

Sheriff seeks tips on bank robbery

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is seeking information about a reported holdup at an Altamonte Springs Nations Bank night deposit machine just before 9 p.m. Monday.

A woman reports she was making a deposit of the day's receipts from a local business when the robbery occurred at the bank, located at 2601 West State Road 434 near Altamonte Springs.

The victim reported she was having difficulty opening the night deposit box just before the robbery suspect approached her with a handgun. It appears the night deposit box had been jammed intentionally, said Steve Olson, spokesman for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

The suspect is described as a black male last seen running across Wekiva Springs Road. Anyone with information is asked to call the Seminole County Sheriff's Office at 407-665-6600 or Crimeline at 1-800-423-TIPS.

Sanford Civic Center hosts cat show

SANFORD — Things got kind of catty in Sanford over the weekend.

More than 200 fancy felines and their owners came to Sanford for the City Beautiful Cat Club's two-day Spring Fling cat show.

Starting Saturday, the cats took their turns in each of the three judging rings in the Sanford Civic Center in hopes of receiving a spot on the "top 10" list for each of the three areas of showing. However, there was no best of show.

According to Show Secretary and Treasurer Emily Turner, cat shows, unlike their canine counterparts, do not award a single top honor.

"That's one thing that makes it less interesting than dog shows," Turner said. "We don't do best of show. Cat shows, unlike dog shows, are not specific enough to do that."

Instead, Turner said cats are judged in one of three areas — kittens, adults and premiers, which are spayed or neutered animals. Judges look at every animal in each area and choose

their top 10 based on a written set of standards determined by the Cat Fanciers' Association (CFA).

"However, once a cat is in the judge's ring, it becomes somewhat objective," Turner said.

"Beauty is always in the eye of the beholder."

Nevertheless, some cats do have a certain look most judges recognize and honor. Joni Pironi of Fort Lauderdale has one of those cats.

Ask many cat lovers attending the shows what "the perfect cat" looks like and they will point you to Pironi's 7-month-old Persian named Jim Doll. With her shiny coat, small ears and flat face, the long-haired feline hits the mark when it comes to the standard.

And, the judges have noticed. Pironi's goal for Jim Doll is to get to nationals, which means the kitten needs to earn 2,550 points at various cat shows during the year.

"This year, we have been to five shows, and she's done

well at every one," Pironi said. "We're almost

Grand jury indicts ax murderer

SANFORD — Thea Kersch testified at a grand jury hearing Tuesday, less than a month after the ax attack by a handyman in which she was left for dead and her husband was killed.

Following her 20-minute testimony, the Seminole County grand jury handed down an indictment for first-degree murder, first-degree attempted murder, burglary, and robbery against 39-year-old John Michael Buzia.

Thea and Charles Kersch, both 71-years-old, were attacked at their 460 W. Palm Valley Drive home in Winter Park. She

suffered fractures to her face and right arm and cuts to her head. Her husband was found dead on the kitchen floor with a gash to the head.

Buzia had worked for the couple as a handyman.

The case's lead investigator and Thea Kersch were the state's only witnesses on Tuesday.

When he was arrested the day after the March 14 attack, Buzia confessed to investigators that he waited 20 minutes in the couple's four-bedroom home until they arrived. He entered the home sometime between 1 p.m. and 2:30 p.m., then

Despite rainfall, fire danger continues

With the lack of rainfall, not only in Central Florida but throughout the state, more and more people are giving words of caution regarding the threat of wildfires.

Everyone is becoming involved including the Governor, businesses (mostly insurance companies) and local officials.

In early March, Governor Jeb Bush issued an executive order allowing local firefighters

involved in dangerous wildfires, to call out the National Guard, should the need arise. At that time, he pointed out that, in the first two months of this year, more than 1,300 fires had burned approximately 34,000 acres statewide. That figure has grown, even though there have been occasional days of rainfall.



AAA has also issued words of caution, offering tips for motorists who may find themselves in wildfire areas. AAA



The Big Picture

Commission needs to look at entire issue before voting on settlement

Despite controversy over the soup kitchen compromise — which was supposed to quell the controversy in the first place — it appears likely the Sanford City Commission will approve the mediated settlement agreement that limits the hours of operation and number of patrons the soup kitchen can serve. However, it could be the wrong decision if the commissioners fail to broaden their focus in order to look at the big picture surrounding the issue.

