifies this truth:

"I believe that the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom and that it is the duty of nations as well as of men to rec-

ognize the sublime truth, announced in the Holy Scriptures and proved by all history. I recognize that those nations are blessed whose God is the Lord.

"I believe the will of God prevails; without Him I cannot succeed; with His assistance I cannot fail. I believe I am a humble instrument in the hands of our Heavenly Father; I desire that all my works and acts may be according to His will; and that it may be so, I give thanks to the Almighty and seek His aid."

Recently, in an address to the American people, President Bush summed up the significance behind our tireless fight and the source of our liberties by stating, "...freedom is not this country's gift to the world; freedom is the Almighty's gift to every man and woman in this world."

Psalm 85:1 reads: "Lord, thou hast been favorable unto thy land." And, we read in Deuteronomy 4:7, "What nation is there so great, who hath God so nigh unto them, as the Lord our God is in all things that we call upon him for?"

Think about that!

the Orlando Sanford International Airport. Visitors were allowed to tour a hanger where a PV-1 Ventura aircraft is being refitted. The aircraft will eventually join the RA-5C Vigilante now on a mounted display at the entrance to the airport. Both the Vigilante and Ventura were among craft used in training at the base during the '50s and '60s.

The PV-1, obtained approximately a year ago, is said to be the only one left in the United States and was among the first planes used at the Sanford Training Command in May of 1943.

Some of the participants drove through the streets of the airport but were often dismayed at the fact that most of their Naval-days buildings are now demolished. The main hangar and support buildings are gone. The few remnants included smaller buildings and at least one former

barracks.

There is presently no specific time being considered for the addition of the PV-1 to the 4.5-acre park located at the Lake Mary Boulevard entrance to the base.

However, according to Patty Mahany, who is handling fund raising for the restoration, there is now plans underway to obtain a third aircraft for the park, an A3-D Skywarrior (also known as a Whale). "If we get that aircraft from the National Museum of Naval Aircraft in Pensacola," she said, "It is in such good shape that it will actually be flown in to Sanford."

Again, there has been no indication of when (or if) the third aircraft may be obtained. "But we're really planning on it," Mahany said. She added that while the announcement of the third aircraft was not made public during the reunion, "Most people know about it anyway."

In an emergency, schools may want students to congregate off campus where they can meet parents. If children are calling mom and dad, parents may inhibit police or fire rescue as they rush to the school, Trump suggested.

"Students need to pay attention to directions rather than playing crisis manager," he said. "There is a big difference between feeling safer and actually being safer."

Jeanne Swaynos, a math teacher at Seminole High School in Sanford, said the district should keep cell phones in the schools.

"What are we supposed to do, get rid of everything?" Swaynos asked. She wondered whether palm pilots will be next?

The problem is enforcing the rule, she said.

"If you see the phone, you take it and give it to an administrator," she said. It is just like anything else, she explained, including CD players. The technology is here.

"School is supposed to be a microcosm of society," she said. "Part of our job is to teach the students how to deal with these situations."

Even if they are banned young people will still have them, she said.

"Kids are going to test you," said Swaynos, who has taught at Seminole for 14 years. Students have to make

decisions about them, just like they do with what clothes to wear.

One Seminole County principal said theft of phones is a big problem.

Students leave a book bag around and everyone knows there is a cell phone in it, said Shaune Storch, principal of Lake Howell High School in Winter Park.

She said most students abide by the rules governing cell phone use.

"They are not to be seen or heard until the students walk off campus," she said. "The vast majority of our students are outstanding, mature young people." Cell phones are just another level of discipline, she added.

Seminole County schools have not had an awful lot of abuses with cell phones, Gaines said.

Some students have been creative in trying to misuse them, he said, but he added he would not describe any abuse as widespread.

"We have not had incidences where we have caught someone cheating that I am aware of," Gaines said.

Policing cell phone use is no different than any other discipline, he said. It is something else the school has to deal with.

School Board member Diane Bauer said the district asks a great deal of its teach-

ers. "(Cell phones) are being used between classes up and down the stairs," she said. She recalled being anxious in approving cell phone use two years ago.

She also said that, at the time, the Board said if the phones are abused, the issue would be revisited.

Gaines said almost anything in a school environment can be abused.

"There are abuses of phones on every campus," he said, just like every campus deals with gum chewing or other problems. Cell phone misuse is not something abnormal, he said, nor is it uncommon.

The Student Conduct and Discipline Code for the coming school year is expected to be approved at the next School Board meeting July 20. It has been advertised and public opinion sought.

No one spoke June 22 during time for public discussion on changes to the conduct code.

One code change states that school officials will try to contact parents if their child is arrested. Gaines said it has happened where students were arrested at school and the police said they would notify the parents, but did not.

"We just wanted to spell that out," Gaines said. "We will pretty much demand that the school contact parents if

their child has been arrested."

The new code also bans wearing bandannas at school. Gaines said any kind of head gear had already been banned, but any time an item can be named specifically, the board tries to do that.

Bandannas have been worn to school by gang members, he said, but that is not the sole reason for the ban.

Students who are suspended can make up missed school work, but the new code states that the days count as unexcused absences. That can affect eligibility to pass a course, Gaines said.

Nothing in the new code will change for now about cell phones. The code says misuse of the phones can result in anything from confiscation to out-of-school suspension.

The code defines cell phone misuse as use during the instructional day or on buses.

Gov. Jeb Bush signed the new law June 10. The code of student conduct, it says, must state that the use of pagers and cell phones may result in disciplinary action by the school or criminal penalties if used in a criminal act during school.

Trump said some of the nation's schools have experienced students taking unwanted photos with cell phones in locker rooms.

Like Seminole County, many school districts that

allow cell phones are revisiting their decision, Trump said. The majority of districts are still not allowing the phones, he said.

The normal disruptions that schools see when they allow cell phone use should be

enough in itself to ban them, Trump said.

"We have to look at the crisis and safety argument that's often used as an emotional trigger to allow cell phones to be used," he urged.

Road warrior

One Gordon dominates while the other falters

The tale of two Gordons Sunday at Infineon Raceway played out in totally opposite directions. Perfect Sunday drive vs. an endless nightmare.

Jeff Gordon won the Dodge/Save Mart 350 with a ride so seemingly effortless he could afford to cut off his engine and coast downhill to conserve fuel in the closing laps.

