# **Animal Trainer** Faces Charge Of Chimpnaping

MIAMI (UPI)-For 40 grueling days, Robert Tomarchin was shipwrecked on a deserted atoll 125 miles from Pitcairn Island in the South Seas with only a baby chimpanzee to keep him company.

Tomarchin and his chimp lived on fish and bananas during their stay on the Island. He refused sevoral offers to be rescued because the skippers of passing ships would not take his companion aboard.

Pinally, residents of Pitcairn laland came for him in an open boat and Tomarchin was rescued along with his chimpanzee.

That was about 34 years ago. Tomarchin brought the chimpanzee back to the United States, raised him and taught the animal how to say "mama" and "no." 'The chimp grew up to become "Mr. Moke," a television star in

Miami and the center of a controversial struggle between Tomarchin and the St. Louis Zoo. The 27-year-old animal trainer today faced a "chimpnaping" charge for spiriting Mr Moke away from the St. Louis Zoo, which bought the animal from Tomarchin.

But Tomarchin, who was reared as an orphan and said he knows what it means to be alone, promised an all-out court fight to keep Mr. Moke from going back to a cage in the St. Louis Zoo.



The experiment may have solved one of the problems which lie in the way of eventual routine interchange of human hearts and organs. The formation of lethal venous blood clots was avoided by a new surgical method developed

His method was to leave in the host dog part of the wall of the auricles, or upper chambers of the heart, including the area where the entering veins return blood to the heart. Lower said that since venous blood flows slower than arterial blood it is more likely to clot.

In former attempts to transplantation the entire heart has been removed from the host and the donor heart has been stitched directly to the veins and arteries. As a result of the new technique, the heart action in the dog is normal and even responds by speeding up to meet the needs of the dog when it exercises.