For the record, we believe the compromise — as it relates to the residents and the soup kitchen — is a good one. The residents' concerns are addressed and Seminole Volunteer Enterprises can accomplish its stated mission, though on a limited basis. Neither side fully gets what it wants, but that's the case in most compromises.

The problem rests with City Commission. Even if it approves the compromise, the debate over the soup kitchen will not go away. Commissioners have yet to address the legal ramifications of granting the development order which waived all of the off-street parking requirements. At the heart of the residents' lawsuit was the argument the city egregiously violated its own Land Development Regulations by granting the development order. City regulations require 40 parking spaces. Metts had only six, and even those were eliminated when Commission approved an ordinance outlawing parking on public rights-of-way.

"What's the big deal?" some may ask. Quite a bit, actually. While Metts' parking situation may not stop traffic like I-4 on a Friday afternoon, the larger question is what happens when the next organization asks for a substantial variance of city rules?

Who might do so? Well, Wal-Mart for one. The national retailer almost always aggressively pursues some type of variance whenever it builds a new store. And with the size of its Super Centers, it's not hard to imagine a situation where Wal-Mart might not have enough land for all the necessary parking. Having granted Metts a variance that requires her to provide no parking, how will the City Commission deny Wal-Mart or another large retailer when they ask for a variance of 100 or 200 less than the required minimum?

"That's an extreme example. Wal-Mart is not looking to build in Sanford," some might argue. True, but currently there is a national restaurant chain eyeing a piece of downtown property. The company's development office is watching this debate unfold because they may need to approach the Commission about a parking variance. The bottom line — Commission can't deny any request for a parking variance unless it wants to lose a very lengthy and expensive legal battle.

This leaves the commissioners with a dilemma: If they approve the compromise that could end acrimony between residents and the soup kitchen they still leave the taxpayers liable for hundreds of thousands of dollars in legal fees.

There is a possible solution. Companies in downtown Sanford, like Miracom, don't have adequate parking in front of their buildings. Instead, these companies provide parking in other sites. Miracom, for instance, pays for its employees to park in nearby lots. Before approving the mediated settlement agreement, the City Commission will have to approve an amended Development Order reflecting the reduction in the number of patrons Metts may serve. As part of the amendment, Commission should require Metts to implement a parking plan. Since Metts has agreed to serve 50 patrons three times per week rather than the original 100, the parking requirements would decrease. Such a reduction may allow Metts to establish parking agreements with nearby businesses, lease the adjacent property from the railroad company CSX, or work out other viable solutions.

The Sanford City Commission has an opportunity to rise above the rhetoric and bring peace to a rancorous debate, while at the same time protecting itself from costly lawsuits. Will commissioners succeed? Only if they're looking at the big picture. If they take the narrow view, get ready to open your wallets.

The making of the Propaganda Broadcasting Network

There are scientifically defensible opinions in opposition to "global warming," but they rarely see the light of day on ABC or any other network. On the limited occasions when they do, they are characterized as tales from the kook fringe that "legitimate" and "mainstream" scientists reject.

This is an issue not only about the environment but also about new regulations that will determine how we live our lives and what freedoms the government allows us to enjoy. The latest flap over oil prices has prompted liberals to again suggest that after government takes away our guns and more of our money, they'll be



coming after our SUVs, closing businesses judged to be "polluters" and hiring the newly unemployed to work in a huge government bureaucracy. This is a scenario favored by Vice President Gore, whose stated goal is the elimination of the internal combustion engine.

A television network owes viewers an opportunity to consider more than one side of an important issue. And it should employ the services of experienced reporters who are not supposed to be promoting an agenda but searching for truth.

In his 1996 book, "News Values," Tribune Publishing Company President Jack Fuller writes on the imbalance of environmental reporting. "Once journalists became persuaded that powerful interests were causing danger and using their strength to cover it up, the tilt set in. It was not easy to learn from news reports about the evidence sug-

gesting that emissions from tall smokestacks do not cause widespread acid rain damage to forests or that Agent Orange doesn't cause severe health problems in human beings or that the white-spotted owl seems to be living happily in undamaged numbers in non-old-growth forests."