Robby Gordon, Jeff's main adversary on road courses, finished 34th, 10 laps down, on a day the wheels literally came off for his team. Tires flew off his No. 31 Chevrolet on three occasions.

And so Robby Gordon, who won both road course races last year, goes back to the drawing board while taking some of the credit for the other Gordon's performance. "When we won both races, it woke Jeff Gordon up," Robby Gordon said. "And they ran an awesome race and controlled the whole weekend. Back to work we go."

Not that Gordon's No. 24 team had been sleeping. Sunday's win wrapped up a fine weekend in wine country for the No. 24 team. Jeff Gordon won the pole and had the fastest car in three practice sessions. He led a record 92 of 110 laps and won for the fourth time here and the third time from the pole.

He is NASCAR's all-time king of the road courses with eight career victories.

Jamie McMurray finished second in the No. 42 Dodge while road-course specialist Scott Pruett was third in the No. 39 Dodge, both Chip Ganassi cars. But neither could seriously threaten the No. 24.

Jeff Gordon's major worry Sunday was saving enough fuel to get to the finish line. Crew Chief Robbie Loomis kept preaching conserve, conserve.

"I guess I learned from my teammate [Jimmie Johnson] a little bit," Jeff Gordon said. "I was shutting the engine off, rolling down the hill under caution. I was putting it in fourth gear when I needed to and then I was short-shifting under green."

Infineon's hilly course is good for that sort of thing.

"You can do it here, it's hilly for a long ways," Gordon said. "From Turn 7 all the way to Turn 10, I just coasted. You're desperate." He didn't even waste any fuel restarting the car. "You don't have to turn it over, you put it in gear and let out the clutch."

Gordon's only other concern was wearing down during the nearly three-hour race under very warm conditions.

"We are tested by many things with every race win, and today I was challenged for my physical fitness because that car was extremely hot," Gordon said. "We've been running a carbon fiber seat. The venting and the way we cool the seat was just amazing. I've felt fresher after races this year than I've felt in any race."

"Unfortunately, we didn't have the seat in the car today. It won't fit. It will be in the car by Watkins Glen. I guarantee it."

When you make a mistake, a snowball effect happens and we never saw daylight again."

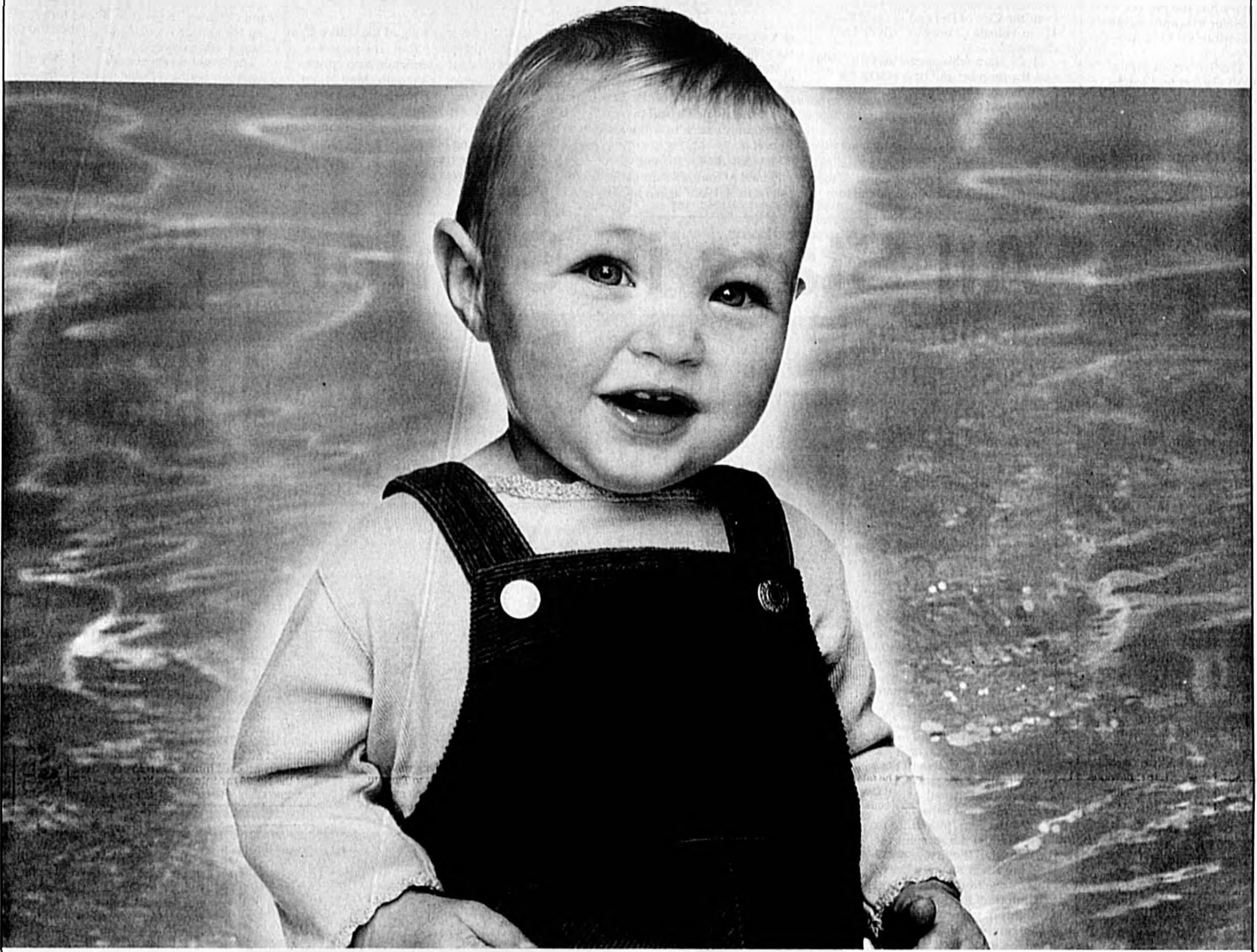

"Clyde Hart Highway" to be dedicated

A ceremony will be held this evening (Thursday) at 6:30 p.m. at New Smyrna Speedway designating State Road 44 from the City of DeLand to State Road 415 in Volusia County as "Clyde Hart Highway."

