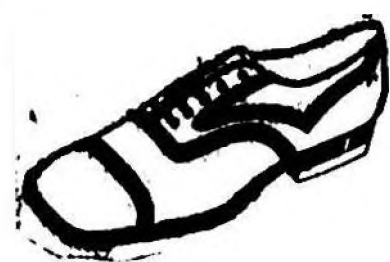

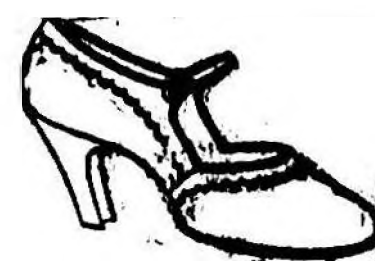

Mob Kills Blacks After Taking Them From Aiken Jail

(Continued from page one)
being held in the jail on that warrant.

The two men were sentenced to death at their first trial, while the woman was given a life sentence.

Estimates of the number of men in the mob varied widely. One woman at the jail declared there were a thousand in the crowd of lynchers while others said there were not more than 30. The cutting of the electric light wires left the jail, and in fact, the whole town in darkness, making it impossible, according to officers, to identify those who composed the mob.

Sheriff Robinson was one of the officers who as a deputy accompanied Sheriff Howard on the fatal raid on the Lowman home. One of the contentions of the defendants at the first trial was that the negroes were not aware that the raiders were officers when they descended upon their home in search for liquor. Annie Lowman, the mother of Demmond and Bertha, was shot and killed by one of the officers. Clarence was alleged to have fired the shot that killed Sheriff Howard. Bertha was shot through the roof of the meter that followed the raid.

Assistant Chief of Police J. H. Woodward said the mob evidently had ordered the negroes to run and then opened fire. The bodies indicated that each negro had headed in a different direction.

Judge Lanham today called the grand jury in session to investigate the lynchings and a rigid inquiry was promised. The grand jury will meet this afternoon. An inquest was to be held late today.

Judge Lanham said that during the progress of the trial yesterday there was no evidence of mob excitement. "The crowd was the most orderly I have ever seen in a courtroom," he said. "Quiet prevailed throughout the session and there was no evidence whatsoever of impending violence."

In adjournment court today Judge Lanham said the lynchings were a "sad and deplorable end."

When the mob left the jail, the sheriff and jailer were released and the sheriff opened fire on the mob in the darkness. He said he did not know whether he had hit any one.

"It was one of the best organized things pulled off here in a long time," Assistant Chief Woodward said.

"We are going to do everything we can to apprehend the members of the mob, but I doubt whether we can do much. From all reports it was pitch dark and while the mob did not wear masks no one could positively identify anyone."

Shippers Protest Against Change In The Ventilation System For Perishables

LAKE CITY, Fla., Oct. 2.—(AP)—Against the proposed change in the rules regulating the ventilation system for perishables in Florida to Canadian standards, shippers of the Canadian railroads, the Growers and Shippers of Florida, according to J. Robinson, secretary of the Florida Shippers' Association, protest points out that in the present system the conditions would be economic, but in the proposed system it would cause heating or decay.

The present rule of Desirable Protective Tariff 313 provides that cars at division or terminal points shall be kept open and ventilated at a temperature (minimum) of 28 degrees Fahrenheit and hatch plugs maximum temperature of 65 degrees Fahrenheit. It is also provided that ventilators must be kept open and ready for use before leaving the terminal point.

Canadian railroads propose the rule so that ventilators be open and hatch plugs be closed and hatch plugs put in place in order to afford superior handling in transit.

POULTRY RAISED ON BIG SCALE ON COLUMBIA FARMS

Incubator With Capacity of 10,300 Eggs Is Established At Lake City to Give Producers the Best Service

LAKE CITY, Fla., Oct. 2.—(AP)—Columbia county is developing into a large poultry producing section and County Agent Fulford is rapidly enrolling the farmers as members of the poultry association.

The establishment of a 10,300 egg capacity incubator at Lake City has given an outlet for high grade eggs at prices considerably higher than regular market quotations, and is giving producers a service which enables them to sell their eggs without leaving the farm, the county agent having perfected arrangements whereby eggs are collected at stated intervals and taken to the association's headquarters at Lake City, where the incubator is located.

Weekly batches are taken off and every baby chick is sold before it is hatched, so great is the demand. This hatchery is to be increased to a 30,000 capacity in the near future.

Those who invested in the present incubator, as members of the association, have been paid dividends, and since its establishment marketing facilities have been increased.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Cotton of this year's crop ginned prior to Oct. 1 totaled 5,639,284 running bales counting 162,041 round bales as half bales and excluding linters, compared with 7,126,248 bales, including 98,059 round bales to that date last year, the census bureau announced today.

Europe's understanding of making the world safe for democracy is making the world rich with United States dollars.




