Two Called Life Saver By B-29 Airmen

Thousands Of Japanese Are Reported Killed Or Made Homeless By Raids

Two Jimu, bought with the lives of about 4,000 Marines, is a life saver for hundreds of B-29 airmen whose raids on Japan have killed thousands of Nipponese, a Superfortress spokesman disclosed today. Thirty Superfortresses have made emergency landings on Iwo, where the major fighting is now under way.

A major breakthrough in the Philippines threatened to trap two Japanese battalions. This was accomplished by the 43rd Division which drove a two-mile wedge into the southern end of Shambu line on Luzon. The Nipponese only escape raids were seized.

Tokyo admitted six raids have killed thousands of Japanese and left thousands more homeless. Enemy broadcasts reported that an American invasion fleet had been sighted north of two islands, possibly preparing for a new landing on the immediate approaches to Japan.

They said also that the British Pacific fleet seems to be joining the bombardment of southwestern Mindanao in the southern Philippines.

Openly anxious over the air situation after tremendous American superfortress firebomb attacks on its three greatest cities, Japan announced a plan for voluntary evacuation of non-essential civilians from Tokyo, Yokohama, Nagoya, Osaka and Kobe.

The government was forming a "civilian special attack corps" to aid in defense against an invasion and, in the meantime, to strengthen the anti-air raid defense system.

It was indicated that the special attack corps would be a suicide organization pledged to go to carry out any assigned duty.

Lacks Confirmation
The report that an American fleet had been sighted north of Iwo was given in a German Transocean agency dispatch dated Tokyo and broadcast from Berlin. There was no confirmation from any Allied source.

MIAMI, Mar. 16, (Special) This outfit they call the "Coast Guard" just won't stay within the apparent limits of its name. From the official title of Uncle Sam's smallest, but oldest, sea-going fighting force, one would expect to find Coast Guardsmen cruising along a couple of miles off Daytona Beach, on the lookout for subs and the like. They do not, but they do the Coast Guard crew, by the darndest of other places, for instance Sanford, Fla.

Thirty-four miles from the east coast, 94 from mangrove-lined Gulf beaches, Sanford is an island town if there ever was one. Residents are proud of their cattle herds, their citrus groves, their cattle herds, their Naval air station.

That's where the Coast Guard comes in. Wherever there's an air base, particularly a training station, there are crashes. And the Coast Guard Air-Sea Rescue unit is charged with saving as many fliers as is humanly possible whenever they crash in the water, Lake Monroe and the St. Johns river provide the water. The Navy provides the air station, and the Coast Guard provides the at-sea rescue unit.

More than 153 pioneers of this section and many friends celebrated at the Lake Mary Community House in evening Florida's 100th anniversary as a state. As Frank Evans, Lake Mary resident, and their host, put on his 20th annual Pioneer Night celebration.

Mr. Evans, announcer of the program, pointed out five flags that had been loaned for the occasion by Rollins College in celebration of Florida's anniversary. He explained how Florida had served under the Spanish, French and Confederate flags and then the Stars and Stripes. He then called on Rev. J. Logan of Geneva to offer a prayer for an American victory and an enduring peace.

To the five oldest men pioneers of this section who were present, Mr. Evans presented a certificate. J. B. Mees of Geneva, oldest was R. W. Warren of Sanford and the others were D. B. Hooker, 84, of Longwood, A. E. Early, 84, W. E. Randall, 82 and O. B. Royce, 81 of Sanford. Present was D. W. Hutchison, 82, of Lake Mary only pioneer present who had attended all 20 Pioneer Night meetings.

