RFC Director George Allen Resigns Today

President Appoints John D. Goodloe To Fill Vacancy Effective Jan. 16

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27 (AP)—The man often called "the smiling court jester" of the Truman administration, George E. Allen, resigned today as a director of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

President Truman immediately appointed John D. Goodloe, at present the RFC general counsel, to replace Allen when the resignation takes effect on Jan. 16. Goodloe, 38 years old, is a native of Richmond, Kentucky.

In breaking the news, Presidential Press Secretary Charles G. Ross told newsmen: "When the President appointed Mr. Allen last January, Mr. Allen said he would be willing to serve only a year. He was appointed with that understanding."

However, in what Truman imagines now term "the black days" following the November election, Allen told friends that he "never would think of leaving the President now."

A friend of Allen was quoted today as saying: "The picture has brightened plenty for the Truman Administration since then."

White House Secretary Ross asserts that Allen is going to the White House to see Mr. Truman with Goodloe and is taking a report recommending important changes in the act creating the RFC.

Allen literally kidded himself into the approval of Senators when his nomination was sent to Capitol Hill by the President last January.

40 Passengers Injured In Train Wreck In La.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 27 (AP)—Two cars of an all-pullman train of the Illinois Central Railroad left the rails today near Ruddock, La., 35 miles northwest of New Orleans. Officials at the railroad's division headquarters at McComb, Miss., said about 40 passengers were injured.

The train was the Illinois Central's streamlined Panama Limited enroute from Chicago to New Orleans.

An Illinois Central official in New Orleans said a coupling on the train broke, separating the last three cars from the others. The first two of the three detached cars left the rails.

Among the passengers injured was Harry Wimer, sports director for the American Broadcasting Company. Wimer was enroute to New Orleans to broadcast the Sugar Bowl football game.

Michigan State Boxing Commissioner John Hettche also was injured. Hettche, who was going to New Orleans for the Sugar Bowl activities, said he believed that several of his ribs were broken.

Mexican Livestock To Be Banned In U. S.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27 (AP)—Officials at the Department of Agriculture say that they expect Secretary Clinton Anderson to issue a formal order sometime today which will close the border to the importation of cattle, sheep, goats and hogs from Mexico.

"These officials declared that the step was being taken because evidence had been found of foot and mouth disease among livestock in Mexico."

Last night the department's bureau of animal husbandry sent instructions to its border inspectors to accept no more Mexican livestock for import inspection.

Atomic Commission Meets

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Dec. 27 (AP)—Russia's Andrei Gromiko was absent today as the United Nations atomic energy commission met in a secret session for a showdown on the United States plan for atomic control. A white-haired Russian scientist, Dr. S. P. Alexandrov, represented the Soviet Union at the meeting after talking to members of the commission who were occupied with other business.

Rival Groups Claim Gains In Georgia Race

Talmadge Forces Say 200 Assembly Members For Herman; 38 Favor Thompson

In Georgia, leaders in the Talmadge forces claimed today that 200 members of the General Assembly would vote for Herman Talmadge to become the next governor.

The claim was made at Talmadge headquarters despite an Associated Press poll showing 3 to 1 preference for Lieutenant Governor-elect M. E. Thompson as the next chief executive of Georgia.

Famous duck House Speaker Roy Harris, directing the campaign to elect Herman Talmadge, said 115 pledges already had been received, and he expected a clear majority of 130 pledges by tonight. Harris added optimistically: "When we get through, we'll have 200 of 'em just watch us."

Replies to a telegraphic poll by the Associated Press showed 38 legislators favoring Thompson to assume the term of the late Eugene Talmadge. The governor is scheduled to be inaugurated Jan. 14. The poll listed 11 lawmakers in favor of Herman, 17 non-communally and three favoring a special election.

Talmadge leader Harris said the results of the poll, however, that poll does not mean anything. "You just don't know from the country boy."

The Talmadge group is claiming the legislature has the right to select a governor after the death of the governor-elect. But Harris on election or campaign is necessary, that an lieutenant governor has the right to step up to the next regular election two years hence.

Thompson has pledged himself to carry out the Democratic Party platform, including a white primary and expanded state services.

In a speech at the University of Georgia, Harris said he would support Thompson if he were elected.

Truman Gives Out Figures On Lend-Lease Aid

President Reports To Congress Amount U. S. Gave Totals 50 Billion Dollars

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27 (AP)—President Truman told Congress today that 70 percent of America's lend-lease help has been marked paid and he said he thinks the accounting will be one of the foundations of economic stability in the post-war world.