Clyde Hart, who passed away in 1999, was the founder and operator of the New Smyrna Speedway, located at the intersection of SR 44 and SR 415.

The honorary designation was approved by the 2004 Florida Legislature, and signed into law by Governor Bush in May. Florida Senator Bill Posey was the prime sponsor of the designation, and will be in attendance

A portion of State Road 44 will change in Thursday ceremony

at a ceremony unveiling the designation signing.

The ceremony will be along west-bound SR 44 just west of the SR 415 intersection, in front of the New Smyrna Speedway, which is still owned by the Hart family and is now operated by son Robert.

State Road 44 is currently being widened to four lanes from SR 415 to Interstate 4. Work began in November,

2002 on the widening of four miles from SR 415 to Pioneer Trail. The project is scheduled for completion next spring.

Work began last month (May 24) on the widening of 7.3 miles from Pioneer Trail to one mile west of Interstate 4. That project is scheduled for completion in the spring of 2006.

Widening from I-95 to Pioneer Trail (5.1 miles) was completed in December, 2000.

Clyde Hart purchased the land for the New Smyrna Speedway in 1966. It originally featured a dirt track, which Hart had paved in the early 70's. He subsequently purchased Orlando SpeedWorld and Orlando Dragway in Bithlo, forming the Florida Association of Stock Car Auto Racing (FASCAR).

The World Series of Asphalt Stock Car Racing is held over nine nights each February at New Smyrna Speedway.

The ceremony will be part of the fourth annual Clyde Hart Memorial Sunbelt 125 at New Smyrna Speedway, which is held every year before the Pepsi 400 and is one of the most prestigious racing events in the state. See Racing, Page 11A

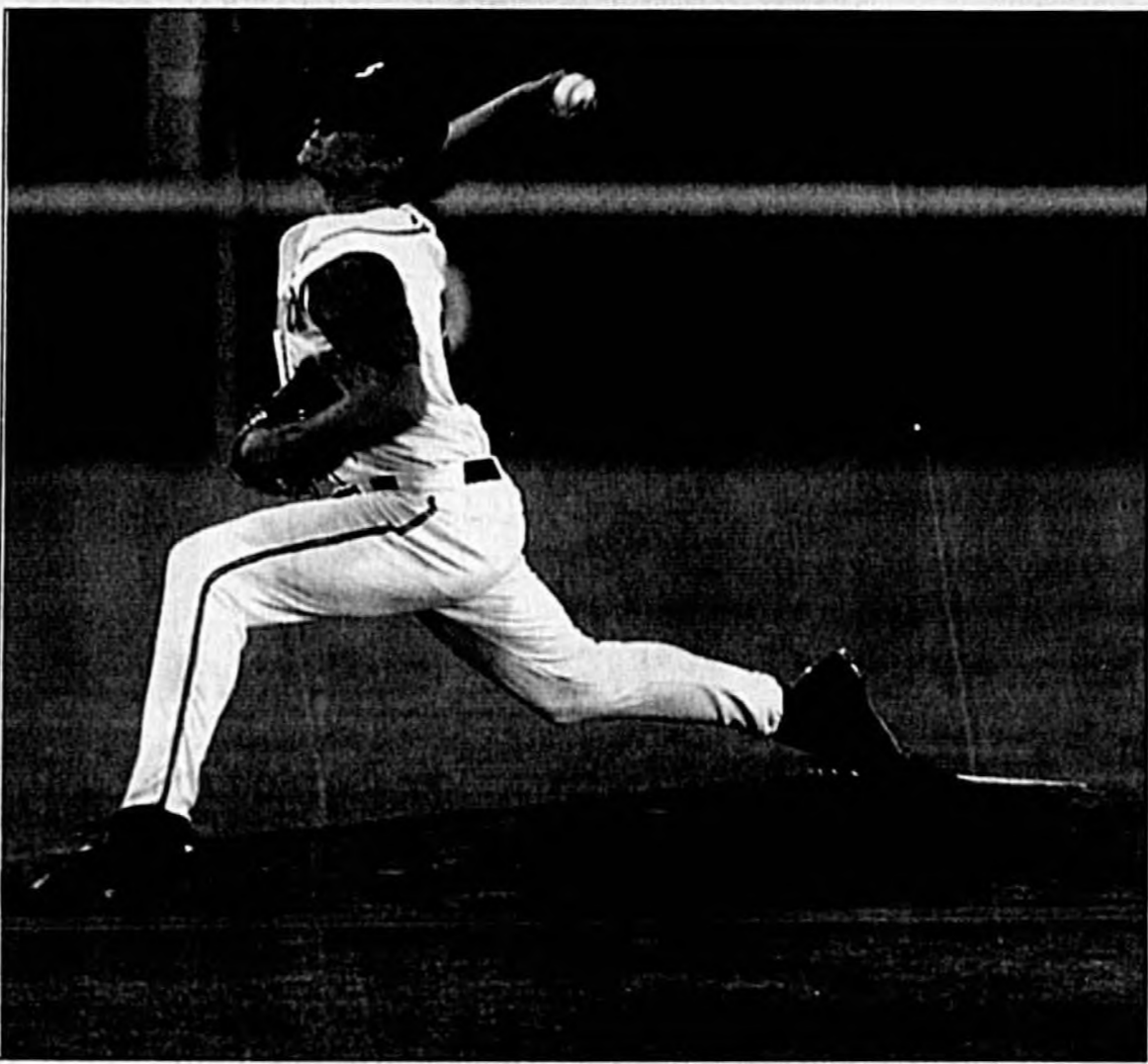
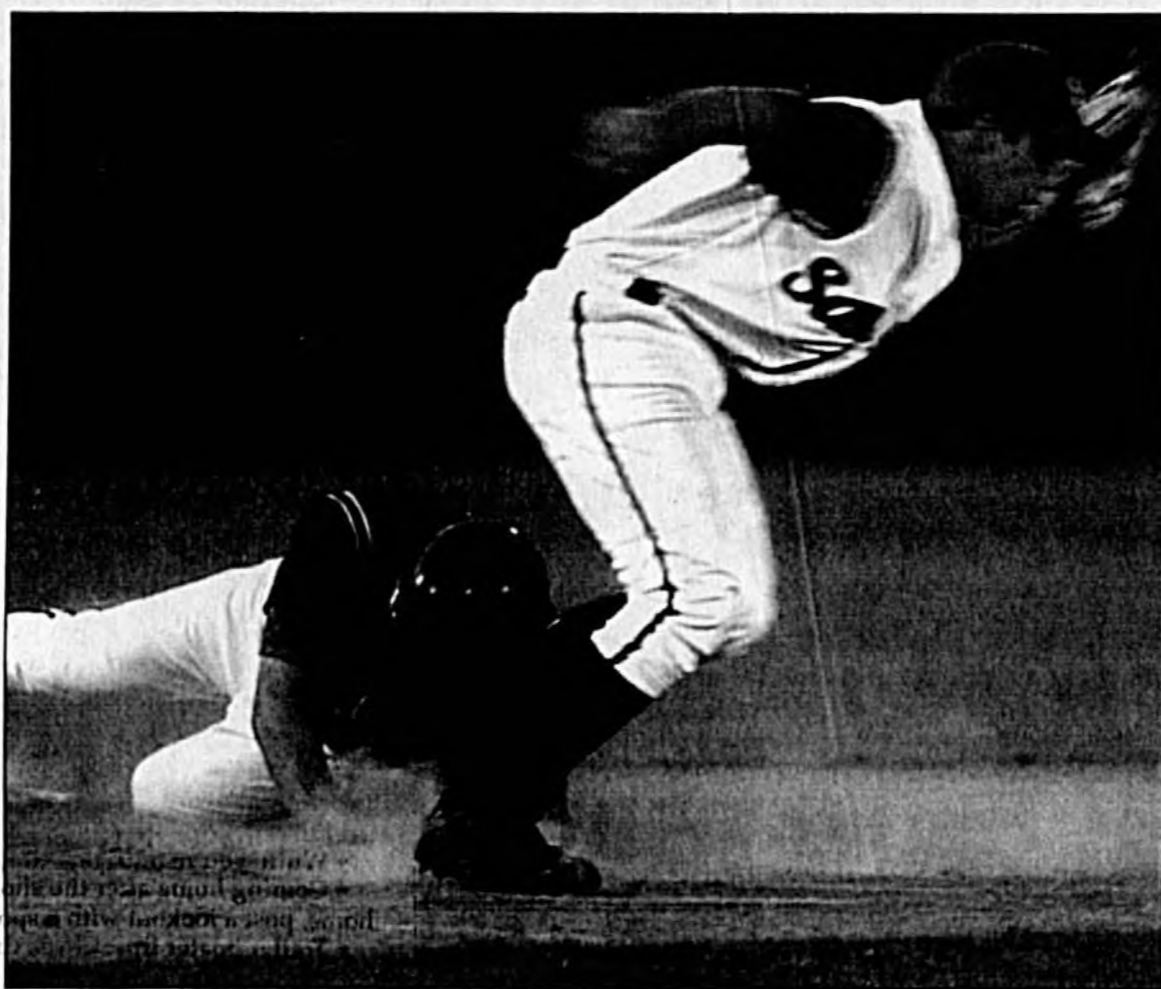