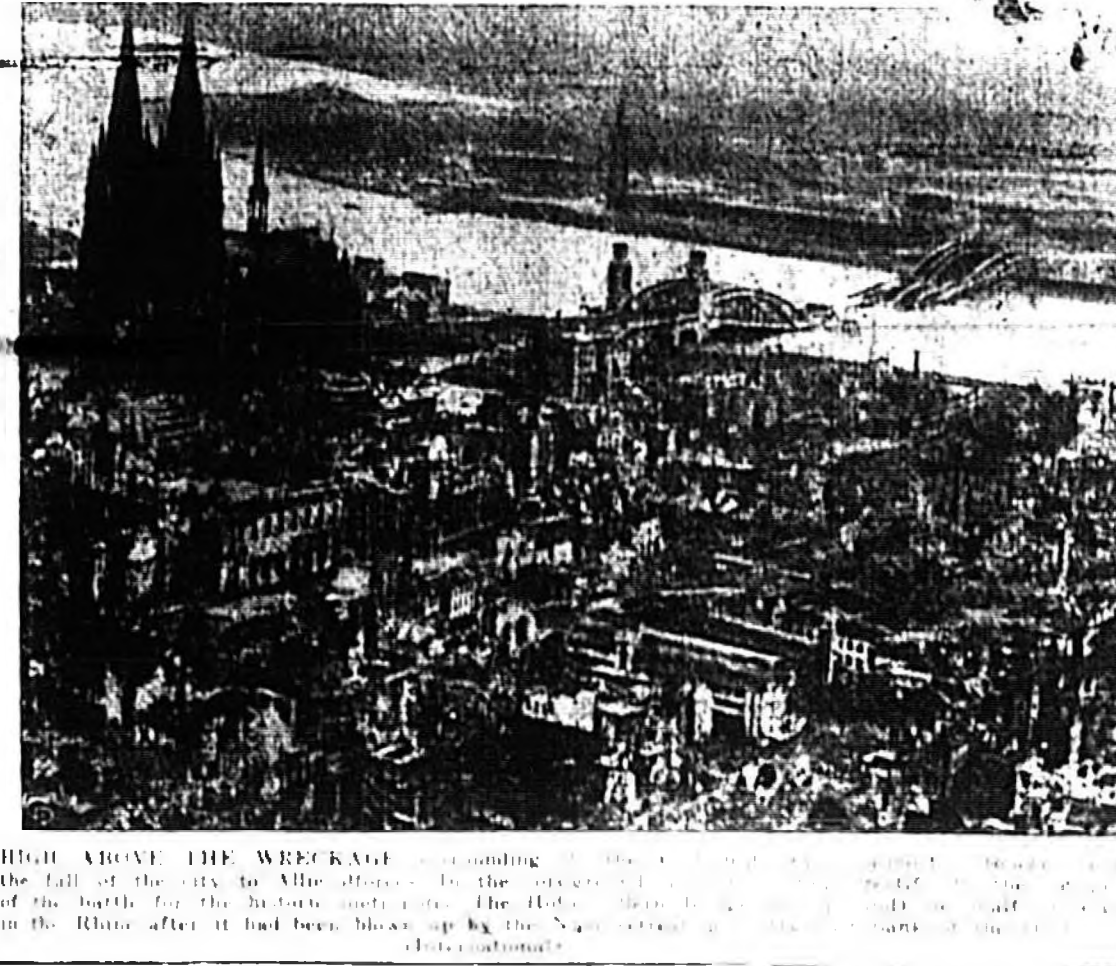
To Mrs. S. S. Sams, 90 of Sanford, oldest lady present, Mr. Evans gave a silver gift. Other pioneer ladies who received gifts were Mrs. S. E. Collins and Mrs. Jane Gray of Sanford, each 81 years old, and Mrs. Jane Snyder of Chuluota, 79.

Of the numerous fine countries were represented with four each from England and Sweden, two each from Bohemia and Germany and one each from Scotland, Russia, Scotland, Newfoundland and Italy. Florida was represented by 26. Georgia by 17, and Ohio and Illinois tied for third places with 10 each.

Warren Roberts, editor of The Orlando Morning Sentinel, told of a visit to a cemetery at Mobile Bay where he had been impressed with how many early settlers had died in their tents and early factories and why he followed the gold rush to the Florida territory had died. DOG NOT SO VACCINATED

AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THE PROVISIONS HEREOF. BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF SANFORD, FLORIDA:

SECTION 1: That owners and keepers of dogs in the City of Sanford, Florida, are hereby required to have said dogs vaccinated against rabies by a licensed veterinarian before the first day of May of each year.

SECTION 2: That upon vaccination of a dog as required by Section 1 hereof the veterinarian so vaccinating said dog shall furnish the owner or keeper thereof a certificate showing the date of such vaccination and also a tag which shall be continually worn by said dog on a collar or harness for the following year.

SECTION 3: That upon any police officer finding a dog without the tag provided for in Section 2 hereof, such officer shall use reasonable diligence to notify the owner or keeper of said dog to have it vaccinated within forty-eight (48) hours after notice and upon failure to do so, said dog shall be killed by any police officer, and if such police officer is unable to notify the owner or keeper after reasonable diligence so to do, he shall kill such dog.