Here are the details of the President's 27th report on the lend-lease program:

The amount of help we gave came to well over \$50,000,000,000. We'll get back well over ten billion in money and in reverse lend-lease. This government never did expect a full dollar and cent settlement. The President said today that the work of the international swapping plan can never be satisfactorily measured in terms of money.

Here's what the various countries who got lend-lease help have done about payment:

France, we've got more than any other country. Britain received 50 percent of the lend-lease; Italy got 25 percent. Mr. Truman said today that he has invited the governments of these countries to settle their accounts with us by contributing to the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration.

Italy, France, India, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Belgium and the Netherlands all have made final agreements. The agreements all include the principle that they settle their accounts with America within their borders; that the United States neither leased military equipment nor delivered to them the equipment delivered to them by us.

Finally, accounts closed. The need for all the materials and supplies we gave her.

Settlements have been made with the Netherlands, the United States, the Netherlands, except Brazil only a few relatively minor matters remain to be settled.

WASHINGTON—Efforts aimed at creating a better understanding of world affairs in both the war and state departments have run into trouble because of gossip.

A sharp fight is going on as result of the recent publication of a report that Commerce Secretary W. Averell Harriman told a group at the Army War college that Moscow bigwigs believe war with the western powers is inevitable.

Harriman later denied the report, but its publication caused a furore in the war department. The report emanated from a state department employee who confessed that he had told it confidentially to a foreign press representative with the understanding it was not to be printed.

The Army was so incensed that it barred state department people for a time from War college briefings. Later they were allowed back in reduced numbers.

Meanwhile, state department employees have been tracking down published news stories involving state department policy which they say only could have come from war department sources.

A GROUP OF GOVERNMENT FINANCIAL EXPERTS are booming former Congressman Charles Dewey (R) of Illinois to succeed Eugene Meyer as head of the International bank.

They feel that Dewey, a Republican, would have no trouble with the incoming GOP Congress. And they point to Dewey's past record as evidence of his fitness for the job.

He was at one time an assistant secretary of the treasury and currently is a vice president of the Chase National Bank of New York.

Dewey now is in Europe and unavailable for comment, but it is assumed in Washington that he will take the post if it is offered to him.

Meyer quit the bank in a surprise move. It had been expected he would continue in the job for several years since he had resigned his publishing duties with the Washington Post to assume the International bank position.

THE FORTHCOMING REPUBLICAN CONFERENCE in which the GOP will complete plans for taking over the Senate reins promises to be a turbulent affair.

The Vandenberg-Taft leadership is going to be challenged—probably unsuccessfully—by a mixed faction that includes both liberal and conservative senators.