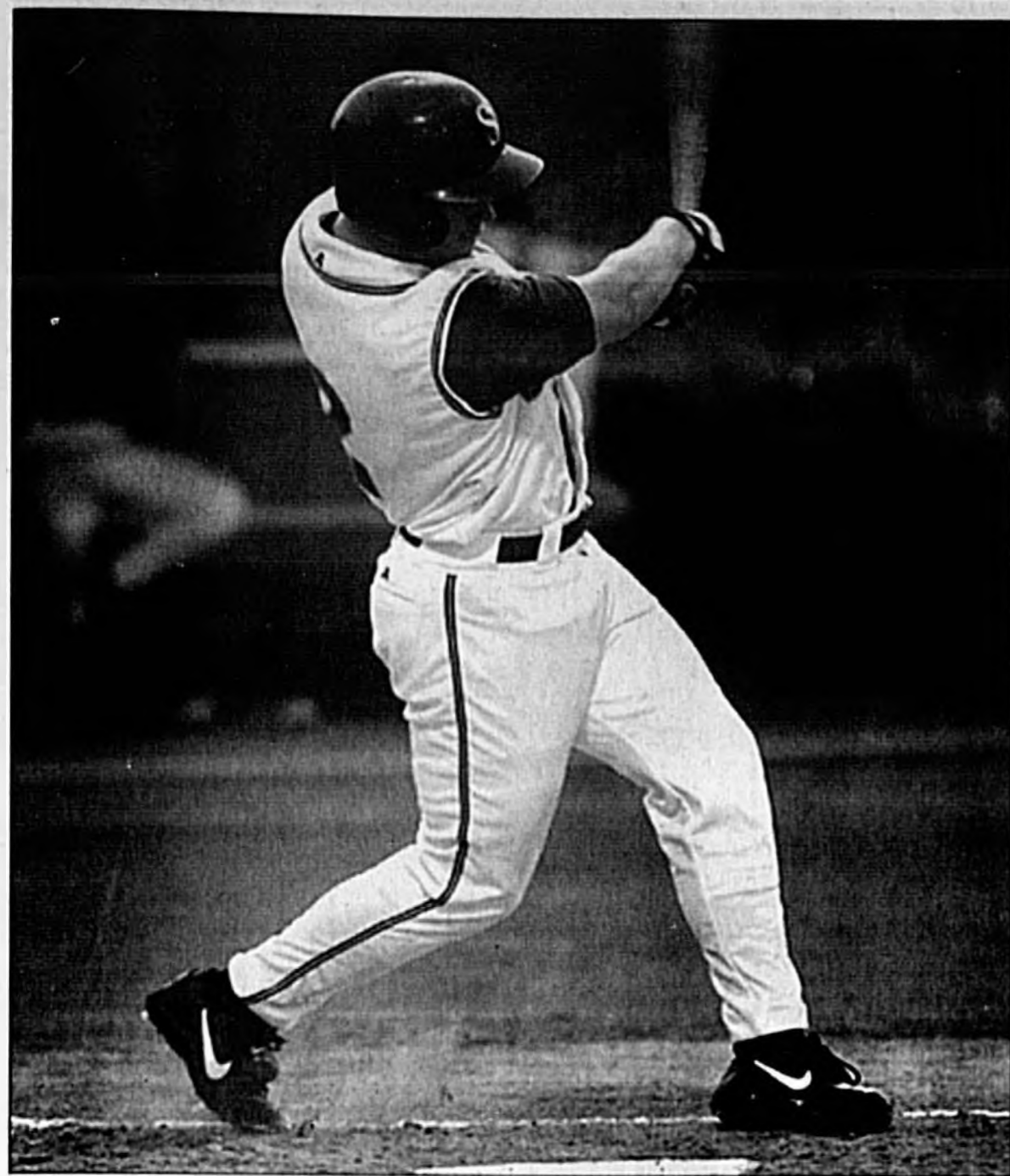
"Fireworks displays bring a lot of boaters closely together at a dangerous time - at night," said Ruth Wood, president of the Boat.U.S. Foundation for Boating Safety and Clean Water. "Most accidents occur as the big show ends and everyone weighs anchor to return home. With many boats hidden in the water and fixed objects in the darkness, keeping extra lookouts is wise move. Consideration, caution and patience will get you safely through this traffic jam."

