Better Markets Are Predicted For Local Crops

Competitive Crop Volume Is Reduced By Low Temperatures In Winter Siege

Improvements Already Noted

Seminole Citrus, Vegetables Again Withstand Mercury Drop

HARLINGEN, TEXAS, Jan. 25.—(A.P.)—Heavy damage to the citrus fruit from the weather cold wave was reported through lower Rio Grande Valley.

Unless Seminole County vegetables are hurt considerably by continued cold, there is every prospect that crops in this area will find a ready market at better prices with the reduction in the volume of competing green vegetables from other sections caused by sub-freezing temperatures.

At least this is the opinion among local shippers who declared this morning that local crops have apparently stood without appreciable damage another severe day of winter's siege.

Temperatures in the range sections of the county by night while the Lake Monroe and the St. Johns River the mercury remained as high as 40 degrees.

Some growers and shippers expressed belief that the early crop of this county is hurt more than its appearance would indicate, pointing out that continued cold, such as has existed during the past few days, may cause the crop to develop hollow stems.

W. A. Leffer of Chase and Company said that the early market is already reacting favorably as a result in the reduction of the competitive crop volume.

Shipments reported that all green vegetables north of Sanford had been frozen by the weather cold wave and that there is increased demand for local vegetables throughout the southeastern states.

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South Florida Cities Shiver In Cold Wave

"Trust-Busting" Law Being Used Against Unions

Government Moves To Halting Coercing Of Employees

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—(A.P.)—The "trust-busting" law that Theodore Roosevelt enacted long ago against business monopolies was turned yesterday on labor unions in a widening effort to defeat what the government called "secondary boycotts and threats of violence to coerce employees to join a union not of their own choosing."

Grant W. Keller, special assistant to the U. S. attorney general, charged that unions are using this law to force employers and employees to join a union not of their own choosing.

The government charged the I. L. A. in one instance had up \$2,500,000 worth of lumber on city streets, rather than let it be used by blacklisted retailers.

The penalties under this act could be as severe as imprisonment and \$10,000 fines. It is the policy of Assistant Attorney General Arnold to charge of labor organizations to include the provisions of the Sherman antitrust law in cases where pressure is being put on an employer through compulsory boycott and threat of violence by coactive employees to join a union not of their own choosing.

Garnishes Add Greatly To Any Kind Of Dish

Fruits And Juices Help To Make Fine, Subtle Seasoning

NEW YORK, Jan. 25 (AP)—Is there blushing in your face by over the same old vegetables served in the same old way? Then the time to bring some changes in the old reliable with a dash of new, creative power of a novel flavor blend. Add color, substance and variety to the old. Cut the vegetables into different shapes and vary some by fashioning them into round, ring or loaf moulds. Put in fruits and fruit juices for subtle seasoning.

Here is a Carrot Ring—new and vitamin filled. The ring can be used as a meat substitute for luncheon, supper or dinner. Cook carrots in boiling salted water until tender, then press through a coarse sieve. Take 2 cups of (about 2 cups of cubed uncooked) will make this much) and add 2 tablespoons melted butter. Add 1/2 cup each of chopped onion, green well. Or put cooked parsnips into vegetable butter. Fry usual and serve hot with celery sauce, meat, gravy or creamed

green bean, cheese sauce or buttered peas.

Serve carrots and turnips together. Cut the carrots into small slices and the turnips into thin strips. Cook separately in boiling, salted water; drain well and put together with a sauce—cheese, savory or regular vegetable sauce. Chilled raw carrots in strips, find an important place on main courses. Surround with piquant cabbage salad with cooked green beans in it.

Carrot balls go fancy when rolled in with creamed potatoes, hard-cooked eggs or celery. Cook the carrots and then cut out balls with a French vegetable cutter. Use up the leftover carrots in soups and casseroles.

A mixture of grated cheese and chopped parsley dressed up the top of plain, seasoned green beans, turnips, cabbage, onions or cauliflower. Slip under the broiler for a second to brown. Grated hard-cooked egg yolks and chopped pimientos or green peppers also dress up the tops of scalloped mixtures. Add topping during the last 10 minutes of baking.

Corn is a good mixer. It ties up flavorfully with cooked egg plant cubes, celery, tomatoes or okra. Serve it well seasoned in creamed or scalloped forms.

For a new meat or fowl garnish there are Parsnip Cakes. Cook parsnip-cooked egg yolks and chopped pimientos or green peppers also dress up the tops of scalloped mixtures. Add topping during the last 10 minutes of baking.

10 minutes, unsoaked, fill and surround with hot buttered beef, seasoned with a little chopped sweet pickle relish. Or sprinkle the top of the hot, seasoned spinach with chopped salted peanuts and cheese. Surround with baby apricots, generally spread with orange and lemon juices.

And a mound of spinach, covered with creamed mushrooms and with a spiced pea garnish offers a worthy change.