SECTION 4: That any owner or keeper of a dog who shall fail to have said dog vaccinated as required in Section 1 hereof, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof in the Municipal Court shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$100.00 or by imprisonment not exceeding sixty days or by both fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the Municipal Judge.

SECTION 5: That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

SECTION 6: That this ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage and adoption.

Governor Caldwell Gives Formal Aid To School Budget

TALLAHASSEE, March 16, (AP) — Governor Caldwell Wednesday gave his formal support to a Citizens' Committee recommendation that the State contribute an additional \$5,000,000 a year to county schools in order to provide the "maximum essentials for education."

In releasing the committee's detailed report, he said "I will support the recommendation in my message to the Legislature, and I feel confident the program advanced will merit approval."

In addition, the committee recommended an appropriation of \$1,000,000 to be spent during the next two years under supervision of the State Board of Education for utilization of about \$5,000,000 worth of war production training equipment which the Federal Government has sent to the State.

BIBLE VERSE FOR TODAY

GOD VALUES THE SPIRIT MORE THAN HE DOES THE FORM: Let my prayer be set forth before thee as incense, and the lifting up of my hands as the evening sacrifice.—Psalm 141:2.

A Cocoa man walls that if you make out your income tax correctly the poorhouse will get you and if you don't, the government will.—Cocoa Tribune. He may be right.

Congress has decided to spend \$500,000 trying to ascertain the cause of the food shortage. If its members would look around them, they could see that more people are eating more food than they ever did before in their lives.

Congress Trains Wary Eye Upon Inflation Drift—headline. It might try trimming unnecessary expenditures. You can't avoid the drift to inflation and prime the pump at the same time. You can't expect one government agency to hold prices down even with ceilings while another government agency spends billions to boost prices.

We regret a typographical error in Wednesday's Herald which caused us to say that Florida's quota for the Seventh War Loan would be \$12,000,000. This should have been, of course, \$122,000,000 rather than \$12,000,000. One which can be raised if everyone does his part. The best quote plan (these sold to individuals) has been set at \$50,000,000.

The capture of Godesberg by American forces recalls the meeting there in 1938 between British Prime Minister Chamberlain and Adolf Hitler. That was just a little while before the Munich meeting of the "Big Four" when Chamberlain, the man with the umbrella, brought back "peace for our times." And how many saps there were who believed him!

A letter comes to our office about the foolish practice of raising rents in war time when everything else is frozen. Local landlords who are resorting to this practice are hurting the reputation of the city for fair dealing and their efforts to pay for their properties in a year or two of wartime scarcities should be checked by city authorities if not by the OPA.

Governor Caldwell apparently approves the report of the Citizens Committee on Education which calls for additional State appropriations for schools of nearly six million dollars and would raise the State's contribution to the school system to \$18,198,922. Although the need for additional tax levies are denied, additional tax levies there will be, sooner or later, for you can't keep robbing Peter to pay Paul forever. However, it will be well worth it to the people of this state if the educational system is improved to the full extent of the \$8,000,000 additional. There is no better way for the people to spend their money than on education.

The president of a powerful international moving picture union threatens to close all the movie houses in this country. That might be a good way of bringing the public to a full realization of the danger of the strike weapon when it is viciously or irresponsibly used. A coal strike would affect the public much more later when the real cause has long since been forgotten. A moving picture strike would interrupt their entertainment tonight.

Some of the useless government expenditures of the last few years which we are now paying heavy taxes to meet, to list what the government that the highway to Alaska is to be abandoned after spending \$125,000,000 on it. The construction of the highway probably never will be started. The first \$125,000,000 has been spent on the road with thousands of taxpayers' dollars. But what is the use of the "Good" program, another Alaskan venture which saw the expenditure of \$125,000,000 for a gasoline pipeline which will be abandoned. But the people don't mind.

Not Better Off

A recent Gallup poll disclosed 64 percent of the American people believing they had suffered no sacrifice. Many so-called sacrifices made by others seem trivial. It would not be fair to deduce from this that the 64 per cent had given up nothing. Doubtless those who had suffered most compared themselves with Europeans and thought it not decent to call trifling deprivations sacrifice.

But many people are getting the idea that they are better off now, with high wages, than they were before the war. Depression, naturally, was hard to bear. Today's easy wages—100% high. Yet it would be unfortunate if the idea that inflation was desirable took hold.