Viewers of the DiCaprio Clinton interview are not likely to learn anything but what the environmental lobby wants them to learn. That's propaganda. Would ABC News consider asking NRA President Charlton Heston to interview a conservative president about gun laws, or the head of National Right to Life to ask a president about abortion? If the answer seems obvious, why is ABC News giving credibility to DiCaprio and his views by allowing him to interview President Clinton?

"And, many would say it holds the most prestige," Carter said.

The CFA is a non-profit organization founded in 1906 when it held its first licensed shows in Buffalo and Detroit. Today, more than 400 shows are held annually worldwide under CFA guidelines.

The CFA presently recognizes 33 pedigree breeds in the championship class, two breeds in the provisional class and five breeds in the miscellaneous class. Breeds include the popular Persian, the British short hair, the Devon Rex and the Javanese.

During the Sanford show, Keith McDaniel of Melbourne

Airlines in January for \$1.9 billion. The orders will be held jointly by Comair and ASA, which operates out of Dallas-Fort Worth and Atlanta. ASA was acquired by Delta last year.

The firm orders, to be delivered by 2004, include a mix of 40-, 44- and 50-seat CRJs that will enable both Comair and ASA to accelerate their plans for an all-jet fleet.

Comair's Florida operations should be all jet by next year, said David Siebenburgen, president and CEO of Delta Connection and former president of Comair.

"This order gives us the tools to do what we've been talking about since we announced the acquisitions," Siebenburgen said.

The aircraft orders, expected to fulfill both Comair and Atlantic Southeast Airlines' fleet growth plans for the next decade, also further Delta's plans to expand in the regional airline market.

The smaller capacity jets will give Delta the ability to serve smaller routes and feed the traffic into airport hubs with greater traffic, Siebenburgen said.

Delta and Bombardier are still discussing how to configure seating on the smaller capacity jets, but officials said they would probably include additional storage and galley areas.

Because the smaller capacity jets will be built using the same CFM engine and aircraft platform as the 50-seat version, they could be upgraded to carry

that many passengers.

The new jets also will allow the Delta Connection to expand direct flights to other larger markets, such as Comair's recently announced plans to offer direct flights to New York City's LaGuardia Airport and

Dallas' Love Field.

Comair now operates a fleet of 93 50-seat regional jets and expects to have an all-jet fleet operating out of its Cincinnati hub by the end of this year. Comair expects to introduce 20-seat regional jets next year.

suggests monitoring the car radio for updated reports of road closings, suggesting people take alternate routes when near a fire, and keeping a roadmap handy to determine the best alternate highway to take.

Wildfires aren't the only concern in this dry weather. Home safety is also a matter of concern. Allstate Insurance Florida Regional office has issued a statement regarding the dangers of wildland fires that have a tendency to be near residences. Allstate suggests clearing the roof and gutters of leaves and other debris, creating a defensible zone around the house, at least 30 feet, and keeping household items handy that can be used as firefighting tools such as a rake, an ax, chain saws, buckets and shovels.

FLASH, Inc., the Florida Alliance for Safe Homes, is suggesting, during this spring planting season, homeowners choose fire-resistant plants when they spruce up their landscaping. Plants characterized as less-flammable include dogwood, viburnum, ferns, redbud, sycamore, magnolia, red maple and others recommended by the University of Florida. FLASH recommends against planting

wildfire-prone conifers (cedars, pines and cypresses) too close to homes.

The American Red Cross suggests residents clearly mark all driveway entrances and display names and addresses, to assist firefighters in times of emergency calls, planning escape routes, posting fire emergency phone numbers, and reporting any potential dangers to the fire department or law enforcement at the earliest possible time.

Most recently, Florida State Fire Marshal Bill Nelson announced that his department and RadioShack are teaming up for the third year to distribute smoke detectors, free, to lower-income and elderly residents around the state. With 100,000 smoke alarms donated in the past, Nelson said Florida firefighters will give away another 21,000 this year. For information, phone the local fire department or 1-800-342-2762.

attacked the couple with an ax, killing the husband and leaving the wife critically injured, said Seminole County Sheriff Don Eslinger.