For a pungent sauce: made to serve over green beans, cabbage, kale or onions, put a little nutmeg into a very creamy white or tomato sauce.

TANGERINE SWEET POTATOES (Serves Four)

4 boiled sweet 1-2 cup granulated sugar
 1-4 cup butter 1-4 cup water
 Tangerine sections

Cut cooked sweet potatoes into halves lengthwise. Arrange in shallow baking dish so that there will be only one layer. Heat butter, sugar and water to form a thin syrup. Pour syrup over potatoes. Bake uncovered in a moderate oven (375 F.) until syrup has been absorbed by potatoes. (About 20 minutes). Bake potatoes with syrup a few times during baking. Just before serving place tangerine sections (unpeeled but free of membrane) generously over top of potatoes. Bake lightly and place under broiler for a few moments until browned.

Improved Cattle Result From Tests By Dr. Bartlett

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Jan. 25 (AP)—Better milk from improved quality cows, increased dairy income and "mass production" of blue-blood cattle have been achieved by Dr. John W. Bartlett as the result of one year's work in "test tube" breeding at the state agricultural college at Rutgers university.

Rutgers university has pioneered in the program of artificial insemination under the direction of Dr. Bartlett, head of its experimental station's dairy division.

The idea of carefully selecting few top-notch bulls of the best blood lines and increasing their progeny by "test tube" impregnation was brought from Denmark by E. J. Parry, extension dairymen at the college.

Three units comprising 20 bulls and 6,000 cows started the program in New Jersey.

The experts now are expanding their work to making the finest stock available to the smallest farm, investigating how to exercise and feed the parents for the best results, and determining what unknown factors may enter into extensive artificial breeding.

"The first year's work on artificial breeding has indicated that the natural breeding method is the standpoint of rate of improvement," Dr. Bartlett said. "The artificial method has made possible to use proved sire through the work of trained dairymen, a number of cases of quality of cows has been come.

Artificial breeding has prevented any spread of disease through the use of a sire because methods have been artificial only a certified equipment has been used.

Statistics show that one bull proved the fat test of his daughters over their mothers by approximately four-tenths of one percent. On the milk check, this means one-third to one-half cent a quart for every quart produced. When we consider 1,000 daughters for this bull this means an increased dairy income for owners of these daughters of \$2.33 a day, or more than \$12,000 a year. This is in addition to higher milk yields.

"Records show that a large percentage of dairymen who previously owned bull, most of which were unproved, have discarded them and are using proved sires provided through artificial breeding units."

One of the units has set up the first laboratory-barn at Clinton, N. J. Two residents of it, Corcoran and Alice, will have fathered 616 and 406 offspring, respectively, during the first 15 months of the program.

Through "test tube" breeding, these and the other proved bulls are producing, in one year, 10 or 12 times the number of offspring a lifetime.

Attack Planned On Smoke Nuisance In City Of St. Louis

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 25.—(AP)—A new attack on St. Louis' \$10,000,000 annual smoke nuisance is being planned.

Prompted by reports of heavy financial losses suffered by the city government, business and householders as a result of the 60-year-old smoke problem, Mayor Bernard F. Dickmann has appointed a committee of business men to study smoke elimination from every angle.

The mayor told his committee he wanted an effective plan that could be put into law and not one that would require the city administration to be ready to pass or finance which would put public health and welfare above special interests.

Public indignation aroused by the three daily newspapers laid the groundwork for appointment of the present committee. The city has suffered a smoke "blackout" on the average of every third day during November and December. On 19 days during that period the weather bureau classed

the smoke fog as dense and it was not uncommon for street lights to be on and motorists to use their headlights at noon.

Smoke Commissioner R. H. Tucker attests to the indignation of the public over the "blackouts." Many persons have called his office on smoky days and indicated by their conversation they held him personally responsible for the smoke. On one smoky day 287 indignant citizens called. On such days Tucker found it convenient to be "in conference." The mayor's office receives similar protests, and in addition many fantastic schemes for solving the problem.

One person proposed that a glass ceiling be built over the entire city with smokestacks extending through it; another that airplanes be sent up to scatter lime to settle smoke particles; a third suggested that large fans be placed in operation at the city limits.

According to surveys, use of Illinois soft coal is largely responsible for the smoke palls. It has been pointed out that use of such coal could not be prohibited without tremendous financial loss to an important St. Louis trade territory.

As a result many plans for solving the smoke nuisance call

for processing the Illinois coal into smokeless fuel. The difficulty in requiring use of processed fuel is said to be in the added expense to families which buy cheap coal by the bushel basket and cannot afford to buy more than one basket at a time.

To solve the low income family's fuel problem a municipal cooking plant has been proposed with the city providing fuel on the same basis as it furnishes water from the municipal water plant. The city counselor has ruled that on or after the city's police and health protection powers such a plant could be established legally.