Consider an average family. Its members are living adequately, buying bonds and paying off the mortgage with payments which would have looked magical some years ago. But are they really gaining? The roof needs repair. The house needs painting. The stove, in time of peace, might last a dozen years more. Now, because repair parts are not made, it may have to be thrown away in favor of one whose cost is entirely out of proportion to its value. All the textiles are wearing out and can be replaced only with poor stuff, far too expensive, or not at all. The car? Don't ask.

Besides these obvious forms of deterioration at home, roads, schools, hospitals and other public properties are running down, too, and need replacement. What about war taxes cutting into future income? They must go on for years, because this false prosperity is based on destruction of wealth. War does not make people rich, but poor.

Kwajalein Development

On Jan. 29, 1944, the first marines waded ashore on islets of Kwajalein Atoll in the Marshalls, and a week later had almost all of Kwajalein Island under control. But that is only the first part of the story. The second half is one of incredible building, which has turned the island into a focal point on the routes from Pearl Harbor to the Marianas, Philippines and other points west.

Capt. Walter G. Thompson, commanding officer of the Kwajalein naval base is proudest of the cooperation attained among the services. The Navy handles all mail and communications, the Army the food. Both the Naval Air Transport Service and the Army Transport Command use it, and both have built enormous hotels, capable of lodging hundreds of transients each. This is not wasteful duplication because not only are all the many cargo and passenger planes daily full on every trip, but so, often, are both hotels. The men of the Army, Navy and Marines, themselves have built a chapel at which all worship.

It's only one example of the power and speed of the American war machine, and also of the smoothness of its cooperative performance out there.

Aviation Pioneer

The youngest colonel since the Civil War, Edgar S. Gorrell, has just died at the age of 64. Col. Gorrell, a member of the former Aviation Section of the Signal Corps, which preceded the Army Air Corps, served in the first World War as a member of the Bolling mission, which decided what flying material the United States should produce for itself and what it should buy from our Allies. At 28 he became a colonel, and later chief of staff of the Air Service of the A.E.F.

Resigning from the army in 1920, he became a notable pioneer in commercial aviation. He first started an organized system of airports, and first built airplane hangars out of steel. He was the first American pilot to fly a plane taking automatic air photographs, first to conduct experiments in aviation radio, also the first American officer to make a successful army plane flight by night. Since 1936 he had been president of the Air Transport Association of America, and was often called the czar of commercial airlines. Few Americans have made more aviation history.

Inspection Is Made Of Local Restaurants

J.E. Matlocks, deputy of the State Hotel Commission recently was on inspection tour in Sanford, working in close cooperation with City and County health agencies.

In his March 1, issue of the Seminole Chief, Dr. Leiland H. Dame, director of the County Health Unit wrote: "Within the past two weeks we have made an effort to have the restaurants of Seminole County cleaned up."

For sometime we have not allowed a new restaurant or eating place to open up for business unless and until they had met all requirements under the Florida Sanitary Code. Besides facilities for keeping the place sanitary, they are required to have ample space, ample ventilation, proper screening, one toilet for each sex, and others for colored help, one for each sex. Generally our old restaurants do not meet all requirements, but we are biding our time and when enough new restaurants are opened up under conditions that satisfy the Florida Sanitary Code, we will close the old, unless in the meantime they comply. "Some two or three weeks ago in connection with the City San-

itary, we made a thorough check on eating places to see if cooks, waitresses and other food handlers had health certificates. As a result, some 20 or more cases were prosecuted in municipal court and convicted for either