Wood also says staying sober could save your life. "Boating stress factors such as fatigue, and long exposure to the sun will increase alcohol's effect on the body, so if you want to have a drink, wait until you and your crew are safely back at the dock. And the best way to ensure everyone comes home is to wear life jackets - especially at night. Accidents happen very quickly - it's often too late to put one on after a mishap," she said.

Jerry Cardarelli, vice president of towing services for Boat.U.S. said, "We forecast that nearly 6,000 boaters will need some type of non-emergency help over the holiday period. Our 24-hour TowBoat.U.S. and Pacific Vessel Assist on-the-water assistance call centers will experience the highest call volume of the year on Sunday as everyone takes in the fireworks displays. Monday's waterway traffic will also be high as many boaters return to home port after a weekend of fun," he said.

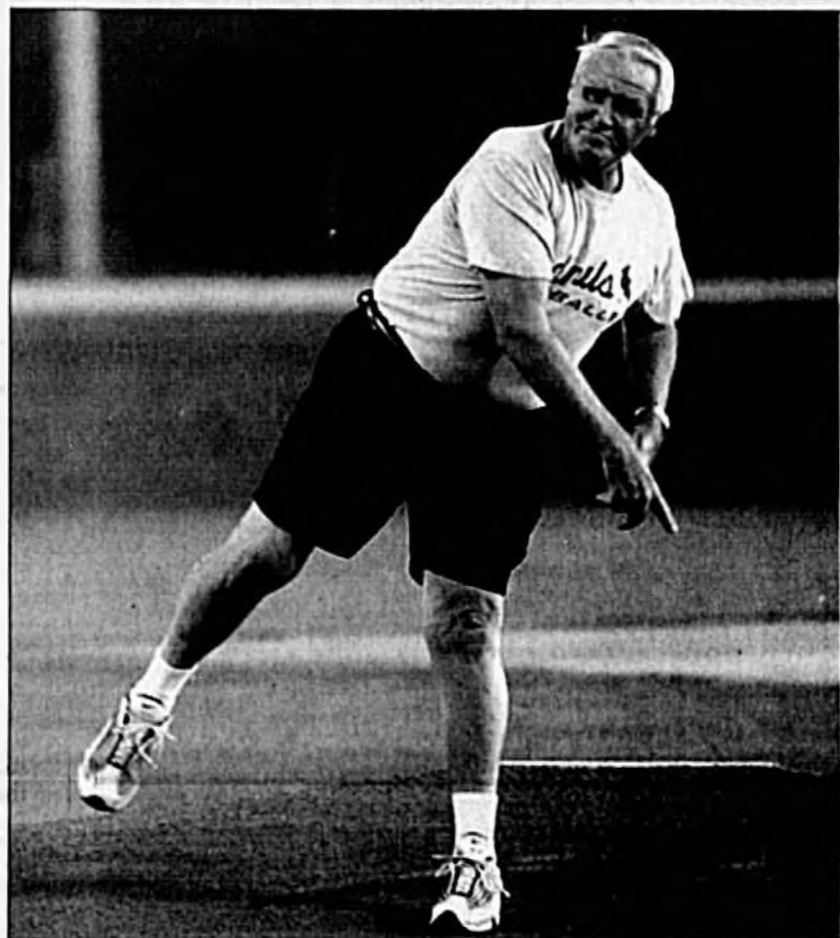

lights operate, fuel is topped off and battery loads are monitored, as running accessories can leave them too weak to start engines. "Keep an eye on your electrical usage when anchored," adds Cardarelli, "Lots of folks will go out early and raft up all day long waiting for fireworks running fans, sound systems or other appliances. You don't want to become part of the 'morning after' crowd who end up inadvertently over-nighting on the hook with a dead battery."

For trailer boaters, the surge in 24-hour call center volume for BoatU.S. trailering roadside assistance is expected to be on Thursday, July 1 as trailers head down the highway to their vacation spot. "The two biggest causes for trailering breakdowns are damaged tires and bearings," said Beth McCann, executive director of the BoatU.S. Trailering Club.

"We highly recommend that before you depart on Thursday that your tires are serviceable and at the correct pressure. It can also help if you have a complete spare tire - inflated on the rim - available," she said.

For some trailer boaters, the July 4th holiday is the only time that they will use their trailers the entire year, says McCann. "Under-used trailers are often under-maintained. Trailers that sit for long periods have the highest incidence of bearing failure, so ensure that this preventative maintenance item is taken care of before you go." And McCann also advises making to stop along the way periodically to check your rig.