St. Louis has a smoke control ordinance, but so far as the citizens can determine, it has effected little improvement in smoke conditions. During most of the time it has been in effect enforcement provisions have been subject to injunctions brought by large fuel users.

Scientific tests, according to the smoke commissioner, indicate the ordinance has forced a reduction in Sulfur and sulphur content in the air.

The present ordinance was passed in 1935 and the city administration terms it a success as far as it goes. It has not checked the exodus of residents from St.

French Women Find War Not So Bad. Thus Far But Still Retain Fears

PARIS, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Madame Jean Q. Frenchman is holding her little family together these days by long distance methods. She not only has to write to Jean, but to their children as well.

This is one of the chief effects this war has had on Madame. In other wars, she and her infants were together after a while, because of the danger of air raids, the children have been evacuated to country refuges.

No Worry Over Money—Madame has many things to worry about, however, to occupy her. She frets for the soldiers. Frenchwomen always have been ardent knitters. But Madame has changed her pre-war favorite colors of blue and pink for khaki and beige.

There are men's jobs to be filled. Madame may now be punching tickets in the subway—or even reading gas meters. And if she has time left over there are the volunteer service corps.

Madame doesn't have to worry too much about money, if she hasn't a job or a nest egg. The government allows her 12 francs daily for herself (10 francs in the provinces) and 4 francs 50 centimes daily for each child. (The franc is worth about 2 1/4 cents.)

She does worry though—about Jean. This worry has been mitigated somewhat by the demobilization of men 49 years old and fathers of two or more children. Madame's concern has been reduced, too, by knowledge that there have been no big battles.

Madame is perplexed by the contrast to the terrific day of 1914, but she continues to read her newspaper avidly, watching with scorn Hitler's efforts to split France and Britain.

Gas Masks Neglected—The possibility of an air attack on Paris doesn't disturb Madame so much now, since none has occurred after many weeks of war. She is encouraged in this attitude by the return of thousands of Parisians who evacuated the capital before hostilities commenced. And Madame no longer carries her gas mask everywhere she goes.

She still dresses smartly—and on a small amount. She can buy whatever she pleases in the shops, although some shops have closed through lack of business or of personnel. The principal difference she notices is above—that windows are crisscrossed with gummed paper as protection against splintering and there are big signs pointing the way to the airtight (air raid) shelters "for our clientele."

Madame carries a flashlight at night because of the blackout. She walks more because subway

and bus service is restricted, though not so badly as at the start of the war. Train service is better, too.

No Ration Cards—The only food restrictions Madame has to face are the closing of all butcher shops on Mondays and the ban on the sale of beef on Tuesdays. There are no ration cards and no prospect of them since France is one of Europe's most self-sufficient nations.

Keeping the home fires burning has become a problem. Many apartment landlords, bereft of most of their tenants, cannot afford central heating for those who remain. So Madame has resorted to electric heaters, oil fires, or to digging the old gas burner out of the cellar. The landlord helps on the fuel bill by reducing the rent.

Madame still goes to the movies—unless she has seen all the shows in town. Cinemas were forced to continue showing the same pictures or to revive old ones for many weeks when war halted domestic output and curtailed importations.

That is nothing, however, compared to the closing time of saloons. With Jean, home on furlough, more saloons are opening. These open at 6 P. M., but they turn you out in the very bud of the evening, by pre-war standards—11 sharp.

Many Billions Spent By U. S. Government For Recovery, Relief

By MORGAN J. BEATTY, WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—(AP)—From a standing start on July 21, 1932, up to midnight last December 31, the Federal government devoted more than 21 and a half billion dollars to recovery and relief.

The exact figure is \$21,689,454,034.60 and the latest figure obtainable. It is possible to get that because the President has made an annual report to Congress on relief since 1935, with every single item accounted for.

That report has just been put on the desks of the nation's 650,000 congressmen.

That book, however, accounts for only the 12 billions spent and lent out of the public till since 1935. You have to wade through the 1941 budget, and the Works Progress reports for December, 1937, to complete the picture. The 21.5 billion total, exactly \$21,689,454,034.60 can be recovered, because it is lending money. The other 18 billions have gone up the spout, never to be repaid.

Not exactly up the spout, either. That you'll learn at the treasury's special office of accounts headed by the government's most efficient bookkeeper, E. P. DeLoach, a watchdog of whom you never may have heard.

You've got lots of public works, battlefields, roads, buildings, and improvements to show for the dollars. Including the morale that relief dollars were expected to put into destitute citizenship.

For other hand, if a single individual on a hard-earned dollar and cents basis could be made from last-making days to now, then the relief projects, well, well worth all they cost. It's all in your point of view.

Direct relief means to state public works including national defense), public buildings, highways, roads and street, farm aid and rehabilitation, conservation work... including CCC, account for more than 18 billions of dollars, or about three-fourths of the total.