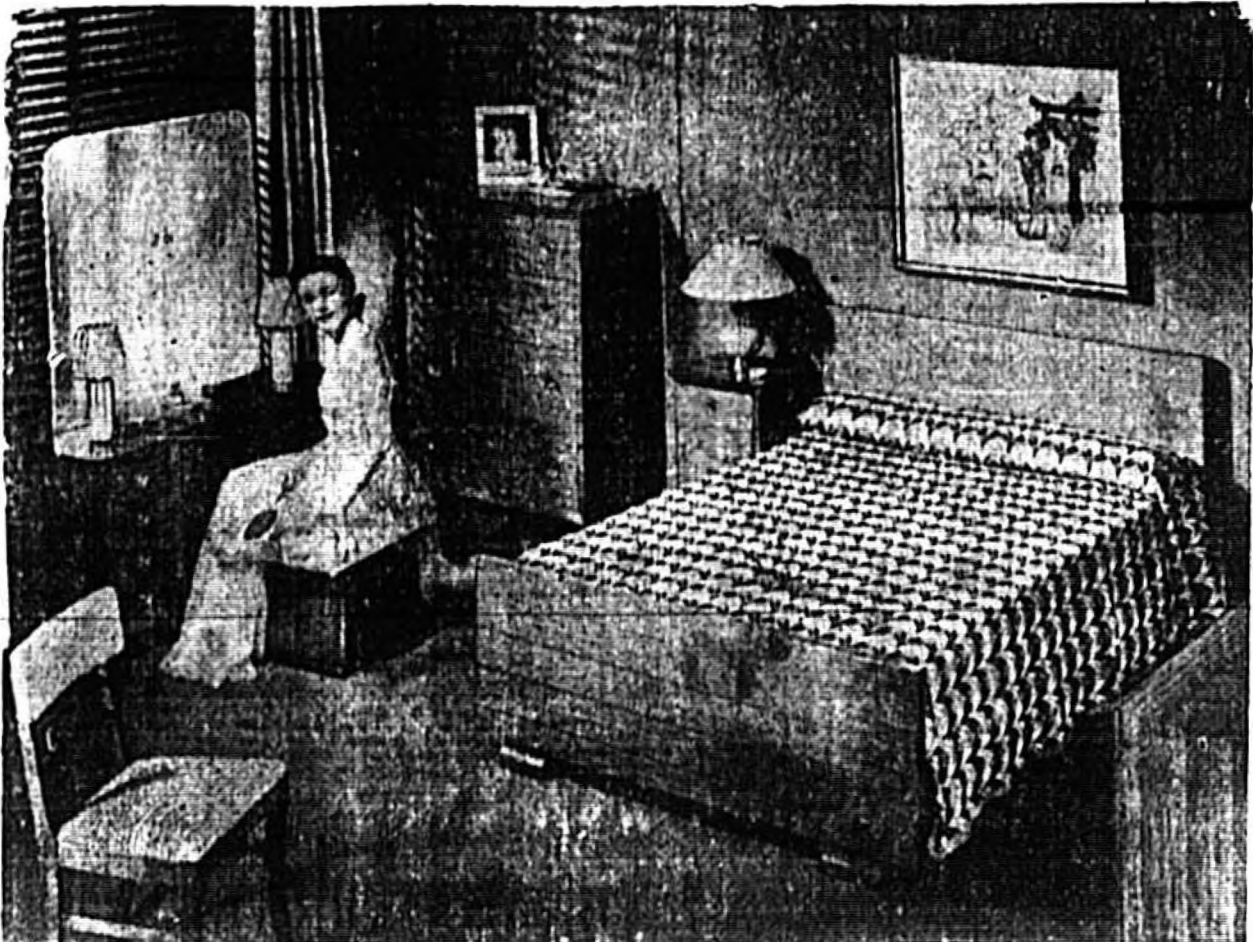

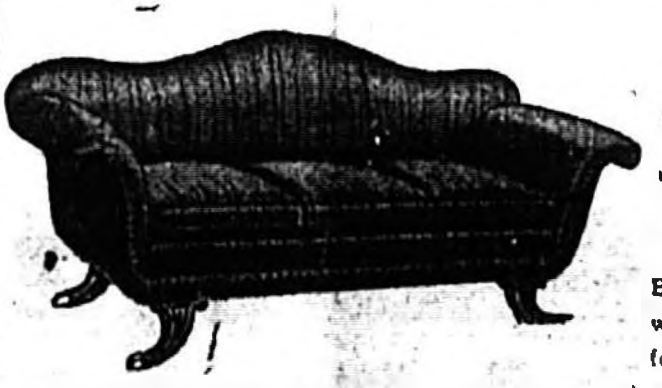

Greatest Raid Of War Made Against Japan

Superforts And Carrier Planes Drop 5,000 Tons of Explosives In Strike

Great flights of carrier planes and Superforts gave Japan the heaviest mauling of war today. Perhaps 5,000 tons of explosives and incendiaries were loosed by sea-borne planes raking the southwest Japanese airfields in a two-day attack and by 350 Superforts in setting fire to Nagoya for the second time in eight days.

Tokyo claimed five U.S. warships were sunk and 46 planes destroyed, reporting American bombers from two Jima raked Guardian Island 200 miles south of the capital.

The Japanese parliament heard a plea for better air raid protection.

American on the Philippines invaded the 24th island—Basilan—and counted 292,000 Japanese killed in the Philippines against 18,579 U.S. casualties, including 3,811 killed.