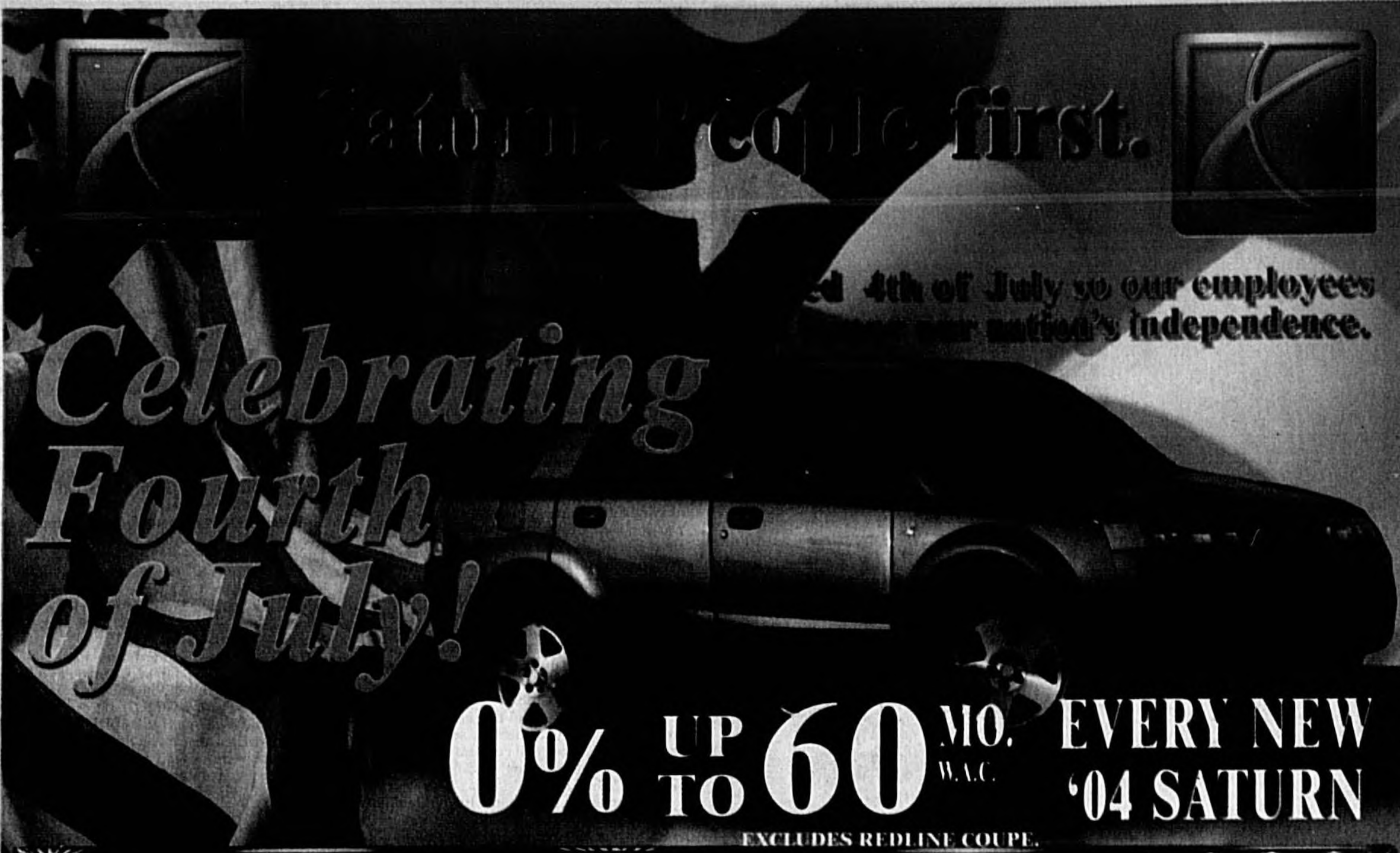

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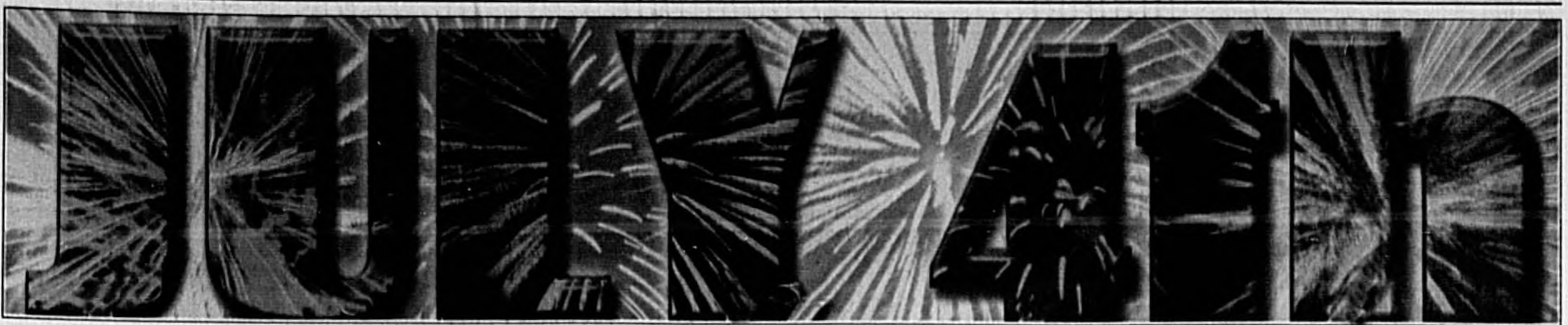
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Sanford Independence Day events the biggest ever

SANFORD — In the city's first attempt to produce a Fourth of July event, organizers are expecting the largest crowd ever.

Sanford has had numerous Independence Day celebrations before, but according to Lisa Jones, Sanford recreation department manager, this is the first year the city has taken over sole production of the event.

The largest one-day event the city has coordinated to date was two months ago when more than 60,000 visitors crowded the lakefront to view the city's grand opening of its 1.2-mile RiverWalk.

Jones said more than 90,000 visitors are expected for the Fourth of July festivities, and with a range of activities no one should be disappointed.

"This will show (visitors) what our assets are and what are potential is, and it will show

them that we are a destination city for their consideration," said City Manager Al Grieshaber.

In addition to the Zambelli produced fireworks display that includes more than 2,000 shells, the event features live entertainment, four food courts and a children's activities zone.

"We have obviously tried to increase activities and the show in general this year," she said. "We have three bands and a 26-minute fireworks display we

think will be awesome."

Band performances at Fort Mellon Park by Cactus Jack and the Cadillacs, Redeye Express, and The RedCoats will begin at 5 p.m. and continue until 10:15 p.m. with the fireworks display beginning at 9:15 p.m.

The All-American Kids Zone is free to children ages 13 and under and includes a moonwalk, face painters, balloon artists, a bungee run, an obstacle course and more. It will be located at the east end of Fort Mellon

Park.