Buzia stole cash, credit cards and a car from the couple. Eslinger said the attack was motivated by the robbery.

Buzia found the ax in the garage of the couple's home, located in the gated Riverwalk neighborhood just north of the University of Central Florida.

"Major crimes investigators, deputies and technical services specialists worked long hours on this case," said Steve Olson, spokesman for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. "We believe we have strong evidence to get a conviction, including statements from witnesses."

Olson said that witnesses include Theo Kersch and bank personnel who saw Buzia try to cash a check belonging to the couple the next morning.

At about 8:30 a.m. the morning after the attack, Buzia attempted to cash a forged \$850 check belonging to the couple in the drive-in lane of the National Commerce Bank located at 2200 Aloma Avenue in Winter Park before the bank was open.

A teller recognized the license plate of the couple's stolen 1993 Toyota Camry as published in news reports, and called the Winter Park police.

Winter Park police had Buzia in custody at 8:45 a.m.

Investigators do not know how long Buzia had known the couple. However, Eslinger said Buzia had been performing work for the couple as a handyman the previous three days.

Buzia has an extensive criminal record which includes possession of drug paraphernalia and DUI. However, he denies that the attack is related to involvement with drugs.

Sanford team to compete in 7th Annual 'Great Moonbuggy Race'

HUNTSVILLE, AL - A high school team from Lake Monroe Christian Academy in Sanford and a college team from Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University in Daytona Beach are approaching their final tuneup phase in preparing for the 7th annual Great Moonbuggy Race, April 7-8 at the U.S. Space & Rocket Center in Huntsville, Alabama in which they will represent the state of Florida.

More than 40 teams — the most ever for the event — from 17 states and Puerto Rico have entered this year's race.

The competition is inspired by the first lunar roving vehicle, which was designed, developed and tested at NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville. The event challenges students to design and build a human-powered vehicle so they will learn how to deal with real-world engineering problems — similar to those faced by the original Marshall Center human rover team.

"This is an excellent program for inspiring high school students and students going into engineering fields," said Art Stephenson, director of the Marshall Center. "It's really exciting to build something and then actually see it work. And that's one of the fun things about the space program."

Teams must confront stringent requirements. For instance, prior to the race, the unassembled vehicle must occupy a space no more than four-feet high, four-feet wide and four-feet long. During the race, vehicles powered by two team members, one male and one female, race one at a time over a half-mile obstacle course of simulated mooncape terrain.

Winners in each category — high school and college — are determined by the fastest vehicle assembly time, plus time through the course. An additional prize is awarded to the team with the best technical approach to solving the engineering problem of navigating the "lunar" surface.

The event is sponsored by the Marshall Center, the U.S. Space & Rocket Center, and the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics.

The high school competition begins at 10:30 a.m. CST Friday, April 7th, with design judging.

High school teams will begin their timed runs through the course at 12:30 p.m.

An awards presentation will follow the race.

College division entrants compete Saturday, April 8th, with design judging at 7:30 a.m. CST and race times from 8:30 a.m. to approximately 5:30 p.m.



Junior's win highlights an exciting weekend

FORT WORTH, TEXAS

Sunday was "Little E Day" here, and the punch line to the DirecTV 500 was an Earnhardt family reunion in Victory Lane, this time with Dale Jr. being toasted by a proud father, for the first time on the Winston Cup tour — but probably not the last.

And NASCAR's marketing gurus would dearly love for this 25-year-old son of the meanest, toughest stock car driver of them all to become the sport's next superstar.

The Earnhardts shared the day with the race itself, the track and Rinston Smith's vision of racing's future.

At the end of the day, after 223,000 people had watched Earnhardt Jr. get his first Winston Cup win, the question of why NASCAR runs 10 Winston Cup races a year within three hours of Winston-Salem and only one within 1,000 miles of Dallas-Fort Worth makes all the marketing whizzes in Daytona Beach look pretty silly.

The racing itself was, if not great side-by-side stuff, certainly hot and heavy and more than entertaining enough to keep everybody's attention.

