

A Look Forward The County In '63

Everyone hopes the year 1963 will be a benner year for Seminole County. But a hope is an idle thing unless it is accompanied by planning, effort and the will to bring it to

This past year has seen the coming of a number of new firms, both large and small to the county and the expansion of others; the building and resurfacing of county roads, the start of the fourlaning of SR 436 and the continuation of construction on Interstate 4; the building of two new schools and the planning for additions to existing schools. To evaluate the advances made by the county would be a pointless exercise. Rather than look to it. now we must look forward to u new year and think in terms of what it holds for Seminole County.

The response of the county municipalities to the challenges presented by the rapid developments in the Cape Canaveral area augurs well for a progressive year for their sphere of action. And the plans for road improvement and building by the county indicate there will be more progress there, too.

One pressing problem that must be solved by the end of 1963 is that of caring for the aged and infirm in the county. The two private homes for the elderly now operating here are doing everything they can to raise funds, Sarepta Home by private donations and Good Samaritan through the FHA, to bring their establishments up to the state standard. These goals must be accomplished if the county is to save the \$250,000 that would be spent to build a new county home.

The school board is working hard on plans for the coming year to raise academic standards of the County Schools, and to improve the equipment and facilities for instruction. Plans are also being made for a School for Business Education, a much needed adjunct to the system. The building of the new air-conditioned English Estates Elementary School will be a big step forward for Seminole County and will make 1963 an important one in the annals of the school board.

One thing that should be finalized during the new year is the planning for a county airport. The committees that have been working on that problem should be revitalized and pressed back into action so that by the end of the year the people of the county can say there will be a Seminole County Airport.

There are a lot of things that should be done in both the city and county during the next year. We have enumerated only a few, but with careful planning and united effort by everyone involved there is no reason why 1963 can't be a BIG year.