Parking will be available on First Street, an adjacent lot on Sanford Avenue and at City Hall on Park Avenue. The city has also contracted with eight buses to transport visitors from the Seminole Towne Center mall to City Hall. The shuttles will begin at 3 p.m. and will run every 20 minutes.

Visitors are encouraged to use the service by parking at the southwest corner of the Burdines parking lot. Buses will

continue return routes from 9:45 to 11:30 p.m.

"We're excited about having the transport buses. I think that will eliminate a lot of headaches for people who want to come and enjoy our show, but are concerned about parking," Jones said.

Organizers say Sanford's celebration has grown into a truly spectacular event with a Zambelli Fireworks presenta-

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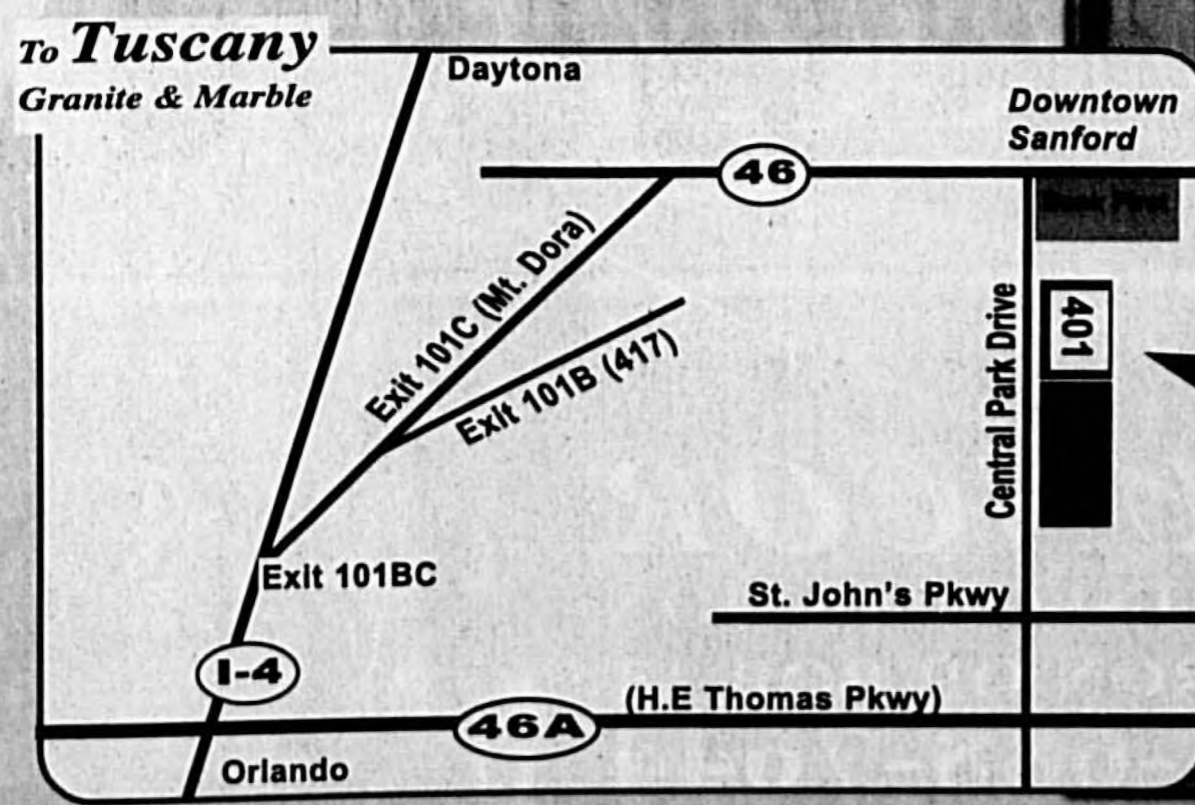
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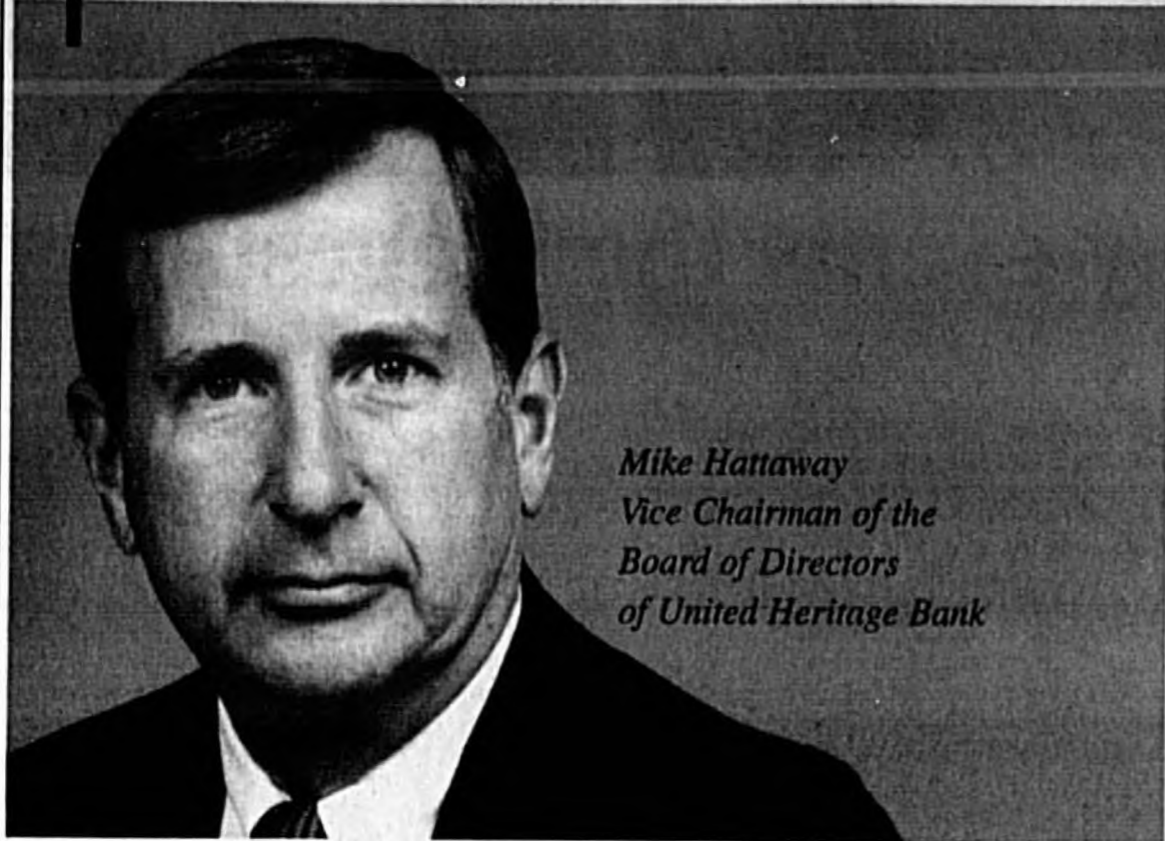
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State fire marshal warns against illegal fireworks