In southern Luzon Brig Gen Harold MacArthur (1593) Regimental Combat Team landed a force of men at Tulaga on the west shore of Batanga Bay and the troops drove northward, throwing off an enemy counter-attack, to join at Mahini other troops who had crossed to the east side of the Camupan Peninsula.

The Sixth and Forty-third Divisions after smashing heavy Japanese resistance advanced eastward in the mountains east of Manila, driving through rugged country into the enemy's secondary defenses, to the south the First Army advanced five miles of terrain.

The Twenty-fifth Division, advancing from the south, reached within three miles of Manila and was en route for the Valley of northern Luzon. At the same time the Thirty-second Division, advancing from the west, advanced three miles from Santa Fe, just north of the pass.

In the coastal area of the northern Luzon zone, planes dropped 337 tons of bombs in the area of Baguio, Summer capital of the Philippines and center of perhaps the largest Japanese concentration remaining on the island.

This was only part of a big aerial day which showed the increasing power of MacArthur's air force. In raids on Baguio, Mindanao, the Navy's Yorktown, Formosa and Horno planes dropped 848 tons of bombs.

Three hundred tons were dropped on Formosa targets including air bases and an electric plant. A destroyer and a destroyer escort were left in flames by planes which attacked a convoy off the coast. The Navy's effort of maintaining the new blockade of enemy communications to the South Seas.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 19 (AP)—The War Relocation Authority is expected to announce today for an investigation of food shortages. The resolution, designed to find the solution for tightened supplies of meat and other commodities, was approved by a vote of 11 to 10 in the House of Representatives.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 19 (AP)—A new and tighter squeeze on food, shoes, tires and manpower may become even more disconcerting to the home front. Government officials predicted this, saying there will be little if any relief as long as the two-front war continues.

They said civilian meat allocations are not expected to increase much before both Germany and Italy are defeated. The people at home are facing the tightest and most desperate situation of the war. It is going to get worse before it gets better," a high official declared.

Even if victory in Europe comes by mid-year the months intervening probably will be the leanest of the war for the home front.

This became evident in week-end food news as reliable forecasts disclosed that the Army and War Production Board have filed confidential and preliminary war forecasts for the next six to 12 months.

WPA statisticians, similarly forecasting a start on the front, predicted a 35 per cent drop in all commodities, and reckon that the shortages will extend over a long time.

Both estimates are based on the assumption of an end to German resistance in June, but it is emphasized that the date is more or less arbitrary to give statisticians a basis for figuring and not a reflection of the views of the military command.

In announcing a 12 per cent drop in meat for April, May and June—the lowest point since the drought and hog-control period—two years ago—the War Food Administration observed last night:

"The end of the war in Europe will not materially affect the food situation, which will result neither in lighter military demands nor in increased civilian supplies.

"By implication the Government served notice also that U. S. resources are strained and the world cannot look to America as an inexhaustible Santa Claus. Lend-lease shipments to most of Britain were cut a whopping 87 1/2 per cent.

JACKSONVILLE, March 19 (Special)—Foodly owners will make money and help the nation if they will stop the present trend of killing laying hens. Eggs are scarce and prices are going up," William I. Wilson, Director of State Farmers' Markets, said in his report and market review yesterday.

"Reports touching my office," he continued, indicate that many poultrymen are killing laying hens as soon as the egg production program went into effect. They apparently intend a drop in prices below production costs.

However, prices are going up and very few eggs are being sold to the government. There is no question of our people facing a very real shortage of meat and this deficit must be made up by eggs and chickens. A continuation of egg and chicken production will be both patriotic and profitable.

"Adoption of a 10-point program for promoting the word 'fresh' in connection with the sale and consumption of fruits and vegetables by the Philadelphia branch of the National League of Wholesale Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Distributors illustrates the need for meeting competitive forces which are being arrayed against the fresh fruit and vegetable industry and which will increase as the post-war period comes nearer.

"This program includes legislation against the use of the word 'fresh' on menus in hotels and restaurants, unless fresh commodities are used, promotion by advertising, arranging hours of sale and temperature control to provide quicker delivery and fresher products, stricter conformity with government regulations and trade practices strengthening normal channels of distribution, closer cooperation between producer and distributor, interchange of information, alter facilities to anticipate postwar changes, and assisting warans returning to the industry.

"Florida being primarily a fresh fruit and vegetable producing state has a considerable stake in the adoption and expansion of this program," Wilson stated.