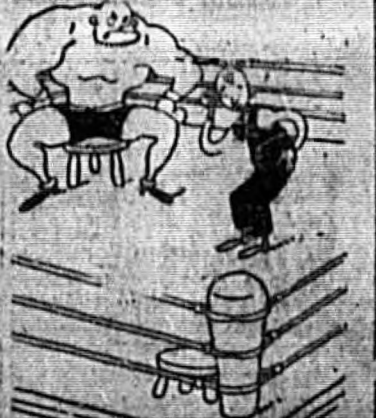

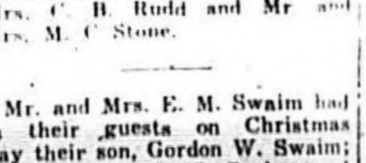

Employees Of Power Company Extend Insurance

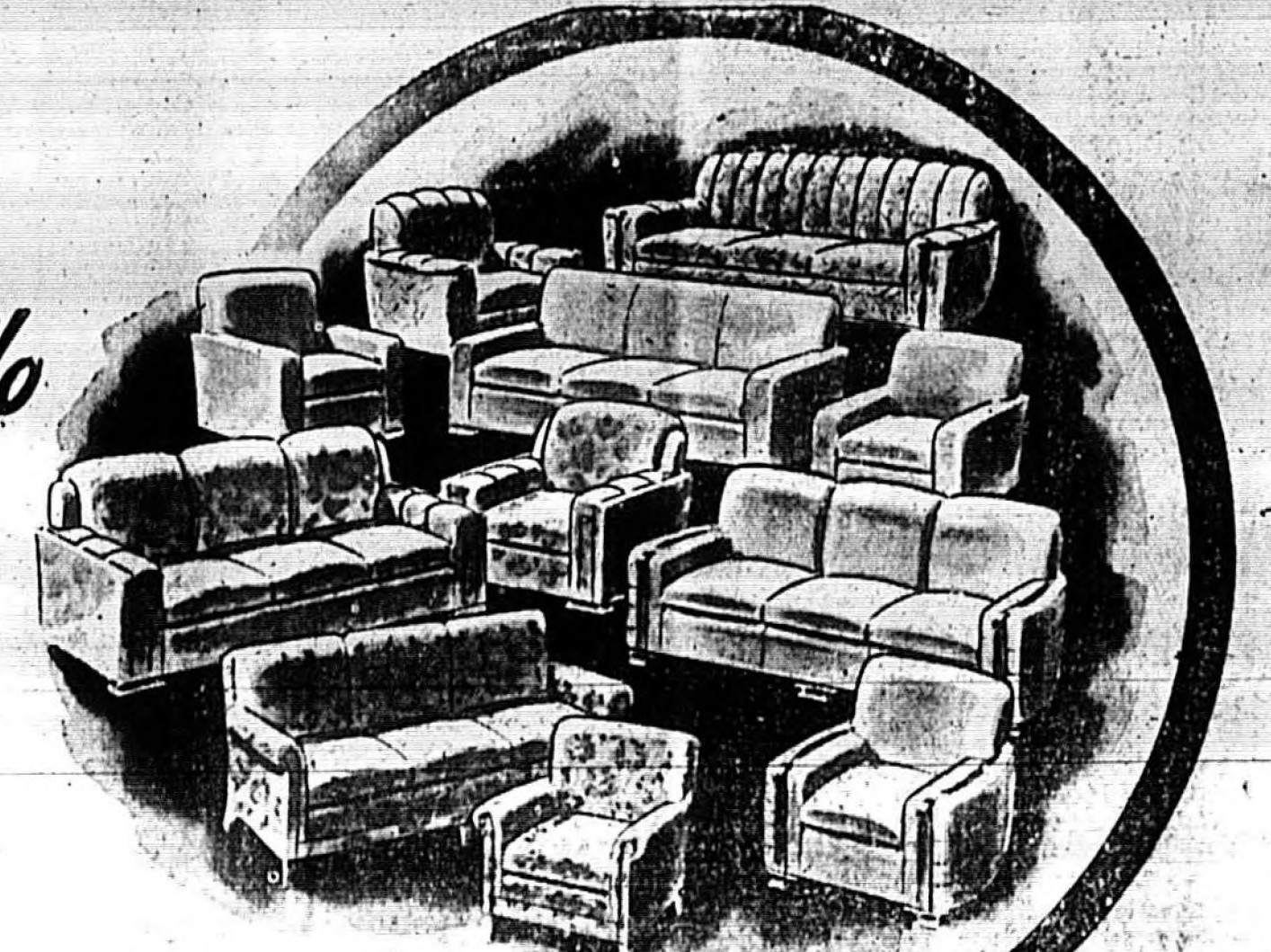

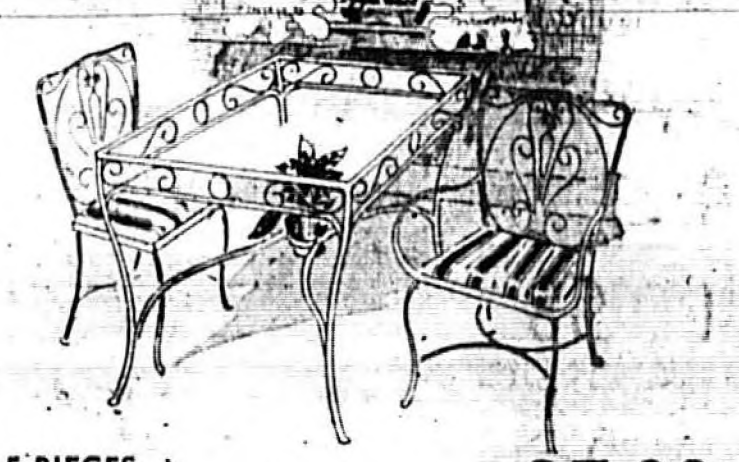

Industry Hits Back At CIO's Pay Demands

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—(AP)—The C-I-O arguments of a new round of wage-creep have been described by the National Association of Manufacturers as "a gross work and statistical nonsense." The N. A. M.'s chief economist, Dr. Ralph H. Avery, spoke for the association when he asserted today that higher wages will force prices again.