Indeed, one of the growing traits of super-fast Texas Motor Speedway is its extraordinary unpredictability.

Perhaps one reason is the exceptional asphalt racing surface, possibly the best on the tour — although a 10 mph cut in speeds might make the second groove come in a little quicker.

What other place has so behaved Jeff Gordon, who calls this "the toughest place to pass on the entire tour"? In one sense, it's a game. Darlington, one mistake and it's all over, as Dale Jarrett and so many others found Sunday during the 12-caution race that stretched on an interminable four hours.

What other place could bring Earnhardt to tears?

NASCAR is already two months into the season with seven different winners, a pace that if kept up would generate 31 winners by the end of the season.

Earnhardt Jr.'s victory came with an overpowering performance, even more remarkable after his three straight weeks of crashes, at Atlanta, Darlington and Bristol, that he conceded merely tested his confidence. He drove almost flawlessly that time, on a day that many of the best in the business wouldn't argue otherwise.

And then Junior crawled out of the car and dishes out that honest and refreshing "Golly, gee, aw shucks" stuff, with just the right touch of self-deprecating humor. Imagine what it must be like to be Dale Earnhardt's son, how tough listening to the taunts and teasing over the years. Then imagine what it must be like to get in a race car and try to live up to the man's reputation, to live up to his standards, on the track and off.

And then imagine what it must be like to finally succeed. But Sunday's win was not just a personal triumph for Dale Earnhardt Jr., and not just a family victory for a son who too often while growing up missed the old man who was busy out on the road making a living. It was also a triumph for Dale Earnhardt Inc., the business that Earnhardt Sr. cranked up only four years ago.


When Earnhardt Sr. announced that he was forming a race team of his own, nay-sayers said that he wouldn't spend enough money to get the good guys, that the venture would falter like so many run by star drivers who turned out to be less than star businessmen. But the elder Earnhardt has clearly proven them wrong. Of course, it helps that he has two of the biggest sponsors in the business.

The Earnhardts weren't the only son-and-father team on the track. Adam and Kyle Petty had their little bit of history, too. Adam, just 19, made his Cup tour debut (he'll run next at Charlotte) and did well, running 215 of the 334 laps before losing an engine. He experienced that moment of terror that comes when Dale Sr. or Tony Stewart takes the air off your spoiler, and he kept his nose clean.

"At least I didn't tear it up, and we learned a lot," Adam said.

"When the race started, I didn't know my limits. Then Tony Stewart took the air off me a couple of times, and Earnhardt took the air off me a couple of times, and I realized my limits then. And I realized how to race those guys. This is totally different than the Busch series. I think I'm a 10-times better race-car driver now than before I started this race."

They took no time to relish their stellar run. On Monday, Kevin Lepage's team headed to Talladega Superspeedway to test for the April 16 race. This is what a team that wants to win does — learn from one race and immediately start planning for another. There's little time to relax in the success of a moment.

So instead of celebrating tying his career-best Winston Cup finish of fifth, Lepage headed to Alabama to test. Or so he planned.

Instead, he watched it rain at the track. He headed to his hotel, only to be sequestered in the lounge with the other guests waiting for a tornado front to pass.

Ah, the glamorous life of a professional driver. Days such as Monday may not be the greatest, but Lepage and crew chief Pat Tryson mind them less and less. When things are going right, it's much easier to deal with the setbacks.

The two started working together shortly before the fall race at Darlington last year. Lepage qualified ninth for that race and wound up with his other fifth-place finish.

"For me, as a confidence-builder [that] was a boost," Lepage said.

To that point, his 1999 season had been a bit of a roller coaster. Tryson smoothed out the rough spots and started changing the pit crew and building new cars. In the off-season, the team auctioned most of its cars, determined to copy the one that put Lepage on the pole at Atlanta last fall.

"We worked real hard together, and through the off-season one of the things that we decided we were going to do, we were going to make all our race cars the same," Lepage said.

"When he [Tryson] came on board, they weren't the same. There were a lot of mismatched cars."

Things looked great. Then the team lost its sponsor and seemed in danger of folding. Jack Roush shocked the garage by promising to keep Tryson and Lepage together — sponsor or no sponsor.

They started this season with a blank car.