This weekend, Floridians will gather in backyards and at beaches to celebrate this great nation and the freedoms we enjoy as citizens.

Unfortunately, some celebrations will be disrupted by injuries, some serious and some even life threatening, because many Floridians will choose to use illegal fireworks, says Tom Gallagher, Florida's Chief Financial Officer and State Fire Marshal. Every year, thousands of Americans are killed or critically injured by fireworks, and a disproportionate number of those injuries are to children.

Fireworks are illegal in Florida. If it launches or explodes, it is off limits. Illegal fireworks include shells and mortars, multiple tube devices, Roman candles, rockets and firecrackers. Signing a waiver will not clear you of responsibility under the law, and using fireworks illegally is a first-degree misdemeanor punishable by up to one year in jail and a \$1,000 fine. Only individuals who have

a permit from their local government can use fireworks legally, and only for certain exempted purposes. Sparklers, however, are legal for anyone to use, and a list of hundreds approved for use in Florida can be found on the State Fire Marshal's Web page at www.fldfs.com/sfm.

Local law enforcement agencies are responsible for enforcement of the state's fireworks and sparkler laws, and the State Fire Marshal's Office has prepared a Law Enforcement and Inspections Guide to Fireworks and Sparkler Enforcement to help them carry out their responsibilities. The guide is free and also available on the State Fire Marshal's Web page.

By passing county or municipal ordinances, some local governments have effectively closed "loopholes" that have allowed the illegal sale of fireworks. Consumers must keep in mind that just because they can buy illegal fireworks does not mean they can use them without concern for the law. Gallagher says he

applauds those communities who have taken steps to re-enforce the law.

Even when using legal sparklers there is still a risk of injury. When lit, some sparklers can reach temperatures between 1,300 and 1,800 degrees, which is at least 200 degrees hotter than a standard butane lighter.

Follow these precautions:

- Use sparklers and other legal novelties on a flat, hard surface. Do not light them on grass.

- Use sparklers in an open area. Keep children and pets at least 30 feet away from all ignited sparklers.

- Light only one item at a time and never attempt to re-light a "dud."

- Don't use any unwrapped items or items that may have been tampered with.

- Keep a fire extinguisher or water hose on-hand for emergencies. It's a good idea to drop used sparklers in a bucket of water.

Also, remember to test the batteries in your smoke detectors.

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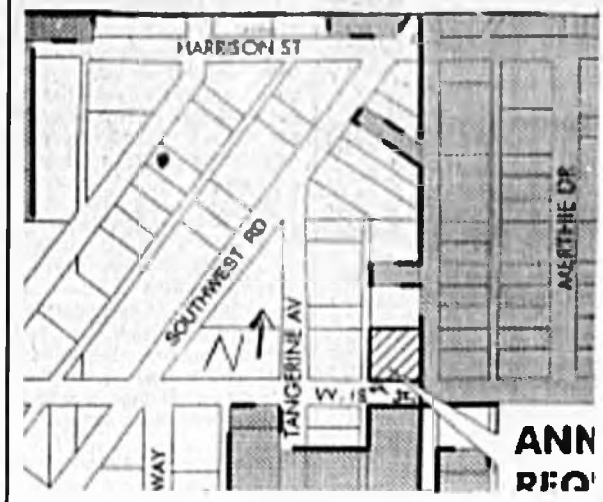

tion nearly twice as long as any other in our area. The show will feature a variety of music broadcasted live on Big-100 Radio.

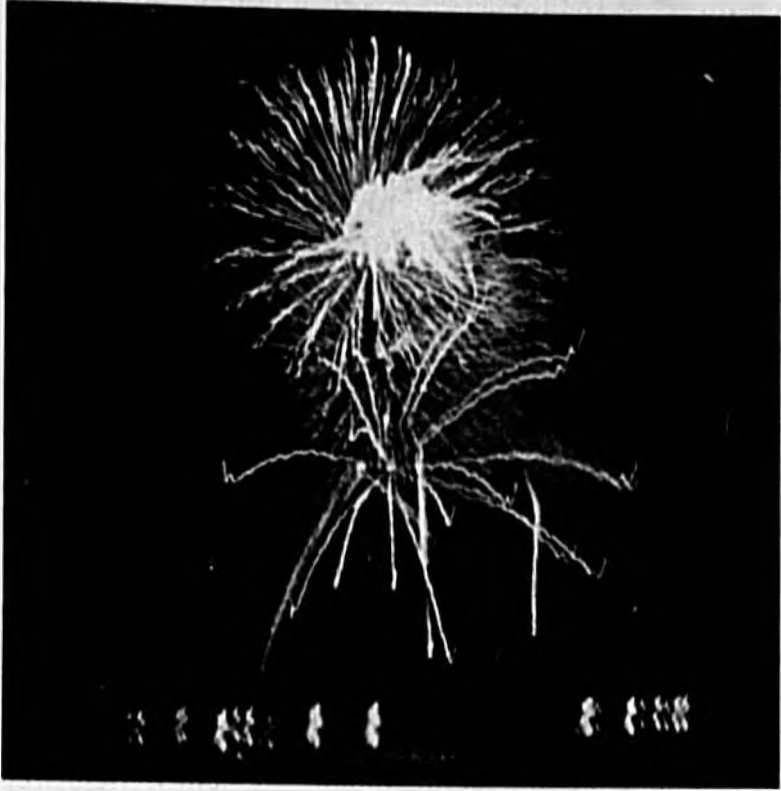
